



District 11E2 presently consists of 30 clubs with membership of 823, a year ago we had 32 clubs with a membership of 865 members. Sadly the Bellaire and Gaylord clubs have decided to fold their clubs. We have six clubs at 15 or less members, the rotation of leadership in these clubs are minimal at best.

For various reasons the trend for the last few years have shown a downward spiral in our district. We definitely cannot deny our membership is aging. With more work and responsibilities being put on fewer members retention of our members is a real issue. New members are not being trained properly and are put in positions that they really have no guidance or even understand what they are expected to do. These issues are not only affecting our Clubs but also our District.

I believe our District is fortunate to have a Governor at this critical time that has history, dedication and willingness to formulate a plan to address these issues.

Boyne Valley Lions Club joined "history in the making" and contributes \$1000 to the Boyne Heritage Center

The Boyne Valley Lions Club became the first service club to contribute funds to the newly formed Boyne Heritage Center. At its regular meeting on Wednesday, September 18th Boyne Valley King Lion John Cool presented Heritage Center Chairperson Kecia Freed with a check for \$1,000. The Boyne Heritage Center has set its goal to become a world-class collaborative historical hub, preserving and promoting the stories of Boyne City, Boyne Falls, Walloon Lake, Advance, Ironton, Horton Bay and surrounding townships.

With Lions International providing over 100 years of service around the world and the Boyne Valley Lions Club serving the greater Boyne region for over 50 years they are proud of their history and that of the area. They challenge other area service organizations and encourage all community members to step up and support the creation of the Heritage Center.



A professional museum designer, Project Arts & Dearborn, was contracted to design the exhibit. The first two of four phases of the design are complete, with the final two stages being production design and installation. Future visitors to the Boyne Heritage Center will feel transported through time as they experience the exhibit titled 'Boyne Before Us. The exhibit will tell the story of how the extraordinary gifts of land and water attracted people over thousands of years to the Boyne region. After settlement in the early 1800s, the explosive harvest of these gifts, through lumbering and industry, built the region but left the land exploited and abandoned. In revival, the Boyne community has embraced a sustainable economy that enjoys, protects and shares these gifts in the present and for future generations. "This is our heritage and our legacy," organizers said.



The Times, They Are A-Changin', Weather We Like It or Not

The month of October usually has a number of sunny days with temperatures in the 60s or even 70s, (like this week) — pleasant weather to enjoy before the onset of Winter. The leaves are turning colors, a feast of beauty for our eyes. Good early Fall weather stimulates our senses and lifts our spirits.

By the end of October and the beginning of November we will enter the second half of the Autumn season, a period I think of as the "ugly time". Too many cloudy, dark and cold rainy days with cutting winds, leafless trees, mud replacing hard ground — it can be depressing. We get through it by focusing on other things in our lives. By the end of Autumn in December the first snows of Winter have arrived. Seasonal change is inevitable, and most of us have learned to adapt to the good and the bad of each each season. For those of us who can take Winter more easily than the dreary, ugly transition period, winter weather is, if not quite welcomed, at least tolerated. Others "skeedaddle" to Florida, Arizona, or other warmer climes.

When I first came to Northern Michigan in 1971, you could depend that snow would come to stay sometime during November's deer hunting season. Much of the early snows might melt, but there would always be some snow on the ground from late November to at least mid-April. That's how it worked, year after year. But a few decades ago this began to change. Now we have seen it rain in January, February and March, as well as experiencing more ice storms than previously. Winters are still wintery in spots. But what used to be a short January thaw can now occur any month for any length of time. All bets are off.

Whatever the controversy of Climate Change is about, there is no doubt that something is happening. Records are being set for high temperatures in summer, as well as a few record low temperatures in Winter or other seasons. Glaciers are melting faster, sea levels are rising. Mosquito-carried diseases and fruit-killing fungus are creeping northward as weaker cold temperatures in Northern Michigan are no longer keeping them at bay.

My 4 years in the US Air Force in the Weather Service does <u>not</u> make me a weather scientist. It does, however, give me a level of understanding of what is going on all over this planet. Reports say that the average temperature on planet Earth has risen at least 2 degrees in recent decades. So, what's the big deal with a paltry 2 degree increase? You can hardly notice a 2 degree temperature change, up or down. Well, as insignificant as it may seem, you must realize that every air molecule on Earth is a little warmer, vibrating a little faster. Take that small increase of energy - heat is energy - and multiply it by every molecule in the enormous layer of atmosphere that covers our planet. Simply put, the atmosphere has gained an enormous amount of energy. This results in high and low pressure systems that are more energetic and can be larger and stronger, and pull in more tropic heat and arctic cold. Thunderstorms. hurricanes, tornadoes, and frontal winds can wreak more havoc, rain and snowstorms can carry and release greater quantities of moisture. And if warming continues, the energy will increase and weather will be even more energized and dangerous.

Over 100 years ago Mark Twain noted: "Climate is what we expect, Weather is what we get." The weather we've been getting in the last few years is more than we expected. Beyond melting glaciers and polar bears edging toward extinction, how will Lions adapt to help those in need (all of us) cope with the potential changes to come? We can't predict the future with certainty, but we can create the future by what we do now.
