Please remember to submit your club photos to PDG Jim North as soon as possible. This will be a great way to showcase your club at the Convention in May.


Also, if you would like to advertise in the Convention program, please submit your camera ready business card to Joanne Waltman.

THE LIONS CLUB AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, IRVINE HOSTS LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The President of the International Association of Lions Clubs, Mahendra Amarasuriya, recently visited the Lions Club at the University of California, Irvine on the morning of Sunday December 30th, 2007 to tour the campus research facilities and to learn more about the innovative hearing-related research currently being conducted at the University.

President Amarasuriya was in Southern California for the weekend to take part in the Lions Rose Parade float. Accompanying the President were over twenty other distinguished Lions from all over MD4 including, Past International Presidents Kay Fukushima and Bill Biggs, International Director Dana Biggs, Past International Director Bill Crawford, Past Council Chair Bob Smith, Council Chair George Skezas, L1 District Governor Lucky Lekhani, L2 District Governor Mike Brassard, and IPDG L6 Alice Tana. Representatives from L4 included District Governor Jon Casteel, VDG Elizabeth Warren, IPDG Jack Mauller, PDG Barbara Hayward and Keith Campbell along with the Lions from the UC Irvine club.

The visiting Lions began their tour with two short presentations by Jeff Carroll, President and Dr. Hamid Djalilian, Vice President of the Lions Club at the University of California, Irvine in which they outlined the goals of the new club that include building the Lions Hearing and Research Center at UCI.

"This is our Charter year, and we have already hit the ground running," said Carroll. "It was an honor to have the President's attention for the morning, and I think that we were able to demonstrate many of our club's strengths and potential".

Following breakfast and presentations at UCI's Beckman Laser Institute, the tour continued to the laboratory of Dr. Fan-Gang Zeng, Hearing and Speech Director, Department of Otolaryngology - Head and Neck Surgery, and a Lions Club at UCI Charter member.

At the laboratory, visitors learned about the work being done on cochlear implants (a device to restore hearing to the deaf) and met two actual cochlear implant patients who shared their experiences. The group continued their tour to the Natural Sciences building where they were entertained over lunch by hearing-related presentations by Dr. Fan-Gang Zeng, Lions Club at UCI Charter member, Dr. Vanessa Rothholtz, Lions Club at UCI Secretary, Matt Korn, graduate student, and Dr. Raju Metherate, Lions Club at UCI Charter member.

"It was a wonderful opportunity to be able to share our research and goals with the International President and the other Lions guests," Rothholtz stated. "The excitement generated by our discussions was palpable and left everyone hopeful about the future of our club."

THE LION'S HEARING CLINIC AND RESEARCH CENTER AT UC IRVINE


Features of the Lion's Hearing Clinic and Research Center:

The Lion's Hearing Clinic and Research Center will be a facility located on the main campus of UCI that will combine both research and clinical treatment of all hearing and balance related disorders. The clinical space would double the space currently provided for hearing at the UCI Medical Center. This would allow for growth of existing hearing aid and cochlear implant practices as well as the development of new treatment facilities, such as a tinnitus center. Tinnitus is a persistent sensation of ringing in the ears. The Center would also be dedicated to serving the community by the development of aggressive programs aimed at serving the underprivileged who do not have access to hearing health services and by the creation of education and awareness programs for the prevention of hearing loss.

The research facility would encompass more than 25,000 square feet of usable research space providing laboratories and offices for at least 15 faculty members. The space would be dedicated to human and animal research as well as cellular and molecular studies. The facility would also include conference rooms, meeting spaces and lunch areas, all designed to promote interaction and collaboration between faculty members.

The Scope of the Project:

The construction of a building is an enormous undertaking that requires the commitment of many people and the charitable support from thousands of donors. In order for this facility to be the Lion's Hearing Clinic and Research Center, the dedication of many districts and the approval of all of MD-4 is essential. This is most likely the largest project that has been put before MD-4 in many years, if not ever, but it is attainable. Similar projects have been successfully accomplished by other districts. Creation of the center will provide immeasurable benefits to the district, the state and beyond. Assisting the underprivileged, developing advanced technologies, and transferring this new technology to the public will serve the Lions with pride. This project could be a



crowning accomplishment for all of MD-4 and a testament to what can be accomplished by the dedication and commitment of the Lions

The Strength of Hearing Research at UCI:

The University of California, Irvine is home to 19 faculty dedicated to research in hearing with emphasis on the development of novel devices to treat hearing and balance disorders, the understanding of the causes of hearing related diseases and the development of models and theories into the most basic areas of hearing on both physical and neurological levels. These faculty members have collectively been responsible for hundreds of publications and research grants in their mission. The group continues to recruit new researchers who will contribute to the development of advanced technologies in hearing research.

Clinically, UCI's department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery has a strong reputation with a history of effective surgical and device related treatments for hearing disorders. More recently, UCI has begun expanding its cochlear implant program to allow patients access to the most up-to-date technologies and treatments.

NEW PROCESS FOR MONTHLY MEMBERSHIP REPORTING BY CLUBS EFFECTIVE APRIL 2008

Beginning in April 2008, there will be a change in submission dates for clubs to report their monthly membership reports (MMRs). These reporting changes will apply both to clubs that report their membership transactions online (through the online WMMR system) and for clubs that submit paper MMRs to international headquarters.

Clubs reporting online through the WMMR system, transactions must now be entered by the **last day of the current month**. And for clubs that file paper MMR reports, they must submit paper MMRs to LCI by the **20**th of the current month.



HEARING & SPEECH ACTION NEWS

February 1, 2008



We have captioned TV, captioned telephones and soon we will be looking at captioned radio.

First Over-The-Air Transmission From Special CES Station LAS VEGAS — At a press conference at the recent Consumer Electronics Show (CES) in Las Vegas, NPR, Harris Corporation, and Towson University announced the global accessible radio technology initiative and provided the first live demonstration of the accessible radio technology. The initiative will leverage cutting-edge HD Radio™ technology to enable hearing-impaired people to "see" live radio content on specially equipped receivers by applying television closed-captioning processes to radio broadcasts. HD Radio enables station operators to carry textual data that will be shown live on a screen on new versions of HD Radio receivers, essentially providing a closed-captioning transcript of live broadcasts for the deaf.

More than 1,500 radio stations are currently broadcasting in HD Radio in the United States. Over half of the CPB-qualified stations have been awarded HD Radio conversion grants by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. According to current estimates, by 2010, all 825 public radio stations should be broadcasting digitally.

During the press conference, the organizations showcased the first over-the-air transmission of the accessible radio technology. Attendees watched the text transcript of the NPR flagship morning news magazine "Morning Edition" on the HD Radio receiver's viewing screen, which is what a hearing-impaired listener will see using the technology. Additionally, the demonstration carried a digital radio reading service that will assist the visually impaired with daily readings of current books, newspapers and magazines.

"There is tremendous need for accessible radio for sensory-impaired people, including the deaf, hard-of-hearing, blind, visually impaired, print impaired, deaf/blind, and mobility impaired," said Dr. Ellyn Sheffield, assistant professor of psychology at Towson. "There is no question this initiative will have a profound impact on the quality of millions of people's lives. Finally, sensory-disabled individuals will have access to all radio programming, as well as radio emergency alerts and vital disaster recovery information."

LIONS CAMPAIGN SIGHT FIRST II

Since 1990 the Lions of the world have provided services for preventable blindness to over 27 million people worldwide. Long known as the "Knights of the Blind", Lions have been dedicated to eradicating preventable and curable blindness. Programs have been put in place worldwide towards that effort.

Currently the Lions have undertaken the largest fundraising effort in world history towards that end. Lions Campaign Sightfirst II has put a goal of raising \$200 million before July 1, 2008. Those funds will be used for cataract surgeries, loss prevention clinics and building hospitals, distributing medication, and training medical personnel.

The challenge has been put forth for individual Lions and Lions Clubs to help raise the funds. They have been asked for personal donations and solicitations as well as for corporate and business donations. To date the organization has raised close to \$130 million. The goal is within sight.

Most recently a challenge was given to the Lions of the world to reach for "The Power of 30". It has been determined that the sight of 30 people can be saved with each donation of \$180.00.

Additional facts include that every 30 seconds six people will go blind; less than 30 percent of the world's blindness is incurable; so far the Lions have opened 30 WHO childhood blindness clinics around the world.

As the campaign reaches its conclusion in July of this year, Lions around the world will continue to work towards the goal of \$200 million raised. It is comforting to know that all funds raised will go to the benefit of those less fortunate. Even as the campaign ends, Lions will continue their tireless efforts towards being "Knights of the Blind".






