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DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S COLUMN

Hello Fellow Lions,

First of all, a great big thank you to PDG Jim Bush for the great job that he did this past Lion's year. Everything that he has done this past year is much appreciated.

During this year, I would like to highlight different projects and also the Indiana Lions Foundation. I will begin with the Foundation and why it is so important that you work the Indiana State Fair.

First a little history. In 1994 the first Foundation license plate was sold. The Foundation would receive \$20 per plate sold. During the first year 430 plates were sold.

The trustees at that time decided to use 50% of the funds generated by the license plates to fund grants to clubs to help with local projects. The other 50% would go to establish a permanent endowment fund. In 2008, the permanent endowment had grown to about \$250,000. Interest earned is used for grants to clubs to help fund projects.

The Lions were then asked to help with the State Fair. The Fair Board pays the Foundation for the hours that Lions volunteers put in. The Lions were also asked to help with the Indy 500. We no longer are able help with the race so we need the Fair work more than ever. Please consider helping so the Foundation can continue to fund these grants. Last year the Foundation received about \$60,000.

This year's Fair is August 1 to 17. You can sign up at the Foundation's website, https:// indianalionsfoundationmd25.org. Go to the "What We Do" tab at the top and it will guide you through the process. On August 6, we will be taking a van of volunteers to help with the day. See PDG Al Arnold's article in this newsletter.

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I am looking forward to leading District 25 -B during the coming year.

THE INDIANA LIONS FOUNDATION'S MATCHING GRANTS BENEFIT MANY LIONS

CHARITABLE PROJECTS

The Indiana Lions Foundation completed its fiscal year with \$24,652 in matching grants awarded to twenty-five clubs and Camp Woodsmoke as well as a disaster assistance grant awarded to District E. These grants resulted in many benefits to our fellow Hoosiers through the enabling of these clubs in pursuing many charitable projects through the use of their charitable funds supplemented by Foundation matching grants. As a results of this club/Foundation partnership:

1. Children 1) learned to appreciate reading through listening to stories in their public parks, 2) received their own book and 3) accessed new books placed in their library

2. Children learned how to fish

3. Children were screened for vision abnormalities and dyslexia in their schools

4. Children received beds to sleep in when they had no bed and were given food on weekends when no food was available in their home

5. Children were able to attend Camp Woodsmoke with a working infirmary

6. Communities benefited by 1) receiving information through the erection of informational signs 2) being able to use ADA compliant restroom facilities and 3) being able to use modern plumbing systems and kitchen facilities in their community centers

7. The uninsured were able to receive medical care in a free clinic with updated exam lighting

8. Communities were enhanced with new tree plantings and entertained by Fourth of July fireworks displays

9. First responders benefited by being able to use a working beverage cooler in their firehouse and by being able to have 'blue bags' available to treat autistic victims and traumatized children



HUMAN CAPITAL: THE FUEL BEHIND OUR MISSION

Why, you might ask, are we talking about growth in the middle of everything else we're juggling? Simple: this is our organization. And the most critical kind of capital we need isn't financial—it's Human Capital. That means new Lions.

In business, nothing happens until there's a sale. For us, nothing happens until someone joins. That's the tipping point for everything: new service, new ideas, new leadership, and new community impact.

Here's the good news: you already have a stake in this. Whether you're a new Lion or a lifelong one, you are part of something that belongs to all of us. When we bring in new members, we gain the power to do more and serve more.

Our international target, Mission 1.5, is bold but achievable:

1,500,000 Lions by July 1, 2027.

That's just a 7% global increase—and we can do our part.

It starts with asking. It grows with inviting. It multiplies when we share our stories and successes. Let's step up to the challenge, because this isn't just about survival—it's about legacy.

Let's grow with purpose. Let's serve with heart. Let's build the future—together. (*P*)DG Jim
