

2023 International Convention, Boston, Massachusetts, USA

The following proposed amendments to the International Constitution and By-Laws will be reported to the delegates for vote at the 2023 International Convention.

ITEM 1: A RESOLUTION TO REMOVE THE MINIMUM DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS FROM THE THIRD VICE PRESIDENT QUALIFICATIONS. REMOVAL OF THIS REQUIREMENT WILL PERMIT QUALIFIED CANDIDATES FROM ANY DISTRICT TO CONTEST FOR THE OFFICE, PROVIDED ALL OTHER QUALIFICATIONS ARE MET. *(THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)*

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article II, Section 2(a)(3) be removed in its entirety, and all subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly.

ITEM 2: A RESOLUTION TO REMOVE THE MINIMUM DISTRICT REQUIREMENTS FROM THE INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR QUALIFICATIONS. REMOVAL OF THIS REQUIREMENT WILL PERMIT QUALIFIED CANDIDATES FROM ANY DISTRICT, INCLUDING TRANSITIONAL AND PROVISIONAL DISTRICTS, TO CONTEST FOR THE OFFICE, PROVIDED ALL OTHER QUALIFICATIONS ARE MET. *(THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)*

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article II, Section 3(c) be removed in its

entirety, and all subsequent sections be renumbered accordingly.

ITEM 3: A RESOLUTION TO CREATE A DISTINCT MEMBERSHIP CATEGORY FOR MEMBERS PAYING DISCOUNTED DUES AS A RESULT OF ANY DISCOUNT PROGRAM OFFERED BY THE ASSOCIATION. CREATION OF A NEW CATEGORY WILL PREVENT MEMBERS PAYING DISCOUNTED DUES FROM INCREASING A CLUB'S TOTAL DELEGATE ENTITLEMENT AT A DISTRICT, MULTIPLE DISTRICT OR INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION. *(THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)*

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That the International By-Laws, Article XI, Section 7 be amended to include "Discounted" between "Associate," and "Honorary," to become effective January 1, 2024.

ITEM 4: A RESOLUTION TO UPDATE THE DUTIES OF DISTRICT OFFICERS. AMENDMENT OF THE DUTIES WILL ALIGN WITH A FOCUS ON MEMBERSHIP GROWTH AND LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT MOVING FORWARD. *(THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A MAJORITY VOTE TO ADOPT)*

SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(a) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

District Governor. As an international officer of this association, and under the general supervision of the International Board of Directors, they shall represent the association in their district. In addition, they shall be the chief administrative officer in their district and shall have direct supervision over the district cabinet. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Oversee the Global Action-Team at the district level and inspire other district officers to actively support membership growth and new club organization.
- (3) Oversee current district action plan focused on and working towards the successful achievement of district goals to
 - a. Charter new clubs.
 - b. Achieve net membership growth.
 - c. Ensure effective club operations.
 - d. Provide leadership development and skills training at the club and district levels.
 - e. Encourage clubs to conduct and report meaningful humanitarian service.
 - f. Support and promote Lions Clubs International Foundation and encourage club and member contributions to Lions Clubs International Foundation.
- (4) Oversee the administrative operations of the district as provided in the Standard District By-laws
- (5) Guide clubs to operate in accordance with International Constitution and By-Laws, support activities that improve member retention and remain in good standing with the association.
- (6) Preside, when present, over the district convention, and cabinet and other district meetings.
- (7) Perform such other functions as required by the International Board of Directors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(b) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

First Vice District Governor. The first vice district governor, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor, shall be chief administrative assistant to the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work toward the success of the current district action plan.
- (3) With the district governor and second vice district governor, review strengths and weaknesses of the district; refine and further develop a draft of the ongoing district plan focused on and working towards the successful achievement of district goals.
- (4) Identify and prepare a highly effective team for the subsequent year to develop and implement action plans to achieve district goals.
- (5) Work closely with the club leadership to identify future district leaders.
- (6) Perform such duties and other directives as may be assigned by the district governor or the policies established by the International Board of Directors.
- (7) At the request of the district governor, supervise appropriate district committees.
- (8) Actively participate in all cabinet meetings and conduct all meetings in the absence of the district governor.
- (9) Participate in council of governors' meetings as appropriate.
- (10) Participate in the preparation of the district budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(c) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

Second Vice District Governor. The second vice district governor is subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the current district action plan.
- (3) Serve as the district liaison to region and zone chairpersons, at the direction of the district governor, working towards successful region and zone operations in support of club health.
- (4) Become familiar with resources to support club development
- (5) Prepare for the role of district governor.
- (6) Perform such duties and other directives as assigned by the district governor or the policies established by the International Board of Directors.
- (7) At the request of the district governor, supervise appropriate district committees.
- (8) Actively participate in all cabinet meetings and conduct all meetings in the absence of the district governor and the first vice district governor.
- (9) Participate in the preparation of the district budget.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(d) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

Region Chairperson. The region chairperson, if the position is utilized during the district governor's term, is subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor and shall be the chief administrative officer in their region. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the


current district action plan and encourage club and zone participation.

- (3) Supervise the activities of the zone chairpersons in their region and such district committee chairperson(s) as may be assigned by the district governor.
- (4) Support club health by identifying club strengths and weaknesses and encouraging growth, leadership excellence and meaningful service.
- (5) Become familiar with district operation and enhance leadership skills as needed for advancement.
- (6) Perform such duties and directives as may be required by the district officers or policies established by the International Board of Directors.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Article X, Section 2(e) of the International By-Laws be amended by deleting the existing language in its entirety and substituting the following:

Zone Chairperson. The zone chairperson, subject to the supervision and direction of the district governor and/or region chairperson, shall be the chief administrative officer in their zone. Their specific responsibilities shall be to:

- (1) Further the purposes of this association resulting in membership growth in the district.
- (2) Actively work towards the success of the current district action plan and encourage club participation.
- (3) Serve as chairperson of the district governor's advisory committee in their zone and as such chairperson to call regular meetings of said committee.
- (4) Ensure club health by identifying club strengths and weaknesses and encouraging growth, leadership excellence and meaningful service.
- (5) Become familiar with district operations and enhance leadership skills as needed for advancement.
- (6) Perform such other functions and acts as may be required by the International Board of



Volunteers Make Service Clubs Continue to Serve

Lions Clubs have a White Cane fundraiser each year. Different clubs have different ways to accomplish this fundraiser. Our Petoskey club has a simple approach: get permission from a business to set up a table outside their entry area and encourage customers going in or out to donate. The outcome of the fundraiser depends on 2 major factors – the number of club members volunteering to work the event, and the number of people choosing to donate something.

It is always unavoidable to try to determine which people approaching will make a donation or just walk past as if we weren't there. Experience has shown that there is no specific type of person that will donate. People of wealth, or not wealthy, men, women, young or old – any or all of these people may or may not give a donation, large or small. As you can't judge a book by its cover, appearance doesn't determine whether an individual is generous, or has a cold heart.

In essence, donating is an act of volunteering. Volunteering means a person willingly offers to give his time to perform a service or other undertaking that is not an obligation. When someone walks up and puts money in the White Cane, it is a moment he or she is willingly giving money to a good cause, without being forced to do so.

Another way to look at this to realize that both volunteering and donating are acts of Kindness, an action of goodness that enriches both giver and receiver.

I hope all the clubs everywhere had, or will have, a very successful donation volunteering White Cane fundraiser this year. Our small club did quite well as the Emmet County communities were very generous this year. There were more 10s, 20s and even 50s bills than usual. But the biggest surprise was that we received two \$100 bills in one day – not seen that before!

Kindness Matters.

The Dog Days of Summer

We are about to end a phase of summer known as the "Dog Days of Summer." It occurs this year from July 3, 2023 to Aug 11, 2023 – 40 days in length. Despite the phrase 'dog days' of summer, it actually has nothing to do with canines panting in the heat. So where does it come from, and what does it mean?

The words "dog days of summer" might bring up images of canines heatedly panting, but the origin of the phrase actually has to do with the stars.

Historians say the phrase dates back to the ancient Greeks and Romans, who kept track of the seasons by looking up at the sky. The star Sirius was known as the "dog star" because it made up the nose of a constellation, Canis Major, or Alpha Canis Majoris, shaped like a dog. Sirius, known as the "Dog Star", or more officially, Alpha Canis Majoris, for its position in the constellation, is the brightest star in the sky viewed from Earth. Sirius was the dog of the hunter Orion in Greek mythology.

When Sirius appeared in the sky just before the sun, near the end of July in those days, that marked the beginning of the very hottest days of the year. It was thought that Sirius radiated heat, and the double-whammy of Sirius and the sun together caused the hot weather. The Romans referred to this period as "dies caniculares" or "days of the dog star," which was eventually translated as just "dog days."

According to National Geographic. ancient civilizations' predictions don't quite work for modern times, because the Earth's rotation wobbles, meaning Sirius does not appear in the sky at the same time of year as it did back then. The Farmer's Almanac lists the modern dog days as lasting 40 days from July 3- August 11. Since Earth's rotation will continue to wobble, one day, thousands of years from now, Sirius will rise with the sun during the "dog days of winter."

Dog days or not, the global average temperature for July 2023 is confirmed to be the highest on record for any month. The hottest day ever recorded globally was on July 6, 2023. We are lucky to live up here.
