<u>Lions of Michigan</u> <u>District 11 E-2</u> Cabinet Meeting Minutes, August 19, 2023

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 AM by DG Murch. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Gocha. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by 2VDG Leathers.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 4/21/23 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by IPDG Leathers, supported by 1VDG Gocha that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

Treasurer's Report- The 2022-23 financial reports were presented, showing a beginning balance in the admin account of \$38,625.41, income of \$15,770.22 and expenses of \$21,113.63, leaving an ending balance in the admin account of \$33,282.00 as of 6/30/23. This consists of \$31,860.89 in admin and \$1,421.11 in convention funds. The projects account showed a beginning balance of \$32,078.77, income of \$41,153,51 and expenses of \$40,695.07, leaving an ending balance of \$32,537.21 as of 6/30/23. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by 2VDG Leathers that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The administrative budget for 23-24 was presented showing income of \$15,675, and expenses of \$17,666.50, leaving projected ending cash of \$31,290.50. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by 1VDG Gocha that the budget be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The 2023-24 financial reports were presented, showing a beginning balance in the admin account of \$33,282.00 income of \$9,736.18 and expenses of \$4,778.04, leaving an ending balance in the admin account of \$38,240.14 as of 8/16/23. This consists of \$34,331.85 in admin and \$3,908.29 in convention funds. The projects account showed a beginning balance of \$32,537.21, income of \$1,008.13 and expenses of \$500.00, leaving an ending balance of \$33,045.34 as of 8/17/23. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by IPDG Leathers that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The dues collection summary was presented showing only one club has not paid their first half dues. They have been contacted both via email and USPS.

Old Business- PDG Gingerich was not at the meeting to do a convention report, so this will be carried over to the next meeting. CST Durflinger reported that she has received the financial report and the convention made a profit of \$334.16.

New Business- Approval of policy manual- The policy manual was reviewed. The new policies approved at the convention were incorporated, and references to Region Chairs that we no longer have were removed. There was some discussion of the section under 1VDG responsibilities in regards to the District Convention. The consensus was to remove it from the 1VDG and create new language as to responsibilities and put it in the District Convention section. CST Durflinger will work on the language and submit it to the cabinet for review so it can be approved at the next cabinet meeting. It was moved by IPDG Leathers, supported by 1VDG Gocha that the policy manual be approved with this paragraph removed. Motion carried.

<u>Comfort Bags for Kids-</u> DG Murch presented a service project idea. He would like to see us think about making up bags for kids with cancer. They would include things like stuffed lions, crayons, etc- age appropriate for the child. He wanted us to think about it and come up with ideas as to how it could be implemented on either a club or district level. It will be discussed further at the next meeting. Please give your comments/suggestions to DG Murch.

<u>Leadership Institute</u> The district has a budget to send two people to the Leadership Institute in Higgins Lake. 1VDG Gocha has registered, and we will ask ZC Timmers if he is interested. If not, it will be opened up to anyone in the district who wants to attend.

<u>Governor's Appreciation Dinner-</u> The Appreciation Dinner for IPDG Rod Leathers will be hosted by the Central Lake Club on Saturday, October 14 in Central Lake immediately following the cabinet meeting. More information will be sent out as available.

<u>2026 Convention</u>- The Central Lake Club put in a bid for the 2026 District Convention. It was moved by CST Durflinger, supported by GLT Zeller that we approve their bid. Motion carried.

<u>GLT Report</u>- GLT Zeller reported that there are several Leadership training opportunities coming up- the Lions Leadership Institute in Higgins Lake in November, the USA/Canada Forum in September in Reno, and the Michigan Forum in February. Please contact him for more information on any of these events.

<u>GMT Report</u>- This position is vacant, but DG Murch reported that we ended the year at 672 members and right now we are down 4 to 668. He says we will be working on a new club this year. There are several communities that are promising.

GST Report- GST Leathers showed a short video about an organization called "Hope to Walk" that works on getting reasonably priced prosthetics to the millions of amputees around the world. They have developed a system for creating one for only \$250. The state GST is asking each district to donate \$250, and to ask clubs to donate also. It was moved by IPDG Leathers, supported by 1VDG Gocha that we donate \$250. Motion carried. Funds need to be turned in by the end of December. GST Leathers will forward a link to the video to CST Durflinger to send out to all clubs asking them to participate in this project. The GST also noted that the service project at the Forum this year is no-sew blankets. She encouraged clubs that have access to Joann's coupons to pick up kits for this project. The blankets will be made up at the Forum. She also reminded clubs about the Kindness Matters Service Award. Information and an application is attached to these minutes.

Zone Chair Reports- None. We have three vacancies for Zone Chairs. If anyone is interested, please contact DG Murch.

Committee Reports Written Reports were provided by: District Editor- Lion Dave Zimmer, District Melvin Jones- 2VDG Leathers, District Peace Poster- Lion Jean Manning, Environmental- PDG Bodem, Eversight- Lion Bethany Hedgepath, LCIF- PDG Durflinger, Leader Dog- Lion Julie Haase, Leo Clubs- Lion Scott Govitz, Lions of Michigan Foundation- Lion Diane Skop, Michigan Forum- IPDG Leathers, Project KidSight- Lion Nate Slezak and Lion Linda Harris, Website/IT- 2VDG Leathers. The following was added to the written reports- Lion Jean Manning reported that she has some left of the special size of paper needed for the Peace Posters for any club that needs more. Posters will need to be to her no later than 11/15, and they will be judged on 11/18 at a location to be determined. IPDG Leathers corrected the information in his written report that said administrative expenses for the Lions of Michigan Foundation are paid by state dues. They are actually funded by the LMF endowment. He also passed out information on the cruise this year. PDG Durflinger reviewed the goals for this year for LCIF that the District Chairs for Michigan developed. Among them are an increase in individual contributions to LCIF,

100% of clubs making contributions to LCIF, and encouraging current Melvin Jones Fellows to consider becoming a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

<u>Oral Reports-</u> Bear Lake Camp- PDG Zeller reported that camp activities are almost back to normal after Covid, but they are struggling financially, so please consider a contribution this year, or an increase to your normal contribution. District Convention- PDG Zeller reported that the next convention will be a one day convention in Alpena on 4/19-20, 2024. There will be a cabinet meeting and service project on Friday night, and the Saturday activities will probably run from 10 AM – 4 PM. This is an effort to reduce the expense and time commitment to attendees and hopefully increase attendance. Honorary Committee- IPDG Leathers reported that he wants to get the Honorary Committee (Past District Governors) more involved in the convention service project, and wants to have a picnic this year.

Audience Comments- None.

<u>VDG Comments-</u> 1VDG Gocha commented that membership is down, and we need to work on making our club meetings fun. We also need to have a balance in our activities- enough to be interesting, but not so many that members get burned out.

<u>DG Comments-</u> DG Murch reported that the All State Band had a great trip to Boston this year. The state band director has a goal this year of at least ten members from each district. He also reported on our International President's goal of 1.5 million members worldwide. He will be sending out a weekly letter to club presidents this year. The last one encouraged joint ventures and camaraderie between clubs. He encouraged club secretaries to be sure their service is reported to LCI.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 11:50. The next meeting will be on October 14 in Central Lake.

Service reporting

We ended the 2022-23 year with all but 1 club reporting a service project in MyLion (96%). The reporting system will be changing soon, so if you like the current reporting system be sure to keep reporting your service. If you don't like or don't know how to use the current system you can either email me the details of your service projects and I will input them for you, or you can wait for the new system to come out. Training will be available on the new system as needed.

Club Service Chairperson

Only 4 clubs in our district have a Club Service Chairperson. Consider finding someone in your club to fill this position. The GST club service chairperson is responsible for implementing impactful service and fundraising projects, increasing service project engagement of members, elevating awareness of Lions' collective impact in fulfilling global humanitarian needs, and reporting service in MyLion.



KINDNESS MATTERS SERVICE AWARD GUIDELINES

This service award is designed for clubs who create high-impact service projects within one of the Lions International and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) cause areas, including diabetes, childhood concer, environment, hunger, vision, disaster relief, youth or humanitarian.

Overall objectives include:

Encouraging creativity and recognizing high-impact service projects

Rewording clubs for high-coliber service activities within each of Lions International's courses

Eligibility

A total 30 awards this year will be awarded at the club level with a minimum of three awards reserved for Lea clubs that;

Are in ortive status

Reported their project(s)

Did not receive the award within the last three fiscal years

Criteria

Award consideration will be given to dubs performing service that:

Addresses needs within Lions International and ICIF's causes: diabetes, environment, vision, childhood cancer, hunger, disaster rolled, youth, humanitarian

Demonstrates creativity and innovation

Achieves impact of scale and long-term sustainability

Uses Lions International's values to shape positive experiences and create engagement and connection with the Lions brand (this is also known as "elevating the Lions brand")

THE NOMINATION PROCESS

The nomination process starts at the **club level**, then moves to the **district**, and then **multiple district**. Nominations must be sent electronically to the next level and endorsed to be considered complete. Hominations that are sent to lians international without endorsements or signatures will not qualify.

Club

July 1 - August 15

The club service chairperson (or the Lea club president) nominates a single service project. If there's no club service draitperson, a member of the club cabinet can nominate.

August 15 - September 15

The dub president (or Lea club advisor) must sign the nomination and the Lians dub service distinguison (or the Lea club president) must send the endarsed nomination to the next level (D-GST) electronically.



District

September 15 - October 31

The D-GST nominates one Lion service project and one Lea service project from their district. If there's no D-GST, then a district governor can nominate the projects.

The nominator must consult with the district cabinet about their Lion and Leo nominations, but no signatures are required to endorse the nomination. The D-GST must send the nominations to the MD-GST electronically.



Multiple District

The MD-GST nominates a single Lion service project and a single Lea service project from their multiple district. If there's no MD-GST, then the council district person can naminate the projects. Nominations are due October 31.

The nominator must consult with the council of governors about their Lion and Lea nominations, but no signatures are required to endorse the nominations. The MD-GST coordinator my send the nomination to Lions International electronically.

KINDNESS MATTERS SERVICE AWARD GUIDELINES (continued)

Lions International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee

January

Winning clubs are selected by the Lions International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee and natified.

Morch

Winning clubs receive their award from Lians International.

What about undistricted clubs and clubs in single districts?

The process is mostly the same, except a Coordinating Lian simply sends the nominations to the GAT Area Leader. No signatures to endorse the nominations are necessary.

HOW TO RATE NOMINATIONS

The following section will help the district and multiple district levels rate received nominations to help determine which nominations advance to the next level.

Please note: It is highly recommended to assemble the district cabinet at the district level and the council of governors at the multiple district to help determine which nominations advance to the next level.

Rating questions to consider when reviewing nominations.

Ratings should be considered on a scale from 1-5 (1-lowest; 5-highest) for the following criteria on how well the nominated service project:

- Addresses needs within the global causes: diabetes, environment, vision, childhood concer, hunger, disaster relief, youth, humanitarian
- Demonstrates creativity
- Demonstrates innovation
- Achieves impact of scale
- Achieves long-term sustainability
- Elevates the Lions brand

RECOGNIZE WINNERS!

Below are ways MD GSTs can help recognize and celebrate award winners.

- Winning dubs will be notified by January
- Recognize the winner in your local Lians' or Leas' publications and social media autlets
 - This will help promote your club and create community support of your service events!
- Prepare a press release announcing the winner.
 - Include a picture of the club in action at their service project!
 - Note the specific successes of the project.
- Ensure that the award is presented to the winning club at a prestigious event by the highest-ranking officer.

Updates from Eversight

Eversight has experienced some significant growth and change this summer. Namely, it was recently announced that we will provide eye banking services in Arizona in collaboration with Donor Network of Arizona (DNA), the state's federally designated organ procurement organization, as of July 1. The partnership will help maximize the gifts of life, sight and mobility in Arizona and beyond. We are very excited about the opportunities this partnership will offer. Please see below for additional highlights from the second quarter of the year.

Tissue Transplants

Every year, thousands of donors selflessly give the gift of sight to those in need. In Michigan, 967 donors gave the gift of sight as cornea/eye donors from January 1 to June 30, 2023. Below is a breakdown of how donated tissues were used.

Research & Innovations

Eversight's research team attended the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology (ARVO)'s Annual Conference in April of 2023. We were excited to interact with fellow eye care professionals and learn about critical research advancing the field. An Eversight staff member also presented findings from her study on treating limbal stem cell deficiencies through the allogeneic-SLET technique.

Eversight is also currently seeking philanthropic support for the purchase of one optical coherence tomography (OCT) machine for our Center for Vision and Eye Banking Research. The purpose of this tool is to allow Eversight's research team to more thoroughly evaluate the eye tissues entering our lab. This machine will allow us to image and evaluate the back structures of the eye, which will allow better placement of tissues to researchers studying retinal diseases. We will also be able to help researchers better understand retinal disease by providing a detailed and comprehensive look at posterior eye structures. Finally, improvements in technology also allow for detailed maps of the retina structures, more precise measurements, and faster imaging times, all leading to improved research to help patients suffering from blinding eye diseases caused by retinal issues. The total cost for the purchase of this machine is \$150,000.

Education & Training

From January 1-June 30, 2023, Eversight staff held 32 educational wet lab trainings for 155 surgeons, residents and fellows at partner institutions on four common types of cornea transplant procedures: Descemet Membrane Endothelial Keratoplasty (DMEK), Descemet Stripping Automated Endothelial Keratoplasty (DSAEK), Penetrating Keratoplasty (PKP) and Deep Anterior Lamellar Keratoplasty (DALK). During these sessions, surgeons practiced graft insertion and positioning with individualized, real-time insights from trained, highly experienced surgeon instructors.

In May, Eversight paltnered with the Cleveland Clinic Cole Eye Institute to provide wet lab training on the DMEK procedure for attendees at the annual American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery (ASCRS) conference. At this same conference, Eversight held a separate wet lab on the DALK procedure for Young Eve Society members and surgeons.

Global Development

In April, Eversight's global development team published an article in Ophthalmic Epidemiology titled "A Review of the Published Literature in Global Population-Based Studies of Childhood Blindness and Vision Impairment." The goal of this publication was to summarize the peer reviewed literature to date on measuring and reporting childhood blindness and vision impairment using population-based surveys and vision examinations. These studies help our organization to better understand the global scope of blindness and gather data to make a case for global eye banking development.

In May, Eversight's Global Development team was pleased to host two distinguished visitors from Al-Shifa Trust Eye Hospital in Rawalpindi, Pakistan. Dr. Wajid Ali Khan, Chief of Medical Services, and Ret. Major General Rehmat Khan, President of Al-Shifa, enjoyed a tour of our facilities and discussions with our team regarding our continued partnership.

Finally, Professor Timothy Dickinson of the University of Michigan Law School received Eversight International's Shared Vision Award in recognition of his generous legal support and guidance over the years. Through our partnership with Professor Dickinson, his colleagues, and his students in the International Transactions Clinic, Eversight has been able to pursue opportunities that either would not have been available to our organization, or that would have imposed a financial burden to an extent that was beyond our ability to absorb. His guidance has enabled us to create an enduring organizational framework for our international programs, and to expand the success of those programs.

MI: Every year, Eversight partners with Michigan's organ procurement organization, Gift of Life Michigan, to host a Donor Family Gathering to honor and celebrate the past years Michigan donors and their families who donate the gifts of sight and new life through eye, organ and tissue donation. This year's event will take place on Saturday, October 1 at the Suburban Collection Showplace in Novi.

LCIF Report- 8/19-23

Last year we ended the year with total contributions of \$21,229.09, an increase over the previous year of \$2,094.34. We had 22 clubs out of 26 that contributed to LCIF this year. It would be great if we could get all clubs in the district to make a contribution this year. We have received so much in this district over the years, including a \$20,000 grant last year for the Gaylord tornado. Since 2001 we have received over \$107,000 in grants in our district. In addition our state projects have received close to a million dollars in grants over the years, providing things like upgrades to the Leader Dog facility and KidSight trailers and cameras.

The Hillman Lions Club just received \$2200 for a Community Impact Grant to upgrade the local band shell. They were the only applicant to apply for the funds. As we earn more each year, it would be nice if clubs would look around their communities for a project that would help with the quality of life in their area- upgrades of trails, playground equipment, park upgrades, etc. Our available funds this year will be over \$4700.

I will be contacting clubs soon about a Hunger Grant to help with infrastructure for organizations within our district that could do more for their communities if they had some additional equipment, etc. This grant is a multi-club grant, so our local clubs will need to work together.

Several new giving programs were announced to reward clubs or individuals for their support of LCIF. The club program is called the Presidential Giving Award. For contributions levels from a \$50 average/per member through \$1000/member your club will receive a special Presidential banner patch.

The individual giving program honors Lions who make personal contributions to LCIF. For donations (cumulative over the year) of \$50-99 you receive the bronze pin, for \$100-199 the silver pin, and for \$200 plus the gold pin. It is easy to make personal contributions to LCIF on the website. You can make a onetime donation, or set up a recurring donation of any amount on your credit card.

Summer Observations in 2023

Our evolution from ape to human was long and difficult. By being able to adapt to the changes of Nature we have succeeded where the giant mammoths. sloths, sabre-toothed cats, dire wolves, and many other creatures failed. Only by adapting do the life forms of this planet continue to live.

We've not only thrived as a species, but we've changed the nature of our environment. Humans may never really control Nature, but we have certainly changed much of it, and not for the good.

We've taken away natural habitats from animals, building and replacing the trees and plants that animals rely on for food and refuge. Industrial chemicals and gases fill the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the foods we humans and other creatures eat. Toxins and poisons from human activities affect natural creatures, plants, and humans alike.

Just as human over-plowing of the prairies spawned the Dust Bowl of the 1930s, our pollutions are adding to natural gasses and particles, changing the weather patterns all over the globe. Earth just roasted under its hottest July on record, according to scientists from NOAA's National Centers for Environmental Information (NCEI). For the fourth-consecutive month in 2023, the global ocean surface temperature also hit a record high. Many states in the American South and West broiled under three-digit temperatures for days or weeks on end. Arizona, Florida, Maine and New Mexico all recorded their hottest July on record, while Louisiana recorded its second-hottest. Hundreds of deaths due to heat have been reported so far, and more to come.

We in northern Michigan had a warm to hot summer depending on the locations, but fortunately have been lucky to be spared from 100+ temperatures plaguing so much of the world.

Being curious, I kept notes on the daily high temperatures for the months of June, July, and August. The information I used came from the Harbor Springs Airport. From your location it may be much different.

There were 21 days of 60s (or 50s) degree highs, 53 days of 70s degree highs, and 23 days of 80s+ degrees. Surprisingly, the global hottest month of the year, July has one less 80s high than June or August. As many northern 'Snow Birds' flee Winter's cold, we can expect many more 'Sweat Birds' flocking north to avoid the sweltering heat of upcoming summers.

The August Super Blue Moon



On August 30, 2023, we were privileged to observe a rare and amazing moment in the sky - a Super Blue Moon (a.k.a. Blue Super Moon, Super Blue Blood Moon, or other tags).

It is a Blue Moon, a term that has come to mean a full moon that happens twice in one month. It isn't blue in color. August saw the moon full on the 1st and 30th days of the month. The term 'Super Moon' relays the fact that the moon is orbiting as close to the Earth as it ever gets, making the moon look bigger than usual. Being both 'blue' and 'super' together is rare.



The second picture was taken on a high hill at the Viewlands, northeast of Harbor Springs. Unfortunately, it doesn't come close to showing the enormous moon arise from the horizon. It was a beautiful sight, and fortunately devoid of the clouds that usually ruin sky events like meteor showers or northern lights in northern Michigan.

The next Super Blue Moon doesn't rise until 2037.
