Can you believe that this year is coming to an end quickly? Because of your leadership, collectively the Lions of Constitutional Area 1 (USA and Affiliate Countries) have set new records for success.

As of May 31, 2022, we have achieved the following results:

- Service 28,117,828 lives impacted with 54% of the clubs reporting. 30 million lives impacted can be reached by June 30, 2022. Please make sure that your club has reported at least one service project.
- Membership Membership growth of 1390, with 71 new clubs chartered. The Entrance Fee Waiver expires on June 30, 2022. Please add all new members before June 30 to take advantage of the waiver. New Club Charters should be completed by June 20 to ensure that the club will be chartered this fiscal year.
- Leadership Reported on the new Leadership Training portal – 537 Training Events with 13,422 Lions in attendance. I know that many training events were not reported.
- LCIF Campaign 100 Donations are up 54% over this time last year. We have contributed almost \$10,000,000.00.
 How much can we give? Do you think we could give another \$1,000,000.00 in the month of June?

Whatever we do in the closing weeks of the year helps to build the momentum for a better 2022-23.

I want to personally thank you for allowing me to serve as the Global Action Team Leader, your success stories, and your encouragement. Together, we are better.

As we conclude the year, it is time to:

- 1. Make sure that 2022-23 Club Officers have been reported.
- 2. Apply for the Club Excellence Award
- 3. Recruit one new member. Entrance Fee Waiver expires on June 30, 2022.

Hello Friend of "Gaylord Strong":

Thank you so much for your donation, to support Otsego County's efforts responding to those impacted by the tornado. We are almost three weeks out from this catastrophe, and we are still responding to victim's needs. I wanted to reach out to send gratitude in this informal way to let you know we are working on distributing formal letters in the mail (ASAP). We are a small staff of six. The past 21 days have been astonishing. We have processed record breaking donations (monetary and tangible), clients and volunteers. Your generosity and thoughtfulness are what has allowed us to do this amazing work.

We have served almost four hundred individuals face-to-face. To offer some perspective on this number, in 2021, in response to the pandemic, that is how many people we served TOTAL for emergency services. Otsego County only has a population of around 26,000. When triaging the clients, the services have been three-fold:

- Helping those completely impacted by the tornado (home damaged, displaced, injured) with survival requirements
- Aiding those that worked at one of the thirty-eight business whose services were obstructed by the tornado and are experiencing loss of work
 - Assisting those that lost electricity and lost food during the first few days' post tornado.

We have distributed over \$32,000 in gift card support to these victims and thousands of dollars in physical hygiene and cleaning supply products. When there was no longer dumpster service for debris offered by the county, we provided this service. In partnership with Habitat for Humanity we are facilitating volunteers and helping obtain supplies for cleanup, repair, and rebuild.

Please know how meaningful your gift is to us. We will continue to respond to survivors' immediate necessities and get them set up in their new homes.

We promise to keep a pulse of varying factors as this crisis evolves, ensuring we are the best stewards of your donation as possible. In partnership with the Otsego Community Foundation and the Michigan Disaster Response and Recovery there will be a case manager hired to assess urgent and ongoing requests so that survivors can get back on their feet. This case manager along with the community's long term recovery team will safeguard that all monies and goods you donated are distributed to victims in the most equitable way possible.

Please respond to this email if you need more of a formal receipt sooner than later. Please know, we are so grateful for you, and we are putting your donations to tremendous use. Do not hesitate to reach out with any questions or concerns. You can call my cell directly-517.819.8070.

Foundation grant for \$7500, with which we purchased gift cards to be distributed to the victims of the tornado. In addition I just got off the phone with the Habitat director, and I will be applying for a \$20K LCIF grant to buy materials for them to use for repairs, as well as helping pay for dumpsters.

After speaking to the United Way director, she said what they can use is food to provide lunches for all of the many volunteers that are doing debris removal, etc. right now. She suggested gift cards from Jett's, Domino's, Culvers, Panera, Subway, McDonald's, etc. These could be used for both the meals for the volunteers, as well as distributed to victims.

The cabinet voted to match club contributions up to \$1500, with a minimum contribution from the district emergency fund of \$1000 to help with this need. So please talk to your club members about making a special contribution to the district to help aid Gaylord. If you can let me know as soon as possible what your club is doing, I can get the district and club assistance plan underway, and you can mail your check later on. Thanks for all your help! Let me know if you have any questions.



COVID Update: Variant BA.5

COVID, like a pesky mosquito, continues to "bite" and deprive infected victims of enjoying a coronavirus-free summer season – and there are a lot of people who have been "bitten", with more to come as variants continue to evolve. According to the CDC, the uber-infectious Omicron BA.5 sub-variant is officially the current dominant COVID strain in the U.S., out-competing its sister Omicron sub-variants, BA.4 and BA.2.12.1, that had been dominant.

While accounting for only 9.6% of cases in the U.S. on June 4th data, the CDC estimates the BA.5 sub-variant is now the cause for about 54% of new cases in the U.S. It's by far a faster escalation than that of any other variant over the course of the Pandemic. BA.5 not only seems to be more transmissible than its precursors, it is much better at evading the immunity provided by vaccines and especially good at bypassing the immunity response usually gained by previous infection. As one expert put it, "The Omicron sub-variant BA.5 is the worst version of the virus that we've seen." While this virus is easily spread and many people are suffering from very unpleasant symptoms and sickness, fortunately it is not usually a fatal disease. Some people do die, but the rate is not high.

While vaccines are less effective for BA.5, they're evidently more effective than immunization through infection, and can still help most people ward off the worst serious effects of the variant viruses. Current vaccines were specifically engineered to counter the original COVID virus. But as new variants mutate, their biological designs move further away from the original virus' configurations. Medical science must constantly tweak the vaccine recipe to accommodate the variants' changing biological structure – and some variants have been very different from the previous strain. The F.D.A. is pressing coronavirus vaccine manufacturers to update their booster formulations to target the fast-spreading sub-variants. Pfizer and Moderna are expected to follow the agency's recommendation and start producing reformulated doses this summer, looking to have them ready by fall.

Experts say significant mutations — especially in the Omicron sub-variants — are evolving with increasing speed. There is already a new strain, discovered recently, designated as BA.5.1. Little is known about this new virus — whether it will be nothing to worry about, or a decimating death dealer. We can only hope that the worst possible variant outcome, a malignant mutated and highly transmissible virus capable of killing millions, doesn't happen.

As things have seemed to be going in a more positive direction lately, I was surprised when researching for this newsletter by the presence of a COVID threat becoming potentially dangerous again. Case and death rates are higher in some locales, and lower in others, but the average has been fairly flat – not increasing but not dropping very much either. In the last few weeks my wife and I have had at least 6 friends and acquaintances come down with COVID, though no deaths as yet. (In the middle of writing this we learned another friend has been infected by COVID.) I'm really looking forward to the day the word "COVID" is used in a past tense. But, like it or not, there it is.

Below are some of the statistics, some good, some bad, created by the Pandemic. In most cases, the statistics are estimated – many numbers of cases are never reported for many reasons, so experts have to estimate figures based on the data they do have.

- The U.S. COVID Pandemic death count rose over 1 million Americans last month (or earlier).
- Males accounted for 558,871 fatalities, Females for 451,261.
- Globally, about 3.4% of reported COVID-19 cases have died.
- For comparison, seasonal flu generally kills far fewer than 1% of those infected.
- At least 257,846,006 people or 78% of the U.S. population have received at least one vaccination dose
- Overall, 220,597,701 people or 66% of the U.S. population are considered fully vaccinated.
- Additionally, 102,232,228 people or 31% of the U.S. population have received a booster dose.

Driving Us Crazy

Back in the day, when I was a teenager approaching the coveted age of being able drive a car, I became aware of something that still puzzles me to this day. Back then there were no digital instruments on the dashboard, just an array of dials to measure gas amount, oil pressure, and speed among others. I noticed that the speedometer was calibrated from 0 to 120 mph. There was no place I knew of where cars could be driven 120 miles per hour, accept maybe a racetrack. I wondered if most cars could even go that fast. But there it was, daring teenagers (whose brains are not yet fully formed) and other risk-takers to attempt to go that speed. I never fell for that temptation, but I've always wondered how many did. Deaths caused by too-fast driving were frequently in the news. Why would car makers install a speedometer in cars when driving was legally half that fast? Why were they allowed to do that by government agencies that encouraged safety measures like turn signals and seat belts? And how high do today's digital speedometers go – 120, 150 mph? That is ill-conceived, if not crazy, thinking. Just drive safely.

The Michigan West Coast on Lake Michigan

There it is, the treasure of Lake and land that makes Michigan the jewel of the northern midwest states. Surrounded by 4 of the 5 Great Lakes, Michigan has an amazing 3,288 miles of shoreline, making it the state with the second longest coastline in the U.S. – only the giant state of Alaska has more, with close to 34,000 miles of coastline, including its islands.

For comparison, it is approximately 3,294 miles to drive from Miami, Florida to Seattle, Washington – 2,734 miles as the crow flies.
