The crew finished up the work at 12:15 pm and only got sprinkled on for a short period of time.


The homeowner was very appreciative of the new ramp and the improved access for all of them.

Editor's Notes — 2024

August 2024 — Savoring Summer

We are now in the last full summer month of August. Our calendar is based on the Roman calendar, and each month is named for some Roman Latin word, a legacy that has been a substantial component in every European culture since ancient Rome fell.

What we call August was once the sixth month in the Roman calendar named *Sextilis* (meaning "sixth" in Latin) until 8 B.C. Like July, a month renamed after a prominent Roman leader, Julius Ceasar — Sextilis was renamed to honor the first emperor of the Roman empire (and Julius Caesar's grandnephew and heir), <u>Augustus Caesar</u>. Augustus led the Roman legions to defeat Marc Antony and Cleopatra, and winning Egypt for the empire — a victory that led him to become the first emperor of Rome. The Roman Senate decided that such a hero should have a month named after him following the month of Julius Ceasar, July, and named it <u>August</u>. It also decided that since Julius's month, July, had 31 days, Augustus's month should equal it. Instead of August having a mere 30 days, it was lengthened to 31, preventing anyone from claiming that Emperor Augustus was a lesser leader with an inferior month.

The Julian calendar months alternated evenly between 30 and 31 days (with the exception of February), which made August 30 days long. To accommodate this change two other calendrical adjustments were necessary:

- The extra day needed to inflate the importance of August was taken from February, which originally had 29 days (30 in a leap year), and was now reduced to 28 days (29 in a leap year).
- Since the months evenly alternated between 30 and 31 days, adding the extra day to August meant that July, August, and September would all have 31 days. So to avoid three long months in a row, the lengths of the last four months were switched around, giving us 30 days in September, November, April, and June.

So our calendar, though tweaked in 1582 by Pope Gregory (the Gregorian Calendar), still retains the months' names and number of days created in 8 B.C.

Update for Summer 2024

Info from Weather Channel Website

Summer's first half was the hottest on record for over 30 U.S. cities from the East Coast to California and the Southwest as the season reached its halfway mark, mid-July.

East: Over a dozen cities in the East have either tied or raced to a record-hot summer through mid-July, according to the Southeast Regional Climate Center. Windsor Locks, Connecticut, north of Hartford, crushed its previous record-hot first half of summer pace by 3 degrees, an impressive feat in the realm of actual temperatures averaged over a six-week period. Washington, D.C., is topping its hottest summer pace from 2010 with help from a record-tying four-day streak of highs in the 100s, something done only two other times in 152 years. Punta Gorda, Florida, and San Juan, Puerto Rico, may also set their hottest summer records for the second year in a row if the heat persists.

West: There were also over a dozen cities that sweated through a record-hot first six weeks of summer in the Southwest. Incredibly, after suffering through their hottest single month on record last July, Phoenix obliterated their previous record-hottest first six weeks of summer by just under 3 degrees, according to the SERCC. If they keep up this pace through August, they could set their hottest summer record for the second year in a row. Helped by a recent heat wave in which the city reached 120 degrees for the first time, Las Vegas is also pacing well above its existing half-summer (2021) and full-summer (2018) records. **August Outlook**: The latest outlook from The Weather Company and Atmospheric G2 indicates August will be hotter than average across much of the country, particularly from the Southwest into the Plains.
