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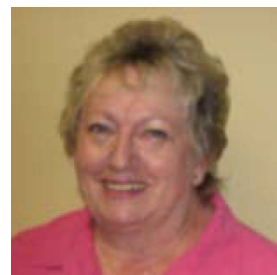

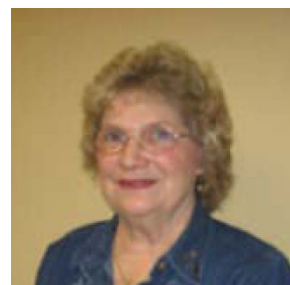
PLEASE REMEMBER to pay your MD4 and International Dues upon receipt of your bill.

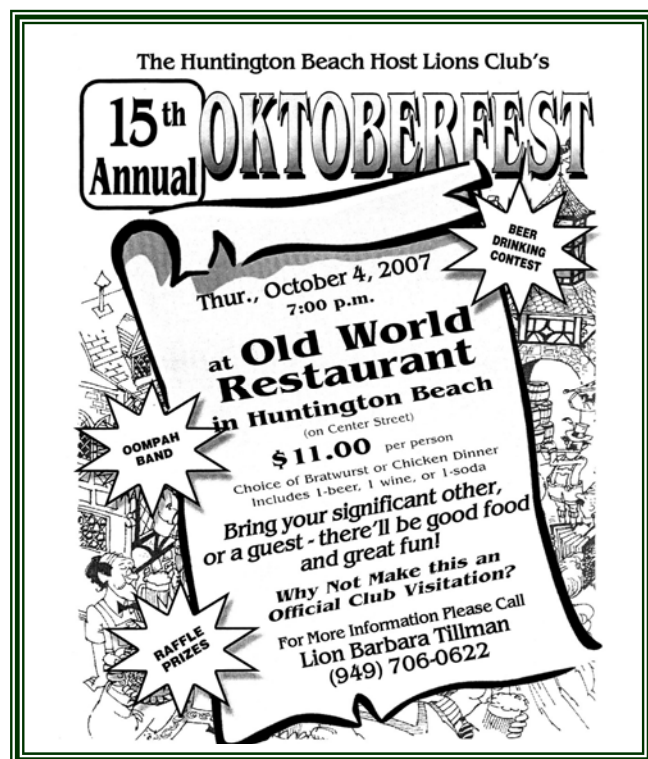

Marilyn Heitman, of the Ontario Upland Lions club, passed away on August 28, 2007. Marilyn was an Ontario Lioness for years and became a charter member of the Ontario Upland Lions Club in 1996. At the time of the charter, she was retired and lived in Imperial, California. She has maintained her membership and contributed to club projects. May she rest in peace.

As you all know, our own PDG Lowell Sneathen has had a very difficult time recently and many of us have been praying for him. I think the following story about prayer is appropriate.

Diane, a young university student, was home for the summer. She had gone to visit some friends one evening and time passed quickly as each shared their various experiences of the past year. She ended up staying longer than planned, and had to walk home alone. She wasn't afraid because it was a small town and she lived only a few blocks away.

As she walked along under the tall elm trees, Diane asked God to keep her safe from harm and danger. When she reached the alley, which was a shortcut to her house, she decided to take it. However, halfway down the alley she noticed a man standing at the end as though he were waiting for her.

She became uneasy and again asked God for protection. Instantly, she had a feeling of comfort and security. She felt as though someone was walking with her. When she reached the end of the alley, she walked right past the man and continued home safely.

The following day, she read in the newspaper that a young girl had been raped in the same alley just twenty minutes after she had been there. Feeling overwhelmed by this tragedy and the fact that it could have been her, she began to weep. She thanked the Lord for her safety and to help this young woman, she decided to go to the police station and tell them her story. She felt she could recognize the man she had seen in the alley.

The officer thanked Diane for her bravery and asked if there was anything they could do for her. She asked if they would ask the man why he had allowed her to pass and attacked the next woman who came through the alley. When the policeman asked him why, he answered, because she wasn't alone. He said she had a tall slender men walking along with her."

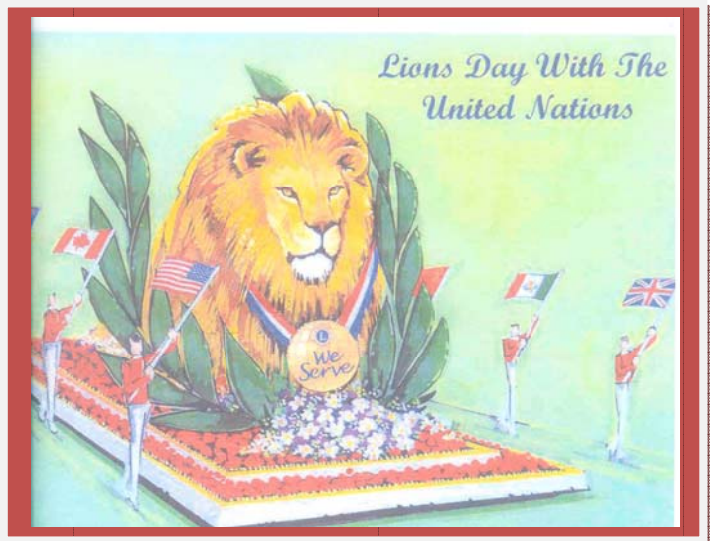

HEARING & SPEECH ACTION NEWS

October, 2007

Let's see, which of my attention-getting, lead-in sentences should I begin with this month?

1. Helen Keller said, "I am just as deaf as I am blind, and given the choice I would rather be able to hear".
2. Thirty-one million Americans have a hearing loss. In our age group that includes either the person to your left, the person to your right, or you yourself.
3. Of those with hearing loss, less than half have had a hearing test, and only 23% wear hearing aids.

Guess I'll use them all – we can use the motivation. What do you think we Lions could do about this situation?

First let's face the fact that, while we are doing wonders with our Sight First Campaigns, we have shown relatively little interest in the problems of the hard of hearing. Human nature being what it is, this is understandable, but it is of little use to dwell on the reasons for this laxity. If you haven't taken your first step you owe it to yourself to reach out and realize the personal satisfaction to be derived from participation in our Hearing & Speech Action activities. If you are already involved you can keep up with the latest LCIF version of the Affordable Hearing Aid Program (AHAP).

With two new hearing aid models now available from Rexton, Inc. that can benefit 95% of individuals with hearing loss, our job is to identify the 30% of that group who cannot afford help and refer them to our Hearing Aid Bank. Add an annual cash donation from your Club, find an audiologist in your area who will participate in our program and we have a recipe for success that each of us can be proud of.

TTT MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM

*Transfusion * Transition * Transformation*

A new educational program is teaching Lions a dynamic approach to service organization membership in the 21st century is being introduced by Lions Clubs International.

Dubbed the TTT membership program, training sessions use interactive and resource DVDs containing nine modules designed to infuse new life into a club through “the three T’s”—transfusion, transition and transformation (TTT).

The program stresses concepts such as learning to take risks, “failing” forward, seizing the moment and approaching change as an opportunity. The DVDs—which used Lions instead of professional actors—depict real-life hypothetical situations to illustrate specific aspects of membership including recruitment and retention, involvement, recognition, meeting management and public relations.

Rather than inviting new prospective members to a regular meeting, the program encourages leaders to extend an invitation to a fund-raiser or service project. Putting prospective members “on the scene” makes the club’s efforts tangible and illustrates the positive impact Lions have in the community — something prospective members might not get by sitting in on a meeting.

The program also encourages clubs to be flexible. Prospective and new members often lead lifestyles different from long-time members, and can’t make regularly assigned meeting times because of other commitments. Having members attend on an adjusted schedule or putting them in charge of a project that suits their scheduling needs are excellent alternatives that allow them to contribute as they can, according to the program.

The program also encourages clubs to take a proactive approach to public relations. Instead of waiting to be recognized for accomplishments, the program teaches clubs to be assertive in raising awareness about Lions’ community projects by putting up signs and attending PTA, school board and library board meetings. Engaging the public makes the club recognizable, and can lead to constructive relationships with public bodies.

Past International Director George “Mick” Barrus, of Cody, Wyoming, a TTT organizer and trainer, said the program has been well-received since its inception last year.

“We’ve been doing the training for six months, and we’ve had a significant number of requests,” Barrus said. “In Arizona, we trained 12 to present to a group of 180 attendees. All 180 came back after lunch. I think the program has raised awareness on the club and district level that we need to keep adapting, because people’s lifestyles have changed so dramatically.”

HISTORY OF THE WHITE CANE



In the United States, the introduction of the White Cane is attributed to Lion George A. Bonham (Peoria Lions Club). In 1930, he observed a man who was blind attempting to cross the street with a black cane that was barely visible to motorists against the dark pavement. The Lion offered to paint the cane white to make it more visible. By 1931, the Peoria Lions Club approved the project and white canes were made and distributed. The Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. The news of the club’s activity spread to other Lions Clubs, and the white cane became known by the blind and sighted alike as a means of identifying the safe mobility needs of the visually impaired. In 1931, Lions Clubs International began a program promoting the use of White Canes for people who are blind.

In the United States, laws vary from state to state, but in all cases, those carrying white canes are afforded the right of way when crossing a road and when in a public place.

Worth, Illinois, Lions Club President Greg Mazak, an attendee at a recent TTT seminar, said he identified with getting new and prospective members involved by bringing them to a fundraising or service project. “We have some younger members my son’s age, 25, 26 years old, and they’re having the time of their lives,” Mazak said. “They helped at the tree lot with some of the old-timers, and they had a blast. It was hysterical. Now we have the 26-year-olds and the 80-year-olds sitting together in the back constantly interrupting my dinner meeting. It’s a lot of fun.”

While the TTT membership program constitutes a unique and effective tool for clubs, Barrus said its effectiveness ultimately lies with the efforts of club officers to institute the principles of the program.

“In conducting the seminars, I really believe the important thing is that they take this program to the next level,” Barrus said. “I’m extraordinarily glad they are paying attention to this, but I want them to be able to take and implement a few ideas from the program that are important to them.”

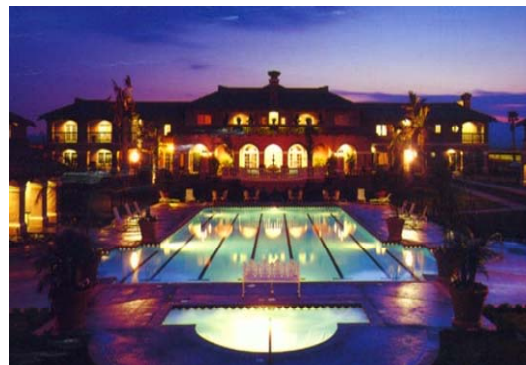
