## 2nd Vice District Governor's Message



#### Greetings, fellow Lions,

#### **COVID Update: Transitioning**

Info from Nature and other websites

The U.S. is no longer in the grip of the COVID-19 pandemic, despite the Coronavirus's continuing global threat, according to Dr. Anthony Fauci. But Fauci also warns that people should still be mindful of the disease. "The United States and the entire world is still experiencing a pandemic, but there are different phases of the pandemic," he said. "And what we are in right now is somewhat of a transitional phase, out of the accelerated component into hopefully a more controlled component." — *Excerpts from NPR interview - April 28, 2022.* 

While national numbers have fallen recently, some areas are currently seeing rising cases – but deaths not so much. A recent surge in Puerto Rico reported new cases at a per-capita rate more than six times the national average. The spike began just 5 days after the island lifted all its pandemic restrictions in late March. Different estimated numbers show that unvaccinated people have 85% to 90 % or more of the severe cases and hospitalizations from COVID. They also make up 98% or 99% of COVID deaths. As of May 1, 2022, the number of both confirmed and presumptive positive cases of the COVID-19 disease (vaccinated or unvaccinated) reported in the U.S. had reached over 81 million. The COVID virus and its variants may become like regular flu epidemics – unless a vicious virulent variant emerges.

#### Why We Do What We Do

One of the universal questions humans inevitably ask is "why do people do the things they do?" Back in my school years, one of the psychology premises I learned was that every person is really 3 personalities — the person you want others to think you are, the person you think you are, and the person you really are. Knowledge has moved on since then. A few years ago I listened to a Ted Talk episode in which inspirational speakerTony Robbins explained the 6 human needs that motivate people to do what they do, and why they do it. The short version follows below.

We all have needs, not just for basic survival, but 6 profound needs that must be fulfilled for a life of quality:

<u>Human Need #1</u>: **Certainty:** Assurance you can avoid pain and gain pleasure. You need to feel secure and safe about the future. A life filled with certainty has to stay the same – a nearly impossible expectation to fulfill. So, you artificially control your environment by changing your expectations or by avoiding new situations or people – assuring that your actions will either avoid pain or gain pleasure, which then fulfills the basic human need for certainty.

<u>Human Need #2</u>: **Uncertainty/Variety:** The beauty of uncertainty is the experience of constant variety and change. This basic human need can take it to an extreme – engaging in frequent job or relationship changes for the sake of variety; taking unnecessary risks to achieve the adrenaline jolt they crave. If uncertainty is one of your top 6 human needs, you will be unafraid of taking risks and will not avoid new situations or people.

<u>Human Need #3</u>: **Significance:** This human need includes receiving recognition, a desire to be seen, heard and listened to – in short, you want to be noticed. You measure significance by what you believe makes you unique compared to everyone else around you. Recognition provides you with a sense of validation that makes you feel seen, special and/or needed. Recognition is a major driving force behind human behavior because it provides us with a measurement system to analyze and track our significance; a very important part of keeping up employee productivity.

<u>Human Need #4</u>: **Connection/Love:** If connection/love is your top basic human need, you are constantly seeking out a close relationship with someone or something. You truly understand that love wakes you up to the gift of life. People need love, and this can lead to some incredibly fulfilling relationships – but it can also cause you to sacrifice self-care in order to take care of others or maintain a partnership.

<u>Human Need #5</u>: **Growth:** Those whose foremost core need is growth are always striving to be better and learn more. They are very good at their jobs, but tend to move on quickly as soon as they believe they've reached their full potential. Though their constant striving for betterment ensures they will never be bored, they can err on the side of perfectionism and neglect the rest and relaxation they need to keep stress levels manageable.

<u>Human Need #6</u>: **Contribution:** The secret to living is giving, and those who experience contribution as one of their top 6 human needs know this better than anyone. If you have a need to contribute, you will likely make a big difference in your community. However, you can lose sight of the fact that giving begins at home and neglect those closest to you as you change the world.

Many of your behaviors are based on which of your needs are – or are not – being met. Depending on which of the basic human needs are foremost in your personality, you could be spending a lot of time consciously or subconsciously meeting one or two of them. And if you don't succeed, it could negatively impact your overall sense of well-being.

Knowing which of your 6 human needs is your primary driver and how this affects your ability to connect with others and develop healthy relationships is crucial to your understanding of what fuels you.

So, which top need(s) do you think fit you — and which would be found in the ideal Lions member?

# Picture(s) of the Month



#### The Grand Canyon

Nature doesn't get any, well, grander than the Grand Canyon. The size of it boggles the mind when you actually see it stretch out to the horizon before you.

Averaging 4,000 feet deep for its entire 277 miles, it is 6,000 feet deep, more than a mile, at its deepest point and 18 miles at its widest. For comparison, it is about 270 miles from Petoskey to Detroit; the Grand Canyon is just a few miles longer.

The Canyon was formed by water erosion that began 70 million or more years ago ago, though parts of it have been created as soon as 6 or 7 million years ago.
