We are looking for a First Vice District Governor, so if you know of anyone that you think would make a good one, please let me know.



Pediatric Cancer Facts

LIONS DISTRICT 11-E2 DISTRICT CONVENTION
APRIL 26, 2025

In 2018, 17,293 children were diagnosed with cancer in the United States.

That is equal to 47 families receiving this devastating news every single day!

Of those diagnosed, nearly 5000 of them were diagnosed with CNS tumors.

These account for roughly 25% of all pediatric cancer diagnoses.

Signs/Symptoms of CNS tumors

- Vision/speech/hearing problems
- Coordination problems, ie. Difficulty walking/loss of balance
- Seizures
- Unexplained weight loss/gain
- Tilting head to one side
- Weakness/tingling on one side
- Personality changes
- Memory/concentration issues
- Endocrine issues, ie., early puberty/increased thirst
- Back pain
- Scoliosis
- Increased head size in infants

It is estimated that between 2020 and 2050

13.7 Million children be diagnosed

11.1 Million will die if there are no major investments in intervensions made.

Of those, 45% will go undiagnosed, and 85% of those cases will be in developing countries.

2024 By The Numbers

Approximately 9600 children were diagnosed with cancer in the US alone!

Roughly 1 in 260 children develop cancer before their 20th birthday.

What is a CNS tumor?

CNS stands for Central Nervous system. These tumors develop in the brain and spinal cord.

They are the most common tumors in children.

_

Complications from treating CNS tumors

- Damage to brain/nervous system
 - Problems with coordination, muscle strength, speech, eyesight
- Post surgery complications
 - Infection, bleeding, problems with anesthesia
- Delayed growth/development
- Learning problems
- Reproductive problems/infertility
- Recurrence of cancer
- Increased risk of other cancers in adulthood

In 2009, the average hospital stay for pediatric cancer treatment was 8 days!

These stays cost 5 times what the average stay costs for other conditions.

The cost per day is approximately 70% greater than the same stay for a child receiving Treatment for another condition.

There is a direct correlation between a pediatric cancer diagnosis and poverty.

1 in 5 children diagnoses already live in poverty

After diagnosis, 1 in 4 families will lose 40% of their income. This comes from a parent having to leave their job or take time off to care for the child.

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Mortality rates

Pediatric cancer is the number one cause of death for children from disease. It is second only to auto fatalities overall.

14% of children diagnosed with cancer will die within 5 years of diagnosis. Of those that survive past that, 18% will die within the next 25 years.

There is an average of 70 potential life years lost when a child dies from cancer, versus just 14 years for adults, who tend to succumb to cancer much later in life,

Some cancers have a higher survival rate than others.

The 5 year survival rate ranges for 0% for some cancer, such as DIPG, to 90% survivability for cancers such as leukemia.

What is DIPG?

Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma-aggressive brain cancer.

DIPG is almost exclusively a pediatric cancer.

DIPG accounts for roughly 80% of all pediatric brain stem tumors.

The survival rate for DIPG is 11 months post diagnosis.

The 2 year survival rate is less than 10%



World Wide, 100,000 children die every year from cancer

Children living in low to middle income countries are 4 times more likely to die from cancer than those living in high income countries.

Drug Development

Between 2009 and 2019, 9 of 11 drugs that were created to treat acute lymphoblastic leukeima, the most common form, were in and out of availability.

Of the 200 drugs approved by the FDA to treat cancer through 2021, only 35 of those were approved for use in children.

29 of those were originally approved for use only in adults. That means that only 6 drugs have been developed specifically to address the needs of children's small bodies during treatment

The median lag time for a drug to go from the first human trial phase to the first child trial phase as approved by the FDA is 6.5 years!!!

The meeting was called to order at 9 AM by DG Gocha. The invocation was offered by IVDG Leathers. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by ZC Chase.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 2/8/25 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by GMT Leathers that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. The minutes of the 4/20/24 Business meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by ZC Chase that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

Treasurer's Report- The 2024-25 YTD financial reports were presented, with a beginning balance in the admin account of \$35,621.40, income of \$18,711.92 and expenses of \$15,901.64, leaving an ending balance of \$38,431.68 as of 4/23/25. This consists of \$35,379.59 in admin and \$3,052.09 in convention funds. The projects account has a beginning balance of \$29,231.88 income of \$16,700.06 and expenses of \$17,373.58 leaving an ending balance of \$28,558.36 as of 4/21/25. It was moved by ZC Roberts, supported by IVDG Leathers that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by GMT Leathers that we continue to bank with Community Financial Credit Union in the upcoming year. Authorized signatures (two are required on checks) will be DG Marie Leathers, CST Barb Durflinger and IPDG Dennis Gocha.

Old Business- None.

New Business- Adoption of convention rules- It was moved by ZC Roberts, supported by GST Gocha that the rules as presented in the convention program be adopted. Motion carried.

<u>GET Report-</u> IPDG Murch turned in a written report, but added we need new members, new clubs and new Guiding Lions to help new clubs.

<u>GLT Report-</u> GLT Zeller reported that we are in need of VDG's and ZC's for next year. Contact incoming DG Marie Leathers if you are willing to serve, or have questions about the job requirements.

<u>GMT Report-</u> GMT Leathers turned in a written report.

GST Report- GST Gocha turned in a written report.

Zone Chair Reports- ZC Sander had no report. ZC Chase said it was a fun job, and more people should try it out. ZC Roberts reported that he had done several zone meetings, but still needs to visit three clubs .

Committee Reports- Written Reports were provided for Constitution and By-Laws- 1VDG Leathers, District Editor- Lion Dave Zimmer, Eversight- Lion Bethany Hedgepath, International Convention- IVDG Leathers, Lions of Michigan Forum- PDG Zeller- Lions of Michigan Foundation- PDG Richardson, MD-11 Convention-IPDG Murch, Peace Poster- Lion Jean Manning Pediatric Cancer- Lion Rebecca James, USA/Canada Forum-PDG Zeller, and White Cane- Lion Shirley Hill. The following supplemented the written reports- Lion Hedgepath announced PDG Rod Leathers is doing a haircut fundraiser for Eversight, with a goal of \$5000. Please support it personally, and go back and ask your clubs for support also. Lion Rebecca James reported that the Central Lake Lions were holding a bowling fundraiser on 6/21 in Bellaire to raise money for Pediatric Cancer at the Cowell Family Cancer Center. Consider getting a team together from your club to help with this fund raiser.

Oral Reports- All State Band-Lion Kris Hoeksema reported that we have 3 district students, and there are 40-50 overall. Convention Raffle- ZC Chase reported that they are still selling raffle tickets for the drawing in the afternoon. There are lots of great prizes. Credentials- PDG Richardson reported that as of the cabinet meeting 28 delegates were certified from 11 clubs. District Convention- GST Gocha reported that there were 76 people preregistered for the convention. Last night at the service project we packed 360 bags with personal care products. 150 will go to the Women's resource Center, and the rest were provided to clubs to take back for use in their communities. Elections/Nominations- PDG Richardson reported that we are all ready for the elections this afternoon. Nominations were received for DG, and for Lions of Michigan Foundation, but we will need to try to fill both Vice District Governor positions from the floor. LCIF- PDG Gaines reported that he has been attending state/area meetings. We have not made our 24-25 goal yet, but many clubs contribute at the end of the year. Our % of goal right now is the highest in the state.

<u>Audience Comments</u> PDG Leathers reminded clubs of the Central Lake Lions 75 anniversary party on 5/31 from 1-5 PM. It is free. More information will be provided soon. PDG Zeller reminded us to save the date-10/17/26 for the 100th anniversary celebration of the Alpena Lions Club.

PID Comments- PID Keller reminded us that we are all Lion "cousins" - one big Lion family. He has been enjoying our laid-back group. He reminded us all that there are many ways to be a Lion's Club now-virtual, across State/International borders, etc. "Your Club, Your Way."

<u>VDG Comments-</u> IVDG Leathers commended the East Jordan Lions on a great convention. Next year's convention will be hosted by the Central Lake Lions, probably at Treetops again. She noted that we need to learn from each other, which you can do by attending cabinet meetings, zone meetings and district conventions. She thinks we should try to do a service project at cabinet meetings, so if you have any ideas, let her know. She would like to see people serve on district committees- you don't have to be a committee chair. "Find Your Passion!"

<u>DG Comments</u> DG Gocha thanked everyone for coming, and said the rest of the day had great activities planned.

With no further business to conduct, the meeting was adjourned at 10 AM. The next meeting date will be announced soon.

GET Report

Lincoln Lions Club's club branch might be interested in becoming a chartered club. The branch has well over the necessary 20 members to charter and Lincoln club President Mark Feldhiser reached out to PDG Barb asking about how the branch could become a charter. Barb asked me to help Mark and I sent him the information he needed, though I have not heard back from him.

My initial attempts to get into some communities were unsuccessful. However, I have reevaluated who to contact and have developed larger community profiles on all of the communities in our district, including those where we have existing clubs. I also have developed data sheets for all 17 counties so we can try and utilize every piece of information available to us.

I have had conversations with our district GMT, PDG Rod about combining our efforts and make sure we use a team approach to both adding membership and adding clubs. We need to build a recruitment team, which can be comprised of any and all Lions who want to help grow the district. This does not have to be exclusively cabinet members, it can be anyone from any club.

One way we can grow and develop the recruitment team is to get more Lions from throughout the district to become Guiding Lions. The Guiding Lions will help usher new clubs through the process of becoming a club, but they also can help identify potential locations for new clubs. I would encourage anyone remotely interested to let me know. They can take the training online and follow the process to become certified, or if enough Lions from the district are interested we could set up either a Zoom class or find a place to bring everyone together for in-person training. The more Lions we have the better our chances of growing the district.

We could combine Guiding Lion training with other membership training and make it a recruitment team training event.

GMT Report 04-13-25

As of 04-13-25 the district membership is at 671 members. For the fiscal year we have added 82 new members but we have dropped 84 members. That puts us at a negative 2 for the year at this point. We still have a quarter to go so let's try to make it a positive number for our outgoing governor.

Council Chair Terri Huffman and our Global Membership Team Leaders challenge you to expand your club membership! Between January 29 and May 16, each club in MD 11 is asked to accept the challenge to achieve a net-positive growth of 3 new Lion members. Clubs to re_ach this goal will be added to a special drawing to receive a Melvin Jones Fellowship. The drawing will be held Friday evening, May 16, during the MD 11 Lions Convention.

GMT PDG Rod Leathers

Eversight

Spring has sprung! As you prepare your gardens, break out the sunscreen and put away the coats, hats and gloves, I invite you to take a moment to review the following key accomplishments from Eversight's first quarter of 2025.

Tissue Transplants

Every year, thousands of donors selflessly give the gift of sight to those in need. 2,406 donors gave the gift of sight as cornea/eye donors from January 1 to March 31, 2025. Below is a breakdown of how donated tissues were used.

Research & Innovationsi

Our research and development team recently created the KLAL-Pro graft, a special type of corneal transplant that helps restore sight in people with bilateral Umbal Stem Cell Deficiencies (LSCD), bilateral meaning cases when both eyes are affected.

Since we began this work, five patients have received the KLAL-Pro graft, and we are thrilled to share that all of them are doing well and have regained their vision. These early successes confirm that the KLAL-Pro graft is effectively delivering the healthy stem cells needed for healing.

The next steps for this project are to **expand our research** to collect more patient data and further refine the treatment and **bring KLAL-Pro to developing countries** where access to vision-restoring procedures is limited.

We have already confirmed that the grafts **remain viable for over 72 hours**, making it possible to ship them internationally, At the same time, we are working on ways to strengthen the stem cells so they can help patients recover their vision even faster.

This breakthrough has the potential to transform lives worldwide, and we're excited to keep you updated as we make further progress.

Education & Training

Education and training are critical to Eversight's impact. Many of the surgeons we train come from regions without self-sufficient eye banking systems. For some, Eversight's training is their only opportunity to learn advanced techniques that will transform patient care in their home countries. By equipping them with these life-changing skills, we help ensure that more people around the world have access to the vision-restoring care they need.

From January 1-March 31, 2025, Eversight staff held 18 educational wet lab trainings for 148 surgeons, residents and fellows at partner institutions on four common types of comea transplant procedures:

Global Development

From January 1-March 31, 2025, Eversight placed 1,111 tissues at greatly reduced or no cost in countries around the world who would otherwise not have access to these tissues.

Also, as part of Eversight's ongoing work to develop a self-sufficient, in-country cornea donation program to meet the need in Pakistan, Eversight's Vice President for Global Development, Collin Ross, recently held a successful interview with a local reporter which ran in national newspaper *Dawn*. Press releases resulting from this appearance were featured across Pakistani media outlets, lending momentum to the effort.

Editor's Notes — 2025 by Lion David J. Zimmer

MAY 2025 — Environment & DNA

April began with the devastation of the Ice Hurricane. The first few days nearly everyone had no electirc power, except those with a generator. Many people were without power for weeks, and the connection to the internet took even longer to come back on for some. April had 19 days of 32 degrees or lower temperatures in this area. Only 12 days had high temperatures above 52 degrees, the halfway temperature between 32 degrees and 72 degrees. There were 5 days of temperatures above 60 degrees, including a 72 and a 75 degree high. On April 29, the high was 72 degrees here, and the low dropped to 32 degrees on the same day.

All in all, it's been a cold Spring season. It must be rough on the many workers putting up downed power lines or removing trees and limbs off roads, yards, and hiking and biking trails. We need these people and what they do, and we need to recognize their service to our areas. The cleanup of millions of trees and branches will take months, or years. At least May will be warmer for the cleanup crews.

There is no doubt that the weather is changing as our planet gets a little warmer each year. I say "a little warmer" as many areas don't feel much warmer, maybe even cooler like our own Winter and Spring this year, while other areas have suffered in 3 digit temperatures.

Environment is one of the Lions Cubs major causes. We need to understand the Environment if we are "to protect the environment to create healthier communities and a more sustainable world." The Environment is basically everything surrounding us; air, earth, fire, water, all life forms. We humans are part of the Environment. We can't control the Environment, but we can affect it, for good or bad.

Most scientists who researched global warming found that the warming is, if not the total reason because of our pollution and gases being released into the air from human activity, at least a helping addition to plantery warming. For several decades the earth is getting an average of 1 or more degrees warmer. Some areas on the planet may have raised only a 1/2 degree, while somewhere else the degrees have raised 1 and 1/2 or 2 degrees. But what ever the warming is at, every air and water molecule is getting warmer. Heat is energy, and a temperature rise that occurs around a 1 degree average in every square inch of air on the planet is a HUGE amount of energy. It results in stronger winds, more potent storms, hurricanes, and tornadoes, droughts, floods. The jet streams high in the sky grow stronger, pushing winter arctic air to southern states, or carry warm air to the arctic and melt glaciers. All these things have happened recently. The Ice Hurricane was that energy powered storm in north Michigan. There will likely be even more energy, and even more devastating events if the warming continues. Melting arctic ice means rising oceans, and it it's very possible that the rising Atlantic waters will begin to encroach on the shores of Forida, with salt water soaking into the ground and creating undrinkable water. There is still much environment data we don't know yet.

Problems for humans are also problems for many animals. Polar bears are losing their homes as ice sheets melt away. Many polar bears have traveled south in search of food, and mated with grizzly bears, creating a new type of bear known as a "pizzly" or "grolar", identified through their DNA.

DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) is "an extremely long macromolecule, the main component of chromosomes and is the material that transfers genetic characteristics in all life forms, constructed of two nucleotide strands coiled around each other in a ladderlike arrangement." We mostly think of DNA as charting family ancesters, or as a police clue found in hair, blood, or saliva at crime scenes that identify the criminal. There is much more to DNA used in medical and scientific research.

Scientists found a rare tyrannosaurus rex bone that hadn't been fossilized, and found DNA that turned out to be closest to chickens and ostriches. Now scientists no longer consider all birds to be relatives of dinosaurs, they <u>are</u> dinosaurs that survived the dinosaur extinction and mutated into today's birds.

DNA confirms that Chimpanzees share 98.8% of the same genes with humans, which isn't surprising. Fungi were once considered a type of plants, but fungi got it's own kingdom in 1969. Further DNA research found that fungi are genetically closer to humans than to plants — fungi share a common ancestor more than a billion years ago. Humans share roughly 50% of our DNA with average fungi.

Our environment is yet a mystery to be solved, with DNA having many surprises yet to reveal.

Top left: Trees still standing at Viewland, but showing the damage of broken limbs and torn off tops.

2 photos above: Trees downed along the Bear River park. Many trees snapped off the trunk, and many were uprooted, all taken down by the heavy ice and strong winds.

2 photos on the left: The Viewland was designated as a dumping point for tree limbs. The first picture shows the massive tree limbs piled on the left side. The piled tree limbs are picked up and dumped into a shredder, and shredded wood is carried up a conveyer to the top of the mound. The bottom picture shows the Viewland a few days after the other photo. The trees were gone from the parking area, with the shredded mound still there. The shredded wood is supposed be taken to Gaylord to be burned for creating electricity power.
