Dear Leader Dog Community,

The Department of Education has announced a reduction in force that would eliminate most positions within the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS), effective December 9, 2025.

If these layoffs proceed, they could undermine the Department's ability to carry out its responsibilities under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Randolph-Sheppard Act. This would disrupt access to Braille education, mobility and employment training, and entrepreneurial opportunities for people who are blind or have low vision — services that are critical to the independence we foster every day at Leader Dogs for the Blind.

We urge you to take action. Please contact your elected officials and let them know that these programs must be protected. Your voice can help preserve the resources that empower people who are blind or have low vision. Find your representative.

Fellow Lions,

I'm starting with this quote from Helen Keller because it captures what makes Lions service so powerful — collaboration. When we joined Lions, each of us had our reasons, but at the heart of it, we share one purpose: to serve others and make the world a better place.

If we each went our own way, supporting only our individual causes, we might accomplish something — but not nearly as much as we can when we unite behind a shared mission. When we all contribute, even a small recurring donation, to LCIF's Empowering Service Fund, we multiply our impact in ways that none of us could achieve alone. Think about it this way: LCIF is the reservoir that holds our collective generosity, ready to be released wherever and whenever it's needed most. A \$4 monthly recurring donation — less than the cost of a cup of coffee — might not seem like much. But if every Lion in our district gave just \$4 each month, together we would generate more than \$3,600 every month, or \$43,200 a year, for LCIF. That would represent a 35% increase over last year's giving — a tangible difference we can all take pride in.

And there's more. When our district contributes over \$10,000 in a Lions year, 15% of those funds return to us through the District Governor's Community Improvement Grants — allowing us to reinvest directly in projects right here at home. Imagine: that's potentially \$6,480 in funds we can use locally to help our neighbors. Individual clubs can also benefit. When a club contributes more than \$5,000, it receives a 15% grant credit for future projects—meaning a \$5,000 donation unlocks \$750 for your club to use, with those funds available for up to 15 years. This is what it means to empower service — both globally and locally. Over the past year, LCIF has turned donations like ours into action around the world:

☐ In Maui, LCIF grants helped rebuild communities devastated by wildfires, providing housing and essential supplies to displaced families.

☐ In Morocco and Nepal, LCIF disaster relief funds brought clean water, food, and shelter to earthquake survivors.

☐ Through SightFirst, LCIF continues to combat preventable blindness, providing cataract surgeries and eye screenings to children and adults across Africa and Asia.

☐ And closer to home, LCIF grants have supported youth mental health programs, diabetes prevention education, and hunger relief efforts that are changing lives every day.

Helen Keller's challenge to us more than 100 years ago — to be Knights of the Blind — continues to guide us. But today, Lions serve even more broadly: protecting the environment, feeding the hungry, supporting youth, fighting disease, and responding to disasters across the globe. LCIF makes all of that possible.

Together, we empower service. Together, we make hope possible.

Let's each do our part. Please consider making a recurring monthly donation to LCIF — whether it's \$4, \$10, or more — because united, our kindness knows no bounds.

CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARD

Applications will not be necessary for the 2025-2026 award cycle. Awards will be distributed by Lions International to clubs that meet the updated criteria and eligibility requirements. You will find these listed below.

Membership

- □ Induct a minimum of two or 20% new members, whichever is greater (not including transfer, reinstated or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the club's membership count on June 30th of the previous Lion year.
- ☐ Or sponsor a new Lions club.

Service

☐ Report a minimum of four service activities to Lions International. Three of these activities must show participation in each of the three International Weeks of Service.

Leadership

- ☐ Report newly elected club officers in Lion Portal by May 15 of the current Lion year.
- $\ \square$ A minimum of 10% of the club's members complete any three courses in the Lions Learning Center.
- ☐ The club president for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms
- ☐ A minimum of two or more club officers (president, vice president, secretary or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club president) complete Club Officer

Training (online with the Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator in Learn) between May 1 – December 31.

Donations

☐ Contributed to LCIF a minimum of the club's membership total on June 30th of the previous Lion year, multiplied by US\$20.
