



A GUIDE DOG STORY - KASSON W., NEW YORK

"I'm 37, I just lost my sight in 2020 just before the pandemic because I was attacked on the subway. I went from seeing to not, just in a day. I'm a people person, I'm a Leo, I used to bartend and I'm the life of the party. I have a close-knit family and I'm a protector. It's been a roller coaster since I lost my eyesight. During the beginning when it was also the start of the pandemic, I thought I would be able to see again, but the eye doctor told me I wouldn't be able to see again. At first, I didn't know there was life after being blind. I have a close-knit family and they tried to do everything for me, and I couldn't handle that. I needed to get past them doing everything which led me to feeling helpless. Then a new season began. It was rough in the beginning; I'm still getting through it... I'm still processing it, but sometimes I think maybe it was blessing because I'm doing things and experiencing things I normally wouldn't do. I feel like new doors have opened for me, everything feels right. I'm going with it and I'm not fighting against it. Leader Dogs for the Blind found me the best dog. I came to get Odyssey because I wanted to be heard. I motivate and inspire a lot of people and now I'm thinking about speaking and helping others."





The crew finished up the ramp at 1200 and the homeowner came back out for a picture with the crew. She thanked everyone for their efforts with tears in her eyes. She said the ramp will help her get in and out of her home on her own now.

Editor's Notes — 2024 by Lion David J. Zimmer

September 2024 — Lion vs Elk

I've been going though the months of the yearly calendar, sharing interesting things I didn't know about, how names and numbers on our current calendars came to be. Now we are in the month of September, first of the last 4 months that are all named from Latin numbers instead of gods or iconic leaders. September means 7, October means 8, November means 9, and December means 10.

Ironically, none of these numbered names actually correspond with the months in the year. In our calendar, July is the 7th month, August is the 8th month, September (7) is the 9th month, October (8) is the 10th month, November (9) the 11th month, and December (10) the 12th month. The Ceasars, Julius and Augustus, took over the July and August months, pushing the last 4 number named months out of their correct posts. For some reason, their names weren't changed by either the Romans or the Catholics with the Gregorian Calendar.

Although the Gregorian calendar is named after Pope Gregory XIII, it is an adaptation of a calendar designed by Luigi Lilio (also known as Aloysius Lilius), who was an Italian doctor, astronomer, and philosopher, born around 1510. He died in 1576, six years before his calendar was officially introduced.

The Gregorian calendar was first adopted in Italy, Poland, Portugal, and Spain in 1582. Catholic countries quickly adopted Pope Gregory's calendar reforms for their civil affairs. 10 days were dropped in October 1582. In Europe's Protestant countries, however, people feared that the new calendar was an attempt by the Catholic Church to silence their movement. It took almost 200 years before England and the colonies switched over when an act of Parliament introduced the new calendar, advancing the date from September 2 to September 14, 1752, dropping 12 days. Orthodox countries followed the Julian calendar even longer; their national churches have still not adopted Pope Gregory XIII's calendar.

All in all, we can just be thankful that we have a calendar to tell us what day it is.

LION vs ELK: Terror on the Highway

A couple Sundays ago my wife and I took our dog out to the Ocqueoc Park near Onaway. There were a lot of people there, many in the river rapids on the warm day. Our dog Chester really wanted to get into that water, and almost pulled me in with him. He is fast and strong, and wants to obey and please us, unless he would rather please himself.


After walking around for about an hour, we went back to our car and left the park. I drove to Indian River, where I turned on to US-75 and headed toward Gaylord. There was a lot of traffic on the road, somewhere between medium and heavy, with many people who came up to Northern Michigan or the U.P. for the weekend heading south to their homes. I had the cruise control on to 75 mph, and watched every car coming behind me zoom past my car at 80 mph or more. No one seems see the speed suggestion signs, or just ignores them.

Somewhere between Indian River and Wolverine an elk suddenly charged out of the trees on the right side of the highway. He was big, with a large antler rack, running in fear. He had ripped off a leafy tree branch that was caught in his antler. He was nearly on the highway, about 50 feet ahead of our car. At 75 mph, the car would meet the elk 50 feet away in 2 or 3 seconds. Instead of hitting the brake, I swerved into the left lane, a reaction, not a plan. The elk either slowed down, turned, or stopped as we drove by within a foot of him.

Deer collisions cause much damage, but a large elk could do much more to our Prius if we had hit the elk head on. It could have been fatal. So, we were <u>very</u> lucky - lucky that there wasn't a car in the left lane when I swerved into it, and lucky we didn't hit the elk. Either one could have prevented me from being here to write this experience. The elk got across to the median, and hopefully he got across the north bound lane. Stay Alert - peril is out there!
