

A message from:

Jerome Thompson

As a club officer, we have all been stressed by the COVID-19. I am right there with you. This is the week of the month that I usually send out a newsletter dealing with membership, service and leadership benchmarks. To be honest, while important, their priority has taken a backseat to just coping.

At age 19, my father passed away. I dropped out of college (temporarily) and, I went to work for RTM, which operated Arby's franchises across the southeast USA. It was during the next 18 months that I would learn life lessons that would serve me well. In fact, in the past three weeks, many of them have echoed in my mind.

1. Profits are important. People are most important. An area supervisor would remind me of this weekly. How you treat your customers today will determine your sales next week.
2. If we want to retain our Lions, we must treat them well today. A call, an email, a text could make all the difference in the world. Let's be sociable, while keeping our distance.
3. Be aware of the needs of others. It was one Friday evening that Jane came to work. I could tell by the look on her face that something was not right. Customers were lined up to place their orders. Every team member was important to maintaining quality service and product. As she washed her hands to start her shift, I asked, "Jane is everything ok?" She broke down in tears. A family crisis was going on at home. However, she could not afford to take off work to deal with it. I insisted we change the schedule to keep her hours, while allowing her to go home immediately. The team understood, we all pitched in and our customers never knew. But Jane did.

As a leader in a crisis, we must be mindful of the needs of our club and cabinet members. They may have the heart of a servant but are distracted by personal situations – loss of a job, loss of a family member, or simply distracted by the wall-to-wall coverage of COVID-19. Leaders rearrange the schedule and assignments to allow others to take care of themselves first.

The vision of the team is most important. One Friday night, in Tucker Georgia, I stood at the front counter. Four school buses loaded with football players, cheerleaders and a high school band pulled into the parking lot. While they were parking, I called the six employees together and ask for their input as to how we would get through the next hour, as we served almost 200 people, most of whom ordered individually. When asked, each employee volunteered to do what they felt most equipped to do. With a common vision of success, we set out to methodically meet the needs of those before us. Ninety minutes later, everyone was served, the group had left the premises and the dining room was a disaster. However, we got it back in order quickly.

One day in March 2020, out of nowhere, came COVID-19. Quickly following on its heels were "instructions to self-quarantine." Then instructions to social distance were broadcast. And finally, governors from most states began to implement "Shelter in Place" orders. The way Lions clubs had served, met and lead was disrupted.

As a leader, it's time we rally the troops, get their input and communicate there is a better day ahead. Lions Clubs International will still be the largest service organization, providing more smiles to the world than any other group. We will emerge on the other side of this darkness a stronger club and district if we take steps to develop a common vision of a better tomorrow.

Thank you for your service and leadership during this crisis. Flexibility is the key to survival. This is a distraction. In a few weeks, maybe a few months, we will begin to get traction and plow ahead. For now, let's remember the three lessons that I picked up from managing Arby's at the age 19.

You are not alone. Your Global Action Team, area leaders and I are only a phone call or email away.

Dear Lion,

The Illinois State government in the USA announced that its stay-at-home order will be extended until at least May 30 to slow the spread of the coronavirus. The measures included the requirement to cease all nonessential services in the state. Lions Clubs International is identified as “nonessential.” To comply with the state mandate, the Lions Clubs International Headquarters in Oak Brook will be closed at least until May 30, 2020.

While staff will not physically be in the building, staff teams will be working remotely and available during business hours to respond to the needs of Lions. You may contact LCI staff or LCIF staff as needed.

The performance of systems may be impacted due to the increased number of people working remotely, and response time may be affected. Some of our business operations that require physical interaction will likely be limited.

More details will be provided as the situation evolves, but here is some preliminary guidance:

- For information on district and multiple district conventions, please check our coronavirus updates webpage.
- Regarding payment of outstanding dues, we recommend that districts allow clubs that are able to demonstrate they have sent or submitted payment to participate in voting. This could be via a bank statement, copy of demand draft, etc. Clubs will not be canceled during this time based on the challenges related to receiving and processing physical checks and electronic payments.
- For Lions International payments, please utilize online payment options via MyLCI or any other electronic payment method (ACH, SEPA, Boletto, NEFT, etc.) instead of sending checks to the office.
- Please submit LCIF donations via the website instead of sending checks to the office. Please also note that grant disbursements and recognition will be delayed while the office is closed.
- There will be delays in shipping awards and recognitions, club supplies orders, as well as delays in processing reimbursements.

We appreciate your patience during these extraordinary times and wish for the health and safety of all our Lions and staff around the world.



April 8, 2020

I hope you and your families are all safe and healthy. The State of Michigan is just starting to explode with C-19 infections, with 18,970 cases and 845 deaths as of this date and we are 3rd. in the entire country! As of recent I have been in communication with our providers from MSU regarding development of a D-PATH diabetes management online classes. I am happy to say we are ready to start recruiting participants.

You will be able to participate in the classes in the convenience and safety of your own homes so you won't have to travel. We are looking at start up dates sometime in May for the classes which are 2-1/2 hours long once a week for 6 weeks. All related costs are provided by our LCIF grant and includes 2 instructors from MSU and a training manual which is yours to keep. Since the crisis has started it has become common knowledge that people with diabetes are in more danger of becoming ill than those who are not diabetics and your immune system is not as strong to fight this terrible disease. This is the main reason why we have been working behind the scenes to develop this very necessary training class which does not propose any health threat to those who become involved. With most of our people being self-quarantined it is an ideal time for people with diabetes, Lions and the Public to take advantage of these classes and family members can also participate. Our trusted professionals from MSU always do an excellent job as I have completed the class myself and can assure you that you will be pleased with the results.

There is no cost, no travel time, you have the time, you won't be exposed to the public, so now is the most ideal time to sign up! I have attached a contact list for all Districts. What you need to do first is contact your District Chairperson and sign up. You will be placed on a waiting list. You will be called for our classes that will start in May.

The D.A.D. Fund Administrator Barry Allen has been very helpful to me in developing this innovative idea that can help a lot of people during these trying times.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Based on the Michigan Lottery's requirement that we notify all ticket purchasers' of a location change for the May 16 Sight and Hearing Sweepstakes Drawing, **we will hold the drawing as scheduled at the Doubletree by Hilton in Holland.**

Please remind the clubs in your district to mail their tickets to the Lions State Office several days prior to the **May 16 drawing** to make sure the we receive the tickets in time for the drawing. Also, if clubs wish to participate in the **Ticket Sellers' Drawing on May 2**, they should begin mailing their sold tickets to the Lions State Office very soon.

We appreciate those of you who are continuing to try to sell tickets during the Stay at Home period. Your efforts have generated some new sales techniques. One sales technique that has been very successful in several areas of the state is posting on Facebook and other social media platforms that your club has raffle tickets available, and the money raised is used to help people suffering from vision and hearing loss. We have an ever-changing list of items that are needed throughout Munson Healthcare facilities. If you have questions regarding donated items, please contact the Foundations directly at [231-213-1150](tel:231-213-1150) or foundation@mhc.net.

The following new or unused, unscented items are being accepted:

- Disposable face masks
- Disposable stethoscopes
- Thermometers
- N95 and KN95 masks (sometimes called respirators)
- Eye protection including face shields and safety goggles
- Disposable gowns
- Disposable gloves, especially non-latex
- Disposable surgical caps
- Disposable foot covers
- Wipes: bleach or antimicrobial
- Hand sanitizer

More specialized items include:

- PAPRs (powered air-purifying respirators) and PAPR hoods
- Nasal testing swabs
- Viral testing kits

Hand-sewn face masks:

Please review the following guidelines to keep our patients and healthcare team safe:

- Munson Healthcare will accept **any style, any pattern, and any designs** of hand-sewn face masks. **We are gladly accepting all donations of hand-sewn masks.**
- Both elastic bands **and** tie style masks will be accepted.
- Please try to ensure fabric is tight-knit or tightly-woven, breathable, and water-repellent. This includes fabric such as operating room linens, or cotton fabric.
- Items do **not** need to be placed in any packaging.
- Hand-sewn face masks **must** be donated to one of our drop off locations designated below and should **not** be delivered directly to healthcare team members. Please do not drop off items at the Foundation office, emergency departments, hospitals, clinics, etc.
- All hand-sewn face masks must be inspected and properly laundered through the Munson Healthcare laundry facility before use.
- Since thousands of items will be laundered together, there will be no way to sort or separate these items for distribution, i.e. we cannot guarantee that donated items will go to a particular location.
Do not make face masks if you are ill.
- Supplies should be new or unused.

We appreciate the communities' interest in making homemade masks to keep healthcare workers and patients safe. Please know we are receiving a high-volume of inquiries regarding masks and response time may be delayed. Thank you for your patience.





CORONAVIRUS REDUX

As we find ourselves beginning the fifth month of the unprecedented worldwide Covid-19 pandemic, we continue to cope as best we can in this unwanted new reality. There is festering frustration, general hope, and the expectation that this Covid-19 Pandemic will end sooner – or later.

Scientists have learned much about this coronavirus, but still don't fully understand it. Early assessments reported Covid-19 to be a regular variety respiratory virus – a contagious and lethal virus, with no vaccine and no treatment. We now know Covid-19 not only attacks the lungs, but also kidneys, heart, intestines, liver and brain. A very worrisome development is the blood clots found in Covid-19 autopsies – hundreds of microclots filling the lungs, and other areas of the the circulatory system. This coronavirus works the opposite way from Ebola and other hemorrhagic viruses that cause uncontrolled bleeding, and it's not clear yet why. Experts believe blood clots might cause a significant share of U.S. deaths, not far behind normal respiratory complications from Covid-19.

The pandemic continues to surge through many states in the U.S. and parts of the world. Early unscientific pronouncements that Covid-19 was a “hoax”, or just another flu that would disappear rapidly, missed the mark totally – and helped set back U.S. responsive actions to fight the virus. Low death rate countries, such as New Zealand, South Korea, Australia, and Germany, were better prepared, took immediate action to limit contact infections, tested early and aggressively for the virus, and had stronger medical systems in place.

Covid-19 has killed more Americans than the entire Vietnam War's 58,220 dead. Michigan alone has passed the nearly 3,000 fatalities of the 2001 9/11 terrorist attacks. This virus still has no vaccine or effective drug to counter it, and the Pandemic hasn't peaked yet. The U.S. death total may surpass 100,000 before it's over. Add to that, the nation's economy is battered and fallen, stalled as millions of workers are laid off or terminated. So yes, this is still a real Crisis.

The highest priority of every government is to protect the well-being of the people it serves, and saving lives is at the top of the list. In times of crisis, evacuation orders in dangerous hurricane areas or flooding regions, and curfews for cities experiencing urban violence, have long been issued as States of Emergency to save and protect human lives.

“Stay-at-Home” edicts in Michigan and many states have been extremely difficult fiscally, mentally and emotionally, for many people. But it is our only option available for combating a new unknown virus with no vaccine that's infecting a population that has no immunity to it. The virus can spread only by contact with someone who is infected. The only way to prevent or at least limit personal contact sequester people. Limiting contact limits infections. Fewer infected cases means fewer deaths — and ultimately, an end to this Pandemic. It's a very simple concept.

Unfortunately, some people just don't get it. In Michigan and elsewhere we've seen recent protests against Stay-at-Home and business shutdown policies. Protestors openly congregate without masks, ignoring Social Distancing and brandishing guns, Confederate flags, and Nazi symbols — exposing these faux “patriotic citizens” to be political extremists using the Pandemic to spew their skewed ideologies. It's about health and saving lives, not politics.

Several pastors in other states have disregarded safety principals to pack their pews with Sunday worshippers. At least one has paid the ultimate price, meeting his Maker courtesy of Covid-19. The number of church goers who have been infected is unknown. The Wisconsin Legislature overturned the Governor's postponement of the state's primary election, resulting in long lines of voters standing close together for literally hours at a reduced number of polling places. At least 40 people (at last count) are confirmed infected directly from this election, and they may have infected many more. Deaths resulting from this virus-infecting election fall squarely on the Legislators who orchestrated this ridiculously unwise decision.

These ignorant and flagrant acts of disrespect for the safety of others, and themselves, is both frightening and foolish. Reckless actions put us all at risk, and may lengthen the Pandemic's timeline.

“Only two things are infinite, the universe and human stupidity, and I'm not sure about the former.” -- Albert Einstein (1879 - 1955)

Everyone wants the Pandemic and its restrictions to end. But the worst scenario is to prematurely remove safety restrictions and reopen social and economic systems before the coronavirus is sufficiently contained. If the reopened society creates increasing infections and deaths, we may have to bring back restrictions and start all over again. Nobody wants that...





The Good News is that “Stay-At-Home”, mask wearing, and “Social Distancing” strategies have proven effective worldwide and in the U.S. to slow or stop the transmission of Covid-19. We are seeing the shortage of medical supplies like ventilators and protective gear for health workers slowly becoming more available — boosted by donations from individual citizens, businesses, and service organizations like the Lions Clubs, including in our own District.

Feverish efforts to create a vaccine or find a helpful drug are beginning to look promising. While earlier hyped drugs that were supposed work against Covid-19 failed in testing, a drug used against the Ebola virus has surfaced as a possible effective medication for infected Covid-19 patients. If testing continues to have positive results, it may be available in a few months or sooner. Also, ongoing worldwide vaccine efforts may produce a breakthrough formula by next year.

A key element in the fight against Covid-19 is testing to determine whether or not a person has or had the virus. Knowing who is infected is critical to stopping the spread of Covid-19. Multiple tests are available, but some are more accurate than others, and some are outright scams. Many technologies are being evaluated to create more accurate tests with shorter analysis times. One interesting testing proposal is to train dogs to use their incredible sense of smell to detect the coronavirus. Dogs already have proven able to detect cancer and other conditions such as seizures. The human body has chemical changes to these diseases and conditions that canines can detect. Dogs could be the first line tests to indicate that a person may be infected and needs a medical test to confirm infection.

The Covid-19 Pandemic can have a positive aspect if we take the opportunity to examine and learn from its effects on human society. It has exposed our society’s weaknesses and mistakes, what works, what doesn’t, where we have succeeded and where we have failed. If we choose to, we can use the data to correct the social discrepancies and institutional inequities that stand out in this crisis — many poor people dying, unable to afford healthcare; African Americans dying at more than twice the rate of their percent in the population; the ignored early pandemic warnings that set back critical responsive action; the lack of needed tools and protective items that put health care workers, police and firemen, and essential workers (grocery/pharmacy), and ultimately all of us at risk. If we have the will, we can do better.

The brightest ray of sunshine in this gloomy Pandemic is the way so many people have come together by staying apart and supporting the healthcare community in many inventive ways. From donations of items and money to cheering and entertaining via internet, people have expressed their appreciation for the heroes battling Covid-19. They are heroes giving their all to saving the lives of infected patients and well deserving our appreciation.

There is another group of heroes who should be acknowledged; those millions of citizens heeding the scientific experts and wearing masks, keeping Social Distance from others, and staying home except to get essentials or walk the dog. While they suffer the woes of restricted activity, these American Patriots have kept themselves, and by extension many others, from getting infected. These heroes are the ones who, if we don’t do something stupid, will beat this virus by shutting off its access to spreading. They are saving the lives of healthcare workers who will be exposed to fewer patients, and saving the rest of us as well. *Thank you for your contribution and commitment to bringing this Pandemic down.*

We look at the statistics daily as the numbers climb, wondering how long it will take. There is a growing impatience among some that enough is enough, that we need to begin restoring society and the economy now whether or not thousands more people get infected and die. At least one Congressman virtually uttered that same sentiment in a TV interview. Do we follow the path of moral decisions, or do we turn in the direction of political expediency?

Every statistic, every number, records a dead human being who is mourned and missed by family, friends, co-workers and scores or even hundreds of others. Few of us will come out of this without knowing at least one fatality, or a close relative of one. We can, and will, bring back the economy, but we can’t bring back the dead.

We Northern Michiganders feel relatively safe in our environment with most dangerous Pandemic hot spots in urban areas. That may be true now, but tens of thousands of summer home owners and vacationers will soon be clogging our roads. Many will be coming from states with less strict polices or recent premature openings, unaware they are infected. Impatience may lead to more patients. Whatever happens, we all must have the will and the wisdom to persevere.

In the end, we will get back to normal, the new normal post-Covid-19. There will be changes and challenges to face, but that’s life, just on a larger scale. We need to be smart in our actions, to exercise reasonable caution instead of irrational fear, and continue doing the right things. As Lions, we must do whatever we can to continue our compassionate mission of Kindness and Service, keeping in mind it’s a new world, a new experience. We need to tread confidently, and carefully.

There is light at the end of the tunnel, but let’s hope it’s not coming from the tunnel following this one.
