

#### About Malala Yousafzai

There are not many young women who have survived an assassination attempt or become the youngest Nobel Peace Prize Laureate. Even with all of her accomplishments, Malala does not consider herself extraordinary.

Inspired by her father's activism, Malala began her campaign for girls' education at age 11 with her anonymous blog for the BBC, Diary of a Pakistani Schoolgirl, about life under the Taliban. Malala soon began advocating publicly for girls' education. She would join her father on his visits to neighboring villages to recruit for the school. While he spoke to the men, she would speak to the women. Their campaign was the subject of a New York Times short documentary in 2009.

Malala soon began attracting international media attention and receiving awards. Due to her increased prominence, at age 15 she was attacked by the Taliban for speaking out. Malala recovered in the United Kingdom and has continued her fight for girls ever since.

In 2013, she co-founded Malala Fund with her father, Ziauddin. A year later, at the age of 17, Malala received the Nobel Peace Prize in recognition of her efforts to see every girl complete 12 years of free, safe, quality education. Malala is currently completing her undergraduate degree at Oxford University, with a focus on philosophy, politics and economics.

Malala remains a leading force in the fight against the barriers—like poverty, war and gender discrimination—keeping more than 130 million girls out of school around the world.





<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 2/8/21 and 1/22/21 special cabinet meetings were presented by CST Durflinger. 1VDG Gaines moved approval with support from ZC McDonell, motion carried. Minutes of the 12/12/20 Cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by ZC Murch, supported by ZC McDonnell that the minutes be approved as presented. Motion carried. The only correspondence was a thank you note from the Winter Camp for the Blind for our contribution.

<u>Treasurer's Report-</u> The financials for YTD 2020-21 were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$31,972.92, income of \$16,839.42, expenses of \$12, 853.59 leaving an ending balance as of 3/5/21 of \$35,958.75. This is made up of \$27,124.56 in administration and \$8,834.19 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$40,314.52, income of \$4,714.52 and expenses of \$3,852.95 leaving an ending balance of \$41,176.09. It was moved by 1VDG Gaines, supported by 2VDG Drury that the financial report be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

Old Business- None

New Business- None

<u>GMT Report</u>- DG Leathers reported that we are down 17 members this year. 1VDG Gaines noted that next year he wants to have a GMT Team. He would like clubs to let him know who the person most responsible in their club for membership increases is so they could help the district build membership. He also noted that he wants to get 2-3 new clubs started next year, but to do that we will need more Guiding Lions. All of our current Guiding Lions' terms will expire in October, so he asked GLT Zeller to work on training for new Guiding Lions, and refreshers for existing Guiding Lions.

<u>GLT Report-</u> IPDG Zeller commented that there have been no statewide GLT meetings this year, and the current state GLT is not communicating with the district chairs. He is working on Zoom training for club officers to be held after the District Convention.

<u>GST Report</u>- GST Marie Leathers commented that while service is hard right now, clubs can also consider doing virtual service projects. She suggested encouraging donor registration or using the "Be My Eyes" app (an app to assist the blind with virtual tasks, reading documents, etc). She noted that Lion Donna Townsend, the widow of Intl VP Haynes Townsend was encouraging Lions to finish out the Lions year by doing 100 random acts of kindness, one every day until the end of the year. Members can keep lists of the acts, and they can be loaded into LCI later. IPDG Zeller noted that there was a new visually impaired crosswalk installed in Alpena, and suggested this as a possible activity in other towns.



Zone Chair Reports — ZC Broome turned in a written report, and added that the Roscommon/Higgins Lake Club is meeting in person. ZC Murch reported several of the clubs are not currently meeting, but there are several that are meeting and continuing service projects. The YTD membership for his zone is +4. ZC McDonell reported several of his clubs are meeting via Zoom, and several in person. Oscoda just built another ramp, and Hale put an ad in a local paper noting that their service activities are still ongoing. His zone is +3 for membership.

Prior to going into committee reports, DG Leathers announced that ZC Murch has agreed to run for 2VDG. ZC Murch was thanked for stepping up.

Committee Reports Written Reports were provided by these Committees: Diabetes Awareness- Lion Diane LaBeau, District Editor-Lion Zimmer, Environmental- PDG Bodem, Eversight- PDG Richardson, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Leader Dog- Lion Julie Haase, Medical Assistance- Lion Clairene Jorella, Michigan Forum- DG Leathers, Nominations- Lion Arnie Engster, Pediatric Cancer- DG Leathers, and Website/IT-Lion Marie Leathers. The following information supplemented the written reports- Lion Di LaBeau reported that D-Path classes are being combined due to not enough people signing up. She has had fliers printed that will be distributed as requested. There is also an MSU tip sheet for veterans with diabetes. PDG Richardson reported that Eversight was busy in 2020 despite the pandemic. In 2020 2182 pairs of corneal tissue were recovered, and 1390 of these were transplanted. There is another virtual chocolate tasting scheduled for 4/21- more information will follow (sounds like a great club get together possibility!) There is also a bowling tournament scheduled for 8/3.

Oral Reports- IPDG Zeller reported that the Lions of Michigan Foundation Kidsight screenings have resumed, but check with the Foundation office for guidelines. The tickets for the annual Sight and Hearing Sweepstakes have been sent out and sales are under way. Both Alpena and Central Lake are challenging Oscoda for the most ticket sales in the state. A Lions of Michigan Foundation cookbook is in the planning stage- get your favorite recipe ready- more info will follow. Other services available from the Foundation include Mints for the Military, emergency disaster relief, veterans' assistance, hearing aids, and sight vouchers are still available. DG Richardson reported that instructions for voting at the district convention have been sent out to club Pres/Sec. The election will be virtual this year. IPDG Zeller reported that the USA/Canada Forum is currently still planned to be in person from 9/9-9/11/21 in Des Moines, Iowa. 2VDG Drury reported that planning is continuing for the virtual 2021 convention. In addition there is a contract signed for the 2022 convention to be held 4/29-5/1/2022 at Boyne Mountain. The rooms will range from \$115-\$139, and the two night minimum has been waived by the resort. DG Leathers reported that the Peace Poster winner this year was Carlina Luchenbill, whose poster was submitted through Central Lake. The only other club participating was Mio, but their community was so excited that 18 posters were submitted to them for consideration. It would be great if we could get other clubs interested in having their youth participate in this project.

<u>VDG Comments-</u> 1VDG Gaines commented that he is working on filling committees for next year. Current committee chairs are being contacted to see if they wish to continue, and he welcomes anyone who is interested on serving on a district committee. 2VDG Drury noted that she is working with DAD chair LaBeau on a diabetes project. Both she and Lion Di agreed that the process would be much easier if there were clear guidelines on what qualifies, and an official project application would be a big help. They hoped that future projects of this nature would be organized in an easier way to administer. She thanked ZC Murch for stepping up to run for District Governor. She commented that she is looking forward to things getting back to normal.



DG Comments- DG Leathers noted that clubs that are doing well are those that are either meeting in person or by Zoom. We need to get all clubs back meeting in some way. The district convention this year will be totally via Zoom. The committee is trying to keep it as normal as possible. There are currently "cocktail parties" being held via Zoom to practice. The current schedule for the convention will be a brief cabinet meeting on Friday night, prior to a mixer. On Saturday there will be presentations from the state projects, which will concentrate on recipients of their service. This will be followed by a breakout session. There will be a break, and the convention will resume in the evening for the awards ceremony and the keynote speech by PID Jenny Ware from the UP. Following this there will be a virtual hospitality room. On Sunday morning there will be a memorial service for deceased Lions from the past two years, followed by the elections. IPDG Zeller suggested that each club should designate an IT person to help get their club members involved in the convention. PDG Gingerich suggested that when we are finally able to get back to an in-person convention that we continue to make it available via Zoom also for those who aren't able to attend in person. DG Leathers noted that we need everyone to encourage their club members to attend the cocktail parties in preparation for the convention. Also clubs are being asked to contribute a gift certificate to be used for random drawings during the convention for those attending. There will also be some larger prizes purchased by the convention committee.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 10:55 A.M. The next meeting will be on April 16 via Zoom at the virtual convention.

#### District 11 E-2 Diabetes Report March 6, 2021

1,000 copies of MSUE's NAVIGATING THE FOOD PANTRY WITH DIABETES tip sheets for those accessing food pantries have come back from the printer and are being distributed.

500 copies of the CDC's PRE DIABETES RISK TEST have also been printed and are being distributed.

MidMichigan Health Systems is working with DAD Project Chair, Bill Bradfield to revamp their request for diabetes grant funds to qualify for grant money.

Munson Kalkaska Health Center has made a request; so far have not heard back from Bill Bradfield if LCI has given the final approval for their educational pilot project.

Emails are going out to all of the District's Lions Clubs with information on MSUE DPATH virtual classes as new classes are offered.

Contact has been made with our zone chairs asking them to canvass their clubs to get a list of food pantries in the district. Potential to distribute more diabetes educational flyers.

MSUE Pamela Daniels has offered to present a short virtual program to the clubs to summarize the Diabetes Programs they offer.

East Jordan Family Health Center / Bellaire Family Health Centers have received \$1,200 from the District's Medical Fund (\$600), Central Lake Club (\$300) and East Jordan Club (\$300). They will use this money to fund continuous glucose monitors to uninsured or under-insured diabetic patients. (This request did not meet the qualifications for the Diabetes Grant.)

Many of the clubs are not yet meeting, and some of the ones who are meeting have indicated they would like to hold on to see if they can do screening later in the year. Some feel that screening is the only diabetes-related activity they can do in their community that will qualify for the grant.

In the future, I suggest we reach out to all clubs with the <u>exact</u> qualifiers for any Diabetes Grant going forward, before any donations are made toward the grant. It may be that the clubs will decide to donate locally to projects that will help with diabetes-related care, but that may not qualify for grant money. Some clubs have expressed frustration that the money they donated is now tied up and cannot be used for a local diabetes-related need because it does not qualify for this grant.

Plan to continue to update the clubs on Diabetes Path Classes coming up. Will continue to distribute the diabetes educational tip sheets to food pantries in the district. MSUE is proposing a new Tool Kit program that is done via phone (not internet) and they are working with Bill Bradfield, the DAD Project Chair, to see if this can be covered by the grant. Have not received word back yet if this will be covered.

#### **LCIF Report**

We are entering the third year of the third major funding campaign since LCIF was founded 50 years ago, Campaign 100. Campaign 100 was originally a three year campaign, but has been extended for another year due to the Covid crisis. Through 2/19/21 the campaign has raised \$191,418,158 of the \$300,000,000 goal.

The goal for every club is to donate \$250/member over three years (only \$80/member/year), with club, individual member and local community donations all included toward this goal. Right now only 6% of Lions donate individually to OUR foundation and International would like to increase this percentage. Our district's percentage is currently 8.65%, led by the Hillman Club at 100%. Individual contributions can be made on a recurring basis via credit card on the LCIF website to make it easier. The Hillman club reached 100% by passing around a can at each meeting for members to put in a dollar or two, or just their pocket change with the proceeds being credited in alphabetical order to each member. This is an easy way that every club could participate.

We started the campaign off well in the district. In the first year we raised \$13,363, and we raised \$11,844 in 2019-2020. This total should make us eligible for another community grant like the one received by the Hillman Club last year which we are using on our Community Walkable Trail project. 21 of our 28 clubs made contributions last year, so we reached 75% giving. It would be great if every club could make at least a token contribution this year so that DG Rod could have a 100% district. This year so far 13 clubs/individual Lion members have donated \$3,541, so I would encourage all clubs to review their budgets and try to make at least a token contribution to LCIF. We still need people or clubs to buy squares on the district Melvin Jones Fellowship raffle board so that we can do the drawing. The squares are \$20 each, with \$10 being credited as a individual contribution to LCIF, and the balance used to pay for the Fellowship. Let me know if you would like to help. The original plan was to complete the squares at the district convention so we could do the drawing then, but Covid disrupted them, so we have some more time now to fill up the board.

REGION — In a partnership between area Lions Clubs and their district, East Jordan Health Center received a donation of \$1,200 toward continuous glucose monitors for diabetic patients in need of financial assistance. Partnering together in this donation are the East Jordan and Central Lake Lions Clubs and Lions District 11E-2.

"Thank you to all the Lions who worked together to makes this happen; it will provide a significant benefit to people dealing with diabetes in both of

our communities this year," states Di LaBeau of Central Lake Lions and District 11E-2 Diabetes Chair coordinating the donation.

As a Federally Qualified Health Center, the East Jordan Family Health Center strives to offer comprehensive care across chronic disease state, including diabetes. The Bellaire and East Jordan Family Health Centers staff two Clinical Pharmacists that work in partnership with our providers to facilitate best medication usage, assist with barriers to care, and provide chronic condition management services. In 2018, the health center's Clinical Pharmacists launched an initiative to use continuous glucose monitoring to assist in care for patients with diabetes. With this data, the healthcare team is able to evaluate the effectiveness of current medication therapy, provide guidance on medication therapy going forward, and help assess the patient's nonpharmacologic factors such as their diet and exercise.

The placement and analysis of a continuous glucose monitor is a covered service for many patients thought their insurance; however, the health center estimates about 20 out of 100 of its patients will lack insurance and the cost of the monitor is a barrier to their care. In this case, the health center offers a Sliding Fee Discount to assist patients with payments. The joint donation by the Central lake, East Jordan and District Lions will provide monitors to patients with need.

"This is an opportunity to continue to service our diabetic patients with technology normally not afforded to them. Providing quality care while eliminating barriers is essential for our community health center and has an impact on patients' lives," states Rachel Krino, Marketing Director for East Jordan Family Health Center.

### **COVID Update: Pandemic Rolls On**

As much as I would like to report that the COVID-19 Pandemic is over, it is <u>not</u> over. Some information about where we are and what we've learned so far about the coronavirus:

- Good News: About 2.83 million people are receiving a coronavirus vaccine every day. States are
  moving rapidly to expand vaccine eligibility, with all adults now allowed to book appointments in
  much of the country.
- Bad News: Michigan leads the country in recent cases per capita. The number of hospitalized coronavirus patients in the state has more than doubled in the last two weeks.
- Doctors and scientists continue to work to estimate the mortality rate of COVID-19. At present, the mortality rate is thought to be substantially higher (possibly 10 times or more) than that of most flu strains.
- Long-haul COVID-19: Defined as symptoms persisting for more than 6 weeks. While most patients fully recover from COVID-19 in 4 to 6 weeks, many patients have persistent and debilitating symptoms for months after symptoms began. Studies have found that more than half of COVID-19 patients continue to feel fatigued 10 weeks after illness onset, and some still have chronic fatigue after more than a year.

# The 10 most common complaints among study participants were:

- Cognitive dysfunction, reported by 81%
- Headache, 68%
- Numbness or tingling, 60%
- Loss of taste, 59%
- Loss of smell, 55%
- Muscle pain, 55%
- Dizziness, 47%
- Pain, 43%
- Blurred vision, 30%
- Tinnitus (ringing in the ears), 29%

# In addition, many reported non-neurologic symptoms, including:

- Fatigue, 85%
- Depression or anxiety, 47%
- Shortness of breath, 46%
- Chest pain, 37%
- Insomnia, 33%
- Variation of heart rate and blood pressure, 30%
- Gastrointestinal complaints, 29%

### The Cards You're Dealt

The following is a verbatim text message series that occurred on March 1, beginning at 1:33 pm, in which I tried to help a fellow Lion who asked for my assistance, and the outcome of my actions:

"Are you free at the moment? Please I need you to do something for me right away." -Rod Leathers.

"Yes for now." - D Zimmer

"OK. How soon can you get to a nearby store? I need you to help me grab a couple of steam cards there. I'll reimburse you any amount of cards purchased as soon as I'm done. Can you do that? Thanks!" - Rod Leathers

"I'm not familiar with "steam cards", what type of store - Walmart, hardware store, grocery?" - D Zimmer "You can find them at Walmart, grocery or any store where gift cards are available. I need 3 @100\$ each Thanks." - Rod Leathers

"Ok, will look for them shortly - how do you want me to get them to you? Mail?" - D Zimmer

"Just peel-off the back and send me a clear picture of each card revealing the number when you get them. And receipt too: - Rod Leathers

"Ok, will do." - D Zimmer

(At this point I left home to find the requested cards; but after 3 stores was not able to get exactly what he requested.)



"Sorry, but I couldn't find any steam cards at Walgreens, they only had the \$50 ones and not enough to do \$300; they didn't have any at all at D&W market. I checked on my phone and Walmart carries them, but when I got there the only cards they had were \$20 & the pegs below them were empty. They must be popular cards if they're are that hard to get." - D Zimmer

"Oh, you can get the 50\$ ones you saw. How many is it?" - Rod Leathers

"There were three at Walgreens." - D Zimmer

"Ok. You can get them and if they have other cards too like eBay. That would do too." - Rod Leathers

(At this point I went back to Walgreens and purchased the three \$50 steam cards, and three \$50 eBay cards as well. I took them home, removed the stickers over the card codes, and took grouped pictures of them and the receipts, as requested. Unfortunately, one of the steam card stickers was faulty, and took off most of the code numbers, rendering that card useless. I was not happy about that, but uploaded the pictures of card codes and receipts and sent them out.)

"Ok. Got it. Thanks!" - Rod Leathers

"One last thing. Please can you take pictures of each card and send it. Not together like you sent them." - Rod Leathers

"The 3<sup>rd</sup> Steam Card doesn't have a clear code, tried to scrape it further to no avail"- D Zimmer

(At this point I re-photographed each card separately and sent them out)

"Yes. Perfect!" - Rod Leathers

"The 3<sup>rd</sup> steam card is badly peeled. Can you see numbers a bit physically there? - Rod Leathers

"I used a magnifying glass but I couldn't make out the writing The adhesive strip was evidently not working correctly. The FBI or CIA could probably decipher it but I don't have the forensic tools needed. Trying to rub off the adhesive just smudged it without revealing the numbers/letters." - D Zimmer

(There was no reply, it was the last message of the day.)

There was another message the next day, asking "What are you up to today?" - Rod Leathers. I was busy with several things that week and didn't notice it until a few days later. I've had no further text messages from "Rod".

This whole request seemed a little unusual, but asking me for this type of favor seemed logical as nearby Petoskey has many stores, including Walmart, carrying many types of gift cards that smaller towns might not have. If that's what was needed I was glad to help. After all, helping is what Lions do.

On March 15, (the Ides of March, ironically) Lion Barb Durflinger sent out an email that some District Lions had "received an email purporting to be from DG Rod asking you to send gift cards for some Covid thing. This email did NOT come from DG Rod. His email was hacked."

When I saw the email about the fake emails NOT from Rod, I realized that messaging was also a communication tool that could be misused. I hadn't received the promised reimbursement for the cards. Upon looking closely at the messages, I also noticed that the sending phone number has an area code not from this part of Michigan. And a query to Barb confirmed that DG Rod had <u>not</u> sent the messages.

#### Yep. I WAS **SCAMMED!**

The texts were not very explanatory, which I had taken to mean DG Rod was very busy at the moment ("when I am done"), too busy to do it himself. And the "100\$/50\$", instead of "\$100/\$50", was a bit strange. But at the time I had no inkling, no suspicion at all that I wasn't texting with DG Rod.

I printed this entire message series so those who read it can see what a scam looks like. Based on the texts received, would you have seen through it, recognized it for what it was? Or not?

Whoever perpetrated this scam seems to know a lot about our Lions district, our hierarchy and the people who serve in it, and our phone numbers. Where did he (or she?) get that information? From someone in a Lion's family or a friend? From websites, and/or hacked computers? Technology brings us together, but the information that is out there also leaves us vulnerable.

I offer this woeful tale of malefaction as a warning that there are people out there using the tools of technology for nefarious purposes, clever and knowledgeable enough to avoid suspicion. That thought wasn't on my radar, but it is now! Lesson learned: We have to be vigilant every moment because, unfornunately, something like this can happen to any of us at any time. Trying to do the right thing with the wrong person never ends well.
