I'm a third generation Lion, following in the footsteps of my dad and grandpa, who was a charter member of the Alpena Lions Club. That's how I became a member, recruited by my dad to become a member.

The family connection is important for me and for my club, and it's one not unique to my family and my club. We have several multigenerational families who are currently in our club, including a fourth-generation club that also traces its roots to the beginning.

So why do I start this message that way? Because family is a great way to strengthen and grow your club. And, legacy of family is the easiest way to make sure our clubs continue to be vital parts of our communities.

Every club in our district faces some challenges when it comes to membership, even the largest and strongest. No club is a cookie-cutter version of other clubs, as we are as unique as the communities we serve.

Just looking at the communities where we have clubs – some are as small as a few hundred while others have several thousand. Some smaller communities have a rather large club considering the population while some larger communities have small clubs by comparison.

The one common thread we all have aside from serving our communities is the need for good members who can help us serve the community. Finding those members is always a bit of a challenge, but it doesn't have to be.

Our families know how much we enjoy being Lions, and how much service to community is at the core of what we do. If your families don't know, then start telling them. This is the first line of new recruits for your Lions clubs if they aren't in the club already.

During membership training at the district convention I told those who took the training that your family is a great source for new members. Spouse, children, siblings, etc. – they likely have seen you serving the community and doing fundraising so it's not a foreign concept to them. If they already are members of another organization it's understandable why they aren't part of your club, but if they aren't then they are prime targets to help your club achieve its mission.

Our district is struggling with membership numbers. We are below 700 members and only have 27 clubs with another club at risk of folding. There is strengthen in numbers even when those numbers aren't our own club. The district's health is dependent upon the health of the clubs.

While there are a few clubs in communities that have an incredibly small pool of membership candidates, most communities have people who want to volunteer but don't know how to get involved. It's up to us to make sure they know about us. So why not start with the people in our lives – family members – and then get the word out to the rest of the community?

We have great clubs and people serving as Lions and there are more people we haven't engaged with who can and should join us. All of us want our clubs to be around long after we are gone, so why not start that with a family legacy of service.

I appreciate you as Lions and the challenges you face. Thanks for all you do.

#### Lions of Michigan District 11 E-2 Cabinet Meeting Minutes, August 20, 2022

<u>Cabinet Members in Attendance</u> DG Rod Leathers, 1VDG Murch, CST Durflinger, GST/ZC Marie Leathers, IPDG Gaines and ZC Kane

Cabinet Members Absent - ZC Dennis Gocha

<u>Lions in Attendance – BJ</u> Sander, Diane Skop, Jean Manning, Linda Harris, Pat West, Brian Graff, and via Zoom David Zimmer

The meeting was called to order at 11 AM by DG Leathers. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Murch. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by ZC Kane.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 4/29/22 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by 1VDG Murch, supported by Lion Skop that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

**Treasurer's Report**- The financial report for 2021-22 was presented, showing a beginning balance in the administrative account of \$35,054.74, income of \$16,375.70, expenses of \$12,805.03 leaving an ending balance as of 6/30/22 of \$38,625.41. This consists of \$29,612.03 in admin and \$9,013.38 in convention funds. The projects account had a beginning balance of \$36,104.07, income of \$12,245.79 and expenses of \$16,271.09 leaving an ending balance of \$32,078.77. It was moved by ZC Leathers, supported by 1VDG Murch that the 21-22 financial report be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The budget for 22-23 was presented, showing beginning cash of \$38,625.41, income of \$16,350, expenses of \$17,784, leaving budgeted ending cash for the year of \$37,191.41. It was moved by 1VDG Murch, supported by IPDG Gaines that the budget be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The YTD 2022-23 financial report was presented, showing a beginning balance in the admin account of \$38,625.41, income of \$7,578.50, and expenses of \$11,671.49, leaving an ending balance in the admin account of \$34,532.42. This consists of \$31,762.90 in admin and \$2,769.52 in convention funds. It was moved by IPDG Gaines, supported by Lion Harris that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The dues collection summary was presented showing 2 clubs with unpaid dues. They have received 2<sup>nd</sup> notices, and will be followed up on in a week or so.

<u>Old Business-</u> <u>2022 District Convention-</u> A partial written report was turned in the by chair of the convention committee. We still need attendance information, and the financial report was incomplete. Suggestions from the chair will be turned over to this year's convention committee for their evaluation. After some discussion of the convention, it was noted that the communication for 2022 was inadequate between the committee and the clubs, between the committee chair and the rest of the committee, and between the committee chair and the District Cabinet. Clubs were contacted via email only, and several who have email problems weren't contacted at all. There was no information as to whether a budget was prepared, and a lack of financial oversight by the committee (again due to communication), which contributed to the large financial loss on the convention. These problems will be discussed with the incoming convention committee to be sure that this doesn't occur again. DG Leathers expressed confidence that PDG Bob and Lion CarlaJean Gingerich are capable of avoiding these mistakes.

#### New Business- None.

GLT Report- No report. Zone Chair training was held prior to the cabinet meeting.

<u>GMT Report-</u> IPDG Gaines requested help with membership this year, particularly with new club development. He needs contacts in the Gaylord area, one of the areas he will be working on this year, in addition to Tawas, where they have the genesis of a new club.

<u>GST Report</u>- In addition to her written report, GST Marie Leathers passed out an article – "Why Report Service" (attached). She noted that for the past two years we received a \$500 grant for Global Action Team funding which was awarded for a write-up of a service activity. This year's deadline is 5/1, but it can be submitted any time. PDG Durflinger suggested a report on the Gaylord tornado activities, which she will work with GST Marie to prepare. GST Marie also noted that money isn't the only way to serve. Several clubs have sent members to do clean-up work in Gaylord, and a Central Lake Lion donated cabinets from a kitchen upgrade to be used in Gaylord. Their club also has furniture which was donated for their annual sale and they are working with United Way and Habitat to donate that to people who lost everything in the tornado.

Zone Chair Reports-ZCs Gocha and Leathers turned in written reports. ZC Kane noted that she is just getting started.

<u>Committee Reports</u> Written Reports were provided by: District Convention- PDG Gingerich, District Peace Poster- Lion Jean Manning, Environmental- PDG Bodem, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Zeller, Project KidSight- Lion Linda Harris

<u>Oral Reports-</u> District Melvin Jones- 1VDG Murch noted that he would be getting information out soon on nominating a member of your club for the District Melvin Jones Fellowship.

<u>Presentations-</u>DG Leathers presented the Hillman Lions Club members with a certificate and banner patch from Lions International for completing their Model Club commitment to Campaign 100.

<u>VDG Comments-</u>1VDG Murch noted that on the last International monthly summary more than ½ the district clubs have not reported activities in more than 19 months. If your club is having troubling with filing, contact Lion Marie Leathers, and she can help you. He also said that he is available to assist clubs in figuring ways to use both social and conventional media to promote themselves.

<u>DG Comments-</u> DG Leathers reported that we started the year with 687 members in the district. We are currently at -2. We will also be losing 14 when the Prescott/Skidway Lake Club completes disbanding. He said each club should work on bringing in at least two members. He announced the cabinet meeting schedule for the year- 11/19 at the Indian River Lions Clubhouse, 12/10 via Zoom, 3/11 at the St. John Lutheran Church in Grayling, and the final meeting of the year will be at the district convention. He announced that 2VDG Drury has resigned as she will be moving to South Carolina. DG Rod is working on a district polo shirt. He will have details soon for those interested. He also announced that the district directories will be available at the next cabinet meeting, if not before.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at noon. The next meeting date will be on 11/19 at 10 AM at the Indian River Lions Clubhouse.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE REPORT for District 11 E-2 Cabinet Meeting Saturday, August 20, 2022, Beverly Bodem, Chair

Have you ever wondered how the statement "<u>Red skies in the morning</u>, <u>Sailors take warning</u>....<u>Red skies at night, sailors delight</u> came about? As a child I had always heard adults repeat the statement. It seemed to help them in planning their daily activities. I searched the internet and it took me to the Bible, specifically Matthew, Chapter 16, verses 1 and 2 to the story of Jesus when he fed four thousand people with seven loaves of bread and some fishes. The Pharisees along with the Sadducees asked Jesus if he would show them a sign from heaven.

Jesus answered (according to Mathew 16, verse 1. "He answered and said unto them, When it is evening, ye say, It will be fair weather: for the sky is red." Verse 3: And in the morning, it will be foul weather today for the sky is red and lowering. O ye hypocrites, ye can discern the face of the sky; but can ye not discern the signs of the times?"

According to Joe Sienkiewicz, chief of Ocean Applications Branch and a science and operations officer with the NOAA/NWS Ocean Prediction Center, there is some scientific validity to the adage. Joe says that because the sun rises in the east and sets in the west, the sun illuminates the mid and high clouds creating a red sky in the morning. If the sun is setting as a weather system exits and high pressure is building, the departing clouds are illuminated, creating a red sky at night, causing fair weather to follow.

#### **LCIF Report**

Campaign 100 ended on June 30, having raised over \$325 million worldwide. Over the course of the campaign the Lions of District 11-E2 contributed \$66,739, or an average of \$96/member, so we did well. We had three clubs, Hillman, Elk Rapids and Rose City, that elected to become Model Clubs, which meant they committed to contribute (club and personal commitments) at least \$500/member. I am pleased to announce that the Hillman Club has completed their commitment to Campaign 100. Elk Rapids and Rose City have until 6/30/24 to complete their commitment.

On May 20, there was a devastating tornado in Gaylord. As there is no longer a Lions Club in Gaylord, the district took over relief coordination. Part of that was a \$20,000 Rebuilding grant from LCIF, which is being used to renovate mobile homes in the Nottingham Forest Mobile Home Park, which received severe damage. Part of that grant was a requirement that local clubs assist in the renovations, and we have had 3 work days so far to help out there, and I would like to thank all of the Lions that have been helping out. Our Foundation is always there to support us when disasters like this happen, so keep that in mind when your club is budgeting your support to LCIF.

#### Lions of Michigan Foundation report- 8/20/22

Once again our district was the leader in sight and hearing raffle ticket sales, led by the Oscoda Lions Club. There were a record number of tickets sold this year, 12,432, of which our district sold 2,725 or 12.7%. 20 clubs participated this year, up from 17 last year. It's such a great fundraiser that I don't understand why all clubs are not participating! We have 6 clubs that were in the 100+ ticket club, which means they received at least 50% of the tickets sales back as a refund.

Our district contributions for the 21-22 years totaled \$8,195, an increase from the \$6,610 last year with 22 clubs making a contribution. It would be great if we could get 100% participation this year.

The cookbook fundraiser is still going on. They make great Christmas gifts. The cookbooks are \$15 each, and when your club sells 20 or more you will receive a rebate of \$5/cookbook sold, so also a fundraiser for your club. If you don't think you can sell 20, the district purchased a supply of them, and if your club is interested, you can buy them from the district for \$10 each, sell them for \$15, and keep \$5 for your club.

The Kidsight program is active again. Contact Lion Nate Slezak or Lion Linda Harris to schedule your event. The trailer is available for your community parades or festivals, so let me know if you would like to use it. We have had several screenings this year already, and more are on the schedule.

Clubs are reminded that the Foundation has funds available to assist needy veterans or military families, and the funds are NOT restricted to medical needs. In the past funds have been given for vehicle repairs, utility bill assistance, etc, so if you know of a needy veteran in your area, talk to one of the trustees about getting an aid application. Contact your local veteran's assistance office and let them know that we can help.

We received a grant from the Foundation of \$7,500 to assist with the tornado recovery efforts in Gaylord. In addition we received \$3,000 in assistance to veterans or veteran families, and hearing aid assistance, so our district was the recipient of a great deal of aid from the Foundation. Please remember that without our contribution and our participation in Foundation fundraisers, this assistance would not be possible.

### **COVID Update: Latest Info**

Whether to offer new COVID-19 booster shots this fall that are altered to improve matching recent changes of the shape-shifting Coronavirus is a critical decision facing U.S. health authorities. Current COVID-19 vaccines saved millions of lives around the world in their first year of use, and still offer potent protection, especially after a booster dose, against the worst outcomes – severe illness and death. However, these vaccines target the original Coronavirus strain. Protection against infections has dropped markedly due to waning immunity and a constant assault of variants. While tweaked boosters may blunt another pandemic surge, there is no way to predict which mutant will be the next main threat. "This is science at its toughest," FDA vaccine chief Dr. Peter Marks told The Associated Press.

- The FDA said it has advised Trusted Source vaccine makers to update their COVID-19 vaccines to include a component that targets the spike proteins of the Omicron BA.4 and BA.5 subvariants.
- These subvariants currently comprise over half of the Coronavirus cases circulating in the U.S.

With about six and a half million people worldwide and over a million people in the U.S. Reported dead from COVID-19, the prospects are that the virus, in whatever variant form, will continue to spread, but maybe not as overwhelming as the prior Pandemic numbers.

We will probably never know the real numbers of cases and deaths as most health officials believe the numbers are under-reported - people dying from COVID-19 but are recorded as death from some other fatal cause. A patient with a fatal cancer may become infected with Covid and die. Without the cancer, the patient might fight off the virus infection, Without the COVID infection, the patient may live a month, or a year, longer before succumbing to the cancer. What is the real cause of the patient's death that should be officially registered? Most would see that that cancer brought the patient to the edge of the cliff, but COVID pushed the patient over the edge. Others might blame the cancer. Without consistency in recording, the data will never be precise.

## What's Wrong With A Little Kindness?

## Kindness — the state or quality of being kind; a kind act; favor; kind behavior; mild, benign, benevolent, gentle, tender, compassionate.

The Lions Clubs International views "Kindness" as the key to successful Service. Our acts of kindness, helping others, are the major part of what we do. Kindness is the "civil" in civilization.

While there have always been disagreements, hostility, intolerance, cruelty, and violence in our nation, it seems to be increasing for the last few years. There have been numerous reports of restaurants and other businesses where customers have accosted, yelled at, or even threatened staff members due to long waits or other complaints. Perhaps this comes from the upheaval of normalcy due to the Pandemic, and the snake pit of contentious politics, among other reasons. Whatever the cause, more people seem to be impatient and cantankerous than ever.

A good measure of this phenomenon is found on our highways and in the behavior of drivers. Virtually no one pays attention to the speed limit signs anymore (or should I say, the speed <u>suggestion</u> signs!). Sometimes I think I'm the only one who even sees the signs, much less obey them. I will admit to occasionally going a few miles over the speed limit by a mile or three, but even then almost every pickup, SUV, hatchback, and sedan behind me will blow past at 70 mph (or more) every chance they get. What's really amazing are the vehicles that pass me at 70 mph +, then within less than a quarter mile they turn off the road. A few months ago I was passed by a car in Petoskey, which then turned onto my lane, dangerously close, then about 200 feet later, turned right into a fast food place, causing me to slow down to avoid crashing into the turning car. That maneuver got the vehicle to it's destination at least 2 seconds faster than being behind me.

We need kindness now more than ever. Lions have to continue to show compassion and serve as models of civility in a contentious world. A nation divided cannot stand, nor can it survive without compassion and civility.
