Recent Event Updates

Ice Plunge Outcome

The Ice Plunge, held annually in February, is one of our best fundraisers. This event is a great way to involve the community while showcasing the camp's impact. This year's event was a resounding success. We had about 120 people in attendance with 30 jumpers braving the icy water. The Ice was 8.5 inches thick this year, the most we have had to date. Final calculations are still being processed but the Ice Plunge total currently is \$20,143, which is a record breaking year. Thank you to everyone who donated, volunteered, jumped, and supported the Ice Plunge.

11-A2 Kickoff Dinner Outcome

Lions Bear Lake Camp was honored to receive a brand-new John Deere tractor, presented at the District 11-A2 Kickoff Dinner, with the keys delivered by AIS Construction Equipment and Nino Messina. This generous contribution was made possible by the support of multiple Lions Clubs, businesses, and individuals, and we are incredibly grateful for their commitment to the camp. The event was a great success, with Traci, Jesse, and Kenny in attendance, and Rachel Lee, a counselor and former camper, sharing how Bear Lake Camp has impacted her life and strengthened her connection to the camp. The camp's truck and snowplow have been heavily used this winter to manage the snowy conditions and keep the grounds clear and accessible. The team also worked on equipment inspections and repairs to ensure everything is in excellent condition for the upcoming season.

It's also a wonderful opportunity to enjoy the beautiful grounds and connect with other Lions & community members who share a passion for supporting the camp. Volunteers are encouraged to bring gloves, tools, and plenty of energy!

Open House

The Open House is your chance to tour the camp, meet the team, and learn about the programs that make Lions Bear Lake Camp so special. This event is open to Lions members, donors, and community supporters who want to see firsthand how their contributions make an impact. Guided tours will showcase the facilities, from the accessible cabins and activity areas to the waterfront and climbing tower. It's also an opportunity to ask questions, hear inspiring stories, and see the camp in action as we prepare for the heart of the summer season.

Off-Season Rentals and Partnerships

Lions Bear Lake Camp remains active year-round, hosting rental groups and providing training opportunities for community organizations. These partnerships not only bring in vital revenue but also strengthen the camp's connection with the local community.

In **January**, **Camp Quality** staff gathered at the camp for a training session to prepare their team for impactful programming during their upcoming summer session.

March is full of returning groups, including Crazy Crafters and the BLC Crafting Weekend, who utilize the camp for creative retreats. Additionally, MSU Kesem staff will visit for a day of training to prepare for their summer camp sessions, ensuring they are ready to deliver transformative experiences.

In April, Lapeer Search & Rescue will return for two additional training weekends. On April 9, Lions Bear Lake Camp will host a day program in partnership with Behavioral Consultants, designed for children with autism. This initiative provides tailored activities to support social engagement, sensory day retreat, while the Anchor Bay Quilting Guild, a long-standing partner, will host their 10-day session at the camp. April also marks the start of Course & Tower Training for staff, with programs continuing into May to certify facilitators, ensure safety protocols are followed, and prepare staff to guide campers through these confidence-building activities.

In **May**, Lions Bear Lake Camp will host another autism-focused day program in partnership with **Behavioral Consultants**. Plans are underway to explore the possibility of overnight camps later in the summer to further expand this partnership. **Lapeer Rocks** returns for another overnight team-building

and educational camp for kids from the Lapeer School District. At the end of the month, the **Camp Cherith Reunion Group** will return for their third year. This group of professional women, who grew up as counselors at Camp Cherith, reconnects with camp life and contributes through meaningful volunteer work.

These rentals, training sessions, and partnerships ensure Lions Bear Lake Camp remains a valuable resource for the community year-round while generating essential revenue to support its mission.

A Look Ahead to Summer 2025

Lions Bear Lake Camp is preparing for an incredible summer filled with 11 weeks of activities and programs designed to inspire confidence, develop leadership, and create inclusive experiences for individuals of all abilities.

The season begins with the Lapeer County Intermediate School District (LCISD) Adult Education Camp, offering outdoor education and team-building opportunities for adult learners. Later in June, the Michigan Chapter of the American String Teachers Association (MASTA) will host three levels of string orchestra camps—beginner, intermediate, and advanced—allowing young musicians to enhance their skills in a serene, outdoor environment.

In July, the camp begins with **Supervisor Training**, preparing leadership staff with certifications and tools for a successful season. **MSU Kesem** will host their first session, supporting children whose parents are battling cancer by offering a week of connection and understanding. **Staff Training** will also take place in July to ensure all team members are ready to provide safe and meaningful experiences for campers.

The Open House on July 12th invites Lions members, donors, and community supporters to visit the camp, tour the facilities, and learn about the programs. Following the Open House, Visually Impaired and Blind Youth Camp (VIB) runs from July 13–19, providing adaptive outdoor activities like climbing and kayaking. This session also includes the Leadership Development Program for teens aged 15–17. The next week, Deaf and Hard of Hearing Youth Camp (DHH) will take place from July 20–26, offering an inclusive environment with outdoor adventures, team-building, and leadership development opportunities. The month concludes with Providing a Better Journey (PBJ), which supports foster youth through confidence-building activities and connections.

In August, the camp welcomes the Jack & Jill Motor City Chapter Leadership Program, focusing on inner-city youth and offering workshops that build confidence and essential skills. We have our Deaf and Hard of Hearing Family Camp back for a weekend of fun for families. The Sterling Heights Band Camp returns for another week of music and teamwork. The second session of MSU Kesem will continue to support children whose parents are battling cancer. Finally, the summer concludes with Camp Quality, providing a week of fun, relaxation, and bonding for siblings of children with cancer.

This schedule highlights Lions Bear Lake Camp's commitment to creating life-changing opportunities for individuals of all ages and abilities. Staff will enjoy a well-deserved vacation at the end of August before the fall retreat season kicks off.

Fundraising Events

Lions Bear Lake Camp is excited to host several engaging fundraising events in 2025, offering opportunities for Lions Clubs and the community to come together in support of camper sponsorships, facility improvements, and operational costs.

The **District 11-C2 Fundraiser** will take place on **April 4, 2025**, at the **Grand Ledge Masonic Temple**. Tickets are just \$15 for an evening filled with bingo, raffles, silent auctions, and presentations about the camp's impact. Attendees will hear about successes from 2024 and learn about plans for the upcoming summer season.

On April 12, 2025, the Buffalo & Boar Wild Game Dinner will return at the Metamora Lions Club House. Tickets are \$60 per person and include a gourmet wild game dinner, exciting door prizes, and silent auctions. This event remains one of the camp's most popular fundraisers.

For golf enthusiasts, the **Lions Bear Lake Camp Golf Classic** is scheduled for June 9, 2025, at the **Metamora Golf & Country Club**. Tickets are \$125 per golfer, offering participants 18 holes of golf, course contests, and a buffet-style awards dinner. It's a perfect combination of fun and fundraising, with all funds benefiting the camp's mission.

Jimmy John's Field Baseball Fundraiser (July 27th, 2025). This event is a fun way to support the camp while enjoying an evening of baseball, great company, and fundraising opportunities. A portion of ticket sales will go back to Lions Bear Lake Camp. More details will be shared soon!

Our brand new Clay Shoot Fundraiser will be held on September 6, 2025, at the Fenton Sportsman Club. Tickets are \$75 per shooter, and the event features a friendly shooting competition, meals, and prizes. Please watch for more information to come.

Bear Lake Camp Ultra Marathon (October 4, 2025): This endurance race is one of our biggest fundraisers, bringing runners from all over to challenge themselves while raising money for the camp. Last year, the event had 114 participants and raised nearly \$10,000. We're looking forward to another great turnout this fall.

These events provide meaningful ways for supporters to engage with Lions Bear Lake Camp, raise vital funds, and have a great time while making a difference in the lives of the campers we serve.

The Importance of Camper Sponsorships

Camper sponsorships are the heart of Lions Bear Lake Camp's mission to provide inclusive, life-changing experiences for children of all abilities. Families pay only \$40 per camper, even though the true cost is \$850 for a week of camp. Sponsorships bridge this gap, ensuring financial barriers never prevent a child from attending camp. These contributions make it possible for campers to build essential skills like teamwork, leadership, and confidence while connecting with peers in a supportive and inclusive environment.

The need for sponsorships continues to grow, with camper participation increasing by 38% from 2023 to 2024. As we anticipate even greater demand in 2025, sponsorships are vital to meeting this need and ensuring every child can enjoy the life-changing opportunities the camp provides. By supporting camper sponsorships, donors directly impact children's lives, helping them create memories, build friendships, and gain confidence.



The meeting was called to order at 10 AM by DG Gocha. The invocation was offered by IVDG Leathers. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by ZC Chase.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 11/4/24 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by ZC Chase, supported by ZC Roberts that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. Correspondence consisted of thank you notes from Lion Kay Gaines, Lion Nancy Weston and Lions Bear Lake Camp.

<u>Treasurer's Report-</u> The 2024-25 YTD financial reports were presented, with a beginning balance in the ad min account of \$35,621.40, income of \$17,714.38 and expenses of \$14,644.69, leaving an ending balance of \$38,691.09 as of 2/3/24. This consists of \$35,544.17 in admin and \$3,146.92 in convention funds. The projects account has a beginning balance of \$29,231.88 income of \$13,955.70 and expenses of \$12,548.15, leaving an ending balance of \$30,639.43 as of 2/3/25. It was moved by IVDG Leathers, supported by ZC Chase that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The cabinet received dues payment summaries. We have one club that has not paid second half dues. CST Durflinger will be sending them a third reminder. CST Durflinger reminded clubs that we restructured the district project categories several years ago, but clubs are still sending in contributions using the old categories. She will send out a reminder to clubs with the correct list.

Old Business- None.

<u>New Business-</u> DG Gocha presented awards to PDG Durflinger and IPDG Murch from LCIF for achieving 100% club participation in contributions last year. ZC's Kris Roberts and BJ Sander were presented with their Guiding Lion Certificates. There were also a number of membership chevrons that were passed out to ZC's to present during club visits.

GET Report- IPDG Murch turned in a written report.

GLT Report- No report.

GMT Report- GMT Leathers turned in a written report.

<u>GST Report-</u> GST Gocha turned in a written report. She reminded clubs they can contact her if they are having trouble reporting their service activities. She reported that the district service project at the convention will be hygiene kits which clubs can take back for use in their communities. A spreadsheet was sent out so clubs can sign up to donate the items for the kits. So far only 6 clubs have signed up.

Zone Chair Reports- ZC Sander had no report. ZC Roberts turned in a written report. ZC Chase reported that he has visited three of his clubs and they are doing well.

<u>Committee Reports-</u> Written Reports were provided for **Bear Lake Camp-** PDG Zeller, **District Convention** - GST Gocha, **District Editor-** Lion Dave Zimmer, **Environmental-** PDG Bodem, **Eversight-** Lion Bethany Hedgepath, **Lions of Michigan Foundation-** PDG Leathers, **MD-11 Convention-** IPDG Murch, **Peace Poster-**

Lion Jean Manning, **Project KidSight-** Lions Nate Slezak and Linda Harris. The following supplemented the written reports- GST Gocha reminded people that hotel reservations for the convention need to be made by 3/17 for the discounted rate. She will be sending out packets again to all clubs. Lion Jean Manning reported that 6 clubs have requested a Peace Poster package already. Please let her know soon if your club is interested in participating so that kits can be ordered. They will be passed out at the district convention. She will also inventory her paper supply and buy more if necessary so that clubs have the correct size paper for the posters. She noted that you don't just have to go through your local schools. They can go to Scout troops or other youth groups who want to participate.

Oral Reports- Constitution and By-Laws- IVDG Leathers requested that everyone think about creating a convention committee to try and bring more continuity to our conventions. Convention Raffle- ZC Chase reported that the convention raffle tickets have been sent out. If your club did not receive them, please let him know. District Melvin Jones- IVDG Leathers reported that 3 nominations have been received. The committee will be voting next week on the recipients. International Convention- IVDG Leathers reminded us that International Convention has been moved to Orlando. It will be held from July 13-17, 2025. LCIFPDG Gaines reported that the district has contributed \$6,842 through December. The reporting is running behind, but they have hired new staff, so it should improve. He noted that LCIF had sent \$130,000 (or maybe more by now} to both California for the wildfires, and North Carolina for the hurricanes. He will be beginning club visits, and would like to talk to clubs about the legacy program. Michigan Forum-IVDG Leathers reminded everyone that registration for the Michigan Forum need to be done by 2/12. The event is from 2/28-3/1 in Kalamazoo. She encouraged anyone who had not attended one before to consider it. White Cane- Lion Shirley Hill reported that the committee had selected three people for the White Cane scholarships.

Audience Comments- Lion Shirley Hill brought up her concerns about a contract that her club is being asked

to sign for one of their events. She gave the documents to PDG Durflinger, who will contact Lions International's legal department about the situation. ZC Chase reminded everyone about the East Jordan "Dinner in the Dark" to be held on 2/22 in East Jordan. The tickets are \$40 for individuals, \$75/couple. The proceeds will go to Leader Dog and Eversight. PDG Leathers asked everyone to save the date for their 75th anniversary picnic to be held on 5/31 from 1-4 PM. It is a free event for everyone in their community and any district Lions who would like to join them. ZC Roberts asked if everyone would start saving their aluminum pop can tabs. His wife collects them and donates them to Ronald McDonald house.

VDG Comments- IVDG Leathers commented that she is attending training in St. Charles, IL next week. She asked everyone to look over the committee list, and see if there is something that interests them. The current chairmen can always use help! She noted that registrations for the district convention have been slow coming, and asked people to get their registrations in soon.

DG Comments- DG Gocha reminded us that there is no 2VDG. We need to have people step up to district leadership. He noted that our membership is down by 11 people this year to only 662. There is a statewide contest which will run from now through 5/16, and any club that adds at least three new members will be entered into a drawing for a Melvin Jones Fellowship. He has key chains (\$6} and bottle openers (\$8} made and donated by his son that he is selling to raise money for the convention fund.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 11:17 AM. The next meeting date will be Saturday, April 26 at the district convention in Gaylord.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE REPORT FOR Cabinet meeting February 8, 2025

Let it Snow! Let it Snow! And more

When we thought we were getting by without much snow in Northern Michigan, we were wrong. We are getting our fair share now. Snow is a good thing. We need snow in the cold winters to protect everything we enjoy in Spring, Summer and Fall. Snow is insulation for our soil. It protects the root systems of trees and shrubs and other plants from freezing. Without the snow, the milder temperatures and sunshine warms surfaces which leads to the soil heaving which can break roots and dry out the plant parts. Soil moisture is protected by the winter snow.

Animals also benefit from the wonderful snow. Mammals, reptiles, amphibians and insects hibernate beneath the ground. You may not realize it but air pockets are found between snowflakes that have fallen. It was found through research that the temperature of soil beneath seven inches of snow was 24 degrees Fahrenheit and the temperature above the snow was 27 degrees Fahrenheit. Snow also protects berries, seeds, etc. that provide food for the living creatures.

Snow is also important in replenishing our ground water as the melting snow (and rain) seep through the soil, filling empty spaces and also cracks underground.

Enjoy our winter snow!



Tissue Transplants

Every year, thousands of donors selflessly give the gift of sight to those in need. In Michigan, 2,477 donors gave the gift of sight as cornea/eye donors from January 1 to December 31, 2024. Below is a breakdown of how donated tissues were used.

Research & Innovations

In December, Eversight was excited to announce a new partnership with 40 scientists, doctors and industry experts from around the country to make whole eye transplants a reality. This team will be led by Dr. Jeffrey Goldberg of Stanford University, and they will work to advance and develop cutting-edge medical devices, artificial intelligence integrations, new surgical techniques, regenerative medicine breakthroughs and improvements to rejection mitigation. Education & Training

From January 1-December 31, 2024, Eversight staff held 69 educational wet lab trainings for 532 surgeons, residents and fellows at partner institutions on four common types of cornea transplant procedures: Descemet Membrane Endothelial Keratoplasty (DMEK), Descemet Stripping Automated Endothelial Keratoplasty (DSAEK), Penetrating Keratoplasty (PKP) and Deep Anterior Lamellar Keratoplasty (DALK). One of these sessions was held at the University of Illinois – Chicago during the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) conference. This session offered seven surgeons the opportunity to enhance their skills in the DMEK and DALK techniques.

Eversight staff also attended the Cornea and Eye Banking Forum (CEBF) in October. Both AAO and CEBF offer educational sessions in the world of eye banking, as well as networking and collaboration opportunities. Learn more here: https://blt.ly/4hmJK7p

Global Development

From January 1-December 31, 2024, Eversight placed 2,195 tissues at greatly reduced or no cost in countries around the world who would otherwise not have access to these tissues.

Eversight is collaborating with ACE Care Global on developing plans for an eye bank in Honduras. We are also in the process of developing an eye bank in Morocco in collaboration with Vision Share. In the last quarter of the year, we completed a training program for future eye bankers in Morocco as part of this project.







MARCH 2025 — Effective Lion Leaders

(I found this very interesting article in last month's District 11-E1 Newsletter, and asked the Editor, Lion Paula Rigling, for permission to put it in our March District Newsletter. Permission was given. Read and learn 6 things that make effective Lion Leaders.)

What Makes an Effective Lions Leader? IPDG Jim Patterson

I did some research on the internet about being an effective leader and found an absolute flood of opinions: "The 5 P's of Effective Leadership", "The 10 C's of Effective Leaders", "12 Characteristics of an Effective Leader" and on-and-on. I found nearly 50 different opinions of what it takes to be an effective leader. After skimming a bunch of these articles, I decided they were all right and they were all wrong. Being a Lions leader takes a different skill set than a business leader. So here is what I think it takes to be an effective Lions leader.

- 1. **Stop Defeating Yourself** One of the worst traits a leader can have is thinking they aren't good enough or no one wants to hear their opinion. But the worst self-defeating thought is that you don't know how to lead. When that happens, you're beaten before the race starts. Of course, you know how to lead you just need help recognizing that fact.
 - News Flash! Everyone has doubts I speak from experience I have often stood in front of a group of Lions, and thought, "What the heck am I doing here?"
 - You and I joined Lions for an important reason. Becoming a leader helps you get that reason out in front. Your reason your vision is what is important. Quit letting doubt prevent you from sharing your vision of service. Leadership is doing what you know is right.
- 2. Be Courageous Take all those doubts and put them in the back of your mind and take a deep breath. Then step to the front. Notice I didn't say eliminate the doubts. Those doubts are there to keep you on your toes nagging you to do your best. But you can't let doubt control your actions. Having the courage to take a leadership role pays enormous dividends. Every ball player steps to the plate expecting to hit a home run. But even if that player strikes out seven out of ten at-bats they're still hailed as a hero. Every leader will stumble somewhere along the way maybe even fall. So what? Failure is not final; it's just one step on the road to success ask any baseball player.
- 3. **Prepare Yourself as Best You Can** Learn all you can about your club, your district and LCI. You can't know everything and something will come up that throws you. The <u>best thing to know is</u> where to go or who to ask to find the answer. But learning also pays double personal dividends because you become a better Lion and a better leader.
- 4. **Be Honest** The absolute worst thing you can do is pass on bad information or a wild guess. It's impossible to know everything so when you don't know, say you don't know but that you will find out. And then go and find out and report back.
- 5. **Talk to Your People** Communication is the grease on the wheels of any organization. I cannot stress this enough! LCI sends an absolute flood of emails to club, district and state leaders. Some leaders keep everything to themselves they seem to have this need for secrecy. I am convinced that is wrong. A good leader informs their membership and asks for opinions and help. Keeping members who have busy personal lives reminded of important Lions events and news is vital to your organization's health.
- 6. Do the Small Things This was a lesson I needed to be taught. I'd always believed folks didn't join Lions to be rewarded. A good friend of mine encouraged me to start writing thank-you notes. I soon learned that a hand-written thank-you note is more valuable than gold or diamonds. People may not "expect" to be thanked but they are gratified when you do it. And they are more inclined to help someone else down the road. Seize every opportunity to thank and reward those who did you a favor, did an excellent job, or showed you a kindness.

There you have it, my take on effective leadership. None of these things are terribly complicated or difficult but they do take some of your time. But it will be time well spent.

Notice I didn't say anything about goals, objectives, missions, or drives. I'll leave that to you. But if you can't do these 6 things well, you will never accomplish your goals.
