The Winter Camp for the Blind 2020 Is Almost Here!

Winter Camp is a weekend retreat for the Blind and Visually Impaired. We have sent applications to potential campers, and have been preparing for their visit on the weekend of Feb 7-9 at the Battle Creek Public Schools Outdoor Education Center (OEC) A.K.A Clear Lake Camp. The camp, sponsored by the Lions Clubs of District 11-B1, has been in operation over 50 years since its inception as a school program in Battle Creek. We thank all of the 11-B1 Lions clubs for their consistent support of this effort. Our current flyer is attached. If you would like to volunteer at the camp, we look forward to seeing you for a visit or a weekend stay!

Winter Camp for the Blind is a Lions Clubs of Michigan District 11-B1 service project. This weekend event for the Blind and Visually Impaired has been in operation since 1969, and under Lions Clubs leadership for 45 years. It offers a welcome respite for this under-served population to get out of the house, enjoy fellowship with fellow campers, and enjoy a variety of activities including crafts, bingo, snowshoeing, nature hikes, hay rides, etc. Over 100 volunteers from the local community and across the district come together to make this camp possible year after year with both time and financial resources. Come out and check us out at Clear Lake Camp, near Dowling Michigan.

So how can you help? We can use your help in registration and meals on Friday. Saturday is our big activity day, where campers may need assistance with indoor activities, such as bingo and crafts, as well as outdoor activities with nature walks, wagon rides, etc. Weekend volunteers help in all areas, but especially for evening activities and snack prep/serving. We have entertainment on Friday and Saturday evenings, which all volunteers are welcome to enjoy. Sunday is checkout, and our weekend stay volunteers are very helpful to make sure that people have all of their belongings and get where they are supposed to be.

As we approach this event, some things to consider:

- 1. If you plan on coming out to visit or stay the weekend, please let us know so we can have an approximate headcount for meals and bunk space.
- 2. When you arrive, please park in the upper parking lot as you first drive-in, unless you have a disability and cannot walk down the steps or road.
- 3. We will have a volunteer sign-in sheet at the front desk. Please check in with your name, email and club name. We want to know who came so we can send you a thank you.
- 4. If you have bingo prizes to donate, please contact the Bedford Area Lions, Elsa Lioness, and Jackson Eye-openers, who are coordinating prizes and running the bingo activity. You can also contact the Admin team just to let us know you have things to bring, and we can pass along the information to the Bingo Team.
- 5. If you know of a blind or visually impaired individual who might be considering camp, please encourage them to apply soon. We need them by January 18, or soon after for the meal count.

Most of all, we were hoping you could come out and have fun and fellowship with our blind and visually impaired friends who are looking forward to having a great time themselves.

<u>Lions of Michigan</u> <u>District 11 E-2</u> Cabinet Meeting Minutes, December 14, 2019

<u>Cabinet Members in Attendance:</u>- DG Dave Zeller, CST Barb Durflinger, 1VDG Rod Leathers, 2VDG Bill Gaines, ZC's Dennis Gocha, Steve Murch, William Smith and Bob Gingerich, GMT Bob Tasior

Cabinet Members Absent— ZC Chuck Brew and IPDG Gordon Harris

<u>Lions in Attendance</u> - PDG's Flo Kelpinski, Lew Moeller and Roger Houthoofd, Lions David Zimmer, Marie Leathers, Bill Palmer, Eileen Palmer, Larry Elmer, Devin Tasior, Linda Gocha, Don McDonell and Newana Visser.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - The financials for 2019-20 were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$30,498.24, income of \$9,543.63 and expenses of \$10,300.67, leaving an ending balance as of 12/13/19 of \$29,741.20. This is made up of \$22,421.46 in administration and \$7,319.74 in the convention account. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$37,280.07, income of \$4,960.29, expenses of \$3,244.29, leaving an ending balance of \$38,996.07. It was moved by ZC Gingerich, ZC Smith that the report be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

<u>Old Business - Defense Against Diabetes Grant</u> - PDG Gingerich reminded everyone that we only have until 5/1/20 to complete activities. As of right now only three clubs have submitted invoices. (Note - two more clubs have now submitted invoices, for a total of 5).

New Business - Selection of Nominee for Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame - DG Zeller left the room, as he is a nominee. CST Durflinger reported that she had received only one nomination, from the Alpena Club for DG Zeller. Those attending were asked if they wanted to make a nomination, and when none were received, the nominations were closed. it was moved by ZC Smith, supported by ZC Gocha that we nominate DG Dave Zeller for the Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame. Motion carried.

Recap from Council of Governor's Meeting - DG Zeller reported that the state office is working on a pilot PR project. Several districts are serving as guinea pigs, and if things work out, the project will be rolled out across the state.

The Michigan Forum will be held on 2/21 in Grand Blanc. The service project on Friday night is to pack socks to be distributed to homeless and domestic violence shelters. Any size socks are needed. The Forum is a great opportunity for learning and camaraderie with fellow Lions. DG Zeller noted that he believes this may be the best speaker line up he has ever seen, and encouraged Lions to attend. Materials have been sent out to club secretaries/presidents.

He noted that there had been a presentation on LCIF's Campaign 100, and asked PDG Durflinger if she would like to comment on it. PDG Durflinger made a brief presentation, and asked that clubs that she had not visited for a presentation last year please contact her so she could visit them.

DG Zeller reported that at the International Convention there will be a vote on a \$3/member dues increase which will go into effect in 2021. After this dues will increase with a COLA.

He also reminded everyone that there will be a vote at the MD11 convention in Holland in May on a \$3.50 increase in the state dues. Right now due to decreasing membership the state office is running a \$25,000/year shortfall. Clubs are encouraged to send representatives to the convention to vote on this initiative. Each club is entitled to one vote for each 10 members or the greater portion thereof.

The Lions Learning Center in Higgins Lake in November was well attended and they have begun work on next years presentation.

The Council Chair for next year will be PDG Jeff Mayuiers from District 11-B2.

DG Zeller noted that we still need a District Global Service Team chairperson. The guidelines for this position will be attached to these minutes.

There will be a statewide Lions fundraiser on 2/18, a Red Wings hockey game, with discounted ticket prices of \$49. The profits will be distributed around the state. Contact DG Zeller for details if you are interested.

The membership team at the state reports that the big growth in the US is in specialty clubs. If you have a local group with any type of special interest they can be chartered as a specialty club, or start out as a branch for your club. This might be a good way to encourage our Lioness to become Lions.

The Winter Camp for the Blind (for blind adults) will be held in Dowling, MI on February 7-9. A brochure is attached to the minutes. If you know of anyone who would be interested, please pass it on, or there is contact information in the brochure to get more information. It was moved by ZC Gingerich, supported by ZC Smith that we donate \$250 to the camp. Motion carried.



Zoom conferencing is now available from the state office. See Lions Marie Leathers for more details. LCIF begins on 1/17/2020. There is a video on the Lions website promoting LCIF week.

DG Zeller announced that if you have student members in your clubs that their dues will be paid out of the state special projects fund next year.

GMT Report - GMT Tasior turned in a written report. He added that he will be happy to visit clubs to present either the "Membership Growth Event" program or the "Just Ask" program.

Zone Chair Reports — ZC's Brew, Murch and Gaines turned in written reports. ZC Gingerich reported that he has visited four of his five clubs and held a zone meeting. He said Roscommon and Grayling are talking about merging, but the talks haven't gone far. ZC Smith has held one zone meeting and visited clubs. The Ellsworth Club is thinking about folding. The Elk Rapids Club has some issues, and he will be visiting again. He is working on a district wide food drive, perhaps in conjunction with the district convention, ZC Gocha reported that Petoskev has membership problems, and he is working with clubs close to them to see if they can help with activities. The Boyne Club has had two DAD activities. East Jordan has a Diabetes event next week, and he is working with the E1 Lioness to try to keep them in the fold. He will probably hold a zone meeting in February.

District Editor Lion Dave Zimmer reminded clubs that they need to get materials to him by the end of the month, or they will go into the following month's newsletter. 1VDG Leathers added that if you have someone who wishes to make the port pillows, Lion Marie has materials available. At the last cabinet meeting we approved the purchase of T-shirts to support pediatric cancer. It was moved by 1VDG Leathers, supported by ZC Smith that we sell the shirts for \$15 each. Motion carried. There are a variety of sizes available. The profits from the shirt sales will be kept in our district to support pediatric cancer projects. To order a shirt, contact 1VDG Leathers.

Oral Reports - District Melvin Jones - ZVDG Gaines reported he has received one nomination. The deadline for nominations is 12/31, so if your club wishes to nominate someone, get it in soon.

Peace Poster - 2VDG Gaines displayed the poster which won the district competition, from Hayley Morrison of Oscoda. Unfortunately it did not win the statewide competition, but she will receive a scholarship check from the district at the district convention.

Website/IT - Lion Marie Leathers reported that while Zoom is available from the state, she would like to get equipment to keep in the district to make the experience better. 2\/DG Gaines questioned whether we should also get our own membership to be sure that we do not have to reschedule meetings due to conflicts with other groups around the state. Lion Marie noted that she hasn't checked on pricing for that, but will do so. It was moved by ZC Smith, supported by ZC Tasior that we spend up to \$500 to purchase equipment and the membership. Motion carried.

Announcements/Audience Comments - The Hale Lions announced they will be hosting a murder mystery on 2/8. A flier is attached to the minutes.

VDG Comments - 1VDG Leathers reported that his focus this year and next year will be membership. "Just Ask" does work. And if the answer is no the first time, don't give up. 2VDG Gaines noted that he wants to visit clubs, so please invite him.

LCIF Report

We are entering the second year of the third major funding campaign since LCIF was founded 50 years ago, Campaign 100. Campaign 100 is a three year campaign with a goal of \$300 million worldwide. This time the program will cover all of our humanitarian programs, vision, youth, disaster relief, diabetes, and will expand our global causes, hunger, childhood cancer and the environment. The goal is to serve 200 million people over the next 10 years.

The goal for every club is to donate \$250/member over three years (only \$80/member/year), with club, individual member and local community donations all included toward this goal.

Right now only 6% of Lions donate individually to OUR foundation and International would like to increase this percentage. Our district's percentage is currently 5.38%, led by the Hillman Club at 88%. Individual contributions can be made on a recurring basis via credit card on the LCIF website to make it easier.

Since 1999, almost \$64,000 in grants have been received by our district. The only reason we haven't gotten more is we haven't asked for them! Our state projects have also been the beneficiaries of a number of grants, the most recent ones including \$75,000 for the Leader Dog Canine Development Center, and over \$48,000 for purchase and outfitting of KidSight trailers, one of which was allocated to our district. In order to continue to receive this support, we need to continue to support our Foundation.

We started the campaign off well in the district. Between club and individual Lion contributions we raised \$13,363 last year, an increase of \$4,623 or +53% from last year. It would be great to continue this pace. 29 of the then 32 clubs made contributions last year, so we almost got to 100% giving. Our giving this year-to-date is \$5,290.65, with 16 clubs giving so far. This figure included personal contributions from 25 individuals. I will be visiting clubs that I did not get to last year and would love to see us continue the pace we are on and try to achieve 100% club giving this year.

Lions of Michigan Foundation Report- 12/14/19

The Sight and Hearing sweepstakes tickets have now been distributed. Our district sold more Sight and Hearing Sweepstakes tickets last year than any district in the state, so let's do it again this year. This is a great fundraiser for your club, so 1f you are not participating in it now, please consider it. Last year the Oscoda Lions earned over \$4,500 from tickets sales, and the Alpena Club earned over \$3,000. If your club sells between 30 and 99 tickets you receive \$3.50 per ticket, for sales from 100-249 you receive \$5.00 per ticket, and for sales over 250 you receive \$5.50 per ticket.

The Kidsight trailer is being scheduled now for screenings. The trailer is available for both vision screenings and for publicity in parades, etc. I will be coordinating the schedule for trailer use Please remember that if you are requesting it for a screening event that you will also have to coordinate the cameras with Lion Nate Slezak or Lion Linda Harris. The trailer is greatly increasing our ability to do screenings, as well as increasing our visibility. The club using the trailer is responsible for pickup and delivery, though we will make an effort to coordinate it so that the distances can be minimized.

The tax year ended 12/31/18 was the first year that people were able to donate to the Lions of Michigan Foundation on their Michigan tax returns. We collected \$14,000 this year, with only part of the year to promote it, so next year should be better. In order to stay on the form, we need to collect \$50,000 per year, so be sure that every Lion and Lion family member knows that this program is available. In addition to providing funds for the Foundation, it greatly increases our visibility statewide. If you use a tax preparer to do your taxes, be sure they know to check the box for you, and talk to them about mentioning it to their other clients

For those clubs participating in the Affordable Hearing Aid program, a co-pay is now being charged for each hearing aid in order to spread the available funds further. Please be aware of this when working with your hearing aid clients. The updated forms are available from either one of your LMF trustees or the District Medical chairperson.

Think about purchasing a carton of mints to be sent to a member of our military (\$90). We are in need of more names of serving military to receive our mints, so if you have a relative, friend, neighbor, etc. who is stationed out of the area, send their name into the Foundation, or get their information to one of our district trustees. A number of clubs/individuals have made contributions to this fund without turning in a name to receive mints, so if you are aware of someone who is serving, please get their information to one of the district trustees even if you are not making a contribution to this fund at this time.

If you wish to order mints, be sure and check to see if either of the trustees or other cabinet members will be going down to Lansing and can bring them back. We would be happy to pick them up for you to save your club the shipping.

Either myself or fellow trustee Chuck Brew are available for presentations to your club or your zone, so let us know if you would like to hear more about what the Lions of Michigan Foundation is doing for the needy of Michigan

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair, we had everything before us, we had nothing before us, we were all going direct to Heaven, we were all going direct the other way - in short, the period was so far like the present period, that some of its noisiest authorities insisted on its being received, for good or for evil, in the superlative degree of comparison only."

Charles Dickens, A Tale of Two Cities.

This profound quote from the genius of Charles Dickens is the closest description of the human condition that I've found to date. We humans create our own version of reality by the judgements we make about the world around us. We "know" things from what we've been taught by others and by what we have experienced for ourselves. In other words, we all have a perspective from which we judge others and the events that occur around us. This is the way we relate to and survive in the physical world.

The fly in this ointment is that we all have a different perspective, and that can lead to disagreements and discord. (As examples, let's say politics and religion — 'nuff said.) We typically think that our way of doing things or understanding "reality" is the "right" way. We tend to agree with and surround ourselves with those whose perspectives are closest to our own, and avoid or judge harshly those whose perspectives are different or directly opposite from ours. We are convinced we know the "truth", and are right, while those who can't accept this "truth" are wrong. Some may believe this to be the best of times and have high hopes for the future, and don't understand those who see the world as flailing in a "winter of despair", the worst of times.

The irony is, both perspectives are experiencing the same exact events in the same physical world. What happens, happens – it is what it is. But it is judged and understood through the lens of the perspective from which we view it For example, take the case of NFL player Colin Kaepernick. The African American athlete was understandably upset by the rising number of unarmed black men being shot to death by police throughout the country. In protest, he began kneeling instead of standing for the National Anthem before football games began. Everyone watching the games saw the same event occur. Some saw it as a blatant rejection of American values, an insult to a sport event, and an unpatriotic act degrading to our nation - doing the "wrong" thing. But others saw a man of principle exercising his Constitutional Right to Free Speech, quietly and peacefully protesting and reminding us that such violent events should not occur or be tolerated in a great civilized nation - doing the "right" thing. Right or wrong, it's up to us and our perspective orientations to decide our stance on this and other controversies.

"It ain't what you don't know that gets you into trouble. It's what you know for sure that just ain't so." — Mark Twain

Like most, if not all, of you reading this, I have over the years changed my many of my former beliefs and accepted new perspectives, some of which I originally rejected. It's called learning and growing. I've learned that determining what is true is not always easy. All of us had (or still have) beliefs or "facts" about the world that we have now given up (or will give up) as we become aware of new data. Sometimes the wisdom of the heart is a better guide to Truth than the head.

Don't get me wrong; I'm not saying that having perspectives is categorically bad. We can't help having a perspectives, that's how life works. But we can accept that "different" isn't necessarily a bad thing, be less rigid, choose less judgement and more tolerance, and be more respectful of others' perspective views.

As Lions, we believe that we need to help others, in our communities and beyond. It is our common perspective view that we need to volunteer, and to make the world a better place through kindness, diversity, compassion and service. There are many bad things in the world, but, as noted in the front page Helen Keller quote, there are really good things in the world as well. We have the power to choose our perspectives on how we see and interact with the rest of the world. I choose Service.
