





Editor's Notes

The Path to Extinction

You've all probably seen pictures from the recent Australian bush fires — devastation almost beyond belief, with bush fires burning an area the size of South Korea. Thousands of homes were consumed, and hundreds

of thousands of people suffered from evacuations and thick toxic smoke. Only 34 people, including firefighters, were killed, though that number may rise as the missing are found.



As bad as the fires have been for humans, the destruction wrought on both wild and domesticated animals is horrific. Estimates of mammals, birds, or reptiles killed range from half a billion, to over 1 billion according to the University of Sydney. Thousands of farm animals, mostly sheep, also perished in fires that raged throughout Australia.

Seeing rescuers trying to save badly burned kangaroos, koalas, and other mammals is heartbreaking. An estimated 25,000 koalas were killed when flames devastated Kangaroo Island in the state of South Australia on January 9, 2020. In all, it is believed that up to one third of Australia's koalas perished, and 30% of their natural habitat has been destroyed.



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These statistics are, of course, numbers gleaned from the best data available in a chaotic situation. Future data may bring other statistics to light, for better or worse.

Whatever the final count, it's heart-wrenchingly sad to lose so many koalas. Unlike kangaroos, these inoffensive and adorable arboreal herbivorous marsupials have little chance of outrunning a fire. They live in trees which leaves them defenseless, with nowhere to hide when a fire comes through. Koalas have evolved to eat only a few varieties of eucalyptus trees. This specific dietary requirement has led to decreasing numbers of koalas as human activity continues to shrink the eucalyptus habitat koalas require. Before the recent fires, the Australian Koala Foundation estimated there were likely to be less than 80,000 Koalas remaining in Australia. Whether from human or natural habitat destruction, koalas are, sadly, on a path to extinction due to their inability to adapt to changing habitats.

That is the way of nature since life on earth began. As indicated from the fossil record, Earth has witnessed five major mass extinctions when more than 75% of species disappeared. While it is not always clear the exact cause of mass extinctions, most involved rapid climate change causing too much heat, or an ice age – either of which can alter habitats, creating conditions in which certain species of animals cannot live. The best science available indicates recurring mass extinction events occurred as follows:

End Ordovician, 444 million years ago – 86% of species lost;

Late Devonian, 375 million years ago – 75% of species lost;

End Permian, 251 million years ago – 96% of species lost, "the great dying", worst extinction event ever nearly ended life on Earth;

End Triassic, 200 million years ago - 80% of species lost;

End Cretaceous, 66 million years ago – 76% of all species lost, mostly due directly and indirectly to an asteroid that ended the dinosaur era.

A number of biologists suspect we may be living through the sixth major mass extinction. The cause of this extinction event: Humans. Whether outright purposely killing animals, or destroying for their own purposes habitats that supported animals for thousands of years, and then creating environments in which these animals cannot survive, human activity is pushing many species onto the Endangered List.

This is actually not a new thing. The Pleistocene Epoch, which lasted from about 1.65 million until 10,000 years ago, was the time of the last Ice Age. As the climate grew colder, many animals grew larger. Mastodons and woolly mammoths, wooly rhinoceros, giant ground sloth, camelops, glyptodon, steppe bison, cave bear and short-faced bear, dire wolf, saber-toothed tiger, Eurasian cave lion and American Lion – all large and strong, the supreme beasts of their time – and all extinct.



We know from fossil remains and cave paintings that our cave dwelling ancestors hunted many of these animals for food, and killed predators that threatened their survival. While climate was the biggest reason for extinction of the Pleistocene giants, it is also evident that humans played some part in their demise.

From prehistoric times to the dawn of civilization to modern times, humans have grown in numbers and altered habitats for cities and agriculture – to the detriment of the animal population. Hundreds of living creatures are on endangered lists, and we've seen several species die out in the last few centuries. The dodo and the passenger pigeons, to name a couple, are extinct because people killed all of them. Only the concept of preservation has saved many animal species from extinction.

Everything mentioned above regarding animals also applies to plants. There are now 41,415 species on the IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) Red List, and 16,306 of them are endangered species threatened with extinction, up from 16,118 last year (includes both endangered animals and plants).

While abrupt climate changes and human activity doomed many species during and especially after the Ice Age, it's important to note that even more species survived, and many have thrived. The rat and the coyote are especially adaptable species that thrive in human habitats. It's estimated that there are up to seven billion rats across the planet, about one rat per person. Rats do actually serve a purpose in the ecosystem. They have adapted to human activity, and as opportunistic scavengers will eat garbage and other things that people discard. As prey for predators, living in human habitats lessens their becoming a wild predators's meal.

Coyotes, smaller cousins of the wolf, were historically found on the Great Plains of North America. Humans killed off most apex predators (wolves and cougars which can prey on coyotes) across the nation, leaving a niche for the coyotes. They now range from the Arctic to Central America. Except for Hawaii, coyotes live in all of the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Urban coyotes are present in practically every city across the United States. Because a female can adjust her litter size based on the availability of food and other factors, she can have larger litters of pups in a city or other location where there are plenty of rodents, reptiles, fruits, vegetables and so much else in a relatively small area.

At least 400,000 coyotes are exterminated each year. The federal government kills around 80,000, with the annual cost of \$20 million in taxpayer money. As for the other 320,000 annual coyote deaths, most of are slain in predator killing contests across the U.S. Individual hunters also kill coyotes for "population management", or for something to shoot in off-seasons for "fun". Despite these efforts to decrease coyote populations, the total number of coyotes continues to rise. More coyotes exist today than when the U.S. Constitution was signed. Removing coyotes from an area results in rodents and other small mammals increasing in numbers, which in turn draws surrounding packs of coyotes to this plentiful food source.

So why did the Ice Age predator, the dire wolf, die out, while the smaller coyote has survived and thrived? The difference between extinction and survival is not about the strength or size, it is about adaptability. Those who adapt to change the fastest win the race for survival.

Both nature and human activity are changing or destroying wild habitats at an alarming pace. Elephants, rhinos, tigers, cheetahs, gorillas, chimpanzees, orangutans, sea turtles, pangolins, koalas, and so many more animals in the wild will disappear unless they can adapt or compassionate humans can manage to preserve their shrinking habitats. Most, if not all, of the animals listed above won't adapt fast enough to survive.

Even our organization's feline namesake, the lion, is rapidly shrinking in population. Just over a century ago, there were more than 200,000 wild lions living in Africa. Today, there are only about 20,000. Lions are extinct in 26 African countries and have vanished from over 95% of their historic range. Though lions still exist in 28 African countries and one Asian country, only six countries are known to each contain more than 1,000 lions.

Ironically, the human Lions are also seeing their numbers shrink in the U.S. Changes in social norms, technology advances, and generational differences have apparently altered the perception of volunteerism and service club relevance. The old ways of doing things are no longer adequate. Nature, whether human or other animal, always seeks balance with the unconditional principle of "Adapt or Die". With Environment as one of our key Global Causes, and Membership gains for survival, we have a **LOT** of **SERVING** to do!
