Pickleball Pandemonium

Clubs hit the courts for fun, fitness and fundraising.

 ${f I}$ f anybody knows how to serve, it's the Lions. They've been acing it for more than 100 years.

But serving in pickleball, now that's a relatively new thing, and Lions who try it are getting stuck on it like syrup on pancakes.

Pickleballin' in the Midwest

"Lifelong friendships are made out of this," Lion Curt Goke in Minnesota says of both Lions and pickleball. Goke, 77, a member of the Eden Prairie Lions Club since 2017, plays pickleball three times a week and teaches beginners after church on Sundays. He has competed in 43 tournaments and played in at least 70 venues. His wife, Jane, equally as active, qualified to play in the 2019 Margaritaville USA Pickleball National Championships.

Pickleball has also created new fundraising opportunities for clubs. The sport is so popular in Goke's town that the Eden Prairie Lions partnered with the Twin City Pickleball Club to sponsor a tournament as part of the Lions' biggest fundraiser, the annual Schooner Days. Pickleball registration filled in early April for the June event.

When Curt and Jane swapped their racquetball racquets for pickleball paddles about 14 years ago, few people knew what the sport was. Now all ages vie for time on the courts.

A hybrid of badminton, tennis and ping-pong, pickleball has been the fastest growing sport in the U.S. for three years running, according to the Sports & Fitness Industry Association. It is played in almost every country.

Exchange Youth Program



Is the YCE Program Right for Me?

Are you ready to embark on a life changing adventure that will open your mind and heart? Are you curious about other cultures and ways of life? Do you want to develop your skills in a second language? Would you like to cultivate new friendships with individuals that have different backgrounds, beliefs, and customs than you? The Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) Program may be the opportunity you are seeking.

Benefits of Participation

As a YCE exchange youth, you will:

- Live with a family in another country
- Meet people your age from around the world
- Learn about what it means to be a Lion or Leo in another country
- Deepen your understanding of yourself and the world around you
- Learn how to foster peace and understanding among peoples of the world

What to Expect

As a YCE exchange youth you can expect to be immersed in a unique cultural experience with Lions and Leo club members supporting your YCE journey. Your host family will treat you as a member of the family, expecting your engagement in typical daily routines and family meals. You will participate in social activities, possibly service projects and visit cultural places of interest. You are expected to familiarize yourself with the customs, expectations and basic language of the host country prior to your visit and have a desire to learn more.

Participant Eligibility

The suggested age range for YCE Exchange Youth is 15-22. Please note age range can vary by specific YCE program.

YCE Exchange Youth must:

- Be sponsored by a Lions club
- Be ready to represent your community, country and the sponsoring Lions club
- Welcome the opportunity to explore the customs of another culture
- Provide proof of insurance (health, medical, travel) and a liability release agreement
- Take initiative to learn the language of the host country (i.e. basic greetings and phrases)

What are the Costs?

Local program costs vary from country to country. Financial arrangements for transportation may be paid by the Sponsor Lions Club, by the Exchange Youth, the Exchange Youth's family or a combination of these sources. Host Lions clubs cover the costs of room and board with a host family. Exchange Youth are typically responsible for:

- Round-trip airfare
- Camp Fees
- Health, medical and travel insurance
- Travel documents (such as passports and visas)
- Spending money

How to Apply?

- 1. Review the Youth Camp and Exchange Directory to see where current camp and exchange programs are offered. Note the camp application deadlines and YCE Chairperson contact information for each location of interest.
- 2. Develop a wish list of a few host countries to inquire about.
- 3. Contact your Local Lions Club to see if they participate in the program and may be willing to be your sponsoring Lions club. A sponsoring Lions club is required to participate in the YCE Program.
- 4. Contact the corresponding YCE Chairpersons in your wish list countries for additional eligibility and application requirements.
- 5. Write a personal letter of introduction to your prospective host family that contains information on the following: interests, studies, hobbies, family, home community, previous travel experience, expectations for the program and any dietary, health or religious requirements.
- 6. Complete the required YCE Youth Participant Application well in advance of any disclosed deadlines (including the endorsement and signature of your sponsoring Lions club). Submit it with your personal letter of introduction to the YCE Chairperson for the location you are interested in.

Last December the Lions Club stepped forward and adopted McRae Park. The Alpena Lions are pursuing opportunities to improve the facilities at the park. Areas of concern include the basketball court and playground equipment.



Alpena Lions Welcome Sheriff Erik Smith

The Alpena Lions welcomed Sheriff Erik Smith to their luncheon meeting on Tuesday. Erik provided members with informational updates on the jail facility, new police vehicles and staffing.

With the addition of more correction officers, coverage at the jail is improving. Deputies are now available to perform road patrols instead of performing correction officer duties. Road patrols will be more frequent and will be occurring 24/7.

New police vehicles are being leased through Enterprise Car Rental. New in car cameras can link with existing body cameras providing continuous coverage. The leased vehicles include warranties and service coverage which should help reduce maintenance costs incurred on the older fleet.

A recent state requirement may end up costing the sheriff's department. Changing radios to the new 800 megahertz radio may end up costing an estimated \$260,000.00 to replace existing communication equipment. These radios will help improve communications throughout the state and will allow communications between the various agencies.



Editor's Notes — 2023 by Lion David J. Zimmer

In The Spirit of Halloween

This month ends with Halloween, second only to Christmas in holiday decoration sales. Halloween has never been an official federal business holiday -- banks remain open on October 31. More of a celebration, Halloween lets us play with a background of monsters, mortality and death but all in fun (unless you are in a horror movie!). Things that don't exist are not as scary as things that do exist. Every belief has a real beginning, so is there some truth in things considered impossible or fiction — such as paranormal activities, cryptozoology, and alien contact? Some people sincerely believe, others scoff at such 'ridiculous' things. In the spirit of Halloween, a look at ghosts, Bigfoot, and UFOs:

Paranormal: of or relating to the claimed occurrence of an event or perception without scientific explanation, as psychokinesis, extrasensory perception, or other purportedly supernatural phenomena.

Ghost: the soul of a dead person, a disembodied spirit imagined, usually as a vague, shadowy or evanescent form, as wandering among or haunting living persons.

Some believe there is no soul -- when you die its over and done. Most cultures believe in souls having an ongoing existence after a person dies, a belief found in nearly all civilizations and cultures. Belief that some souls are stuck on earth or choose to stay here for some reason is also widely held. Some people will admit having a paranormal experience, but most abnormal experiences are kept secret for fear of being mocked or distrusted for making it up or being mentally impaired. What are people really seeing?

Belief in and investigation of ghosts has become very popular in recent years. Many TV series have been shown in which investigators use current technology to find and contact ghosts, complete with sounds and electrical field responses. Many TV series show videos and photos of strange shadow figures where no one else was, and videos where objects moved or were thrown off counters or shelves when no one is there. If these are true accounts, there is real data that ghosts exist. However, determining whether ghosts exist or not is muddled by the many liars and hoaxers who tell false stories of ghost encounters. or make fake photos or videos. It's also probable some people just mistakenly saw 'something' that wasn't there, or hallucinated.

Even the White House is reported by staff, residents, and guests to have seen ghosts of former Presidents and First Ladies throughout the building. The Lincoln Bedroom is especially charged with paranormal activity. It isn't just humans who have felt this presence. It was reported in 1989 that Ronald Reagan's dog felt comfortable roaming through every White House room except the Lincoln Bedroom, where "he'd just stand outside the door and bark."

Winston Churchill himself reported encountering Lincoln's ghost in that very room during a visit. Just stepped out of the bath and "wearing" nothing but a cigar, he saw the former President by the fireplace. "Good evening, Mr. President," Churchill reportedly said. "You seem to have me at a disadvantage."

I talked recently to a man (call him "Joe") who told a story of a fateful day before his birth when his parents went to a grocery store. Being very pregnant with Joe, the wife stayed in the car while her husband went in to get the groceries. Suddenly, her deceased mother's voice from the back seat shouted "get out of the car! Now!" Shocked and frightened, she bolted from the car. Seconds later, a car smashed into their vehicle. Had she not heard the voice and left the car, she and her unborn baby Joe would have been killed. Was it a ghost, a spirit protecting her daughter from a tragic death? Something happened that saved 2 lives.

Thousands of years of people seeing, hearing or having objects move or fly across the room by ghostly activity versus made up stories and hoaxes, slight of hand movements and faked photos and videos. How do we decide which is the Truth? As of now there is no absolute certain scientific proof that ghosts exist – but there is also no certain scientific open and shut case proof that ghosts don't exist.

Cryptozoology: the search for and study of animals whose existence or survival is disputed or unsubstantiated such as the Bigfoot, Loch Ness monster and the yeti. Such creatures are called "cryptids."

Bigfoot. a.k.a. 'Sasquatch', is probably the most popular cryptid that may or may not exist on this earth. Thousands of people throughout the U.S. and Canada have reported sighting or encountering this large humanoid or anthropoid creature. It is described as being bipedal, 7 to 12 feet tall, and having thick long hair, dark or lighter brown in color, covering the body. They also are said to smell "very" bad according to those getting close enough — a Bigfoot variant believed to prowl the swamp forests of the southern states is known as a "Skunk Ape." The Sasquatch seems to be very smart and cunning, an expert at stealth and quiet mobility. There are almost as many TV Bigfoot hunter series as there are for ghost hunters. Despite footprints, photos and videos of tall, hairy, bipedal creatures, not all people believe Bigfoot exists. Others are convinced they do exist. The rest just don't know what to think.

Reasons why Bigfoot **doesn't** exist: (1) Despite the hundreds or thousands of sightings and encounters reported, there has never been a Bigfoot found dead, or captured alive.

- (2) What people really have seen may be bears standing up on their hind legs, which they do often.
- (3) Many, if not most, of the many footprints found, are created by hoaxers. They carve wooden footprints, secure them to their feet, and go running through forests and along rivers where someone will find the prints. Hoaxers also don gorilla costumes and run around where they can be seen or photographed, from a distance to be ill-defined.

Reasons why Bigfoot **does** exist: (1) The lack of a dead Bigfoot body doesn't mean they don't exist. It may be just that no one has been found yet. These hominids may be have learned to bury their dead. They also seem to be nocturnal creatures, more active at night when it is unlikely to be seen. Also, the vast forests create a very large area that humans have not really explored. No one knows what's really in there.

- (2) That a few reported Bigfoot sightings were actually bears on their hind feet is probable. From a distance and looking through trees and bushes, a bear might be mistaken for a Sasquatch, but only if the bear is seen from the back or front -- a side view shows the jutting snout of a bear. Bigfoot has a flatter face more human than bear. Also, bears get up on their hind legs but don't walk very far before going back to four legs, and they swing their arms like humans when walking, something bears don't do. Bear footprints are very different from Bigfoot footprints.
- (3) Hoaxes are indeed a problem. When a fake footprint is found, it doesn't mean that every footprint found is a hoax. Actual footprints have been found for decades, and experts can tell if a print is genuine or fake.
- (4) Howl-like sounds have been taped, sounds which were not made by any other known animal. A Bigfoot hitting a tree trunk with a wood club has also been heard and taped, thought to be some way of communication. Also, some night encounters saw rocks thrown in the dark toward humans. Bears don't throw things. Primates and humans do.
- (5) One of the most convincing reasons to believe Bigfoot exists is the fact that native people throughout the Americas have encountered the Bigfoot/Sasquatch for thousands of years, traditional legends of large hairy men.
- (6) Some experts working with quantum physics think Bigfoot comes from and goes to another dimension at will, which is why we haven't found a dead body on earth. Another possibility is that Bigfoot is really an alien from an other planet -- there have been several reports of UFOs in the sky in the same areas Sasquatch sightings occurred.

In the end, Bigfoot is still a mystery to solve. Science has no firm data so far to give us an answer as to whether Bigfoot is the real deal, or a dead duck. We've seen other animals thought extinct show up alive years later. New species of animals are found every year. We just don't know enough to know what this planet has yet to show us.

UFO: Unidentified Flying Object

UFOs have been hot news and hotly debated for several decades. Are they real, or just wrongly mistaken normal things in the sky like meteors, high flying birds or airplanes, satellites, or weather balloons?

It was in 1947 that public awareness of unidentified objects in our skies really began. On June 24, 1947, civilian pilot Kenneth Arnold saw a string of nine, shiny unidentified flying objects flying past Mount Rainier at speeds that Arnold estimated at a minimum of 1,200 miles an hour. His knowledge and pilot skills made him a trustworthy witness. He later stated the objects' movement was like "saucers skipping on water", from which the press coined the terms "flying saucer" and "flying disk". He also thought if the objects weren't Army technology they must have come from some other planet. The nationwide story encouraged many to report any unknown objects in the sky.

The now famous "Roswell incident" occurred in July 1947. A military press release announced they'd recovered a "flying disc" from a ranch near Roswell. The next day, Army officials quickly reversed themselves, stating that the found debris was actually from a weather balloon. Over the years some of the local residents have come forth sharing what they saw in the debris area before the military arrived — signed testimonals that they saw a crashed craft debris, and a couple of dead beings — not a crashed weather balloon or parachuting dummies the military claimed.

Since then, the UFO sightings and claims of alien activity have been all over the board. Whether just moving lights in the night, shining objects zig zagging across the sky, or encounters with alien beings, people reported what they saw to authorities, or said nothing to avoid being regarded crazy. All sorts of UFO connected events have been reported over the years. Among the people reporting a UFO sighting are Presidents Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan.

A discovered document sent to F.B.I. Director J. Edgar Hoover in 1950 from a field agent disclosed that 3 UFO crashed crafts had been recovered in New Mexico. Three alien bodies about 3 feet tall were found in each craft, it confirmed.

From July 12 to 29, 1952, a series of UFO formations were reported in Washington, D.C., which later became known as the Washington flap. Thousands saw the lights, watching as they sped off when military fighter planes appeared.

Crop circle designs, made in grain fields in by flattening the plants, became popular in the 1970s. Over the years they've gone from simple circles to incredibly complex works of geometrical patterns. While most of the thousands

of crop circles found worldwide are created by human hoaxers and artists, UFO believers note that lights have been seen over fields where crop circles appear. They also point out it would be impossible for humans to flatten plants in a perfectly completed large complex pattern in one single night. The debate continues.

In the latter half of the 20th century reports of cattle mutilations, dead cows having organs removed with surgical finesse beyond predator animals ripping flesh. Sometimes the dead cows were found near an area where strange lights in the sky were seen and reported. Still happening, and still controversial.

Over many years, more people have come to realize and believe they have been abducted by aliens, mostly from their beds at night. In many cases, memories are recalled over time, or by hypnosis therapy. Abductees, also known as "experiencers", remember being taken aboard an alien craft where they are probed and examined by alien beings, and were then returned to the spot they came from. Many experiencers believe they have been abducted more than once, some being taken as children and continuing well into a middle age. Some think abduction has to do with DNA alteration and reproduction, either for the better, or not for the better, of mankind. Experiencer's encounters are similar world wide, and the several species of aliens are discribed around the world as being the same.

Believers of aliens and UFOs claim the Government knows much more about UFOs and aliens, and keep secret. Some believe the U.S. and several countries are working with aliens in a deal for obtaining technology from several alien species in return for allowing them to perform scientific studies on this planet — which has been going on since the Eisenhower presidency. Whistleblowers have also claimed that the Government and military have been operating secret programs on UFOs for decades, and obtained alien crashed spacecrafts to be reverse engineered to understand the technology. Whistleblowers are usually threatened, called liars or crackpots, and disavowed by the Government or military area where they worked. Yet they continue risking their jobs and stick to their claims under great pressure.

So many UFO mysteries; the Phoenix lights, Pennsylvania crash, Travis Walton abduction, the North Dakota Air Force missile takeover — what we were told happened, or what really happened. Sightings of unidentified objects in the sky have been going on for thousands of years . Native people in America and indigenous cultures throughout the world have seen UFOs, and have passed that knowledge down through the ages. Many American native tribes talk of the Star People, sky gods who came down from the sky in flying crafts and taught them survival skills before they left.

During WWII both the Allies and Nazi plane crews had many encounters with orbs or lights flying near their planes, faster and more maneuverable than anything known then. The strange objects became known as "foo fighters". The Allies suspected the lights were from Nazi technology; Nazis thought that they were from Allied technology.

While the Government is cursed for keeping secrets of alien activities, a recent alternative possibility is that it's not the Government keeping aliens under wraps. It may be aliens themselves who feel we humans are not yet ready for them to reveal themselves, and that a premature revelation might cause a disasterous panic and create chaos. Whether it is the aliens or the Government, the concept of aliens existing and being here on earth may be a slow effort to ease in the truth to reach a final reveal point. Recent Congressional committee hearings and other developments have confirmed that UFOs, or UAPs (Unidentified Aerial Phenomena), as the Government now calls unknown objects in the skies, do exist. They haven't said that aliens are here, but if UAPs aren't our tech, and aren't other countries' tech, who else could be responsible? The question is, if aliens are here, what do they want?

A few years ago a woman I know told me she saw a huge triangular craft moving slowly and silently just above the treetops in the Boyne area until it suddenly flew away and vanished. I asked if she reported her sighting; she said no.

When I was in the Air Force Weather group stationed near Amarillo, Texas, on my way to work I noticed people looking upward. A small white dot was moving across the sky. A weather balloon, I realized. That night on the news there was a mention of hundreds of people reporting a UFO to authorities. It was a weather balloon.

My next station was in Libya at the Wheelus Air Base, where our job was to send up...weather balloons, twice a day, and collect the data. One night the weather station and the radar tower personnel saw a reddish glow hovering in very low clouds out over the Mediterranean Sea It had no blinking flight lights or aviation identification code, and no helicopter noise was heard. It dropped below the clouds, then rose back up into the clouds. It did this a few times before disappearing. It was reported, but nothing was ever heard about it. I didn't work that night and missed the incident. Some of the airmen who witnessed it were shaken and spooked by this UFO.

My dad was a Army Engineer in WWII, running different machinery building the Alcan highway in Canada and Alaska. Then he was sent to one of the Aleutian Islands. While there he and others more than once saw strange crafts come out of the sea and shoot away in the sky. He never told us that — he only told my sister before he died.


