

Lions of North America Are Impacting Lives!

Dear Club Leader:

I got a call one afternoon from a friend. The first thing that I heard as I answered the phone was, "Jerome, I think I am lost."

"Ok, stay calm. I will try to help you. Look around and tell me what you see. Then, tell me where you are trying to go."

After a short exchange, my friend discovered where she was; the wrong turn that was made; and, how to get back on course.

COVID - 19 has us a little off course. Where are we?

Even with the COVID crisis slowing us down, we impacted nearly 22 million lives in the United States and affiliate countries (CA 1). That is with only 49% of the clubs reporting at least one service project.

Because of the efforts of each club, we decreased our dropped members by 6% in the past year. Additionally, we reduced the number of clubs that turned in their charters by 10%. Congrats! Let's keep working on retaining those members that we have.

Lions are resilient! We will remain calm and learn to navigate the new normal that is emerging daily.

Where are we going?

Our challenge in 2020-21 is to work with our clubs to emerge from "COVID Hibernation" and return to what we do best – serving our communities.

We are going to utilize the North American Membership Initiative process in about 90% of our district to expand our footprint of service, engage more volunteers and provide opportunities for personal leadership development.

How can you and your Club help?

Service

- Monthly report your service using MyLion. The process has been streamlined to allow you to report in a matter of minutes.
- Strive to report service activities that impact about 120 lives per member during the next year. If you have a club of 30 members, try to report service projects impacting 3,600 lives.

Membership

- Your DG team will be striving to charter a new club or two in the district. If you know someone who lives in the area, please ask them to join the new club.
- The Constitutional Area Goal is to add 44,000 Lions to existing clubs between July 1, 2020 and June 30, 2021. Your club is asked to add at least one new member each quarter.
- The Constitutional Area Goal is to limit drops to no more than 33,000. Your club is encouraged to
 engage members in new service opportunities, new fellowship opportunities and to limit dropped
 members to three per club, if at all possible.

Thank you for your leadership!! Working together we are going to show kindness to our members and our community. Your Global Action Team is here to assist. Please let us know what we can do to assist your club.

Council of Governors COVID Guidelines

The District Governors of Michigan have compiled the following procedures to help Lions cope safely with COVID-19

My fellow Lions,

Meeting safe and the safety of all our Lions members and guests is all of our responsibility. From the State Office to the District Governors all the way down to the club level. To help us all I'd like to provide you with this safety meeting outline. Where ever you might gather these guidelines could save many should the COVID virus come calling. This can be applied to indoor meetings as well as outside meetings. This outline was designed by PID Jenny Ware and I feel it is very well done.

- 1. Outside have simple entry area set up. All Lions are asked to use the front door for a single point of entry.
- 2. Masks are to be worn upon entry where they will sign in and provide a contact number.
- 3. Masks are to be worn upon entry and at all times during the meeting if able. Masks will be provided if needed.
 - **a.** For those that are not able to wear masks due to medical conditions, you will not be asked about your health. We honor your privacy.
- 4. COVID screenings will be completed at the door. Please fill out the screening with either your own pen or a sanitized pen will be available.
 - **a**. These forms will be placed into an envelope and sealed for protection of confidentiality. The envelope will be given to the Cabinet Secretary.
- 5. Your temperature will be taken with a Touchless Thermometer. If your temperature is 100.4 or greater, you will be asked to leave the building and contact your doctor's office for further direction.
- 6. Physical distancing of 6 feet will be expected. Seating will be arranged to reflect this standard.
- 7. If food and beverages are being served, contact your local Health Department for guidelines to be followed.

Our State of Michigan Governor has established Regions within our state. The guidelines may differ depending on where you are located. Be sure to research the criteria for your Region, especially right before the event as guidelines can change quickly. For instance here in southwest Michigan, Region 3, we are limited to an indoor meeting of 10 people or less and outdoors of 100 people, with all meetings practicing the things we have outlined and the need to follow social distancing.



Three of those receipts cover the materials purchased while the fourth represents materials we took, but didn't need to use to complete the ramp. It's better to have a few extra materials than start a job and not have what you need to complete it."



Cause & Effect In Action

Another month, and COVID-19 numbers continue to soar throughout the U.S., especially in the Southern and Western states, with Midwest states poised to see new infection records set if current trends continue. It's depressing to watch the COVID-19 infection rate graphs move downward for several months, and then soar to new heights in the past month. Many states, if not most by the time you read this, will have recorded numbers climb as high as the supposed April "peak", or higher.

The reason for this resurgence is simple: Too many American citizens are ignoring or purposely defying the safety protocols medical experts laid out for our protection — congregating together at beaches, bars and other recreation or business sites, without masks, no social distancing, and haphazard soap and water hand washing, giving the virus just what it needs to continue spreading. Premature opening of recreational and business sites backfired. Instead of bringing the economy back, it is slowing the recovery. Many states have postponed further steps to open things up, and some are reinstating safety protocols they had discontinued. Whether it's disagreement with government policies, a lack of faith in science, belief in alternative "facts" spread from hoaxers, extreme political media, and misleading data from unreliable internet sites, counterproductive actions have exposed more people to COVID-19, stalled the containment of the virus, and set back the economic recovery.

COVID-19 is not your father's flu. Globally, about 3.4% of reported COVID-19 victims have died. By comparison, seasonal flu generally kills far fewer than 1% of those infected. Children and young adults are statistically less apt to die if infected, but there have been increasing deaths of infants, children, teens, and young adults, mostly (but not <u>all</u>) due to complications of existing health conditions. And they can be virus carriers, spreading the infection to others. Studies in certain areas have reported children under 10 to make up around 10% of confirmed COVID-19 cases, and some reported areas had adults under 30 accounting for about 40% of confirmed virus cases.

Other troubling aspects of the COVID-19 virus continue to emerge. Beyond respiratory distress, some symptoms of neurological irregularities are showing up in patients, including brain damage – strokes, seizures, loss of taste and smell, and slower-than-normal cognitive speed. Heart damage in the form of heart attacks and sometimes-deadly clots is a major concern, as are cases of acute kidney damage in patients, most who are diabetic, have high blood pressure, or suffer from chronic kidney disease. A number of patients who fight off the virus are suffering from long recovery times and some ongoing severe complications that may be life long.

A big question now is whether to open schools this fall, or wait until the Pandemic is contained. While some parents, teachers, and students may be eager for schools to reopen, many feel the virus resurgence makes it potentially too dangerous to have students and teachers back in closed classrooms. Reports say an estimated 1 in 5 teachers have already decided not to return this fall. Then there are the support staff – bus drivers, janitors, cafeteria servers – most are high risk older adults who may not risk returning either. Schools may open, but to what level of proficiency? And what is this mask controversy? Patriotic citizens have followed the Pandemic health experts' recommendations. However, some individuals have rejected mask-wearing as if it were a disease in itself. Masks aren't always comfortable or stylish and don't provide 100% protection like a hazmat suit, but they are proven to substantially reduce the risk of virus transmission. World-wide studies show mask-wearing populations have case numbers drop. Cases increased where the mask-wearing percentage was low. We've all seen the placards displayed that say "No Shirt - No shoes - No Service", accepted by the general public for decades without protest marches. We need to update to "No Shirt - No Shoes - No Mask - No Service." Health practices that curtail a Pandemic virus from spreading shouldn't be controversial in a mentally balanced society.

The anti-maskers and deniers are Pandemic equivalents of drunk drivers. Impaired drunk drivers risk death or injury to themselves, and to everyone they meet on the road. People not wearing a mask or social distancing risk getting infected with the virus, or spreading the virus to others they encounter if they already have it (whether they know it or not). And if counter-productive activities aren't bad enough, it's reported that allergy and infectious diseases health expert' Dr. Anthony Fauci and his family have been receiving death threats "because Covid-19 is a hoax". We really need a torrential outpouring of Kindness, and a massive dose of reality...

There is some good news in this COVID-19 Pandemic. Human trials of promising Coronavirus vaccines have started, and if successful may be available by the end of the year or the beginning of next year. What we've learned from this COVID-19 gives us an opportunity to build on our experiences and avoid our current mistakes, to do it right in the next pandemic that will happen sooner or later. We have the power, if we have the will, to end this Pandemic.

For now, we have to deal with the fact that this COVID-19 Pandemic is not going away anytime soon. How long it lasts depends on how well we practice the "3 W's" — Wear a mask. Watch your social distancing. Wash your hands with soap and water. Limited close contact limits spreading the virus. Stop exhaled droplets, stop the COVID-19 virus.

We Lions help people, and taking proper precautions and doing things right is the best help we can give.


