How Veterinary Students and Leader Dog Collaborate to Ensure Healthy Eyes in Future Leader Dogs

As part of their advanced ophthalmology elective, veterinary students from Michigan State University's (MSU) College of Veterinary Medicine are diving deep into the world of eye care. Leader Dogs for the Blind's breeding team invited these students to help perform some routine eye exams on our breeding stock dogs. The students that participated have a keen interest in ophthalmology, making this opportunity an ideal way to gain hands-on experience and improve their skills in examining eyes.



During their training, they perform indirect ophthalmology exams using a specialized lens and a head-loop to get a clear look at the back of the eye. This method allows them to observe the retina and other vital structures, ensuring they can identify potential issues.

In addition to this, they also use a slit lamp to examine the lens of the eye, a technique commonly used to detect cataracts or other abnormalities. These exams are crucial, as they help students understand how to spot conditions that could affect a dog's ability to see properly, potentially impacting their ability to work as guide dogs.



Why These Exams Matter for Leader Dog

Eyes can change rapidly, and abnormalities may not always be detectable in young dogs. Many eye conditions only become apparent after a dog reaches the age of three or older, which is why regular eye exams are essential. At Leader Dog, we ensure that our breeding stock dogs undergo annual ophthalmologic exams. This practice not only helps us catch any potential problems early but also gives us confidence that our dogs are in top health and capable of producing healthy offspring.

With these exams, we can monitor the eyes of our breeding dogs to ensure they're free from hereditary conditions that could be passed on to future generations. It's all about setting up the next generation of Leader Dogs for success.

A Mutually Beneficial Collaboration with MSU

The partnership between Leader Dog and MSU goes beyond simply providing us with valuable eye exams for our dogs. Since MSU is a teaching hospital, having their students visit a few times a year offers multiple benefits. It gives us the opportunity to have our dogs examined regularly, and if any abnormalities are detected during these routine exams, we can address them promptly.


But it's not just a win for us — it's also a fantastic learning experience for the veterinary students and residents. Working with Leader Dog's breeding stock allows them to observe a population of dogs that may not be seen as frequently at MSLI's cli

them to observe a population of dogs that may not be seen as frequently at MSU's clinic, offering them a rare




and unique learning opportunity. These dogs are part of a specialized program, and their eye health is of utmost importance. By interacting with this different population, students get exposure to a range of conditions and cases they might not otherwise encounter.

"As someone who has completed both an internship and residency at an academic institution, I can say firsthand that these types of learning experiences are invaluable," says Leader Dog's Assistant Director of Canine Health and Reproduction Dr. McRae.



The 17th annual Best Ball Bowling Tournament was a great success. Lion Jane reported that \$2,350 was added to our activities account.



APRIL 2025 — Fury of the "Ice Hurricane"

Well, March is over and April is here. March 20 was the Spring Equinox, the day Winter ends and Spring begins. Normally there are a few snowfalls in April, usually shortened as days continue to be above freezing temperature. Winter typically turns somewhat warmer by the end of March, and April continues to offer rising temperatures as it moves on to May. That's the normal way it usually goes, and how we believe it should be. This year we've experienced a new event, something different.

A large storm, warned ahead by scientific weather forecasters, swept into northerm Michigan, Lower and Upper, on Friday evening, March 28. There was an awesome show of lightning, uncountable bolts filling the sky with constant light and thunder, for 15 to 30 minutes. As the lightning receded, a downpour of rain fell for awhile. Then the rain turned into pellets of ice that continued with high winds and higher gusts that howled in the night. We awoke on Saturday, March 29, to a land of a dusting of snow and a coating of ice on everything outside. It was cloudy all day, with spurts of snow, rain and ice drops. Tree branches of all kinds were bending down by the weight of the ice. The evening hours brought another part of the storm with ice growing everywhere. About 8:30 pm the lights suddenly went out. The winds and coats of ice had reached the point of damage for electrical power wires. Thousands of people in Northern Michigan lost electrical power. We thought it would be only a few hours before the power would come back on, and we went to bed.

Sunday morning, March 30, we looked outside to see everything covered by a thick layer of ice, covered by snow. Branches on trees pointed down with the heavy added ice, and many branches were broken and lying on the ground. There was still no power, and winds were still blowing fiercely. Rain, snow, and more ice were falling, off and on all day. We realized that this was really a dangerous event and there was nothing we could do about it. Everything came to a stop: No power. No furnace heat. No water. No showers. No lights. No TV. No phone connection or texting. No internet. No mail for a couple days. No way to know what was happening around us, what the weather forecast would be.

Fortunately, our gas stove allowed us to have cooked meals, and our gas fireplace gave us some heat, though the bathrooms and bedroom were beyond the fireplace heat to keep them warmer. Flashlights and headlights let us get through the house as needed at night. The lack of flushing water for the toilets was "Problem Number 1." I went outside and shoveled snow into a plastic container, which I took into the house. The snow melted near by the fireplace, and by filling a cooking pot with snow that melted on the stove—flushing water successful! We were able to get drinking water and other things from Meijer's in Petoskey, the only store open early in the power blackout. Meijer's was also the only open gas station in Petoskey early on — we saw scores of cars lined up for gas.

Our neighbor came over with a small generator which he connected to our furnace, and we had a brief time of 70 degrees in the house. He did that 2 days, and we were very thankful for his generousity.

Driving around Petoskey and Harbor Springs was almost like being on an another planet; ice covered trees, branches, and power wires down everywhere. As much as the ice storm made things difficult and left unbelivable damage, the ice cover was dazzling, especially when the sun was out and giving the ice it's glittering light. It was the most beautiful disaster I never thought I'd see.

The power came back on at 5:06 am on Wednesday, April 2. As I write this on Thursday, April 3, the ice has melted away, but the internet is still not connected. My experience in this area may be different from other areas, but I think we all agree we don't want to have another storm like this one!

I call this an "Ice Hurricane". Hurricanes are large powerful storms that hit wide areas with high winds and incredible precipitation, and leave massive damage behind. This "Ice Hurricane" was a powerful storm that hit wide areas with high winds (less that 100 mph, but 50 or 60 mph) and excessive precipitation as ice, and certainly caused enormous damage. Only difference: colder storm.

Without power Northern Michigan and the people who live here have suffered, had our lives suddenly changed, faced with survival conditions, watching water trickle from the refridgerator as the freezer thaws. Many have power now, many others don't. It will take time, but we will bounce back.




