It seems that every year at this time, somewhere in Southern California suffers serious wild fires. Sadly, it was the turn of cities in 4-L4 to face evacuations and ultimately, loss of houses, condos and apartments. Once again, Lions Clubs International Foundation is there to give some aid. With the help of ID Dana Biggs, I was able to get a \$10,000 emergency grant from LCIF and the money has been turned into gift cards from Target, just like last year. By the time you read this, the cards will have been distributed to some of those in need in the cities of Yorba Linda, Brea, and Anaheim Hills. A big thank you to Lion Tom Brown, the District Disaster Preparedness Chair, who worked so hard to get the help for the victims of this fire storm. There is also a 4-L4 Fire Disaster Fund to which clubs can contribute. There is already some \$2,500 that has been donated, and I know that clubs will be generous as their Boards consider this request. Once the money is available, it will be used to give added help to the people who need it most.

Over the last 5 years, LCIF has sent \$30,000 in emergency grants to our district, besides the grants given to other California districts when they have suffered these devastating events. I hope this will help Lions understand that the money donated for Melvin Jones Fellowships does come back to our own communities when needed, and is not only sent outside of the USA.

My official visits are done, and what a wonderful experience they have been. They have been a great insight into how our clubs are all different, and yet they are the same – devoted to serving our local communities by doing good deeds or donating money where needed, all the time sharing comradeship and having fun.

I have had the pleasure of inducting several new Lions, and I am only a phone call away when the time comes to get those new members officially into your clubs. Just give me a few days notice!!

The upcoming holidays are a time to be with family and friends, and I shall be lucky enough to have my own brother with me. He is coming for almost 5 weeks, and I hope many of you will have the chance to meet him.

Have a wonderful holiday season, and get rested ready for the next six months. We have much to do!!!


'We're going to stay at this exclusive little place over on Rome's Tiber River called 'Teste'.

Hearing & Speech Action News

Well, the Holiday season is upon us and our mailboxes are filled with greeting cards, utility bills and a stack of requests from myriad charitable organizations for donations. So why be different? Here's one more request from your Hearing Aid Bank. First, let's look at past performance

Lions Year	2005-06	2006-07	2007-0	8 Trend
Hearing Aids Collected	309	276	234	Down 24%
Hearing Aids Donated	19	32	51	Up 168%
Club Donations	\$2700	\$1400	\$2100	Mixed

So, more and more people are needing two hearing aids, the cost of each fitting has doubled in three years and more new aids are being used when fewer used aids are collected. Club donations will be the determining factor, along with the collection of recyclable aids, as to how many people in the community can be served.

The HAB was fortunate to receive in 2007 a one-time transfer of \$5072 in unused funds from a failed Theater Captioning Project; now it is time for District Clubs to pick up the slack. With 37 Clubs in the District an average annual donation of \$800 each would pay for 50 hearing aid fittings (until prices go up!)

Nominating Procedure

Today the News is quick to tell us about the things wrong with our youth. You as molders of the next generation and our future know how narrow a view this really is. The Lions agree.

Your local District 4-L4 Teen Recognition Program (TRP) was first started as a Saddleback Region project in 1989. District Governor Kevin Evans in 1992 introduced the program to the District, to widen the scope.

The purpose of the program is to recognize, support and reward teens for their efforts in volunteerism in promoting a drug, alcohol and tobacco free life-style

Applications are distributed by Lions clubs to local middle schools, high schools and community youth groups. Students aged 13 to 19 years old who have maintained a 2.5 GPA or above and have worked toward helping their peers attend a substance free lifestyle are eligible to receive applications. Applications are evaluated by the Lion's Teen Recognition Committee.

Students honored by TRP are active in both their schools and communities. They spend their free time volunteering in programs such as safe rides, PAL (Peer Assistance Leadership), Red Ribbon Week, D.A.N.C.E. (Drug Alternative Night and Counseling Event). Through the support of our Lions clubs, TRP annually acknowledges these students with plaques and cash honorariums at a special dinner in their honor.

The Teen Recognition Program's success depends on participation in the identification and selection of qualified young people. Lions clubs must ensure all schools, educators-and youth group leaders select and propose suitable candidates. Finally, the committee must make the final selection. If all activities are carried out in a timely manner the deserving Teens will be honored at the Saturday, January 31st, 2009 recognition dinner

The all day event provided those individuals either partially or totally visually impaired breakfast, lunch, entertainment and the chance to board a sailing vessel and cruise Newport Beach Harbor!! For some it was the first time being a "deckhand".



Our Seal Beach Lion volunteers enjoyed a nice breakfast before we started our service tasks. These included, but were not limited to, some administrative duties, food (breakfast and/or lunch) preparation and delivery, clean up of both and most importantly, escorting each sight impaired "Guest" to the highlight of this annual event: meeting their skipper and boarding the sailing vessel.

Tis the Season for Caring...





In hopes of raising money for the Littlest Lions Fund, a fund that supports children with visual impairments, Mr. Coffman gave out bags of candy with notes asking recipients to donate their spare change to the cause.

Mr. Coffman, a Claremont resident, lost his vision at the age of seven. However, he said that he has been fortunate enough to always have support and help from the people around hi and the financial support of the state during his schooling.

"People have done wonderful things for me all my life," Mr. Coffman said. "All my life people have said they believe in me, and this fund is a response to that. It's my way of contributing."

Mr. Coffman said he is involved with many of the activities and fundraisers the Lions Club puts on, however, he has had difficulty helping out with some of the other fundraisers due to his own visual impairment.

The Littlest Lions fund was Mr. Coffman's way of contributing to the lives of visually impaired children.

"I work with the Lions Club on say many activities they do, but it was difficult for me to really help out with some of those things," Mr. Coffman said. "I thought if I could come up with something where I could do most of the planning that I would be doing my part."

With the support of the Lions Club, Mr. Coffman started the Littlest Lions Fund this year. With the help of about 25 other volunteers, mainly other members of the Lions Club, Mr. Coffman was able to stuff 3,000 bags of candy and hand out a little over 2,000 bags on Halloween.

The bags included notes explaining the purpose of the fund and asking the recipients to put their spare change in the bag and take it to Wells Fargo in Claremont to be deposited in the fund.

"We're just testing it out and seeing if it brings in any rewards. We'll know more in a couple of months when we see if they bring anything back to Wells Fargo, but I think the Littlest Lions Fund will flourish."

The money Mr. Coffman is able to raise will go to support the needs of visually impaired children in the area. Support can range from paying for the children's glasses, canes or walkers to funding events, which will make them feel more included.

Mr. Coffman said from his own experience that one of the biggest burdens for handicapped people is overcoming a feeling of isolation. When he was a child, he remembers feeling left out when he realized he wouldn't be able to play baseball like the other children.

"Anything you can do to make these kids feel less isolated helps" he said. "If they feel like they're a part of the group, like they belong, they can deal wit their handicap better."

Mr. Coffman said he will continue the fundraiser each year and hopefully the Littlest Lions fund will accrue over time. He expects that children will want to get involved in raising money for the fund and he hopes the fundraiser will prove to be successful.

"I used to teach junior high kids and they were always excited to get involved," Mr. Coffman said. "We've had at least 2000 kids come here each year just to see the decorations, so last year I got to thinking that the kids might like to participate in something like this. We won't know how successful it was for a few months, but I really think kids will want to get involved and the Littlest Lions fund will thrive."
