Hello December and Lions of 25 B(ee),

As I travel around and visit our district Lions, I'm amazed by the great service we're doing. I know I haven't visited all of you yet, but I'm working on getting to your club

soon. We're getting ready to start our 6th month of the Lions year and our clubs are

making our mark through vision screenings, food and clothing drives, fundraising and donations to community projects, ultimately making a difference in our communities and beyond.

I'd like to tell you a happy membership growth story this month but I can't. While we've added some new Lions this year, we're still down from where we were at the start of the year. Our goal hasn't changed, we need to add 135 Lions this year, or 3 new Lions per club from this point on. I know if we make a plan and take action it can be done. Why should we do it? We need to grow so we can provide more service in our communities. 25B has been shrinking for several years while the

25B has been shrinking for several years while the need is growing. Our communities are supporting countless individuals and families, and our Lions family can help them and change their lives. We've been blessed with the ability and desire to serve, and there are a lot more potential Lions out there that have that same desire. I know that most of us are planning to provide for children and families in our community this month, why not invite a friend to come along on a charitable activity with you. Many Lions are made at this time of the year when they see the impact we have on families during the holiday season. Whether we're helping families with meals or gifts, or helping communities celebrate the season with small services, it's a great opportunity to share the joy of being a Lion with a

potential Lion. Just a quick update on the numbers, today, 25B is holding at 975 Lions. If we add another 135 we'd be at 1110 Lions in our district at the end of the year (before end of the year losses) which would put us in a very good position to grow this year. I know we can do it, it may seem like a stretch, but it is attainable.

LIONS, the best kept secret –

We need to share our stories of how Lions are making a difference in our communities, around the state and world.

I was at a club visit the other night and one of the Lions said I sounded like Dale Carnegie, the author of How to Win Friends and Influence People. He's right. We are in the business of influencing people. How do we do that? We talk and LIS-TEN. When we listen, we learn. We were created with 2 ears and one mouth and need to figure out where people's passions are and relate those to what we're doing as Lions. In other words, find their "Why" and share how Lions are working in areas they care about. If we talk to people and ask a few questions, then LISTEN, we'll be ready to tell our stories at the appropriate moment and ask them to join us in service. I know this technique works, but don't take my word for it, give it a try and be surprised by the results.

How do I know what Lions are doing? It's a great question. I have to tell you, it's a great day to be alive. We have so much information available to us that I can't list it all, but here are a few suggestions: Use the internet. Your phone, computer or local library has the ability to access the internet and see what is happening in our district and around the world. Read your District newsletter, Hoosier Lion and Lions Magazines. These sources are full of what clubs are doing in the district, state, and internationally. In addition to reading these publications, please submit YOUR stories so we can all benefit from the

knowledge of how you're Making Your Mark. When you finish with these publications repurpose them by sharing them with someone you've been talking to about becoming a Lion.

Attend Lion Conferences, Conventions and Training. We have numerous opportunities to network, learn and grow. District, State and International conventions, Lions Forums, Regional Leadership training, and Online conferences. This year we have a couple unique opportunities. 1st, the State Convention is in our own back yard, and the International Convention has been moved from Mexico City to Orlando, FL. These are great opportunities to shorten the distance and reduce the time and expense of participation. This year, consider attending one or both events. Also, please put the District Convention in Huntington on your calendar for 3/1/2025.

Report service. When we report service, we're also sharing the service we're doing with-Lions and potential Lions. We don't have to come up with every great idea, just see what works and adapt that to our situation.

I know this article has been long and appreciate you reading until the end. Thank you for serving as Lions. As you go out this season serving your communities, know that I appreciate all you're doing as Lions, but not nearly as much as those whose lives you're impacting.

LCIF UPDATES

Hello Lions,

Just a quick note about LCIF. For those of you that I've visited or have come to the cabinet meeting, this will be old news, but for some of you it may be new. Our Lions and Clubs have been generous to LCIF so far this year, and I want to say thank you for supporting OUR Foundation. The reporting lags behind, but I can tell you the reports we're getting put us ahead of our giving at this point last year. If the trend continues,

we'll beat last year's number and hit our 2024-2025 goal. Your contributions to LCIF continue to make a difference in our district and all over the world.

Speaking of making a difference, with the recent hurricanes, District 25B has been leading the way in the relief effort. The Auburn and Stroh Lions clubs have organized collection and transportation efforts to get needed supplies to the affected areas. I'm not even sure how many shipments have been made, but I know it started almost immediately after the disaster struck. Way to pitch in Lions! Following the same instincts, several Clubs have donated funds to LCIF for disaster relief. Thank you for caring and making a difference!

From LCIF, the latest information is that your donations have helped fund \$365,000 of LCIF emergency relief and recovery grants so far. I'm sure that there are more grants coming, but can't speak to anything until they're approved. With the amount of destruction, I know this will be a concern well into the future. Giving Tuesday is December 3 rd 2024. If you're holding off on donating to LCIF, this could be a good day to act and Make your Mark with an LCIF donation.

Additional opportunities to participate in LCIF giving are coming soon. We have a board started to draw for a Melvin Jones Fellowship for a \$10 donation, and soon we'll have I Love LCIF pins available for a \$10 LCIF donation.
