Board of Directors Take Steps to Help Our Clubs

Dear Club Leader,

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has impacted the work of Lions around the world. In many cases, it has also created financial hardships for our Lions and the people for whom we care.

To support the incredible men and women serving with us, the International Board of Directors has passed a resolution to help our clubs.

Here is an overview of the resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

- Flexible payments No clubs will be suspended or canceled through December 31, 2020 for late payment of dues.
- Charter and entrance fees waiver We have waived all charter and entrance fees from July 1 December 31, 2020.

These measures will help Lions facing financial hardships, and give our clubs hope, encouragement, and an opportunity to start the new Lion year with renewed energy and optimism.

This may be a time of great need, but we will overcome this together. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity. That is who we are, and what we do.

So let us stand together. And let us remember just how important we are to our communities and the world.

MyLCI Outage Update

Dear Lion Leader.

As you may be aware, Lions Clubs International experienced an outage in our data center on May 22, 2020, which impacted the availability of MyLCI and some other internal systems for a period of time.

Although MyLCI has largely been restored, the root cause of the outage and broader impact remains under investigation. Here's what we know:

- The outage appears to have only affected systems hosted at Lions International Headquarters in Oak Brook. Cloud-based services remain functional.
- Since Lions International does not store credit card information in our systems and these payments are processed by third-party vendors, there was no impact to credit cards that Lions may have used to shop or donate to LCIF.

We are utilizing all available resources to conduct a thorough investigation of the cause and impact of the outage, and will provide more information to you as it becomes available.

Lapeer, MI - <u>May 10, 2020</u>. Today's message is about Lions Bear Lake Camp's plan for the Summer of 2020. Since March, we have been watching and evaluating the impact of Covid-19 on Lions Bear Lake Camp's plan for the summer, while all along the way, preparing to receive staff and children as normal. As time has elapsed, we have intently listened to Governor Whitmer, Health, Regulatory and accrediting bodies, who have guided us to this point.

As I'm composing this message, I'm sitting next to the waterfront area at camp, as it is one of the original activity areas developed at Lions Bear Lake Camp, 28 years ago. When it was developed, the lake did not hold water properly. A water dam was built by hand, with bricks, as the stories go. Lots of sand needed to be added to make it a nice beach waterfront front area that it is today.

During the "4 Our Kids" Building Campaign, we were able to form a plan and raise the funds to make important alterations to the facility that has resulted in what you see today: a 20' deep lake that provides habitat for fish and game, opportunities for fishing, and universally accessible canoeing and paddle-boating for children across our State. This is in addition to our Universally accessible Low Ropes Challenge Course and Climbing Tower, Dining Hall, Pavilion, Art Center, Nature Center and our cabins. I am reminded that this facility did not start where it is today, rather, it matured and improved given time, planning, and care.

As the Board of Directors, staff, and I have evaluated the evolution of the Coronavirus, we have watched and realized that the systems that camp is dependent upon to keep children safe are not in place for the Summer of 2020. If we take a realistic assessment, given the short time-frame, they are not likely to be able to progress to the point they need to be by the time they are needed for Lions Bear Lake Camp. This deals with our capacity to safely house our staff, to accommodate children who have multiple health concerns from across the state of Michigan to co-habit in one place, to not becoming a restraint on local healthcare resources ourselves, should Covid-19 infections result here at Lions Bear Lake Camp.

Of greatest concern, is the fact that virtually all of Lions Bear Lake Camp counselors, campers, and even staff, have been listed by the CDC as having increased risk from contracting a Covid-19 infection. Clearly, the health and safety of our kiddos, their families, our Lions, volunteers, and staff are not something we are prepared to place at risk and certainly not at greater risk.

What does this Mean for Summer Camp 2020?

This means for the Summer of 2020, we are transitioning our operations to include summer activities, but we will NOT open our residential operations onsite this summer for check-in of campers.

The staff and I are working diligently to develop many new and exciting offerings for the summer that will be offered online via Facebook and/or other platforms to accommodate our audience. We are collaborating with many organizations across the United States, who are offering programming just like ours, in order to make sure our programs remain universally accessible and top notch.

Both The Visually Impaired Camp and Deaf and Hard of Hearing Camp will continue to be held during the same weeks in July that are already on the calendar. Visually Impaired camp will still be instructed by Stephanie Steffer and the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Camp will still be instructed by Melissa Behnan. There will also be camp counselors joining in on this virtual camp opportunity. Both Stephanie and Melissa will create Facebook Groups (or a more universally accessible platform) in which campers and their families can join. These ladies, and/or myself, will be reaching out to you and your families in order to share the information as soon as it is setup. Once the setup is completed, campers can start registering!! The registration will be done via Facebook (or a more universally accessible platform), in which



we will be asking for demographics and consent forms, which allow your child to participate. This camp is being offered for free, so if you've already paid for registration for the in-person camp, you will be refunded by June 1, 2020. Please look for all of this information to come around June 1st.

The hope is that sometime this fall we will be able to regroup in person, for a day event, to reconnect with our friends and staff! So please stay tuned for that opportunity. Also, the Open House is postponed and we are working to reschedule that in late August and/or combine it with our in-person day event that we are trying to host. Again, please stay tuned for more information.

For those individuals that applied for Camp Counselor positions, we appreciate your application and hope that you will apply again next year!! While we are having camp counselors assist with the Virtual Summer Camp 2020, it is minimal and we have made our selection.

I recognize that everyone is ready for things to return to normal. Given Time, Planning, and Care I expect exactly that, but we care too much about you, our camp family to signal all clear before we are in a position to do so.

My belief in Lions Bear Lake Camp's mission, and in fact the camping industry as a whole, is unshaken. Please understand that there will be other camps that are positioned to open and operate, and our decision is in no way a statement against their choices and ability to safely operate. Rather, it is an honest assessment of what we feel is right for Lions Bear Lake Camp and the children who depend upon us.

Given time, planning and care, Lions Bear Lake Camp will be positioned to be stronger than ever and operating at next-level proficiency as more becomes known and the systems needed to safeguard the lives in our care are not in such a condition of flux.

As we set about the work at hand, thank you for your continued support and belief in the mission of Lions Bear Lake Camp. Truly, we are in this together and will emerge stronger and ready for the next-level given Time, Planning, and Care.

From the Desk of the Executive Director

Again, thank you to everyone who continues to check in on us and send donations to assist during these hard fiscal times. We are beyond grateful and still continue to pray for the well-being and safety of you and your families.

As noted above, the Lions Bear Lake Camp Board of Directors has made the very sad and tough decision to cancel residential camp, with the new opportunity to host a Virtual Camp for all of our campers and their families.

As a reminder, we are still hosting our fundraisers throughout the year and are looking for your support!!

- The Work Bee is ON!

- Lions Bear Lake Camp Golf Outing Fundraiser is August 23rd

As a reminder:

- Lions Bear Lake Camp will remain closed to the public until further notice and working remotely.

- Keeping the safety of our employees in mind, we have intermittently laid them off.

<u>Lions of Michigan</u> <u>District 11 E-2</u> <u>Cabinet Meeting Minutes, May 9,2020 via ZOOM</u>

Lions in Attendance- PDG's Dennis Richardson and Lew Moeller, Lions Jill Drury, Cal Shooks, Julie Haase David Zimmer, Linda Gocha, Jan Kane, Larry Taylor, Lew Kunze and Bill Palmer

<u>Guests</u>- 2VDG Bill Bradfield from 11-El, Mike Dengate from Leader Dog

The meeting was called to order at 10:03 AM by DG Zeller. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Leathers. The Pledge was led by 2VDG Gaines.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the February 29, 2020 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. 2VDG Gaines moved approval with support from 1VDG Leathers, motion carried.

Correspondence- None.

Treasurer's Report- The financials for 2019-20 were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$30,498.24, income of \$18,556.69 and expenses of \$16,863.61 leaving an ending balance as of 5/7/20 of \$32,191.32. This is made up of \$24,484.08 in administration and \$7,707.24 in the convention account. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$37,280.07, income of \$8,559.76 expenses of \$5,105.31, leaving an ending balance of \$40,734.52. It was moved by ZC Murch, supported by 2VDG Gaines that the report be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

<u>Old Business</u>- <u>Defense Against Diabetes Grant</u>- 2VDG Bradfield, 11-El, presented information on the D-Path classes, now available on line from the MSU extension. The deadline date has been extended to the end of the year, and maybe into 2021. The cost of the class is \$1000 and it can take 12 participants. Since it is via Zoom, clubs from all over the district can participate. A flier for the program is attached to the minutes. Note: The Central Lake Club is working on setting up a class right now, so if you want to contact them about joining with them for the first class (more can be set up later), contact CST Durflinger. The first class is tentatively scheduled to begin on 6/4. 2VDG Gaines questioned 2VDG Bradfield about the information he had forwarded about the American Diabetes Association summer program, but that question wasn't answered. 2VDG Gaines will follow up. There is also an on-line class available through the National Kidney Foundation (flier attached), but it is more expensive (\$2800 with a max of 20 participants). Contact CST Durflinger if you want more information on this class.

<u>2020 District Convention</u>- DG Zeller thanked the Rose City Lions for their hard work preparing for a convention that had to be canceled. He noted that the policy manual calls for profit sharing when the convention is successful, and the Rose City Lions had counted on a successful convention to help replace the roof on their clubhouse. After some discussion, it was moved by 2VDG Gaines, supported by ZC Gingerich that we donate \$1000 to the Rose City Lions from the convention funds. Motion carried.

New Business- Leader Dog Update- Lion Mike Dengate from Leader Dog reported that everything is currently shut down at Leader Dog. They are hopeful that classes can resume in July. On-site visits and summer programs have been canceled, but they will be scheduling virtual visits. Their revenue is down.

<u>2021 Convention</u>- The Boyne Valley Lions will be hosting the 2021 convention. They have a tentative contract for the location, and the tentative date is April 14-16, 2021. More details will follow.

<u>GMT Report</u> – GMT Tasior turned in a written report. He added that we have demonstrated that Zoom is a great way to hold meetings. This is a good way to get younger people involved that don't always have the time (or money) to attend a meeting in person.

<u>GST Report</u> – GST Marie Leathers turned in a written report. She added that we need to report our service, and encouraged clubs to contact her about holding Zoom meetings.

<u>Zone Chair Reports</u> – ZC's Smith and Gocha turned in written reports. ZC Murch reported that he has maintained contact with his clubs. Alpena is using Zoom to hold their weekly meetings. Unfortunately the Fairview/Comins Club will be disbanding, a loss of 14 members.

<u>Committee Reports</u> – Written Reports were provided by the following Committees: All State Band-Lion Les Jackson, Constitution and By-Laws- DG Zeller, District Convention- Lion Ray Shelley, District Editor-Lion Zimmer, Elections- PDG Richardson, Eversight- PDG Richardson, ICIF- PDG Durflinger, Liaison- DG Zeller, Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Durflinger, Michigan Forum- DG Zeller, Pediatric Cancer-1VDG Leathers, Strategic Planning- DG Zeller, USA/Canada Forum- DG Zeller, Website/IT-Lion Marie Leathers.

The following was added to the written reports- PDG Richardson congratulated our new District officers. He also reported that Eversight has been unable to do corneal transplants as they are considered nonessential, and this has hurt them financially. They will be holding a virtual golf outing the first two weeks of September. Go to your local golf course and play. The cost is \$50/golfer. Contact Lion Dennis for information. PDG Durflinger noted that the Lions of Michigan Foundation canceled Kidsight screenings until next year so we can work on putting in safeguards for both the volunteers and the children. Clubs are asked to look at their budgets, and please send in funds if you can afford it to help all of the state projects as they are all experiencing financial difficulties. Lion Marie Leathers reported that the virtual symposium was excellent and there will be another one soon. Information will be on the website. You can also see the symposium by video later.

<u>Oral Reports</u> – PDG Gingerich reported that since the MD-11 convention was canceled that the vote on the dues increase has been postponed. Next year's COG will take it up again.

<u>VDG Comments</u> – 1VDG Leathers thanked everyone for supporting him. It will be a rough start to the year, but clubs can do Zoom meetings. He asked if ZC's are not going to continue in their positions that they give him the name of someone else in their zone who might be interested, since they are more familiar with the Lions in their zone. He noted that either he or Marie can help set up Zoom meetings. 2VDG Gaines noted that we have had very positive responses from using Zoom. He has an account which is available for use any night except Thursday.

<u>DG Comments</u> – DG Zeller reported that a Fall Conference is in the planning stage. It will depend on when restrictions are lifted. It will include officer training and Zoom training. He thanked everyone on the cabinet for their hard work this year.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 11:30. The next meeting will be announced when the incoming DG has his schedule set up.

District 1 1-E2 Cabinet Meeting Eversight Report

I would like to start by outlining the information from our May 5th state committee meeting on how COVID-19 is impacting Eversight.

- ES usually places an average of 160 transplants per week right now is averaging 20 for emergency surgeries only.
- Corneal transplants fall under "elective surgery".
- Operating on about 4% of normal budget now.
- 95% of revenue comes from corneal transplant surgeries.
- Predicting that for the first time in years there will be a waiting list for a transplant once corneal transplants start again.
- ES not recovering tissue from COVID-19 positive donors right now: No research that definitely says COVID-19 can't be passed through corneas.
- ES will start implementing testing on all tissues that they receive.
- Good news: Ohio starting to open for elective surgeries.

Eversight's Response

• Eversight's Leadership Team is forming a taskforce to model how 'onramp" could play out once corneal transplants resume.

The three possibilities:

- 1. Could be a huge demand for tissue right away.
- 2. Could be a slower opening, with a gradual increase in demand.
- 3. Could be a "rollercoaster" effect.
- Operating on 4% budget.
- Placed hiring and expense freeze.
- Introduced decreased work weeks and 25% pay deduction for all ES employees.
- Applied for paycheck protection and received supporting wages for May.
- Applying for loans and grants in every service area.

As you can see these are challenging times for Eversight. Please note that Eversight's other service areas are affected also. Organ donor programs, donor family gathering, fund raisers (see following), research, etc. are all being negatively effected by COVID-!9.

Eversight's largest fundraiser each year is their golf tournament. Because of it having been held in the Ann Arbor area very few if any of our Lions attend. One positive thing from this Virus is that the Lions of District 11 -E2 will be able to participate very easily. A virtual golf tournament is being planned so golfers can participate from their home golf course and they can play on any date from September 1 to September 15. The entry fee will be lowered to \$50 per golfer and more information will be coming soon. Hopefully our District will be well represented at this year's tournament.

In conclusion, as you know, Michigan Lions started Eversight and continue to be its largest support group. Eversight now needs our help more ever. If your club has already donated, thank you very much. If not, please consider donating whatever your budget allows. Thank you for your support of Eversight and stay well.

District 11-E2 Cabinet meeting May 9, 2020

LCIF Report

We are entering the second year of the third major funding campaign since LCIF was founded 50 years ago, Campaign 100. Campaign 100 is a three year campaign with a goal of \$300 million worldwide. This time the program will cover all of our humanitarian programs, vision, youth, disaster relief, diabetes, and will expand our global causes, hunger, childhood cancer and the environment. The goal is to serve 200 million people over the next 10 years.

The goal for every club is to donate \$250/member over three years (only \$80/member/year), with club, individual member and local community donations all included toward this goal. Right now only 6% of Lions donate individually to OUR foundation and International would like to increase this percentage. Our district's percentage is currently 8.65%, led by the Hillman Club at 100%. Individual contributions can be made on a recurring basis via credit card on the LCIF website to make it easier.

Special thanks to the Alpena Lions Club for applying for an emergency grant to benefit the east side of the district. We received \$10,000 which will be used to partner with Austin Bros. Of Alpena to produce hand sanitizer to be distributed to local first responders and to nursing and group homes throughout the counties in the east side of the district. In addition this year the Hillman Lions Club received a community grant of \$1933 which will be used to improve a local walking trail. LCIF stands ready to help with projects and disasters- we just have to ask!

We started the campaign off well in the district. Between club and individual Lion contributions we raised \$13,363 last year, an increase of \$4,623 or +53% from last year. It would be great to continue this pace. 29 of the then 32 clubs made contributions last year, so we almost got to 100% giving. Our giving this year-to-date is \$8,997.37 with 21 clubs giving so far. This figure included personal contributions from 70 individuals. My visits to clubs that I did not get to last year had to be curtailed during the emergency, but I will be getting back to them when travel restrictions are lifted. I emailed club Presidents and Secretaries to ask them to request that their club members buy a square in our district Melvin Jones Fellowship raffle board, so hopefully we can get it filled up soon to increase our district's contributions to LCIF in a fun way, so if you haven't seen it emailed out to your club members, please contact your club Secretary and ask that it be distributed.

Lions of Michigan Foundation Report- 5/9/20

The drawing for the Sight and Hearing sweepstakes tickets seller's drawing was done at the Board meeting on 5/2, and Lion Bill Chase of East Jordan won the top prize of \$750. Congratulations Lion Bill! The ticket sales as of right now are at about \$85,000, compared to our budget of \$105,000. There is still another week, so sell a few more to add to the funds that your club will share. If your club sells between 30 and 99 tickets you receive \$3.50 per ticket, for sales from 100-249 you receive \$5.00 per ticket, and or sales over 250 you receive \$5.50 per ticket.

The Kidsight program has been put on hold until after the first of the year when things will hopefully be close to normal, and procedures can be put into place to be sure that both screeners and the children screened are safe. The trailer is still available in the event that your community has a parade or festival that hasn't been canceled, so let me know if you would like to use it.

The tax year ended 12/31/18 was the first year that people were able to donate to the Lions of Michigan Foundation on their Michigan tax returns. We collected \$14,000 for that period, with only part of the year to promote it, so this year should be better. In order to stay on the form, we need to collect \$50,000 per year, so be sure that every Lion and Lion family member knows that this program is available. In addition to providing funds for the Foundation, it greatly increases our visibility statewide. If you use a tax preparer to do your taxes, be sure they know to check the box for you, and talk to them about mentioning it to their other clients. Now that the filing deadline has been extended, we have more time to spread the word about the program.

Our district contributions to the Foundation this year so far total \$7,900 compared to \$12,500 last year, so if your club has not yet made a contribution, please consider it.

There will be a new raffle calendar for the 2021 year that is available for purchase now. If your club is interested in selling calendars, contact the state office and they will be sent to you. The calendars are \$20 each, and if your club sells at least 10, you will receive \$5 per calendar sold. This might help raise funds for clubs who have had other fundraisers canceled.

The Nature of Balance

The COVID-19 Pandemic continues to impact human life throughout the world. In this unique moment of history, nearly every person on this planet is experiencing the same reality of social disruption in the face of a new highly contagious and lethal virus for which there is no vaccine or natural immunity. Science continues to learn more about this virus, but still doesn't fully understand everything about it. Recent interesting facts I found:

- Most dangerous pathogens, such as Ebola or SARS, are "usually either highly lethal or contagious, not both." "It is very unusual. I haven't seen it in my lifetime, one that is <u>both highly contagious and lethal</u>." — Renowned medical expert Sanjay Gupta, M.D.
- Fatality rates for COVID-19 are presently shown to be substantially higher than that of most strains of flu.
- Research shows asymptomatic individuals "silent spreaders" are usually female adults (nearly 67 percent were women) between the ages of 26 and 45; typically contagious for only three to 12 days, compared to 16 to 24 days among the patients with symptoms. (Why this is so is unknown.)
- Statement by University of California, San Francisco, researchers published in New England Journal of Medicine:
 "Asymptomatic transmission of [COVID-19] is the Achilles' heel" of America's current public health strategy surrounding symptom-based screenings. This supports "the importance of population-wide testing particularly as states start to reopen in order to determine exactly how many people may be unknowingly spreading coronavirus and where outbreaks may be lurking undetected." It also emphasizes how essential it is to wear face masks and practice social distancing.
- Researchers believe asymptomatic carriers to be up to 50% or more of COVID-19 cases, and that up to 80% of infected people don't know they have the virus.

Unsurprisingly, people are tired of the economic and social consequences this deadly Coronavirus created. The urge to get back to "normal" is overwhelmingly irresistible for many, resulting in increasing acts of unsafe behaviors. As I heard someone say, "the American people are done with this COVID-19, but the Virus is not done with us."

The rush to reopen society carries the risk of abandoning the protective actions that have kept most people virus free. While numbers of new virus cases are decreasing in Michigan and many other states, COVID-19 cases are still increasing on a daily or weekly basis in other areas. This virus is not yet contained. At this time, we have no idea of how many asymptomatic "COVID-19 Marys" are unknowingly spreading the virus. As the lifting of quarantines spreads, we still need to be conscious of the ongoing threat and cautious in social contact situations.

Pandemic lockdowns have also impacted the Earth in unexpected ways, generating some positive effects on the natural environment. A study compiled by NASA (National Aeronautics and Space Administration) and ESA (European Space Agency) verified environmental data before and after the COVID-19 Pandemic began. It shows that <u>pollution</u> in some of the epicenters of COVID-19 such as Wuhan, Italy, Spain and USA, etc. was <u>reduced</u> up to <u>30%</u> – an amazing improvement in just a few months. Many areas have also seen more wildlife activity on human-devoid streets in towns and cities . It's as if the planet has taken the opportunity to heal itself.

We tend enjoy Nature's pleasures – beautiful sunsets, gardens in bloom, green forests and blue skies – and curse its annoyances and cruelties – mosquitos, hurricanes, floods, and pandemics. Somewhere along the road to modern civilization we've lost our spiritual connection to the natural world. Indigenous cultures and our own ancient ancestors perceived themselves as part of Nature, learning from and understanding natural forces that helped them, or harmed them. Human efforts to "control" Nature have mostly proven futile.

There is a natural balance, a specific range in which all life exists. Earth revolves around the sun in a "Goldilocks Zone" where it's not too hot or too cold for life as we know it to exist. An ever-changing cycle between predators and prey determines who will thrive, and who will perish. The optimum balance is when there are not too many predators or too few prey. When the ratio between them is out of balance, one or both may suffer, or go extinct.

Predatory viruses mutate to infect new hosts, killing some, but not all their hosts as they spread. Nature's balance response to pathogens is the host immune system. An inevitable vaccine for COVID-19 won't kill the virus, but will boost the host immune system enough to fight off the virus. That, and the cessation of unsafe physical contact, should create the balance that will finally end the Pandemic.

Ironically, just as we seem to be emerging from the shadow of COVID-19, we are faced with a "social pandemic" of critically damaged social systems. Hundreds of protests, tens of thousands of protesters, nationwide and in some other countries, continue to respond to yet another unarmed black man, George Floyd, murdered by police, in Minneapolis, Minnesota. When social justice is not shared equally, racism and bigotry are openly apparent, and the forces of division are degrading a society that desperately needs unity, things are <u>seriously</u> out of balance.
