

Hillman's Barb Durflinger honored with S.A. Dodge Award at Lions convention

Hillman Lion Barb Durflinger was honored with the S.A. Dodge Distinguished Service Award at the Michigan Lions Convention held May 15 to 17 in Bay City. The Dodge award, a lifetime achievement award, is the highest award a Lion can receive in the state of Michigan.

Durflinger joined the Benton Harbor-Fairplain Lions in 1988, and served as a board

District Governor. She served four terms as District All-State Band Chair. She coordinated the district "Cents for Sandy" fundraiser to support the victims of Hurricane Sandy. She served as District Lions Clubs International Foundation Chair from 2015 to 2024. She chaired the District's relief efforts for the victims of the Gaylord tornado, securing over \$40,000 to assist in both

member, secretary, or treasurer every year. She also served as a board member on the Benton Harbor Lions Foundation. She served as District 11-B2 cabinet secretary/treasurer three times.

In 2004, Durflinger transferred into the Hillman Lions Club when she and husband Duane retired and moved to northern Michigan. She has served as Hillman Lions treasurer for a number of years. She initiated the "Adopt a Class" program to work with fifth graders in both Hillman and Rogers City. She initiated the weekend food backpack programs for needy children in Hillman Schools, Rogers City Schools and Atlanta Schools. She chairs the monthly pop-up pantry food distribution in Hillman which feeds 200 families per month. This program was recently expanded to do food distributions twice a month. In 2024, 250,000 pounds of food were distributed.

Durflinger's service to District 11-E2 (17 counties in northern Michigan) includes serving as cabinet secretary/treasurer 13 times, zone chair, region chair, Vice District Governor and



immediate relief and reconstruction. She has conducted the treasurer training for District 11-E2 for the past 10 years. She is a Certified Guiding Lion. She served three terms as a Lions of Michigan Foundation trustee, and has served as assistant treasurer of the Foundation since 2018.

Durflinger has received numerous Lions awards including a Melvin Jones Fellowship, a Noel Fellowship, a Helen Keller Fellowship, and a Lautzenheiser Fellowship. She was named Lion of the Year in 1993 in the Benton Harbor Lions Club, and Lion of the Year in 2005 in the Hillman Lions Club. She has received six International President's Certificates of Appreciation, the International Presidential Award and the International Leadership Award, as well as multiple District Governor Certificates of Appreciation. She was inducted into the Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame in 2023.

In addition to her Lions service, Durflinger is the treasurer of the Hillman Chamber of Commerce and volunteers at the Brush Creek Mill.





JUNE 2025 — Smokey Skies Again

June brings the official calendar beginning of Summer on June 20. The Summer Solstice offers the longest day of daylight for the year; after the Solstice the amount of daylight begins to get shorter. The weather was cooler this May, not really cold, but a few degrees lower than average, especially the lower temperatures below temperature average.

While we marveled at the rapidity of the plants and trees bursting with flowers and green leaves in late May, we've also been visited by several days of air quality alerts as the skies are filled with smoke. The following data is from AccuWeather.com:

Massive wildfires burning out of control in western and central Canada are forcing thousands to flee as dire forecasts for the country's fire season come to fruition. The intensifying blazes are also sending hazardous smoke toward major cities in the United States. Manitoba and Saskatchewan have declared states of emergency, and much of Canada, from the Northwest Territories and Alberta to Ontario, are at "extreme" risk of wildfires — the highest level on Environment Canada's fire risk scale.

There are just over 170 wildfires burning across Canada as of Thursday (May 29), according to the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Center, and about half are uncontrolled. The country raised its National Preparedness Level to level 5 of 5 on Thursday, which is unusually high for this early in the fire season. Last year, Canada didn't reach that level until July 15.

Climate change is leading to an increase in wildfire risk days, as well as more frequent and larger fires that exhibit more extreme wildfire behavior.

Canada had its worst wildfire season on record in 2023, when extreme heat and drought helped propel blazes that burned more than 45 million acres. Last year's fire season was Canada's second-worst of the century. Some of those blazes also sent thick, hazardous smoke into US cities.

This year, wildfires have burned more than 1.58 million acres in Canada, about 40% above the 10-year average for this point in the year.

Nearly 90% of the acreage burned has been in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, though there are many ongoing blazes in British Columbia and Alberta as well, where some evacuations are underway. In Saskatchewan, about 250,000 acres have burned during each of the past two days. About 430,000 acres—an area twice the size of New York City—have burned in Manitoba since Sunday alone. Manitoba has already seen about four times the average acres burned for this time of year, according to the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Center.

The smoke plume from fires in the region covered over half a million square miles on Thursday (May 29), which is double the size of Texas. Computer models show smoke from the western Canadian blazes will spread into the Upper Midwest and Great Lakes Friday and throughout the weekend, potentially affecting the cities of Green Bay, Wisconsin, Milwaukee, Chicago and Detroit.

The smoke will likely be in the lower to middle levels of the atmosphere, which could lower visibility and crater air quality in some areas.

Authorities in Minnesota issued an air quality alert for the northern half of the state, warning that fine particle levels are expected to reach "a level considered unhealthy for everyone." A similar alert is in effect in far northern Michigan and throughout Wisconsin for Friday (May 30). Minnesota's Arrowhead region had the poorest air quality in the nation on Friday morning due to the smoke.

Some of the mid-and-low-level smoke could linger through the weekend in parts of the Midwest, according to the National Weather Service, while projections show a high-level smoke plume plunging even further south across the Plains. High-level smoke – which doesn't affect air quality – has spread across the Northern Plains, shielding the sun slightly and potentially creating vibrant sunrises and sunsets.

More smoky days could be ahead for millions this summer. Canada's seasonal wildfire forecast called for well above-average blazes, and much of the western U.S., too, will have above-normal wildfire potential by July, according to National Interagency Fire Center forecasts.

Are we fated to be threatened by smokey air every Summer by wildfires from Canada and our own western states? Our environment seems to be aided by human activity as well as negative natural things that come to pass. We can't control Nature, but we can work with it, if we learn to cherish it.


