On Thanksgiving Day PDG Ellen Liebherr will put on her chef's hat to run the American Family Housing Thanksgiving Dinner for the homeless and less fortunate. A repeat of last year, about 300-400 people are expected at the Westminster Community Center.

The dinner is traditional fare – turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, dressing, cranberry sauce, green beans, salad and dessert.

Last year there was great support from local Lions and friends. Since this a District approved project we hope that more Clubs would like to get involved. Here are a number of ways:

Dear Lion,

Earlier this week as Superstorm Sandy was near landfall on the East Coast, we let you know that Lions would be there for those in the storm's path. We know the devastating impact that a disaster can have in a community and as always, our thoughts and prayers are with those who were affected, including members of our own Lions family. As Lions, we have once again demonstrated our quick response in the time of need, and we want to update you on relief efforts.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) awarded a US\$100,000 Major Catastrophe Grant with money from the disaster relief fund, allowing Lions in affected areas to immediately begin providing assistance. Many Lions are already working with local food banks, police and fire departments and other local organizations.

In addition to the Major Catastrophe Grant, LCIF has awarded US\$100,000 in emergency grants to Lions districts in North Carolina, Maryland, New Jersey, Connecticut and New York. LCIF was able to award these funds from the disaster relief fund, thanks to Lions who generously donated knowing that in times of disaster there is an urgent and great need.

Follow our efforts online through the <u>LCI blog</u>, <u>Twitter</u> and <u>Facebook</u>. LCIF is expecting and is ready for many more <u>emergency grant</u> requests as Lions assess the needs of their communities and power is restored. We also encourage Lions to consider making a donation to the Foundation for disaster relief. <u>Donations</u> to the disaster relief fund are Melvin Jones Fellowship eligible.

We believe that "In A World of Service," one person can make a difference, but together we can have an even greater impact.

California Lions Friends in Sight have fully charged into fall by doing 5 vision clinics in an 8 week period. Many miles were put on traveling from Phelan in the north to Thermal in the east and Tecate Mexico in the south and Rancho Cucamonga in the west. Then Senator Emerson's Senior Health Faire in San Jacinto was thrown in just for good measure. During the 5 vision clinics, 1,731 people had their vision improved. This means CLFIS has helped improved the vision of 2,624 individuals since July 1, 2012.

Since the start of this fiscal year, July 1st, there have been 28 various Lions Clubs from 3 different districts ,4L5, 4L4, 4L2, that have provided volunteer help to man the vision screenings. Western University School of Optometry, American Career College School of Optometry, and the Coachella Valley High School Partnership Academy have provided many students to assist as well.



TUSTIN LIONS WHITE CANE SAFETY DAY TEACHES ABOUT VISION PROBLEMS

The goggles, which simulate various vision conditions, were part of White Cane Safety Day, held Monday at the Tustin Library.

About 50 people petted guide dogs and assist dogs, tried their hand at an obstacle course wearing the low-vision goggles and heard from the White Cane Marching Society members how to march in formation.



The most popular activities were the guide and assist dogs and the vision simulation goggles, said Judy Barr of the Tustin Host Lions Club. "That was really an eye-opener for everybody who tried it," Barr said. About four kinds of vision impairment could be simulated with the goggles. People wore the goggles and carried a cane to try to navigate their way around the Tustin Library courtyard – past benches and trash cans, over cords on the ground and off sidewalk curbs.



Lions Club International District Governor P.J. Smith spoke to the small crowd about the club's history in advocating for sight issues. The Tustin Host Lions Club organized White Cane Safety Day to make residents more aware of blindness, with help from the Blind Children Learning Center, Canine Companions Inc., the city of Tustin, Tustin Parks and Recreation, and the White Cane Marching Society and Drill Team

POMONA HOST LIONS DIVE UNDER TABLES FOR SHAKEOUT

For the October 18th Great California ShakeOut, 24 Pomona Host Lions and one guest dove under the tables at the Pomona Valley Mining Company, practicing the "Drop, Cover and Hold On," which is the recommended action when a large earthquake hits.



Members, ranging from their 20s to 80, took cover and remained there for 30 seconds. According to the club's Disaster Preparedness Chairman Steve Storbakken, in a real quake, people may have to remain for more than four times that long.



Prior to the drill, Storbakken spoke to the club about preparing for a catastrophic California earthquake and about the progress being made on an early warning system. Lion Storbakken is the Director of Environmental Safety and Disaster Resource Center Coordinator for the Pomona Valley Hospital Medical Center and formerly was the Emergency Preparedness Director of the American Red Cross Rancho Region.







HEARING & SPEECH ACTION NEWS

RESTAURANTS SERVE UP AN EXTRA HELPING OF HEARING LOSS

Noise-induced hearing loss (NIHL) is not limited to construction, factory or farm workers as some might presume - just ask a waiter or a retail employee. Many restaurants average nearly 100 dBA, per a recent article in the New York Times. "The risk to hearing from hazardous noise exposure is a product of sound level and duration," said Deanna Meinke, PhD, a Colorado audiologist. "A particular dBA level can be safe or dangerous depending on the exposure time. Permissible exposure levels (90 dBA for eight hours) are mandated by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) for service personnel such as waiters." This metric has been debated, and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health has proposed changing the maximum eight-hour exposure to 85 dBA. Many people in the hearing conservation business have adopted the 85 decibel standard.

Would a waiter who worked eight hours at 96 dBA be at risk of hearing loss? "Yes, if this waiter received 230 percent of his OSHA daily dose," said Dr. Meinke. "And if he rode a motorcycle home, played in a band or mowed the lawn he would be at greater risk. Noise exposure is cumulative throughout each day and throughout our lifetimes."

Different techniques are being used to help people at risk to understand how irreversible and devastating it is. Dr. Meinke asks," What's your favorite sound? And what if you never hear that sound again, and it was replaced with a neverending annoying sound (tinnitus)?" There is no guarantee that science will be successful in correcting hearing loss in our lifetime and, even if advances are made they are unlikely to provide the pristine sounds that healthy ears provide now.
