OPTION ONE - Online Risk Assessment

Finding out if you're at risk for prediabetes or diabetes is simple. You can complete the test at <u>https://doihaveprediabetes.org</u> in roughly 5 minutes and a few clicks....then encourage others to take the assessment. Assess Your Risk!

We are asking ALL Lion's members and Clubs to share the above screening link on your social media page on the day of the event and ask your friends to do the same.

OPTION TWO - Organize a Screening Project on that day.

Clubs can make a difference by organizing a screening project in their communities. The ADA Diabetes paper Risk Test is available through Globe Printing at 906-485-1033 and they can coordinate shipping and quantity AT NO COST to the Club. Have a Lions member set up a display at a location in your community. Besides entering the information in myLION, email your LCIF Diabetes Program Manager/Administrator of your screening on November 14th.

Report Your Screening

To reach our goal of 1 million screened, it's important for all of us to report our service. After your clubs screening, be sure to

report your activity on MyLion.

PROJECT IDEAS

- Work with a healthcare professional to organize an educational talk about diabetes, pre-diabetes, prevention and management at your club or district meeting.
- Facilitate a discussion about diabetes to encourage club members to share their personal connections to the disease.
- Share a low calorie high nutrient snacks such as fruits and vegetables at your club meeting and ask a nutritionist or diabetes educator to teach club members and their families about interpreting food labels.
- Sign-up for myLION and learn how Lions and Leos are getting involved in diabetes service.
- Download an app that educates and encourages healthy lifestyle choices. Invite club members to participate in healthy lifestyles related challenge.
- Newspaper: Lions for Diabetes Awareness event in your community.
- Partner with healthcare professionals to organize a screening for diabetes, diabetic retinopathy and diabetic foot.
- Promote diabetes prevention through social media campaigns or radio announcements.
- Volunteer for a day at a diabetes center
- Sponsor a healthy cooking demonstration for people with diabetes and pre-diabetes.
- Organize a weekly walking club at your place of work and share a healthy snack afterwards.
- Bring fresh fruits or vegetables to an elementary school classroom to encourage children to try a variety of healthy foods.
- Collaborate with a healthcare professional to organize a physical activity and promote exercise and healthy eating.
- Sponsor a training program for community healthcare workers to learn about screening, community support programs and prevention of diabetes complications.

Michigan Defense Against Diabetes (D.A.D.) Grant Info

We have recently completed a contract with the MDHHS to perform A1C's and possibly other Educational programs in District # 10 which is located in Northwest Michigan primarily in Lions District 11E1. The project we will be doing in the month of November will be performed in 8 of their offices in District 11E1 and 2 of their offices located in District 11E2. This also presents opportunities in all of their offices Statewide, which is a minimum of 1 office in each county. The content of this package includes the following:

- 1 Cover letter to send to each MDHHS office in your respective Districts explaining the DAD program and how we can partner with the MDHHS Statewide and provide our services in their communities.
- 2 A complete listing of their offices including contact information.
- 3 A map of the MDHHS Regions so you can find which ones are in your District and contact them.
- 4 First Draft of a press release
- 5 A sample flyer developed by MDHHS with 11E1 input.
- 6 A sample MOU- Memorandum of Understanding that would be between the District and the offices that you partner with.
- 7 You will need to contact their offices by phone first, get an email address and send the attached cover letter, your contact information, an Mou for your area, a map of our Districts and our contact list for their use. We would like to get as many A1C's as possible in the month of November as the LCIF has proposed doing 100 MILLION Worldwide. However if some offices in your area wish to perform other projects that are covered in our grant they may do so.
- 8 The cost of our project in District 11E1 is \$7,700 to do 10 offices, making it \$770. per office to have their office staff perform the A1C's and other related costs.

At our Board of Directors meeting in October we developed a new plan for the second half of our grant to assist all Districts in meeting their goals and spending their share of grant money. This is an opportunity that you do not want to pass up as it will shore up a Partnership with the MDHHS in every county and it will add credentials to our PORTFOLIO that will be very valuable in the future. There are several districts that need this boost of projects so it is absolutely necessary that you act NOW and take advantage of this opportunity. Please contact me with any questions or concerns,

Dear Lions:

Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

2018 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and total assets less than \$500,000	990-EZ or 990
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions

clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by November 15 each year. Please note that *an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N.*

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may apply for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an <u>EIN online</u>, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.

Lions of Michigan District 11 E-2 Cabinet Meeting Minutes, October 19, 2019

<u>Cabinet Members in Attendance-</u> DG Dave Zeller, IPDG Gordon Harris, CST Barb Durflinger, 1VDG Rod Leathers, 2 VDG Bill Gaines, ZC's Dennis Gocha, Bill Smith and Steve Murch, GMT Bob Tasior <u>Cabinet Members Absent –</u> ZC Chuck Brew and Bob Gingerich

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 AM by DG Zeller. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Leathers. The Pledge was led by 2VDG Gaines.

Secretary's Report - Minutes of the August 17, 2019 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. 1VDG Leathers moved approval with support from ZC Smith. Motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>- The financials for 2019-20 were presented showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$30,498.24 as of 7/1/19, income of \$9,543.63 and expenses of \$9,778.88, leaving an ending balance as of 10/18/19 of \$30,262.99. The account consists of \$22,943.25 in administrative funds and \$7,319.74 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance as of 7/1/19 of \$37,280.07, income of \$1,370.29, expenses of \$474.29, leaving an ending balance as of 10/18/19 of \$38,176.07. It was moved by 2VDG Gaines, supported by ZC Smith that the report be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

Old Business- Defense Against Diabetes Grant- IPDG Harris reported that 18 clubs made contributions toward the grant, but only two have expended funds. Any clubs who wish to participate may still send in a contribution toward the 3:1 matching grant. Clubs should begin working on their projects as we only have until 5/1/20 to complete activities. IPDG Harris noted that the state chair has scheduled several events in our area without contacting the local clubs or requesting permission. He asked that he be allowed to refuse payment for any activity not instigated and approved by a local club. It was moved by ZC Smith, supported by 1VDG Leathers that IPDG Harris be authorized to refuse approval for payment for unauthorized event. Motion carried.

<u>New Business- Membership-</u> DG Zeller noted that our district membership has decreased from over 1300 when he was DG last time to 800 now. We have lost a number of clubs, and we need to begin work to reestablish clubs in those areas. He requested that the cabinet approve the expenditure of up to \$500 to advertise in local papers to try and find people interested in becoming Lions. CST Durflinger noted that we already have \$200 in the budget for membership, so we would just need to approve spending up to an additional \$300. It was moved by ZC Smith, supported by 2VDG Gaines that we approve this expenditure. Motion carried.

<u>Service Projects-</u> Our new state Global Service Team chairperson, PDG Diane Wehby from District C-1, discussed the need for clubs to consider new and innovative service projects not only to serve our communities but to interest people in joining our clubs and helping increase service to our communities. She noted the success of the Kidsight program and the DAD programs in expanding our outreach and our visibility in our communities. The GST chair on both the district and state level is a member of a team with the Global Leadership Chair, the Global Membership Chair and the District Governor to help clubs in all three areas. There is so much crossover between the areas that they need to work together.

Right now our district does not have a Global Service Team Chair, so PDG Diane will be working with us as needed until someone fills the position. You may contact her at <u>dianewmsn@ameritech.net</u>, or 626-901-8026 if your club could use some help. Anyone who is interested in filling the District GST position should contact DG Zeller.

<u>Recap from Council of Governor's Meeting</u>-DG Zeller reported that we have been asked to appoint a District Hunger Chair. If you want to know more about this position, contact DG Zeller. He reported that the Red Wings have made available a fundraising opportunity to us during two games, 12/2 and 2/18/2020. There is a flier attached later in this report. The COG approved putting a state dues increase on the ballot at the MD-11 convention (3/14-16 at the Doubletree in Holland). The state is currently running a \$25,000/year shortfall due to our declining membership. There was a lengthy discussion with proposals for the increase ranging from \$2.50/member to \$5/member, and they ended up compromising on \$3.50. If you want to have a say in this, be sure that you have delegates from your club attend the state convention. The state GLT has authorized each district to send one person at the state committee's expense to the Lions Leadership Institute at Higgins Lake in November. If you are interested in attending, contact DG Zeller ASAP.

GMT Report- GMT Tasior turned in a written report.

<u>Zone Chair Reports – ZC Gaines, Gingerich and Brew turned in written reports.</u> ZC Murch reported that he has one more club to visit, and inducted one new member during one of his visits. 2VDG (acting R2,Z1 chair) Gaines reported that he has is in the process of scheduling a zone meeting in Oscoda on 11/23. ZC Smith reported that the Ellsworth Club is in bad shape and has asked for help. The Elk Rapids Club has been assisting them. ZC Gocha reported that his clubs have been active. Several have held Diabetes activities, but these events were at no charge to them, so they have not yet incurred DAD grant expenses.

Committee Reports

Written Reports were provided by the following Committees:

Constitution and By-Laws- DG Zeller, District Editor-Lion Zimmer, Environmental- PDG Bodem, Eversight- PDG Richardson, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Leader Dog- Lion Julie Haase, Liaison- DG Zeller, Lioness Liaison- Lion Carole Schultz, Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Durflinger, Medical Assistance-Lion Clairene Jorella, Michigan Forum- DG Zeller. Pediatric Cancer- 1VDG Leathers, Project Kidsight-Lion Slezak, Strategic Planning- DG Zeller, USA/Canada Forum- DG Zeller, Website/IT- Lion Marie Leathers

The following information supplemented those reports: PDG Richardson reported that the new Eversight community room is now open and thanked clubs that made contributions to it. He also noted that the district directory has the old address in it. Lion Julie Haase reported that Leader Dog is in need of puppy raisers. 1VDG Leathers noted that one of the focus areas for Pediatric Cancer right now is Camp Quality. The cost to send a child to the camp is \$1200, and the cost for a family is \$2500. It was moved by 1VDG Leathers, supported by ZC Smith that we do a sponsorship of up to \$2500, either a family or 2 children, depending on need. The funds will come from the District Special Needs Camp Fund. Motion carried. 1VDG Leathers is available to do presentations to your club on Pediatric Cancer. He noted that on the back of his report there is a pattern for a Port Pillow which protects a child's chemo port from a seatbelt. If we have any sewers out there, please consider making these a project. Lion Marie Leathers has a supply of the Velcro needed, so contact her if you would like some. The Pediatric Cancer Committee is also selling T-shirts to raise funds. It was moved by 1VDG Leathers, supported by ZC Smith that we purchase 50 of the shirts at \$7.50. The profits from selling the shirts will

stay in our district for Pediatric Cancer projects. Motion carried. PDG Durflinger passed around the Melvin Jones Fellowship raffle board. The squares are \$20 each (like a football pool board), and the winner will receive a Melvin Jones Fellowship. This is a fundraiser for LCIF's Campaign 100.

<u>Oral Reports- District Convention- 2020-</u> DG Zeller reported that the 2020 convention will be held from 4/24-4/26/2020 in West Branch. The committee has met, and the theme for the 2020 convention will be "The Roaring 20's."

Bear Lake Camp- IPDG Harris reported that they are searching for a new director since the current director is retiring.

<u>Website/IT-</u>Lion Marie Leathers reported that we can use MyLion for promotion of our clubs. You can send her information and she will see that it gets on the District website. There will be MyLion training following the meeting.

<u>Announcements/Audience Comments-</u> Mackinaw City Lion Don Jones announced their Soup in a Bread Bowl fundraiser will be help on 10/23 from 4 PM-6 PM.

VDG Comments- 1VDG Leathers would like to be invited to visit your club.

2VDG Gaines would also like to visit your club. He noted that the letter requesting nominations for the District Melvin Jones Fellowship will be going out next week. He encouraged clubs to look at their members and nominate someone with DISTRICT LEVEL service for the Fellowship.

<u>DG Comments-</u>DG Zeller reminded clubs that they need to appoint a club level GST representative. He reminded club that if you are participating in the Peace Poster contest that posters have to be postmarked by 11/15 and sent to PDG Stenback. He thanked GST Diane Webby for making the trip to our cabinet meeting.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 12:10 PM. The next meeting will be at 10 AM December 14 in Oscoda at a location to be determined. Note that this is a different date than published in the district directory.

MyLion Training



MyLion training following the October 19 cabinet meeting focused on inputting and reporting activities. PDG Diane Wehby from District C-1 assisted in the training and focused on how to report service activities correctly. There will be another MyLion training following the December 14 cabinet meeting.

Two zones have scheduled MyLion training. Trainings will focus on different aspects of MyLion depending on those in attendance. LIONESS LIAISON SUMMARY

DISTRICT 11 E2 LIONESS

Submitted by Lioness/Lion Carole Schultz

The Lioness of District 11 E2 have met for two Cabinet meetings. August 17, and October 12, 2019; at Dawson and Stevens Restaurant in Grayling. The major topic of discussion for both meetings has been the discontinuation of the Lioness Program by LCI. Obviously, there are some very strong feelings concerning this issue. Some-of the concerns are listed, as follows.

The Lioness Club Program will be ending, as of June 30, 2021, after establishment in 1975. Lions Clubs were men only Clubs, at the time, often assisted by groups or volunteers. Lioness District 11 E2 was the 1st in Michigan, 2nd in the United States, and 3rd in the; World, in 1980-1981. We have a long history supporting the Lions of District 11 E2. It is difficult to understand the rationale of discontinuing a successful 45 year program.

1. The Join Together Program, for Lioness Clubs to become Lioness Lions Clubs is a simply the Bridge Program of 15 years ago. Sounds good on paper,-but the Whole Club has to join: if some members want to remain as Lioness, they can not do so. When the Lewiston Lioness Lions chartered, with 52 members; it was without the remaining 36 members who wished to remain as Lioness. The Lewiston Lioness Club had 88 members, prior to Bridging, LCI lost 36 people who were no longer working for Lions activities.'

2. At the present time, there are no Lioness Clubs moving to become Lioness Lions Clubs, from Lioness District 11 E2.

What the Club Survey Shows:

a; Communities where there are both a Lions Club and a Lioness Club, resources would not support two Lions Clubs

b. Some members of Lioness Clubs, are also members of Lions Clubs, by LCI rules, a Lions member can be an Officer, or vote in only one Club.

c. The difference in Lioness Club dues, and Lions Club dues is prohibitive for some Lioness members. Many are great workers, have very limited income, and simply cannot afford the increase in dues.

d. EXAMPLE: Oscoda Lioness has 6 Oscoda Lions members, we have 2 more who may become Lions, when we finish this year. We will be Celebrating 40 Years of Service, as we turn in our Charter, in June:of 2020. The other members will be unable to join Lions, for various reasons.'

3. At the Lions District Cabinet meeting, on August 17th, a change in the Policy Manual was voted to drop the Lioness Officers from the group to be covered at the Convention. The Lioness officers were not notified that the change was under consideration. The implication was that the Lioness Officers were being covered by the District Lions, and not being reimbursed for their rooms and meals. District Lioness Clubs have contributed to the District Convention Fund, by paying \$2 per member, plus the Lioness District covers the cost of the DVP. For the 2019 Convention, we voted to pay \$3 per member, because costs have increased. Many times our Officers, share rooms, to keep the expenses to a minimum.

a. District Lioness members have served as the Chairperson for the Convention Committee, served as secretary for the Convention committee, and have been in charge of the Sunday morning Memorial Service.

b. Lioness Clubs, and Lioness members sell tickets for the District Raffle, and provide many prizes for the Raffle Drawing.

c. District Lioness Clubs and Lioness members donate to all of the MD 11, and State Projects.

d. The District Lioness did not receive Convention Packets for the 2019 Convention.

4. The District Lioness were told that the District Lions would not be providing meeting space for the Lioness for Cabinet meetings. Again implying that the Lioness were not sharing the cost in previous years. The District Lioness paid a share of the cost for the meeting space, about a third of the bill.

5. There seems to be a communications problem. The District Lioness are not included on emails, the only time information is shared, is when an email is forwarded to the Lioness District secretary, by a Lion, for distribution. The Lions Pride magazine is ONLY received by Lions. Lioness have to purchase a subscription, if there is information we need to know.

6. The District Lioness have some very talented leaders, who have for years stepped up to assist the District Lions to get things done. We have contributed to our local communities, in many ways. Will the Lions Clubs carry on that service, when the Lioness Clubs are no longer there? At the end of the 2019-2020 year, there will be five Lioness Clubs remaining for the 2020-2021 year. There will not be a District for 2020-2021 year, those who would be Officers, will not be Lioness members. There are three Clubs, at this time, ending their Clubs in 2020.

7. In the past, all of the PDG's and PDP's have received Lions District rosters. To date, none of the District Lioness have received the current rosters. (The rosters were received on October 19th, from 2nd VDG Bill Gaines, and will be mailed to PDP's)j

Lions Clubs International has been concentrating on increasing membership, but by doing away with the Lioness program completely, LCI. will lose many good leaders, and supporters. Those of us who are Lions Club members will continue to remain as Lions. Lioness members, many who worked behind the scenes, making phone calls, doing local. programs, raising funds for Lions, will not be serving.

Seeing Things Differently

It probably comes as no surprise to anyone that we live in a time of, shall we say, excessively contradictory realities. We Lions extol the noble ideals of kindness and diversity, positive concepts of acceptance, community and helping others – Civilization at its best. Unfortunately, many – too many – people are being drawn into the negative abyss of divisiveness, with its destructive attributes of conflict, discord, hate, and bigotry – all forms of fear. As a society, we have fallen into extreme positions, with no middle ground or compromise. Politics used to have people with differing ideas – they had "opponents". Now, they're called "enemies". Compromise has become a sign of weakness instead of strength, and not just in politics. Greed and lust for power are in ascendant, and lying seems to be the new universal replacement for facts and truth.

Not only are we no longer on the same page, we're not even in the same book.

While it seems the people don't see eye to eye on much of anything, my choice of column title "Seeing Things Differently" refers to another meaning of the phrase, literally "Seeing" in the sense of physical vision through our eyes.

I am going through an experience that came out of the blue, almost literally blind-siding me. About 6 months ago I went to my Eye Doctor for new glasses. I had noticed that my current glasses were no longer working for me; my vision seemed to be getting blurry. During my eye exam, she spotted an irregularity in my left eye and immediately set up an appointment with retinal experts. It turns out that I had a transparent layer growing on my left retina that was pulling the retina out of shape. This is not common, and no one seems to know why this happens for sure. The distorted retina results in vision that warps what I see. With my good right eye, a door frame appears straight across. If I close my right eye and look at the door frame with the left eye, it appears to be "wavy", not straight. I never noticed this before because my right eye is the dominant eye and with both eyes open the wavy effect wasn't evident.

To make a long story short, I had to have a cataract removed from my left eye to clear the eye for surgery, and then surgery to remove the layer from the retina. This procedure, as explained to me, entailed poking a syringe needle into my left eye, withdrawing the eye fluid, using tiny tweezers to grab and pull out the transparent film layer, and replacing the eye fluid. The operation was done at Munson Hospital in Traverse City on October 22. As unpleasant as this procedure sounds, I was anesthetized and felt nothing. There was only a very slight soreness; I didn't need take any pain relievers. They did a great job, no complaints about my care while there. The worst part of the event was having to get up at 4:00 am and driving to Traverse City for the 6:30 am appointment (<u>NOT</u> an early riser!).

I have been a very healthy person for most of 70+ years. Allergies, a car accident, one shoulder surgery; other than that and a few cuts or scratches, throughout my life I've mostly avoided the need for medial resources. Prior to this the last time I went to a doctor was over a decade ago, for a job-mandated physical. I'm not taking any medications, and my pre-op exams validated good health – the technician described my heart EKG as "beautiful". I've been a vegetarian (not a Vegan) for over 40 years, and take supplements and use essential oils for health. So this eye thing was a shock to my healthy image – suddenly I'm in doctor's offices and hospitals getting sliced and stitched.

No matter how healthy one may seem to be, the years add up and something somewhere will invariably get out of whack. It's just the way life works, and we all need to be aware of this and plan accordingly. My left eye is healing and my vision, though still wavy, is getting better. It might take several weeks or months for the retina to return to it's normal shape. No matter how that turns out, I am definitely "seeing things differently".
