






Chaplain's Corner PDG Chuck Overbey

District Helps Pomona Host Celebrate Its 90th Anniversary

The Pomona Host Lions Club, joined by Lions dignitaries and Lions members from clubs throughout the district, celebrated its 90th Anniversary on Friday, March 18, 2011 at the Pomona Valley Mining Company. Chartered on March 4, 1921, Pomona Host is the oldest club in the district and the tenth oldest in all of California, Nevada and Hawaii. Lions founder Melvin Jones spoke at the Charter Night, and other Lions International officers attended.

The keynote speaker for the March 18th event was International Director Bob Smith, who flew down from Sacramento with his wife Vickie. Also making remarks were District 4–L4 Governor Norm MacKenzie, Los Angeles Host Lions (which sponsored the club in 1921) President Gilbert Mares, Pomona Mayor Elliott Rothman, who presented a city tile to the club, and Foothill Region Chair Jack Tanaka, whose club, the Diamond Bar Breakfast Lions, was sponsored by Pomona Host. Pomona Host President Jack Lightfoot served as the Master of Ceremonies, and PCC Phil Browne introduced Bob Smith.

The 85 attendees dined on prime rib au jus or salmon. Following dinner was the Parade of Presidents, during which twelve Pomona Host Lions past presidents were basked in a spotlight and marched in to presidential music. Club member Frank Alvarez announced each of the presidents. The oldest living past president is Jack Johnson, who joined Lions in 1948 and was president in 1956–57.

Throughout the social hour and dinner, a slideshow of photos from 1921 to 2011 was shown. The entertainment was a

Pomona's 90th Anniversary Celebration continued

medley of "Songs through the Ages," sung by Soprano Coril Prochnow and Bass Baritone Mark Palmer and accompanied by Janet Noll, all from the Repertory Opera Company.

The room, a corner banquet hall with windows on two sides overlooking the city, was especially elegant for the evening. The flower arrangements, created by Marilyne Sherwood, consisted of white lilies and roses and were arranged in large displays for the head table and the registration table and in tall dramatic vases for the round tables. In keeping with the Emerald Anniversary theme, small faux emeralds were sprinkled on mirrors under the flower vases, and the tables were covered with green tablecloths. The napkins and programs were ivory.

On display was club historical memorabilia—scrapbooks, a pin display and the club bell cart, which had been transported from the Historical Society of Pomona for the evening. Also on display and in the program were congratulatory letters and certificates from Lions dignitaries and elected officials: International President Sid Scruggs, International Director Bob Smith, District 4–L4 Governor Norm MacKenzie, U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein, U.S. Congresswoman Grace F. Napolitano, U.S. Congressman Gary Miller, State Senator Gloria Negrete–McLoud, State Senator Bob Huff, Los Angeles County Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich, Pomona Mayor Elliott Rothman, Diamond Bar Mayor Steve Tye, and Pomona Unified School District Superintendent Richard Martinez.

Stories from the club's impressive and sometimes colorful past were shared during the event. An especially noteworthy project of 1922 involved the origins of the Los Angeles County Fair. Club members proposed an agricultural fair, publicized it, promoted it by wearing straw hats with streaming red ribbons to business and social events, and got it adopted by the city council. Soon the fair transformed into the Los Angeles County Fair, and L.E. Sheets, our club's second president, became the the first president of the Fair Board. Another interesting bit of history was the club's 5-piece band, which became world-renown as it played at 17 international conventions. An historic project of lasting merit was the club's support of member LeRoy Haynes by building parts of LeRoys Boys Home, now known as the LeRoy Haynes Center. Our Braille bus project, which provides weekly trips for local residents to classes at the Braille Institute in Los Angeles, has lasted for 47 years and is still continuing.

Less distinguished stories involved such events as selling Seagull insurance for the Catalina District Conventions, transporting a live horse to the second floor for a meeting, and club member Frank Alvarez's lining up to land on the taxiway, instead of the runway on a long-distance club visitation to Bakersfield.

Each attendee was given the limited edition Pomona Host Lions 90th Anniversary pin, which depicts a lion with glasses reading a book, symbolizing the club's substantial involvement in vision and educational projects. The evening concluded with the drawing for door prizes and table flowers. The winning raffle tickets for the two LA Fair competition quilts were also drawn.

The 90th Anniversary Committee was co-chaired by Past Council Chair Phil Browne and Immediate Past President Gil Smith. Other committee members were Frank Alvarez, Patrick Daniali, Jo Fulton, Amanda Gonzalez, Anne Henderson, Jack Lightfoot, Barbara E. Smith, Beverly Sugerman and Mary Wallace.

HEARING – THE UNDER-RATED SENSE

Our ears never sleep. The ability to hear is such an integral part of our lives that most people take it for granted, and we seldom realize how important it is to us until we think that we might lose it. While hearing loss is the world's single most preventable disability, it is also one of the most common. Being aware of our own hearing is the first step toward protecting it.

Why do we depend so heavily on our hearing? An unborn child picks up sounds, voices, and even music, storing them as unconscious memories in its brain. Later on, it associates these familiar sounds with safety and security. After it is born, a properly functioning sense of hearing helps the child learn to speak and to understand speech.

Good hearing gives us spatial orientation. For example, when we are in traffic, how often do we hear an approaching vehicle before we can see it? To be able to judge how close a vehicle is and from what direction it is coming, we need two ears that are functioning correctly.

Hearing opens up the world of the spoken word. It is the key to interpersonal relationships and social activities. In conversation, it is not just the words themselves that matter, but also the intonation and volume that give the words their full meaning. What would we do if we were no longer able to identify these fine distinctions and undertones?

Some sounds, such as music, the sounds of nature, or the voices of loved ones, speak to us on an emotional plane. Because of this, good hearing plays a crucial part in our perceived quality of life.

Think about it. And make sure your doctor includes a hearing check during yhour next physical exam.
