District Governor's Message



District Governor William Gaines

Greetings, fellow Lions:

June marks the end of the Lions year and end of my term as District governor. District membership growth remains positive with a net growth of twelve, although there will certainly be some members drop as we come to the end of June and semi-annual dues payments come due. MD-11 has added 200 plus net members at this time with positive membership growth and several new clubs. I'm looking forward to the new year and the possibilities of adding members and clubs in our district in support of District Governor Elect Rod Leather's district goals.

We all face the challenges of keeping our existing clubs active and growing in service. Clubs with less than fifteen members are particularly vulnerable to events which make it difficult to

continue to do service activities successfully. Part of the responsibility of our district leadership team is to assist clubs with membership growth and service vitality. Please ask if you need help.

The recent tornado in Gaylord was a tragic event and our district is reaching out to help. We've received a Lions of Michigan Foundation grant which has been distributed as gift cards through Gaylord's United Way to help families with household needs. We'll be working with their emergency management office to determine further needs for help from our district and district clubs. We are also working on a possible Lions Club International Foundation Reconstruction grant.

The Special Olympics Unified Cup will be held in Detroit July 31st to August 6th. Our state Lions have agreed to help with volunteers for this event in coordination with other organizations. This emulates the soccer World Cup for special Olympians with 24 teams from 20+ nations participating. District 11A2 is coordinating support for this event, including hosting a picnic on Aug 3. Our district has been asked for financial support so any clubs that can offer a modest (50-100 dollars) donation to cover expenses would be appreciated. Opportunities to volunteer can be coordinated through myself or District Governor elect Leathers.



Lions of Michigan District 11 E-2 Cabinet Meeting Minutes, April 29, 2022

<u>Cabinet Members in Attendance-</u> DG Gaines, 1VDG Drury, 2VDG Murch, CST Durflinger, GLT Zeller, GST Marie Leathers, and IPDG Rod Leathers

The meeting was called to order at 4 PM by DG Gaines. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Drury. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by 2VDG Murch. DG Gaines introduced our special guests, ID Snider and Council Chair Dave Hill.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 3/5/22 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by 2VDG Murch, supported by 1VDG Drury that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

Treasurer's Report- The financial report for YTD 2021-22 was presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$35,054.74, income of \$16,375.70, expenses of \$12,441.56 leaving an ending balance as of 4/26/22 of \$38,988.88. This consists of \$29,975.50 in admin and \$9,013.38 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$36,104.07, income of \$6,849.79 and expenses of \$5,121.63 leaving an ending balance of \$37,833.23. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by IPDG Leathers that the financial report be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

Old Business- None

<u>New Business-</u>DG Gaines discussed the 60/60 project (60 new members in 60 days). He wants to use a targeted social media blitz to work on new clubs in two areas. It was moved by 2VDG Murch, supported by 1VDG Drury that we spend up to \$600 on this project. Motion carried.

<u>GLT Report</u>- PDG Zeller supplemented his written report by noting that we should think about a Fall Conference this year to train new officers, in addition to sessions on other topics.

<u>GMT Report-</u>DG Gaines noted that as of today we are at +12 in members. Statewide we are up by 145. If we end up positive this year, it will be the first time in decades.

<u>GST Report</u>- In addition to her written report, GST Marie Leathers reported that are doing KidSight screening during the convention.

Zone Chair Reports- 2VDG Murch turned in a written report. ZC Clarke and ZC Broome had no report.

<u>Committee Reports</u> Written Reports were provided by: Constitution and By-Laws- PDG Zeller, District Editor-Lion Zimmer, District Peace Poster- Lion Jean Manning, Environmental- PDG Bodem, Eversight-PDG Richardson, Hunger- Lion Kris Roberts, Leader Dog- Lion Julie Haase, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Clubs-, Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Zeller, Pediatric Cancer- IPDG Leathers, Project KidSight- Lion Slezak and Lion Harris, USA/Canada Forum- PDG Zeller, Website/IT- GST Leathers. **Oral Reports- District Convention-** 1VDG Drury reported that about 70 people are registered. Thanks to the Boyne Valley Lions and the East Jordan Lions for their help. She would like us to consider a one day convention. **Elections-** PDG Richardson reported that 3 of the 4 open positions have candidates. **Honorary Committee-** IPDG Leathers noted that we will be packing goodie bags to be passed out to children after their KidSight screenings tonight during the mixer. The Honorary Committee will be meeting immediately following the elections on Sunday. **LCIF-** PDG Durflinger reported that we are doing a district raffle board for a Melvin Jones Fellowship. A few squares need to be filled, and we will draw the winner during the banquet on Saturday. NOTE: The drawing took place, and Lion Jim Paczkowski of Hillman won the Fellowship. In addition the state committee is holding a raffle with some great prizes each district is being asked to sell at least 100 of the \$20 tickets. Information has been sent out to the clubs. There are currently 30 remaining to sell.

<u>Audience Comments</u>- Lion Shirley Hill noted that many Lions are not back from the South yet, and we should consider holding the convention later. PDG Zeller noted that we are required to have it at least 30 days before the International Convention, so we can't move it much.

<u>VDG Comments-</u> 1VDG Drury said it had been a pleasure working with everyone this year. 2VDG Murch agreed with this, and also noted that he was looking forward to working on making the district grow next year.

<u>DG Comments-</u> DG Gaines thanked everyone for working so hard to make the convention happen during the time he couldn't participate, and offered his heartfelt thanks to everyone for their support during his illness.

ID Comments- ID Snider said he and Susan were happy to be here with us. He told us not to feel too bad about the attendance being down, as all of the conventions he had attended were down. People are still not ready to go back into larger group events. He will be around all weekend to talk to anyone about their concerns.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 4:50PM. The next meeting date will be announced later.

Alpena Lions Club is at 56 members, having lost is longest-serving member recently. The club has begun its responsibilities at city-owned McRae Park, as the club has adopted it as a project. The club also adopted a stretch of highway for cleanup as part of the state's Adopt-A-Highway. Reviewing of scholarship applications will begin for the club's eight scholarships it awards annually to students at Alpena Community College. And, the club will be hosting a bowling fundraiser in May for a family whose daughter is battling cancer and recently had brain surgery to remove tumors.

Alpena Evening Lions Club is at 5 members and continues to meet, though no service or fundraisers are planned. The club awards an annual scholarship.

Glennie Lions Club is at 14 members. The club returns to meeting the first week of May. Due to members who winter elsewhere the club doesn't meeting during the winter months.

Hillman Lions Club is at 18 members. The club continues its pop-up pantry and backpack program and has received donations to help with those programs. The club held its annual onion sale and delivery of the onions will be in early May. The club awarded its scholarship to a Hillman High School student and sponsored a fifth-grade craft project for Earth Day. The club also purchased school yearbooks for two graduating seniors who didn't have the resources to purchase the yearbooks.

Hubbard Lake Lions Club is at 15 members. The club has been meeting once a month due to having members who winter elsewhere. However, the club returns to regularly meeting twice a month in May.

Mio Lions Club is at 22 members. No other news about the club was available as efforts to contact Mio club were unsuccessful.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE REPORT FOR DIST. 11 E-2 CABINET MEETING, April 29 & 30, 2022 Beverly Bodem, Environmental Committee

SPRING BRINGS WARM WEATHER FOLLOWED BY SPRING FLOWERS, SUMMER PLANTS AND FALL COLORS! Followed by Allergies.

How do these events impact us? A few weeks ago, someone mentioned that they were experiencing the worst allergies they have ever dealt with. (never end a sentence with a preposition) I just checked with Merriam-Webster and found that "There is nothing wrong with ending sentence in a preposition "like" "to", " with", "for", or "at". The people who claim that a terminal preposition is wrong are clinging to an idea born in the 17th century & largely abandoned by grammar & usage experts in the early 20th century. I must have been born in the 17th Century, or my English teachers were born then.

I have been reading articles about climate change and how it is affecting allergies. Early warmer weather causes the allergy season to begin earlier and keeps the blooms lasting longer. The EPA indicates that these warm temperatures could increase concentrations of unhealthy air and water pollutants. Also, heat waves, changes in precipitation including flooding and drought and worsening air quality can impact higher numbers of people contracting allergies. People, including children, with asthma, pre-existing respiratory diseases are more vulnerable to ground level ozone which comes from chemical reactions between nitrogen oxide and organic compounds when exposed to sunlight. Emissions can come from industrial facilities, motor vehicle exhaust and gasoline fumes. This is likely to occur during hot sunny days in urban areas. High winds can cause allergen producing plants to move to new areas by carrying pollen and mold, even from outside of the United States.

The University of Michigan did a climate change study and found that from 1990 to 2018 the pollen season is starting earlier than usual. It used to start around St. Patrick's Day and now it can begin around Valentine's Day. It is predicted that by the end of the century pollen season could start 20 days earlier and in more extreme conditions could start 40 days earlier.

The core mission of Eversight is restoring vision through corneal transplantation. I am pleased to report that in 2021 Eversight had a record year in providing the Gift of Sight through corneal transplantation. In Michigan 2060 donors made it possible for 1393 people to receive the Gift of Sight. In our district there were 46 donors and 29 recipients. In the first three (3) months of 2022 there were 510 donors and 326 recipients in Michigan, with 13 donors and 4 recipients in our District. Sixty-one (61) tissues were placed for research and twelve (12) for surgeon education.

Eversight continues to be very active in Organ Donor Awareness. April has been National Donate Life Month. This celebration was created to raise awareness about donation, encourage Americans to register as organ, eye and tissue donors and to honor donors who have saved lives and improved lives through the gift of donation. Thank you Lions for the many ways you have supported the organ, tissue and eye donation programs and the transplantation community..

District 11-E2 has always been very generous in support of Eversight. Thus far this Lions's year 14 of our 28 clubs have donated \$5450. I am asking that each club support this great Lions of Michigan State Project to whatever extent your budget allows. Thank you very much to those clubs who have already donated to Eversight this year. It is greatly needed and appreciated. Let's be a 100% District this year.

Alpena Lions – donated \$1,200 to Feed the Need, and Lions helped to distribute food to 415 families, helping 845 community members.

Boyne Valley Lions – partnering with the Boyne City High School Hospitality class, delivered 88 Christmas dinners to assisted living homes in December. In November and February, Lions made and sold 1,110 pasties to raise \$4,700 to apply to Lion Core Programs including Hunger, as well as delivering 90 of the pasties to assisted living homes. In March, the Lions donated \$600 to the BC High School Hospitality class to help fund activities to feed the community. The Lions use their Food Service Trailer to serve at community events, which raised \$2,600 which was used to support Lion Core Programs, including Hunger. \$500 was donated to Eta Nu, an organization fighting hunger.

Central Lake Lions – donated \$6,900 to food pantries in Bellaire, Central Lake, and Ellsworth. The club also carried out 2 Bell Ringing events to raise funds for the Petoskey Salvation Army community and hunger support programs. Several Lions also regularly volunteer at the local food pantries.

Charlevoix Lions – Their main fundraisers involve cooking chicken in the community for events, and donating surplus to local law enforcement. They donate to Joppa House, which helps women and children get on a better start, and to the Charlevoix Community Christmas Project. Lions volunteer with the Charlevoix Food Pantry, Meals on Wheels, the local Men's Homeless Shelter, BASES (substance addiction), and a weekly community free breakfast. As the Ukrainian crisis continues, members have made substantial contributions to aid the Ukrainian people.

East Jordan Lions - donated \$1,155 to the Care and Share Food Pantry in East Jordan

Elk Rapids Lions - donated \$1,500 to their local food pantry over the last two years.

Glennie Lions – have for the last 4 years organized a community holiday food basket donation program. They provide two food gift baskets to each of the six area churches on the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter Holidays. They partner with Rogers Family Foods to purchase the baskets at a discounted price. For three years Glennie Lions have also partnered with the Alcona County Veterans Affairs Department to purchase a number of additional food baskets to distribute to area veterans.

Hillman Lions – along with community volunteers staff the Pop-Up Pantry every 3rd Wednesday to box and distribute food in a drive-through building provided by a club member. An average of 170 families are served monthly in this project. Club members also pack 40 meal bags with food for the weekend (many donated by Lions and community members). The bags are delivered to the Hillman Elementary and High School for distribution by teachers to students in need. Funds for these projects are from area grants applied for by the Lions, local donations, and club fundraisers. Additional funding over the last couple years also came through COVID relief funds.

Houghton Lake Lions - donated \$426 to their local food pantry, and volunteer time there.

Indian River Lions – donated \$200 to \$400 per year to their local food pantry, as well as holding benefits and then donate the surplus items to the food pantry.

Oscoda Lions - volunteered their time to an organization that provides services to their community.

LCIF Report

We are in the final months of the last year of the third major campaign since LCIF was founded 50 years ago, Campaign 100. Campaign 100 was originally a three year campaign, but was extended due to the Covid crisis. Through 4/15/22, the campaign has raised \$279,826,912 of the \$300,000,000 goal, (93.3%) so please consider what your club can do to help us reach the goal.

We started the campaign off well in the district. In the first year we raised \$13,363, we raised \$11,844 in 19-20 and \$12,547 in 20-21. 18 of our 28 clubs made contributions in 20-21, so we reached 64% giving, a decrease from 19-20 where 21 clubs participated. It would be great if every club could make at least a token contribution this year so that DG Bill could have a 100% district. This year so far 17 clubs have made contributions totaling \$10,159, so we have reached the \$10,000 we need as a district to receive our 15% Community Impact Grant for the year. This year the Alpena Lions Club project of park equipment was selected to apply for the CIG. The only other club who has submitted a grant request was the Hillman Lions, who received a grant from LCIF several years ago to improve the Hillman Walkable Trail. All you need to do is apply to the district in order to be selected to receive the grant to assist in your community so think about applying for the funds available next year. Contact me for more information.

We still need people or clubs to buy squares on the district Melvin Jones Fellowship raffle board so that we can do the drawing. The squares are \$20 each, with \$10 being credited as an individual contribution to LCIF, and the balance used to pay for the Fellowship. Let me know if you would like to help. We will be filling the remaining squares (7 left as of the date I wrote this report) at the district convention, and drawing the winner then, so if you want a square, time is running out! All clubs were recently sent a list of what they have accumulated towards Melvin Jones Fellowships, and how much they have to go to get one. If there are any questions about this, please let me know.

I am delighted to report that the Elk Rapids Lions and the Rose City Lions have become Model Clubs in Campaign 100, joining the Hillman Club, which means they have made a commitment to contribute at least \$500/member to LCIF for Campaign 100. These contributions include club and personal contributions. Hillman is also currently the only club in the district that has 100% of members making a personal contribution, so we challenge other clubs to join us in the effort.

At the state level, we have kicked off a statewide raffle in an effort to raise funds for Campaign 100. The tickets are \$20 each, and each district has been asked to sell at least 100. As of the date of this report, we have sold 54, so if your club/club members have not yet purchased tickets, please consider supporting this project. Thanks for your help in getting these sold. The goal is to raise at least \$20,000 to present to PIP Joe Preston at the MD convention.

A number of you have inquired about how your club, or you individually, can help the victims of the Gaylord tornado, so here is some information on what is being done, and what more will be done.

The County Emergency Management in Gaylord has turned over assistance to displaced people to the United Way. We are coordinating the Lions response with United Way. They have been flooded with donations of food and supplies, and their immediate need is for gift cards. As a district, we applied for a Lions of Michigan Foundation emergency grant of \$7500 with which will we will purchase Wal-Mart or Meijer gift cards. These will be distributed to the displaced so they can buy clothing, pot, pans, etc.

We have district funds available as well. The United Way director has requested that we wait about 2 weeks to disburse those when they can see what the needs are then. If your club would like to make a contribution to help with this effort, you can either wait a couple weeks when I will send out more information, or if you would like to do something now, you can send a check made out to Lions District 11-E2, and we will add that to the funds we will be disbursing in a few weeks for the ongoing needs.

In about a month, we will be applying for an LCIF Community Recovery Grant. We can get up to \$20,000 (if approved, of course!) from LCIF which can be used for repairs and refurbishment and other longer term needs.

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



COVID Update: State of COVID

- More than 100,000 cases are currently announced each day in the United States, a figure that captures only a portion of the true toll. In addition to the fact that many cases go uncounted in official reports, current figures are further depressed by reporting delays brought on by the Memorial Day weekend.
- Cases are increasing in more than half of all states, but there are signs of improvement in the Northeast and Midwest. Reports of new cases have fallen by more than 20 percent since mid-May in Michigan, New Jersey and New York.
- The United States recently surpassed one million total coronavirus deaths. New reported deaths remain at some of their lowest levels of the pandemic, with fewer than 300 announced each day. (NY Times data as of June 2)

COVID seems to be in a roller coaster up-and-down phase in the U.S., with flare ups in many locations periodically. It's just enough to be a consistent threat to people with impaired immune systems and unvaccinated individuals, who make up most of the hospitalized people and the death cases, and keep COVID active.

The COVID statistics are almost always different on every website I go to, due to different ways of determining the data, and the time data is received, as figures are changing every minute. Also, many places, especially rural communities, don't always report deaths as COVID related because they may not test for it, labeling it a fatal heart condition or pneumonia, etc. We may never know how many more COVID-caused deaths were not counted. What is now a sure fact is that the U.S. death count has passed the 1 million mark, something many thought could never happen.

We can only hope that the COVID experience has been a lesson learned, one enough to avoid the misunderstandings and mistakes made, and enough to prevent another million deaths when the next terrible virus hits. Even now, 2/3 of U.S. States, including Michigan, reported outbreaks of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, or Bird Flu, with several millions of wild birds and domestic poultry killed by this virus. Also, 2 genetically distinct variants of Monkeypox are circulating in the U.S., with 22 confirmed cases. So far, neither virus is a major threat to humans, but only time knows what the future will bring.



The picture (*left*) shows a plaque on a wall in a place we stayed in New Mexico in April. The message it conveys really connected with me. I've tried for years to live with those very concepts, among others. We are born, live, and die. The living part is the time we have to experience the world around us, to do good (or bad) things, and to succeed (or fail) to rise to the potentials within us.

We live in a world of hectic motion, a culture where people want it and they want it now. We all have experienced the fast-lane life and its result – stress. The American Psychological Association's *Stress*

in America Survey 2022 found the stress and mental health U.S. statistics are worsening, mostly due to the COVID-19 pandemic, rising inflation, and the Russia-Ukraine crisis. Participating Americans were stressed out due to supply chain issues (81%), rising inflation in the country (87%), possible Russian cyber attacks or nuclear threats to the U.S. (80%), fear that a World War III could break out any moment (69%), about money and the economy (65%), and the fact that the COVID -19 pandemic might never end if new variants keep mutating (66%). Add in work situations and family strains of daily life, and we're drowning in stress. Living a simple life is difficult today–IF people let circumstances control their lives. There are things we can't do anything about as individuals, but we all have the ability to control our own actions and to form our thoughts in more positive directions. Living more "simply" doesn't mean we must become Amish - it's creating a state of mind, of calm and focus, that we can achieve IF we want to.

"Loving generously" isn't living a shallow amorous existence like Casanova. It's having compassion, acceptance, and a sense of connection to all the diversity of our fellow human beings. It's being open to Nature, a feeling of belonging with everyone and everything else. Love in the greatest sense is about forgiveness, for others and for oneself, gratitude for all the good things, and the desire to enjoy life with others. Service is love in action.

Humans are designed to learn, for survival, and for pure curiosity. We learn, change and grow throughout our lives except when people close their minds and huddle in their current narrow nooks of beliefs. Reality is what we think it is, and so much more. What we know, or think we know, is a grain of sand in a vast desert of the Unknown. As long as humans continue to learn, we will begin to understand, and ultimately, perhaps, reach the level of Wisdom.

Living Simply, Loving Generously, and Learning Constantly are concepts worth pursuing, and a good fit with Lions' principles in the line of Service.
