AUDIT COMMITTEE

• The committee received an update from Lions Clubs International Internal Audit and will continue to follow up and monitor action plans.

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

- Denied a third vice president election complaint filed by Past International Director Rosane Jahnke, and affirmed Fabricio Oliveira as International Third Vice President for the 2021-2022 year.
- Reviewed the suspension of the district governor from 3233-E2 (India), removed Sudhir Kumar Goyal as district governor, and declared a vacancy in the office of district governor. Instructed the district to fill the district governor vacancy in accordance with Article IX, Section 6(d) of the International By-Laws.
- Approved the "General Incorporated Foundation Nihon Lions" as a foundation in Japan, in accordance with the Board Policy Manual, Chapter XV, Paragraph A.6.d.3.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE

- Approved in-person registration rates for the 2021-2022 District Governors and Council Chairs to be reduced to US\$100 for the upcoming 2022 International Convention.
- Approved the 2022 International Convention to include a virtual convention component.
- Approved international election procedures to permit use of an electronic platform for voting in person at the International Convention.
- Approved per diem for convention appointees and staff for the 2022 International Convention.
- Approved update to Chapter VIII, Paragraph C.5. of the Board Policy Manual, to include past and present trustees in the memorial service at convention.

DISTRICT AND CLUB SERVICE COMMITTEE

- Recognized the United Arab Emirates as a provisional region and appointed Zone Chairperson Amer Bitar to serve the area as Region Chairperson.
- Appointed Past District Governor David Wilson to serve as the District Governor for District 105-N (British Isles).
- Appointed Past International Director Geoffrey Leeder to serve as Coordinating Lion for District 105-N (British Isles).
- · Approved the redistricting proposal submitted

by Multiple District 325 (Nepal) to bifurcate the districts into Districts 325-C, 325-D, 325-E, 325-F, 325-G, 325-H, 325-I, 325-J, 325-K, 325-L, 325-M, 325-N, 325-P, 325-R, and 325-S to take place at the adjournment of the 2022 International Convention.

- Approved the redistricting proposal submitted by District 322-F (India) to bifurcate into District 322-F and 322-H to take place at the adjournment of the 2022 International Convention.
- Appointed Past District Governor Douglas Small to serve as the District Governor for District N-1 (Canada) for the remainder of the 2021-2022 year.
- Revised the Standard Form District By-Laws to no longer require the submission of a visitation report following club visits.
- Revised the District Governor Reimbursement Policy to cover the mailing of items to clubs when the club visit is conducted virtually.

FINANCE & HEADQUARTERS OPERATION COMMITTEE

- Approved the 2021-2022 fiscal year 1st Quarter Forecast, reflecting a deficit.
- Revised the Executive Officer Travel and Expense Reimbursement Policy.
- Revised the Procurement Policy of the International Association of Lions Clubs.
- Approved the waiver of entrance and charter fees through June 30, 2022.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- Confirmed the alternative plan for a virtual 2022 First Vice District Governor/District Governor-elect (FVDG/DGE) Seminar Days 1-3 to replace the seminar content originally scheduled for February 2022.
- Confirmed the addition of a second day for the FVDG/DGE Seminar at the convention in Montréal, making it a two-day seminar.
- Approved the addition of the Nepali group for the 2021-2022 FVDG/DGE Seminar and an exception of the LCIP requirement for Nepali group leader for this year's seminar.
- Approved Past International Director Sanjay Khetan as the 2021-2022 Nepali group leader.
- Approved an increase to the DGE Seminar gift budget by \$38,354 for the 2021-2022 FVDGs/ DGEs.

LONG RANGE PLANNING (AUG 2021 MEETING REPORT)

· Received an update on the Lions International

Strategic Plan.

- Received an update on the study of the role of the District Governor and reviewed an analysis of the current methodology for District Governor budget allocation.
- Reviewed International Director endorsement qualifications.
- Discussed the creation of a Marketing Think Tank, and the approach to developing marketing skills, confidence, and competence at the club level.
- Reviewed election procedures for positions of LCI International Directors and 3rd Vice President.

MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

- Reviewed the PR Grant program and recognized the growth in the popularity of the initiative. This year, 32 PR Grants have been approved for funding, which has effectively exhausted the annual budget of US\$400,000 for the program.
- Reviewed a request from Multiple District 318, Multiple District 3232, and Multiple District 3233 in India to utilize surplus funds for the acquisition of office space to support Lions' activities, training, and other initiatives. The committee tabled a decision to review the request in more detail and to refer the request to the Finance Committee. The committee will review during the next board meeting.
- Revised Board Policy Chapter XIX to remove discontinued titles of New Voices Constitutional Area Chairperson and New Voices Constitutional Area Speaker from international protocol.
- Revised Board Policy Manual Chapters II, XVI, and XIX to align the name of the Marketing Committee with the previous decision.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

- Requested the Finance Committee consider an extension of the fee waiver.
- Reviewed progress updates on the Specialty Club Program.
- Reviewed progress updates on the Global Membership Approach rollout and data showing success within pilot districts.
- Reviewed and approved Membership Development Grants.
- Reviewed and approved the 2022-2024 Leo Club Advisory Panel.
- Reviewed membership investigation results

for the Lions Club of Mumbai Choice and recommends cancelling the club for reason of fictitious membership.

- Reviewed and updated several sections of Board Policy Manual, Chapter XXII to align with program updates and to support future program growth.
- Updated Board Policy Manual, Chapter X to add Multiple District 300 D Taiwan.

SERVICE ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE

- Resolved to update Chapter I of the Board Policy Manual to reflect LCI's new mission statement, and update language to align with common use.
- Received a report on service reporting, including the number of people served, the number of service activities, and the percent of clubs reporting service.
- Received an update on advocacy events, including Lions Day with the United Nations and Lions Day on Capitol Hill.
- Received an update on LCI's Memorandum of Understanding with the Association of Diabetes Care and Education Specialists.
- Selected winners of the Top Ten Youth Camps and Exchange Chairperson Award.
- Discussed service programs, the development of LCI's global causes, and implementation of Lions International Strategic Plan.
- Received an update on the Kindness Matters Service Award.

TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE

• The committee discussed the 2021-2022 first quarter forecast versus budget for the division and requested further explanation for the approximately US\$850,000 negative variance. The committee was satisfied with the explanation provided by staff on the factors contributing to the variance.

- The committee received updates on privacy initiatives and ongoing steps being taken related to the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). The committee reviewed an update regarding the ongoing plans for adopting International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 27001. The committee approves the security and privacy initiatives planned for the next three to six months.
- Your committee received an update on infrastructure initiatives. The committee was pleased to note progress had been made on three fronts: compliance, network security, and infrastructure improvements. The committee is cognizant of increasing frequency of security threats and is pleased to know this continues to be a top priority for the association.
- Staff presented a comprehensive update on the CRM project. The committee agreed with the recommended approach (Salesforce) and were excited that it offered a positive payback by year six of the project. The committee was pleased that staff will focus on delivering value quickly and look forward to updates at the April 2022 board meeting.
- The committee discussed the status of the digital products. Staff continues to explore new features and functionality requested by members. Staff acknowledged that all planned product work could/will be impacted by the Salesforce project and will keep the committee updated on any priority changes.
- Your committee had a comprehensive

discussion on the use of our digital products and the importance of increasing adoption and use of our products. This committee requests the support of the International Directors in promoting the adoption of the digital products.

- Staff presented data on Connect and highlighted recent usage trends for the application. Given the significant investment to support Connect (US\$350,000) and minimal usage (~2,500 sessions in the last 12 months), the committee advised staff to evaluate how to retire the application without causing significant impact to members.
- The committee received an update from staff on the mobile applications. There are concerns with the long-term viability of the current mobile platforms, with immediate action required for the Android application as it will lose vendor support after December 2022. The committee recommends discontinuing mobile application support until a mobile solution that works for any device can be implemented with the Salesforce project.
- The committee received an update on supporting the 2022 international election. Staff was directed to continue evaluating hardware needs for supporting digital ballots in-person.
- The committee met jointly with the Service Activities Committee to receive updates on service reporting and the adoption of technology products.

Highlights of the Council of Governors' Meeting November 19, 2021



The Council of Governors met on Friday evening, November 19, in our new "home", the Toronto- Markham Monte Carlo Inn. The change from our usual Saturday morning meeting schedule was designed to accommodate Global Membership Training for 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors. Assuming that we are not in any lockdown mode, our Council weekends should return to our normal routine in February.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Council Treasurer Dave Hewitt presented the audited Financial Statements ended June 30, 2021, which were accepted and approved by Council. The auditors reported that the statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at June 30, 2021, and the results of its operation and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit Organizations.

Administration Committee

In addition to its other duties, the Administration Committee is currently in the process of advertising for qualified candidates to fulfill the role of Council Secretary, as the five-year term of office for current Council Secretary David Mills will end June 30, 2022. Details of this position can be found on pages 7 through 9 of the Policy and Procedures Manual which can be accessed on the MD'A' Website.

Ontario Director, Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides

District Governors have been busy selecting qualified endorsed candidates for this important position. Interviews will be held prior to the Council of Governors Meeting scheduled for February 19, 2022. At that Council meeting, the successful candidate will be endorsed. Currently, the Research and Long-Range Planning Committee is studying a Council of Governors proposal to combine the roles of Ontario Director Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides and the Multiple District 'A' Committee Chairperson. The intent is to improve lines of communication as well as effective reporting between the Foundation, the Multiple District and District Committee Chairpersons.

Multiple District 'A' Convention

Plans are well underway to finally have an exciting in-person convention. Please mark your calendars for May 27-29, 2022. The convention will be held at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Kitchener, Ontario. Registration forms will be forwarded to the MD'A' Lions Family in January of 2022.

We have successfully acquired a new advertiser for the next print edition.

Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF

The current balance in the fund is \$1,204,008.30 and over the last few years new grant payouts have totalled \$1,391,699.33. The bulk of these payouts have remained in Canada. In October, a grant of \$50,314.64 was awarded to District 55KN to equip a hospice house in Saskatchewan. Personal donations have slowed somewhat during the pandemic and Lions are encouraged to support their foundation, where your dollars are accepted at par. Huge thanks to the Bramalea Lions Club who recently donated \$100,000!

Lions Clubs International Foundation

As of November 2, 2021, a total of \$230,117,435 has been raised worldwide. Canada has raised \$2,518,233 and \$893,003 of that has come from MD'A'. A campaign strategy meeting was held on the weekend of September 24/25 and tools were developed to help push us over the top. Please consider a personal donation, also keeping in mind the challenges being faced by our fellow Canadians in British Columbia and the East Coast. Mark your calendars for June 5, 2022, when the second Tell-A-Thon will take place.

Opportunities for Youth

The Peace Poster competition is once again a huge success. District winners have been forwarded to Council Chairperson Dan Armstrong who will make arrangements for final judging. Effective speaking Chairpersons met via ZOOM on October 17,2021 to make plans for in-person competitions this Lions year. A poster and letter will be created that will assist District Chairpersons in contacting schools. The Petrolia Lions will once again host the MD'A' Effective Speaking contest May 6-8,2022. Youth Exchange may finally be able to happen, and the biggest need will be to find host families. Youth programs are expensive, and it is important that districts and clubs support theses valuable programs financially. Please try to find room in your budgets.





Preserving the Precious Gift of Sight

Delivering a Brighter Future to Paraguay

Not long ago, eye care was inaccessible, and often unaffordable, to many in Paraguay's rural Itapúa community. In 2018, Lions began changing that, helping fund and bring to fruition Lions Club of Coronel Bogado Ophthalmology Clinic (LCCBOC). With US\$62,700+ in LCIF grant funding, Lions equipped LCCBOC, making more extensive, permanent care accessible close to home. Today, the clinic has modern equipment for diagnosing refractive errors, cataract, diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, macular degeneration, and pediatric eye diseases. The new machines and technology are helping LCCBOC increase patient capacity 30 percent annually over 60 months, to more than 3,400 consultations a year. Patients needing treatment beyond LCCBOC's capability are referred to a clinic in Asunción, several hours away by car, with Lions funding transportation and care for those unable to pay.

Clear Vision for Years to Come

When a friend mentioned a clinic offering free vision screenings and affordable eyeglasses, 65-yearold François – who couldn't see clearly beyond 10 inches (25 cm) – hopped aboard his motorbike, traveling 29 miles (45 km) to

the clinic. For obvious reasons, the trip was treacherous, but François was desperate and knew the risks would be worth the reward. Bringing that lifechanging clinic to fruition were LCIF and Lions in Burkina Faso, who used nearly US\$111,000 in LCIF SightFirst



grant funds to work with local partners to build optical clinics in areas of the country where eye care was unavailable or unaffordable. The project, which began in 2018, will screen vision for 124,000 people and distribute 26,400 pairs of eyeglasses. François' outcome? His first pair of eyeglasses, purchased for 5,000 CFA (just US\$10). **"I can see everything perfectly,"** exclaimed François, whose trip home on his motorbike was a far safer journey.

RESPONDING TO COVID-19

Since March 2020, LCIF has awarded US\$6.8 million through 385 grants for COVID-19 relief.

Our decade began like no other, with healthcare systems stressed, economies halted, and more than a billion people worldwide staying home, staying safe. Answering the urgent call was LCIF, funding your efforts to serve your neighbors while also staying safe. Through special COVID-19 grants, as well as District and Club Community Impact grants, LCIF empowered our kindness, compassion, and service as we delivered protection and relief during some of the world's darkest hours.

Ensuring a Safe and Healthy Future for Youth

Building Better School Environments and Communities

In Merrick, New York, USA, students and teachers feel the positive effects of Lions Quest, LCIF's social and emotional learning curriculum. Launched district-wide, Lions Quest is helping students develop confidence, self-esteem, and teamwork skills, while fostering a sense of community, through ongoing fun, team-oriented lessons and discussions. Second-graders at Chatterton School enjoyed a lesson that required them to work together toward a common goal and then discussed what worked and what did not. In addition to benefitting students, Lions Quest is also positively affecting the community. Students at Birch School raised close to US\$3,200 for childhood cancer research after participating in the program's service-learning lessons.

Helping Struggling Families Cope with Childhood Cancer

Lions recognize that families affected by childhood cancer bear the weight of long hours spent enduring treatment, and feelings of helplessness and uncertainty about the future. With support from LCIF, compassionate and caring Lions worldwide are helping ease the burden.

In Utrecht, Netherlands, a US\$150,000 Childhood Cancer grant from the Foundation is helping Lions upgrade 87 patient rooms at Princess Máxima Center for Pediatric Oncology. An anticipated 4,350 families will benefit annually from the rooms, which enable parents, siblings, and caregivers to stay with children undergoing treatment.

A US\$32,000+ LCIF Childhood Cancer grant awarded to Lions in Kerala, India, is delivering joy to children stricken with a disease no youngster should have to bear. Grant funds are helping Lions establish a children's library, a conference hall for youngsters, and a small theater to enhance quality of life for more than 60 children each year at Malabar Cancer Centre.

There When Disaster Strikes

Rebuilding the Future in Southeast Africa

Pummeling Southeast Africa's coast, Cyclone Idai delivered a devastating blow in 2019. Mozambique, Zimbabwe, and Malawi all suffered the storm's wrath and sustained unprecedented damage and devastation. Nearly 1,100 people perished; hundreds of thousands more were left homeless.

With more than three million people in desperate need, LCIF responded swiftly, sending 200 tents providing much needed shelter and 700 water purifiers, vital to stemming the cholera outbreak that had begun. But there was more to be done. With a focus on restoring children's education and everyday lives, Lions used US\$70,000 in LCIF Disaster grants to help rebuild three schools and repair damaged classrooms in so many more. Steadily, once-obliterated schools rose from the ground. **Steadily, classrooms rendered** uninhabitable became

safe once again.

Providing Rapid Relief to Haiti

Last August, a massive earthquake struck the island of Haiti. Two thousand one hundred people lost their lives, more than 12,000 were injured, and 53,000 homes were destroyed. Days later the country was hit hard again, this time by a strong tropical storm affecting relief efforts, which were already difficult due to COVID-19.

Responding quickly, LCIF awarded a US\$100,000 Major Catastrophe grant. With the funds, Lions provided immediate support for victims, including more than 1,900 food kits and 11,000 water bottles delivered to families across 33 underserved rural areas in South Haiti, Grand 'Anse, and Nippes.

Setting Off a Ripple in the Community of Western Cape by LCIF Marketing

Imagine feeling sick every day, new symptoms emerging, making it difficult to work, and care for your family and yourself. Also imagine having no idea what's wrong.

This is the unfortunate reality in South Africa, where 84 percent of people with diabetes are unaware they have the disease. With Africa's second highest number of diabetes cases, South Africa has a critical diabetes problem. The country is not alone in its crisis. Diabetes is a global epidemic.

Lions are familiar with diabetes' detrimental effects and determined to create change. With a Diabetes grant of more than US\$13,000 from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), Lions in Western Cape, South Africa, are helping their neighbors live healthier lives.

Planning for Change

With funding from LCIF, 30 registered nurse Lions are being trained to become diabetes educators. With their new, specialized training, the Lions speak with patients about symptoms and management of type 1 and 2 diabetes, and prediabetes. They are also able to screen thousands of people for the disease.

In addition to facilitating this training, the LCIF Diabetes grant is empowering Lions to host 40 screening events at high schools across Western Cape. The Lions were able to reach 22 schools before COVID-19 restrictions put their activities on hold. The Lions are enthusiastic to recommence activities once COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. In all, 20,000 students will be screened for and educated about diabetes. Approximately 6,000 educators will also be screened and educated, ultimately equipping them to educate future students about diabetes prevention, symptoms, and management.

Starting Young

Diabetes education must begin when people are young and can learn how to prevent it or more effectively manage symptoms. By extension, educating thousands of students also means increasing knowledge among families of the students. The youngsters share what they learned

with their parents and siblings, further spreading diabetes awareness.

A New Perspective

As knowledge is the best defense against diabetes, screenings focus heavily on education, Lions stressing the importance of a healthy diet, exercise, and symptom management. Screening event participants also complete a risk assessment. Those identified as high risk have their blood glucose tested. Individuals with elevated blood glucose levels are referred to a nearby health facility for further testing and treatment at no cost to them.

Continuing Support

Another key to managing diabetes is a dedicated support system. Lions establish support groups at each school for students and educators diagnosed with diabetes or at high risk of developing it. Monthly meetings further educate participants on healthy lifestyle changes and habits.

In Western Cape, the impact of LCIF grant funding and Lions is just beginning. Lions will continue educating students and teachers in months and years to come.

After diabetes diagnosis, one Lion makes it his mission to spread awareness

When Lion Pat Ryan was a child, his grandmother came to live with his family. One thing Ryan noticed quickly was that his grandmother had two different sized feet – size 10 on her right and size 8 on her left. The reason? She had all of her toes amputated from her left foot due to diabetes complications. This was Ryan's first experience with the disease, but it would not be his last.

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 10.5% of adults are living with diabetes. In the state of Kentucky, that number is drastically higher with approximately 15% of the adult population diagnosed with diabetes and 35% considered prediabetic. Furthermore, Kentucky has the fourth highest diabetes mortality rate in the nation.

In 2014, Ryan himself was struggling with type 2 diabetes. He had developed stage 3 chronic kidney disease and was taking prescription medication to control his blood sugar, high blood pressure and high cholesterol. "I was well on my way to having bad complications due to diabetes," said Ryan.

Ryan knew he needed to take action to live a healthier life and gain control over his diabetes. Through major lifestyle changes including changing his diet, moving his body more, and seeking diabetes education, Ryan's blood sugar lowered, blood pressure normalized, cholesterol went down, and his chronic kidney disease was downgraded to stage 1. Today, he takes none of the prescription medication he once took daily and has regained control of his life.

Ryan's struggle with diabetes made him even more aware of the prevalence of the disease in his home state of Kentucky, where seven out of 10 people don't know they have the disease. When diabetes became an official cause area of Lions Clubs International and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) in 2017, Ryan found his calling.

Lions adopted diabetes as an official global cause in response to an ever-growing global need for awareness, support, and prevention. In order to magnify the service of Lions throughout the world, LCIF launched an enhanced Diabetes grant program to assist with large-scale projects in the areas of diabetes awareness, education, access to care, screenings, and facility improvements.

With Ryan taking the lead, the Bluegrass Lions put together a two-year plan aimed at reducing the prevalence of diabetes and improving the quality of life for those diagnosed. With the help of a US\$67,500 LCIF Diabetes grant, the Bluegrass Lions have educated and screened thousands of Kentuckians, with plans to reach even more. To date, the Lions have hosted 28 screening events, which included both A1C screenings and retinal screenings for diabetic retinopathy. More than 240 people with possible diabetes or pre-diabetes were referred to the proper medical professionals.

The events also encourage Kentuckians with diabetes or pre-diabetes to enroll in either the Diabetes Self-Management Education and Support (DSMES) Program or Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP). The two nationally certified programs provide the foundation to equip people with diabetes or prediabetes to navigate self-management, lifestyle decisions, and activities. Evidence has shown that enrollment in DSMES improves diabetes outcomes and reduces health care costs, while enrollment in DPP cuts the risk of developing type 2 diabetes in half for those with

prediabetes.

The COVID-19 pandemic proved to be a challenge with many screening events canceled in 2020 and 2021 due to social distancing guidelines in the state. With diabetes being one of the pre-existing conditions that can lead to serious COVID-19 complications, the Bluegrass Lions knew they needed to stay active to keep their communities safe. They have since refocused their efforts on community awareness and plan to host more screening events this fall.

DELIVERING A BRIGHTER FUTURE TO PARAGUAY



Opened in 2018, Lions Club of Coronel Bogado Ophthalmology Clinic (LCCBOC), in rural Itapúa Department, had hosted countless screening events, an ophthalmologist periodically travelling to the facility with his own

equipment to provide basic eye exams to nearby residents, among Paraguay's poorest.

Though LCCBOC has been a beacon of hope and health for many who might otherwise lack access to affordable – or any – eye care, Lions knew an upgraded clinic could better serve their community. With a grant of more than US\$60,000 from Lions Clubs International Foundation

(LCIF), Lions helped transform the clinic with permanently installed modern equipment and technology to address refractive error and more efficiently provide referrals for patients with cataract, diabetic retinopathy, pediatric eye diseases,

macular degeneration, and glaucoma. New equipment is helping increase the clinic's patient capacity 30 percent annually over five years, to more than 3,400 consultations each year.

"We've made access to comprehensive eye care more convenient and more affordable," said Grant Administrator Lion Daniel Dominguez. "Lions and LCIF have given our neighbors a precious gift."





CNIB Lake Joe: Daring to Dream for 60 Summers

CNIB is grateful to Lions – the Knights of the Blind – for helping to secure this piece of paradise on Lake Joseph, and for serving as volunteers, donors, and dedicated advocates. For over 60 years, CNIB Lake Joe has been evolving to provide a camp experiences for Canadians with sight loss and their families. With the ongoing support of Lions, we are making it possible for campers like Julia to follow and fulfill their dreams.

CNIB Lake Joe has been a "second home" for 49-year-old Julia Stevenson from Bowmanville. When she recalled her most recent visit during the new Holiday Week program, she gushes that "It was the best experience – just phenomenal." Julia has vision loss from albinism and corneal dystrophy and wears corrective lenses. She underwent two corneal transplants and dares to continue dreaming despite the circumstances.

Julia began attending Lake Joe in 2015. At the time her orientation and mobility worker mentioned CNIB Lake Joe. Once she heard about this one-ofa-kind camp, she immediately secured a spot for the summer that year. Julia 'built her own adventure' during Holiday Weeks as this new program had a focus on independent activities including kayaking, archery and the all-new climbing tower to name a few. A memory that stands out for Julia was when Eugene Chong, CNIB Lake Joe General Manager, asked if she wanted to take a kayak out on the lake. "The confidence he had in my ability to do it by myself meant a lot to me," she shared. "At one point I just sat on the lake with myself and thought, 'I'm actually out on the lake' – I can't adequately explain the feeling that happened for me." Each visit to CNIB Lake Joe leaves Julia with a feeling of relief and relaxation. "I don't have to worry," she explains. "I can be myself and do all the strange things that I have to do to cope with my sight."

To many, CNIB Lake Joe is a place that holds warm, long-lasting memories and for Julia, it's a place where dreams begin. "I just turned 49 and in all that time I've never really dreamed," she confides. "But over the years of going to CNIB Lake Joe, I've finally started to dream about where I could take my life and what I can do with the skills I have."

Smash barriers associated with travel costs by helping to replace CNIB Lake Joe's aging buses. Nick was presented with a cheque for \$1903.50, this helped Nick to surpass his goal.

All facts and figures are in and the Lions Foundation of Canada PetValu Walk for Dog Guides held virtually across Canada for the second year with one



hundred and eighty-five walks taking place that involved one thousand four hundred and twelve walkers that raised \$818,456.50 on the 2021 walk. The Foundation's annual walks over thirty-six years have raised over \$17 million dollars, owing to the wonderful generosity of community businesses, Lions, family, friends and other service-minded individuals. Otis and I, the Ariss and Maryhill, Elora and Belwood Lions added \$12,190,30 which brought our total in seven walks to \$52,240.35.

The Foundation's facilities were closed because of Covid-19 but were still able, through the dedicated efforts of training staff who took dogs home with them, to continue their training to virtually graduate service dog guides. Foster families were able to do a drivethrough pickup of the new puppies and begin their training. Since the first dog graduated in 1985, over thirty-five hundred have been trained, graduated, and placed in service. Today across Canada there



are one thousand four hundred active teams working together.

Although Lion Hilda and I are in our early 80's it is our intention to once again hold Larry and Otis's 8th walk for dog guides in 2022. We are expanding our time frame for requesting support to spread out the work load for Lion Hilda. Donations can be made by using the following link:
