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





Lions have been serving and connecting safely through social distancing, Zoom meetings, social media and more, and we encourage you to continue being safe as you sponsor the Peace Poster Contest. The 2021-2022 Contest: **We Are All Connected.** 

Consider the following tips:

- Email or call your school or youth group leaders to check in, confirm their participation in this year's contest and offer your support.
- Encourage schools conducting e-learning to participate by providing contest rules and instructions online. Students can then complete their posters at home and drop them off to the designated school contact.
- Provide your name, email address and phone number to the participating school or youth group contact, and make plans to collect the posters from them for the local judging.
- Follow local guidelines for gathering and practicing social distancing when holding your contest judging (at the club, district and multiple district levels).
- Consider holding your contest judging online. Photograph the entries and post them without the student's names (remember it is a blind judging) in an online photo gallery such as Flickr, Google Photos, etc. Share the link with your judges and include a score sheet to email back to you.
- Recognize local winners by sharing their poster images with your local news media and by posting them on social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, etc.) with #PeacePoster.

### Lions of Michigan District 11 E-2 Cabinet Meeting Minutes, August 14, 2021, Grayling and via Zoom

The meeting was called to order at 10 AM by DG Gaines. The invocation was offered by DG Gaines. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by 2VDG Murch.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 4/16/21 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. DG Gaines requested that they be accepted as published. There was no correspondence.

**Treasurer's Report**- The financials for the 2020-21 year were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$31,972.92, income of \$16,850.70, expenses of \$13,768.88 leaving an ending balance as of 6/30/21 of \$35,054.74. This is made up of \$26,520.55 in administration and \$8,534.19 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$40,314.52, income of \$5,671.69 and expenses of \$9,882.14 leaving an ending balance of \$36,104.07. The 2021-22 budget was presented. We are projecting expenses exceeding income by \$2064 this Lions' year, but with reduced expenditures the last two years due to Covid restrictions, we have plenty of cash in the bank to cover the shortfall. The financials for YTD 2021-22 were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$35,054.74, income of \$5,646.50, expenses of \$5,110.99 leaving an ending balance as of 8/13/21 of \$35,590.25. This is made up of \$26,810.56 in administration and \$8,779.69 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$36,104.07, income of \$100.00 and expenses of \$500.00 leaving an ending balance of \$35,704.07. It was moved by IPDG Leathers, supported by 2VDG Murch that the financials report be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The dues collection report was presented, showing there are eight clubs that have not yet paid their first half dues. CST Durflinger will be mailing out reminders next week.

#### Old Business- None

<u>New Business-</u>CST Durflinger reported that Bear Lake Camp is hosting a Wine and Beer tasting fundraiser on October 29. They have asked for event sponsorships, one of which is a \$1,000 sponsorship which includes recognition and 8 tickets to the event. We have over \$2,400 in our special needs camp fund, so after some discussion it was moved by 2VDG Murch, supported by IPDG Leathers that we do a \$1,000 sponsorship. The eight tickets will be awarded from a drawing of entries of each person attending the 8/14 and 10/9 cabinet meetings. Motion carried.

<u>GMT Report-</u>DG Gaines noted that as of today we are break-even in membership. IPDG Leathers noted that Central Lake will be adding 6 members this month. DG Gaines is working on getting at least one new club started this year.

<u>GLT Report</u>- DG Gaines reported that PDG Zeller is willing to do individual training or group training for any incoming officers that want it. Contact PDG Zeller to arrange training for anyone in your club.

<u>GST Report</u>- GST Marie Leathers reported that clubs are beginning to get active again. Too many of our clubs are not reporting their service to LCI, and she will be happy to help anyone who has any questions about how to do it. DG Gaines noted that CST Durflinger has been set up as the District Administrator, so if you are having trouble entering anything, she can do it for you.

<u>Zone Chair Reports</u> – ZC Broome reported he will be starting club visits soon. He has spoken to his clubs and they are getting active again. Central Lake has added 16 members in the last three months.

<u>Committee Reports</u> Written Reports were provided by: Diabetes Awareness- Lion Diane LaBeau/Lion BJ Sander, District Editor-Lion Zimmer, Environmental- PDG Bodem, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Durflinger, Website/IT- GST Marie Leathers

<u>Oral Reports-</u> Bear Lake Camp- PDG Harris reported that there is a golf outing next week. CST Durflinger will contact them and see if they need any additional support for that event. They are beginning to hold camps this year- two in July, a hearing and a sight camp. Honorary Committee- IPDG Leathers reported that he is working on a PDG event, probably in October. He would like to get the PDG's together to do a service project this year. Pediatric Cancer- IPDG Leathers reported the state committee hasn't met. If clubs have ideas for something in their local area, please let him know. There are still pediatric cancer t-shirts available for \$15. The proceeds go into the district cancer fund. The proceeds from the dunk tank at IPDG Rod's appreciation dinner will go into the pediatric cancer fund.

<u>Audience Comments</u>- The appreciation dinner for IPDG Rod will be held 9/18. Announcements have been sent to all clubs. It is carnival style and is meant for all Lions in the district- horseshoes, cornhole, dunk tank, entertainment, etc.

<u>VDG Comments-</u>2VDG Murch commented that he will be visiting clubs and meeting everyone. He encourages clubs to reach out to clubs around them for joint fundraisers and projects. He is chair of the District Melvin Jones Fellowship committee and reminds clubs to look around at their membership to see if there is someone who deserves this honor. He also encourages clubs to do member satisfaction surveys, and to contact members who resign to find out the reasons.

<u>DG Comments-</u> DG Gaines reported that the state convention this year will be in Muskegon from 5/19-5/22. He noted that this is the last year of Campaign 100 at LCIF and encourages every club to make a contribution. We have one model club in the district, the Hillman Lions. They are challenging other district clubs to join them. DG Gaines is challenging all cabinet members to make personal contributions to LCIF- he would like a 100% cabinet. He noted it is time for him to nominate district Lions for the State and International level awards- the Presidential and Leadership medals and the SA Dodge award. If you have suggestions for Lions who deserve these awards, please let him know. He has committee chair positions that need to be filled, and he really needs a GMT. Please talk to your club members about the available positions.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 10:55 AM. The next meeting date will be October 9 at the Congregational Church in Alpena.

Now passing on contacts info and setting up a date for a zoom meeting with BJ, DAD Project Chair DG Bill Bradfield and DAD Grant Fund Manager PCC Barry Allen. This may occur later this month or in September, when PCC Barry has a more open calendar.

Goals of this past year 2020-2021 have been partially met. The District 11 E-2 DAD Grant funds have been earmarked for a USDA based school program for middle schoolers in the Alpena and Ogemaw schools (received word 8/10/21 that the contract is still in the negotiation stages) and a PreDiabetes education program in the Munson-Kalkaska Health Center (that contract was received 8/10/21 from DAD Project Chair, Bill Bradfield and has been forwarded on to Katie Daman, MS, RN, CDCES, at Munson Kalkaska Memorial Health Center 8/11/21 7am). Any updates to these contracts will be given verbally at the Cabinet Meeting 8/14.

PreDiabetes checklists and MSUE tip sheets and posters "Navigating the Food Pantry with Diabetes" have been printed and distributed to food pantries within our district as an educational outreach during the COVID pandemic when other avenues of providing diabetes education were restricted. Marketing of the MSUE online Diabetes Path classes sponsored by Lions was carried out. Continuous glucose monitors (cGMs) for East Jordan and Bellaire Family Health Centers were funded by a combination of donations from Central Lake and East Jordan Lions Clubs with matching funds from District 11 E-2., not part of the grant.

During the 2021-2022 year, the above mentioned contracts will be monitored and progress updates will be requested from the grant recipients.

### ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE - Dist. 11 E-2 August 14, 2021

There have been several articles in the in newspapers and other publications within the last few months concerning invasive plant species in northern Michigan. Many of the invasive flowers we enjoy seeing along our highways. One of these invasive species is Purple Loosestrife which is abundant in the summer. The Purple Loosestrife has lovely pink and purple flowers on their stems, but it is an invasive plant that was brought to the United States through ballast water of ships and commercial sale as ornamental shrubs. This plant pushes out the native vegetation such as the joe-pye weed and cardinal flowers which support hummingbirds and other pollinator insects.

Huron Pines out of Gaylord is very much involved (along with many volunteers) in removing many types of invasive species including Purple Loosestrife. Other invasive species include narrow leaf cattails and garlic mustard. I am sure that Huron Pines would welcome more volunteers to assist in the control of invasive plant species.

### **LCIF Report**

We are entering the fourth year of the third major funding campaign since LCIF was founded 50 years ago, Campaign 100. Campaign 100 was originally a three year campaign, but has been extended for another year due to the Covid crisis. Through 6/30, the end of the third year, the campaign has raised \$215,891,550 of the \$300,000,000 goal.

The goal for every club is to donate an average of \$250/member over three years (only \$80/member/year), with club, individual member and local community donations all included toward this goal. Right now only 6% of Lions donate individually to OUR foundation and International would like to increase this percentage. Our district's percentage is currently 8.65%, led by the Hillman Club at 100%. Individual contributions can be made on a recurring basis via credit card on the LCIF website to make it easier. The Hillman club reached 100% by passing around a can at each meeting for members to put in a dollar or two, or just their pocket change with the proceeds being credited in alphabetical order to each member. This is an easy way that every club could participate. I am also proud to announce that the Hillman Lions have decided to become a model club (giving of an average of \$500/member) and we challenge other clubs in the district to join us in this support of OUR Foundation.

We started the campaign off well in the district. In the first year we raised \$13,363, we raised \$11,844 in 19-20 and \$12,547 in 20-21. This total makes us eligible for another community grant like the one received by the Hillman Club last year which we are using on our Community Walkable Trail project. 18 of our 28 clubs made contributions in 20-21, so we reached 64% giving, a decrease from 19-20 where 21 clubs participated. It would be great if every club could make at least a token contribution this year so that DG Bill could have a 100% district. We still need people or clubs to buy squares on the district Melvin Jones Fellowship raffle board so that we can do the drawing. The squares are \$20 each, with \$10 being credited as an individual contribution to LCIF, and the balance used to pay for the Fellowship. Let me know if you would like to help. The original plan was to complete the squares at the district convention so we could do the drawing then, but Covid disrupted that plan, so we have some more time now to fill up the board.

Now that most (or maybe all?) of us are back doing in person meetings, I am available to make a presentation to your club on Campaign 100, so give me a call! If you have any questions, please contact me.

### Lions of Michigan Foundation report- 8/14/21

The Sight and Hearing sweepstakes finished with 10,841 tickets sold, an increase of 1,073 from last year, better than expected given the Covid restrictions. Our district led the state with 2,478. Seventeen district clubs participated in the sale, so we will be aiming for more club participation in this fundraiser next year. Six clubs sold over 100 tickets, led by Oscoda and Alpena. This is such a great fundraiser for us- rebates from \$3.50-\$5.50/per ticket sold depending on how many you sell, that I don't understand why all of our district clubs don't participate. The rebate for the Oscoda Lions this year was over \$4,200, so a great fundraiser!

Last weekend was the LMF Hall of Fame banquet. I had the pleasure of being the presenter for our own PDG Dave Zeller for his induction. Congratulations to Lion Dave, and to all of our 11-E2 Lions who have been selected for this great honor in the past.

A new fundraising project this year is a cookbook. You can turn recipes in through 10/1, and the cookbooks will be ready probably in November- just in time for Christmas gifts. The cookbooks are \$20 each, and when your club sells 20 or more you will receive a rebate of \$5/cookbook sold.

The Kidsight program is active again, with special Covid protocols to protect both the children and the volunteers. Contact Lion Nate Slezak or Lion Linda Harris to schedule your event. The trailer is available for your community parades or festivals, so let me know if you would like to use it.

Clubs are reminded that the Foundation has funds available to assist needy veterans or military families, and the funds are NOT restricted to medical needs. In the past funds have been given for vehicle repairs, utility bill assistance, etc, so if you know of a needy veteran in your area, talk to one of the trustees about getting an aid application. Our district just received a grant for a veteran who needed vehicle repairs, and one to assist with medical expenses, so contact your local veteran's assistance office and let them know that we can help.

The board approved adding a third tier to the co-pays for hearing aids. They will now be 0-125% of the poverty level, at which the co-pays will be \$25 at the low end, \$100 at the high end. The other two ranges are 125-225% of poverty level and 226-325% of poverty level, with the co-pays increasing with income. New application forms are available.

Our district contributions to the Foundation for the 2020-21 year totaled \$6,610, a significant decrease from last year, but hopefully with conditions improving, we can increase our support this year. All of our state projects need support!

**Delta Variant Continues to Surge** 

"The Delta variant is more than twice as contagious as previous variants, and there's data that suggests it might cause more severe illness." *Aug 13, 2021* 

"The COVID-19 death toll has started soaring again as the delta variant tears through the nation's unvaccinated population and fills up hospitals with patients, many of whom are younger than during earlier phases of the pandemic." *August 15 2021* 


"At this time, as we build the level of vaccination nationwide, we must also use all the prevention strategies available, including masking indoors in public places, to stop transmission and stop the pandemic. Everyone who is able, including fully vaccinated people, should wear masks in public indoor places in areas of substantial or high transmission". *Aug 26, 2021* 

These statements sound familiar, and could have been voiced last summer, or last winter, when the COVID curve began to go upward after falling in the previous weeks and months. The only difference is the presence of the Delta variant, which is currently surging throughout the U.S., and the vaccines that are now available. Just when we think this is finally going to be over, super-spreader events and widespread lack of masking and distancing allow the COVID/Delta viruses more opportunities to jump to new hosts. We've heard it all before; we know what to do — and chances are we again won't do it. The COVID roller coaster Pandemic, like the Energizer Bunny, just keeps on going.

A prime example of how we can keep prolong this Pandemic: Health officials had been seeing some of the lowest numbers this summer in South Dakota since the pandemic began. Then COVID cases once again surged when more than 525,000 visitors attended the 81st Annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally in early August. There were few measures to suppress any COVID-19 spread; few if any in the crowds wore a mask. South Dakota witnessed a <u>686.8 percent increase</u> in daily COVID-19 case counts over the past three weeks, currently 10+ times the nationwide rate. Sturgis Rally attendees from all over the nation are now known to have spread the virus to locations in at least 25 other states. More are expected.

Deaths are now increasing in 43 states - the worst numbers since December 2020. Deaths from the Delta variant are increasingly centered among white non-Hispanic people, and the share of deaths among young people is also increasing. Preliminary data from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shows those in their 30s and people 18 to 29 have roughly tripled their share of deaths in July and August, . People in their 50s and early 60s have represented fewer than 1 of every 6 victims in the Pandemic, but in July and August they make up more than 1 of every 4 deaths.

While research suggests that




COVID-19 vaccines are slightly less effective against the variants, the vaccines still appear to provide protection against severe COVID-19. Nearly all COVID-19 deaths in the U.S. now are in people who weren't vaccinated, a staggering demonstration of how effective the shots have been.

It should be noted that in this volatile Pandemic these statistics a few days ago — & ALL COVID/Delta statistics — may change drastically tomorrow as the Delta variant works its way through unvaccinated people of all ages.


As Lions, we need to be aware and do what we can to help everyone stay safe until this virus is vanquished.
