I am very pleased to report that I know of no lost Lions in recent days. There are Lions who are ill and suffering, and I would ask that you pray for them. Since I have no losses to report, I will take this opportunity to submit a story.

ATTITUDE IS EVERYTHING

John is the kind of guy you love to hate. He is always in a good mood and always has something positive to say. When someone would ask him how he was doing, he would reply, 'If I were any better, I would be twins!' He was a natural motivator. If an employee was having a bad day, John was there telling the employee how to look on the positive side of the situation.

Seeing this style really made me curious, so one day I went up and said to him, 'I don't get it! You can't be a positive person all of the time. How do you do it?'

He replied, 'Each morning I wake up and say to myself, you have two choices today. You can choose to be in a good mood or ... you can choose to be in a bad mood. I choose to be in a good mood.' Each time something bad happens, I can choose to be a victim or...I can choose to learn from it. I choose to learn from it. Every time someone comes to me complaining, I can choose to accept their complaining or... I can point out the positive side of life. I choose the positive side of life.

'Yeah, right, it's not that easy,' I protested. 'Yes, it is,' he said. 'Life is all about choices. When you cut away all the junk, every situation is a choice. You choose how you react to situations. You choose how people affect your mood. You choose to be in a good mood or bad mood. The bottom line: It's your choice how you live your life.'

I reflected on what he said. Soon hereafter, I left that job to start my own business. We lost touch, but I often thought about him when I made a choice about life instead of reacting to it.

Several years later, I heard that he was involved in a serious accident, falling some 60 feet from a communications tower. After 18 hours of surgery and weeks of intensive care, he was released from the hospital with rods placed in his back.

I saw him about six months after the accident. When I asked him how he was, he replied, 'If I were any better, I'd be twins...Wanna see my scars?' I declined to see his wounds, but I did ask him what had gone through his mind as the accident took place.

'The first thing that went through my mind was the well-being of my soon-to-be born daughter,' he replied. 'Then, as I lay on the ground, I remembered that I had two choices: I could choose to live or...I could choose to die. I chose to live.'

'What did you do?' I asked.

'Well, there was a big burly nurse shouting questions at me,' said John. 'She asked if I was allergic to anything ' Yes, I replied.' The doctors and nurses stopped working as they waited for my reply. I took a deep breath and yelled, 'Gravity'.'

Over their laughter, I told them, 'I am choosing to live. Operate on me as if I am alive, not dead.'

He lived, thanks to the skill of his doctors, but also because of his amazing attitude... I learned from him that every day we have the choice to live fully. Attitude, after all, is everything.

Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.'

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training October 2010

With the recent increase in earthquake activity in Southern California and the fact that we are long, long overdue for a major earthquake, disaster preparedness is crucial for all of our communities. There are two things your clubs can do to prepare: schedule our Disaster Preparedness program presentation for a club meeting and enroll your members, families and friends in the District Lions-sponsored CERT class.

CERT training is a nationwide program sponsored by FEMA and is an important aspect of disaster preparedness. After a widespread disaster, such as a major earthquake, emergency services may be overwhelmed and unable to respond in an organized manner for at least 3-5 days, in which event, <u>YOU</u> will be the <u>FIRST RESPONDER</u> to the emergency. It will be <u>YOU</u> who provides fire suppression, triage, disaster medical treatment, search and rescue. Please see the attached flyer for details on the CERT class offered to Lions in October.

CERT training covers the following topics:

- Disaster Preparedness (disaster workers, impact on infrastructure, hazards and their mitigation, home, workplace and community preparedness)
- Fire Safety (fire chemistry, CERT size up, firefighting resources, fire suppression, hazardous materials)
- Disaster Medical Operations (Part 1) (treating lifethreatening conditions, triage)
- Disaster Medical Operations (Part 2) (establishing treatment areas, head-to-toe assessments, treatment for burns, wounds, fractures, hypothermia)
- Light Search and Rescue Operations (size up, conducting search operations, conducting rescue operations - do not become another victim)
- CERT Organization (organization, decision making, documenting, tabletop exercise)
- Disaster Psychology (team well being, working with survivors' trauma)
- Terrorism and CERT (what is it, targets, weapons, indicators)
- Disaster Simulation.



Dear Lions:

Like me, I'm sure that you have been following the news reports of the deadly flooding in Pakistan. My heart goes out to the 20 million affected by this disaster. As the flood waters and death toll continue to rise, Lions are committed to helping.

Lions have been providing assistance since the devastating flooding began July 22 and LCIF is providing US\$120,000 to help Lions in providing relief to their communities.

You know well that Lions Clubs greatest asset is our volunteers – you the 1.36 million Lions around the world. Where ever there is a need, there is a Lions club nearby, ready to respond with their hearts and hands. In the case of disasters, we are the first to offer help, and the last to leave.

I was moved by a video created by the Lions of Pakistan. While it shows the effects of the disaster, it also shows hope – hope for brighter days ahead. This hope is because of Lions. Thy have put aside their own needs to help their neighbors, providing needed relief supplies and shelter.

We have received a lot of inquiries from Lions asking how they can help. Lions in Norway have donated US\$81,000, District 105-1 Ireland has donated US\$6,500, three clubs in District 201-W1 Australia have donated a total of \$2,200, and Lions in England have informed me they are sending funds to LCIF in support of this disaster. You can also give hope through a designated donation to LCIF for Pakistan relief.

We are truly committed to long-term relief, and Haiti is one example where our work remains ongoing. The Lions of Haiti have done a great job given the wide-spread devastation and the local constraints that exist. Six hundreds Haitian families will move into new homes thanks to an initiative between LCIF, the Lions of MD111 Germany, and HELP, an international non-governmental organization (NGO). This is the first of many reconstruction projects to receive support from LCIF thanks to the generous response from the international family of Lions following the devastating earthquake in Haiti.

Through the project, homes will be erected directly on a family's plot of land, thus avoiding the hardship of further displacement and any potential property disputes. The building of these homes is an important first step toward reestablishing normal life for families who lost their homes and so much more after the earthquake.

From Haiti to Pakistan, China to Tennessee, Lions and our Foundation are rebuilding homes and lives.

Many of you know that a lot of donated eyeglasses are not reusable for overseas missions. In fact only 30-40% of the glasses collect by Lions In Sight can be recycled that way. The rest have scratched lenses, broken frames, are sunglasses or are "out of range. Out of range glasses are so named because they have a significant difference between the prescriptions in the two lenses or have a large amount of correction for astigmatism. The standards for sorting glasses are set forth by Lions Clubs International and are the standards followed by Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centers throughout the United States.

Eyeglasses that are not cleaned and sent out on missions are recycled in other ways. Little is thrown away. Sunglasses, plastic frames and glasses in plastic frames that cannot be used are donated to the non-profit organization—Feed the Children. 110,000 pairs of glasses where donated to this organization last year. Once the lenses are removed, some reusable metal frames are recycled and distributed to needy patients at Lions in Sight clinic missions. Local optometrists then make custom lenses for the more difficult prescriptions. Some metal frames, particularly those vintage models in high demand now, are sent to an optical recycler for scrap or resale. Money raised from the recycling of frames that can't used helps to subsidize doctor's travel expenses and for operational expenses.

In addition to supplying Lions In Sight's own clinic missions and permanent clinics with 775,000 pairs of donated glasses, glasses are routinely provided to non-Lion humanitarian groups both here and abroad. During the 2009-2010 fiscal year, 25,000 pairs of glasses were shipped from the Lions in Sight warehouse for vision screenings conducted in Bolivia, Chile, Ghana, Haiti, Honduras, India, Mozambique, Serbia, Sudan and Thailand.

Lions in Sight as two specially trained volunteers who sort through donated glasses once a week and take out some of the fancy sunglasses that are donated and sell them on E-Bay. Ray-Ban's, Maui Jim's or Oakley's are sold that way. Since Lions in Sight does not use sunglasses this has a little effect on the overall recycling program.

On behalf of the entire warehouse staff, Lions in Sight would like to thank all of the Lions, Lioness and Leo Club members who participate in the collection of used eyeglasses for their recycling program. Without your support, Lions in Sight could not bring the gift of sight to people in need around the world.



Hearing & Speech Action News

As Helen Keller also said....

"I'm just as deaf as I am blind, and if had the choice, I'd rather have my hearing restored than my sight. With vision, you can see things, but with hearing you can hear and interact with people!" And when you tell people that they generally act surprised and tend to disagree with that idea.

So tell me, why do Lions work so hard on projects like SightFirst, eyeglass recycling, guide dogs for the blind, etc. but practically ignore LCI programs like HARP – Hearing Aid Recycling Project and AHAP – Affordable Hearing Aid Project? My theory, after 25 years in the business of coaxing people to do something about their hearing loss, is that human nature in the form of vanity, ego or whatever you want to call it interferes with common sense and consideration for the people who have to put up with your problem.

OK, you can do as you wish about your own situation, but as Lions, we can and should put forth a reasonable effort to help others cope with hearing loss. "We serve", right? Now here is something you can do with little effort and minimal cost. This is not like organizing a mission to Mexico to fit glasses or helping to raise a couple million dollars to fight river blindness. The Hearing Aid Recycling Project can be your Club Project for the coming Lion's year. It's as easy as 1-2-3.

Here's how.

- Get some eyeglass collection boxes from LCI, about \$7 each in boxes of 10.
- Add a label "LIONS RECYCLE Eyeglasses; Hearing Aids; Cell Phones"
- Place boxes in mobile home parks, senior centers, optometrists and audiologists offices, libraries, drug stores, etc. and follow up with monthly inspections.

Call me to process the hearing aids, give the glasses to Lion Diane Martin or PDG Jack Luellen and keep the cell phone income for your Club's charities – like the Hearing Aid Bank, maybe?
