2nd Vice District Governor's Message



Greetings, fellow Lions,

I have two important questions to ask you this month pertaining to your Lions membership:

Why are you a Lion? And, what do you enjoy most about being a Lion?

I'll answer them first before going into why I asked them, with the second one being the easier of the two to answer.

The thing I enjoy most about being a Lion is two-fold: the first is the satisfaction of helping my community. I say on a regular basis (in this space and face-to-face) that we are only as strong as our weakest link, and by helping my community I help to strengthen my community and its weakest link. The second part is the friendships I have forged as a Lion – some of them were people I knew in some manner prior to joining my club, and some I didn't know

at all. That friendship extends to Lion from other clubs as well, something I never imagined happening.

Now for that first question. At first blush, the easy answer is because I'm third generation Lions Club member and it was inevitable. But it's more than that. From a young age I was "volunteered" to help at various events where my parents were volunteering. Mike and Billi Murch knew the importance of getting involved in the community and believed in doing something to help, whether it was the sports and groups my brother, sister and I were involved in or it was the volunteer fire department or some other organization that needed help. It was a belief they instilled in my brother, sister and me.

So why were these two questions important? Well, if you are unable to tell a fellow Lion the answers then how can we be expected to tell the people we are trying to recruit to join us why we are Lions and what you enjoy most.

We have begun a 60 by 60 recruitment drive throughout Multi-District 11. Each district is challenged to bring in 60 new members from April through May. And in case you weren't aware, we as Lions are the best recruitment tool our clubs have to bring in new members.

By being able to answer those questions we improve our chances of bringing in new members to help our clubs grow and serve our communities. When we share our stories about being a Lion then we spread the word about our clubs and the good we do in our communities; when we discuss the things we enjoy about being a Lion we show others our clubs are places they might enjoy too.

A few years ago Lions Clubs International changed its tune about tooting our own horns and the service we do. Now we try and trumpet it for all to hear and see. Some clubs are better than others, but we all need to continue those efforts.

My club sends all of our club's news to the local newspaper – photos, meeting news, new members inductions, etc. Whether they run it is up to them, we've done our part by trying to use that form of media. We post our news to social media as well.

As you tell your stories about your club and your reasons for being a Lion, use every platform available to you whether it's traditional media or social media. Spread the word, it's the only way for our clubs to continue to grow.

<u>Standard Club Structure</u> – Help your nominating committee know the positions available in the new Standard Club Structure. The sample structure includes the officers, board of directors and standing committees. It provides guidance to the overview of a club's layout.

The Club Quality Initiative (CQI) is a strategic planning tool that helps clubs identify opportunities for improvement. The program features several steps to help club operations become more efficient and find new directions. By identifying areas that can be improved, your incoming officers can take measured steps to accomplish goals and, by involving the whole club in this exciting process, your club can be even better!

Use these helpful resources to get your incoming officers ready as they take the lead.



This email is to let you know of an upcoming challenge for the districts of MD 11 -- we are part of MD 11 E-2. The challenge, created by the district governors, is being called 60 by 60. 



COVID Update: Where We Are

"The emergence of a new variant is just a matter of time, scientists say.

After the Omicron variant brought a fresh wave of SARS-CoV-2 infections and anxiety at the start of 2022, some nations are starting to record a decline in case numbers. But after two years of oscillating between pandemic surges and retreats, even people in these countries cannot help but wonder when the next blow will come — and what form it will take.

There is no way to know for sure when a variant will become dominant, or whether it will rise to the status of a 'variant of concern' — meaning that there are signs that it has picked up worrying new properties, such as spreading more rapidly, causing more-severe disease or evading immune responses.

The history of these viral dynamics suggests that a new variant will sweep through every few months.

The 54 mutations in Omicron's genome — and particularly the 34 clustered in a key viral protein called spike — severely weakens the ability of COVID-19 vaccines to prevent SARS-CoV-2 infection. But protection against severe disease seems to have remained high, and probably contributed to the perceived mild disease caused by Omicron.

Although Omicron's spike mutations seem to weaken antibody defenses, scientists have detected only slight declines in the ability of immune cells called T cells to recognize the virus. These cells are thought to be particularly important in limiting the scope of a viral infection, killing off infected cells and limiting the virus's spread.

Ultimately, the data continue to point to the importance of vaccination. Vaccines shore up our immunity and that immunity will be cross-reactive, when it comes to T cells, with another variant."

Truth, or Consequences

April begins with the slightly odd day of pranks and tricks, supposedly all in "fun" — April Fools' Day. While many historians have postulated several different origin possibilities, from the Middle Ages to ancient Roman festivals, nobody really knows for sure when or where this practice first originated.

In a time of countless conspiracy theories, "fake news", "alternative facts", Ponzi schemes and other scams, and downright disinformation, factual truth seems a rare commodity. Sometimes an untruth is merely a mistake, a human error, thought to be true at the time — especially found in science, where what is considered as true often is revised when newer data is available. Today's feathered dinosaurs are much different than the lumbering reptiles that I learned about as a child.

The worst untruths are those knowingly used to perpetuate some financial or social advantage to the liars. A good example: slavery and the resulting racism that we know so well. Slavery of black Africans thrived in a supposedly civilized nation on the premise that the Africans were a less than human race, little more than animals that could be trained to do human tasks. Because the entire economy of some states depended on the labor of slaves, the whole society, churches included, backed the not-quite-human dogma, even though many people who were around slaves may have had their doubts as to this inferiority. How could anyone see these black people every day, working, talking, doing human things, with human emotions, and yet not realize they share our humanity? After the abolishment of slavery black people were legally free citizens, but the "big lie" dogma of inferiority continued as racism. Modern science has long proved all the so-called races, black, red, white, yellow, are are one race, Homo Sapiens, the Human Race. Racism, as we Lions know, is as pointless and senseless as the "Flat Earth" theory.

Truth is a cornerstone of any human endeavor. There can be little progress if untruth becomes dominant among fractious groups. While we are all capable of knowing right from wrong, some just choose to ignore it. Picture(s) of the Month

White Peaks - White Sands

These Pictures were taken this March at the White Sands National Park, just west of Alamogordo, New Mexico.

I'd heard of White Sands many years ago, and I've seen pictures of the area. Still, I was totally blown away by the experience of actually being there at one of the world's great natural wonders, rising from the heart of the Tularosa Basin. The white sands are not the same as the silica beach sand we're familiar with. It reflects rather than absorbing the sun's rays as regular sand does., Even on the hottest day it feels cool to the skin, no hot blisters on bare feet. It is also easier to walk on, you don't sink into it.

White Sands is unique, the largest gypsum dune field in the world, covering 275 square miles (the 2nd larges in Cuatro Ciénegas, Mexico, covers 8 square miles). The mineral that forms the White Sands dunes is about 98 percent pure gypsum sand. Gypsum is a common mineral that dissolves in water, so it is very rare in the form of sand granules, and it is even rarer to find gypsum sand in the form of large dunes piled up by wind.

White Sands National Park on one of the largest military bases in the U.S., White Sands Missile Range, which uses most of White Sands' 275 square miles as a missile testing site, leaving only a small section for park-goers.

The gypsum dunes are home to a unique ecosystem of plants and wildlife, many of which only exist here. White Sands also has the largest concentration of Age of Mammals, (Cenozoic Era), footprints (mammoths, saber-toothed cats, giant ground sloths, etc.) in the United States. If you have the chance, experience this unique place that has no equal.

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
