PROTOCOL MINUTE

One of the things that my mentors in Lions drilled in my head was protocol. Another was how we present ourself to the public.

On the latter, the theme was if you are a leader then dress as a leader. Yes, I am aware that what people perceive as appropriate dress has changed it still does not allow a leader to not lead by example.

Now on to protocol. Many do not understand what protocol is or why we should be following it. Many in our world today say I am going to do my thing regardless what is deemed appropriate. By following some basic protocol measures hurt feelings and misunderstandings can be avoided and the organization will appear to be a bit more professional.

Now let us look at some different aspects of protocol. During introductions, those to the left of the speaker are introduced first then to his/her right. After, that starting with the highest ranking to the lowest from the audience. If there are several of a particular rank they may simply be asked to stand and be recognized. In setting the flags. The US flag is always on its own right. So, if one is looking at the flags from the audience they would be in the following order: The American Flag, the flag of the visiting dignitary from another country, the state flag, the Lions International flag and then the club or event flag/banner. One other item that comes up is were to place the podium if used. The podium should be placed center front of the room. If it is placed to the side or to one coroner then there should be a clear and easy path from the speaker to the podium.

As I was writing this, I received a call about how we address each other in meetings. As Lions we should address as Lion So-in-so. If we know their title the it should be used. When a Lion holds a title out side of the organization then it would be for example Lion Doctor So-in-so.

These few simple things can go a long way in helping your meeting to run smoothly and keep hurt feelings down.


