Be sure to nominate one of your club's service projects for the Kindness Matters Service Award. The nomination form explains the process and requirements. Please email your nominations prior to the August 23 cabinet meeting, or you can bring them with you to the cabinet meeting where you will have a chance to promote your club's nomination and vote on which project will move on to the state level.

If your club qualifies for the 2024-25 Cllub Excellence Award, the completed application must be submitted by August 31. Please note that the <u>2025-26 qualifications</u> are changing, and includes participation in the "Weeks of Service" initiative: Mental Health and Well Being October 4-12, Hunger January 3-11 and Environment April 18-26, so be sure to plan accordingly.

Last but not least, I'm so excited that our district is applying for a \$150,000 LCIF Hunger Grant to purchase equipment for the new Food Bank of Eastern Michigan facility coming to Gaylord. This facility will directly and indirectly impact every county in our district. We plan to have a representative at our cabinet meeting, so be sure to be there with all your questions!



KINDNESS MATTERS SERVICE AWARD PROGRAM GUIDELINES AND NOMINATION FORM

















This service award is designed for clubs that create high-impact service projects within one of the Lions International global causes: childhood cancer, diabetes, disaster relief, environment, hunger, humanitarian, vision or youth.

Overall objectives include:

- Encouraging creativity and recognizing high-impact service projects
- Rewarding clubs for high-caliber service activities within each of the Lians International global causes.

Eligibility

A total of 30 nominations will be awarded at the club level with a minimum of three awards reserved for Leo clubs. Eligible nominations must:

- Remain in active status
- Report their project(s) in the previous Lion year via the Lian Portal by July 31.
- Not have received the award within the previous three Lian years.

Criterio

Award consideration will be given to clubs performing service that:

- Addresses at least one of the Lions International global causes: childhood concer, diabetes, disaster relief, environment, humanitarian, hunger, vision or youth.
- Demonstrates creativity and innovation
- Achieves impact of scale and long-term sustainability
- Uses Lions International's values to shape positive experiences and create engagement and connection with the Lions brand (this is also known as "elevating the Lions brand")

HOW TO RATE NOMINATIONS

The following section will help the district and multiple district levels rate received naminations to determine which naminations advance to the next level.

Please note: It is recommended to assemble the district cobinet at the district level and the council of governors at the multiple district level to help determine which naminated service projects advance to the next level.

Rating questions to consider when reviewing nominations

Ratings should be considered on a scale from 1-5 (1-lowest; 5-highest) for the following criteria on how well the nominated service project:

- Addresses needs within the Lians International global causes: childhood concer, diabetes, disaster relief, environment, humanitarian, hunger, vision or youth.
- Demonstrates creativity
- Demonstrates innovation
- Achieves impact of scale.
- Achieves long-term sustainability
- Elevates the Lions brand

THE NOMINATION PROCESS

The nomination process starts at the club level, then moves to the district and then multiple district. Nominations must be sent via small to the next level with signatures to be considered complete.

Once the nomination is complete, and has received all appropriate signatures, the Multiple District Global Service Team (MD GST) coordinator is to email the completed nomination form to Lions International at ServiceActivities@lionsclubs.org by October 31 from their email address listed in the Lion Portal. Nominations that are not amailed directly from the MD GST coordinator to Lions International and are without signatures will not qualify.

What about undistricted clubs and clubs in single districts?

For single district clubs: The nomination must be signed by the District Global Service Team (D GST) coordinator, and then sent to a GAT Area Leader for endorsement. Once a GAT Area Leader endorses the nomination, he/she should email it to Lions International at ServiceActivities@lionsclubs.org from their email address listed in the Lion Portal.

For undistricted clubs: After the service project has been nominated at the club level, the Coordinating Lion is to send the nomination to the GAT Aren Leader for approval. If there is no Coordinating Lion, nominations can be endorsed directly by a GAT Area Leader. Once a GAT Area Leader endorses the nomination, he/she should email it to Lions International at ServiceActivities@lionsclubs.org from their email address listed in the Lion Partal.

KINDNESS MATTERS SERVICE AWARD PROGRAM GUIDELINES AND NOMINATION FORM

TIMELINE

The following timeline is a recommended guide for each step of the process for submitting a nomination to Lions International. Once all signature criteria have been completed, nominations may be sent to Lions International anytime between July 1 — October 31.

*July 31: Clubs are to report their service projects from the previous Lion year via the Lion Portal by July 31.

Club



July 1 - August 1

The dub service chairperson (or the Lea dub president) nominates a single service project that their club completed in the previous Lian year. If there's no dub service chairperson, a dub cabinet member or officer can nominate a service project. Additionally, the club president (or Lea club advisor) must sign the nomination, and the dub service chairperson (or the Lea dub president) must send the signed nomination to the next level district Global Service Team (D GST) coordinator electronically.

District



August 1 - September 1

The D GST coordinator selects one Lion service project and one Lea service project from their district to move forward. If there's no D GST coordinator, then a district governor can endouse the project. The endorser should consult with the district cabinet about their Lion and Lea nominations. Signatures are required from the D GST coordinator to complete the nomination. The D GST coordinator must then send the nomination to the multiple district Global Service Team (MD GST) coordinator electronically.

Multiple District



September 1 - October 1

The MD GST coordinator selects a single Lion service project and a single Lea service project from their multiple district. If there's no MD GST coordinator, then the council chairperson con endorse the project. Signatures are required from the MD GST coordinator to complete the namination.

October 1 - October 31 deadline

The MD GST coordinator is to email the nomination to Lians International at ServiceActivities@liansdubs.org from their email address listed in the Lian Portal. The final month is designated for the MD GST to verify the full nomination form and ensure all required information is occurate before sending it to Lians International. Nominations are due October 31.

Lions International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee

January

Winning dubs are selected by the Lians International Board of Directors Service Activities Committee and notified of their award.

March

Winning dubs receive their award from Lions International.

WINNER RECOGNITION

Below are ways MD GSTs and district governors can help recognize and celebrate award winners:

- Winning dubs will be notified by January
- Recognize the winner in your local Lices or Leas publications and social media outlets. This will help promote your dub and create community support of your service project!
 - Use our piess release to announce the winner.
 - Indude a picture of the club in action at their service project!
 - Kote the specific successes of the project.
- Ensure that the award is presented to the winning club at a prestigious event by the highest-ranking officer.
 - Invite the media to attend this event!

NOMINATION FORM RULES

- The nomination form must be submitted with all the sections complete, and all appropriate endorsements and signatures included. Nomination forms submitted without completed information and/or the proper endorsements and signatures will not be eligible.
- The service project description answers must have a minimum of 200 words per question, and a maximum of 2,000 words. An additional typewritten supplemental document in black ink may be submitted, if more space is needed.
- Any additional items like photos or videos are highly encouraged as supplemental documents but are not required.
- The remaining sections of the nomination form must be typewritten in block ink.
- All signatures must be electronically signed or typed.
- Multiple districts may submit one Lions club and one Leo club nomination per year.
- Lions club and Leo club nominations should be submitted separately.
- The service project must have been completed in the provious Lion year to be considered for the award.
- The service project must be reported in the Lian Portal by July 31.




Message from the President

11-E2 DISTRICT NEWS



Hunger Grant

District 11-E2 is in the process of applying for a Hunger Grant of \$150,000 to purchase equipment for the new Food Bank of Eastern Michigan facility being built in Gaylord. The grant requires a \$50,000 match from Lions Clubs, which would raise a total of \$200,000 for the FBEM project.

The new facility will directly serve most of the clubs in our district, with the exception of a few on the far west of the district. However, those clubs not directly serviced will receive a benefit from this facility also as the FBEM will be providing space and assistance to Feeding America of West Michigan at this facility, so that they may better serve their northern clients.

So far we have \$9,291.59 in LCIF Community Impact Grant funds which are eligible to be used as a match for this grant, \$6,535.87 from the district hunger fund, the Oscoda Lions have pledged \$2,000, the Central Lake Lions have pledged \$1,000 and the Hillman Lions have pledged \$1,000, for a total of \$19,827.46 toward the \$50,000 match. We are asking all of our 11-E2 clubs to pledge something toward this project. The grant request will be submitted in October, and will go to the LCI board in January 2026. The matching funds need to be collected by the time the grant goes to the board, so we have until the end of this calendar year to collect funds. The FBEM will be visiting the Council of Governor' meeting in August to explain the project, and we will be asking for support from other districts and clubs who will receive a benefit from the new facility. It will also be on the agenda at the 8/23 cabinet meeting and we may ask the FBEM to be there also for a presentation.

This project is a \$12 million facility which will greatly benefit food insecure people in Northern Michigan. It will make it possible for food collection from farmers, grocery stores, etc, that are not possible now from the Flint facility, and it will greatly reduce the FBEM' costs to deliver food to their northern clients. Hunger is one of the eight service areas supported by Lions International, and we would very much like our district to support this long-term project.

Please talk this over with your club members, and let DG Marie Leathers or CST Barb Durflinger know what your pledge amount will be, or you may just send a check made out to Lions District 11-E2 with the notation that it is for the Hunger Grant. AUGUST: Summer 2025 — Fingerprints?

August is the last full month in the Summer season. We are in the middle part of the Summer Season called the "Dog Days", the period between early July and early September, when Sirius, known as the "Dog Star", rises and sets with the sun. Ancient Romans were aware of Sirius rising and setting with the sun, and called this phenomenon dies caniculares. This Latin was translated as "dog days" in the first half of the 1500s.

Hot, sultry summer weather marked by people slowed down by lethargy, inactivity, idleness or inaction is usually expected during Dog Days. And boy, are we getting it this year. Every week of July had at least 2 days with temperatures in the 80s in northern Michigan. After a colder Spring this year, these Summer Dog Days have been brutally hotter than normal up here. For some of the "sweatbirds" who come up north to escape the 3 digit temperatures of the southern states the 80s are nothing new, something they're used to. But to many of us northern Michiganders the heat is difficult and curtails our outdoors activities.

Ironically, Superman gets his energy, strength and powers from our yellow sun, but for many of us the heat of the sun sucks the energy out of our bodies - the sun can be our kryptonite if we get too much of its ultraviolet radiation and heat that requires medical care.

The other thing that has made Summer less great this year is the air quality, which has often been less than good due to the widlfires in Canada and the U.S. Air quality, which has been a part of weather forecasts in recent years, tells us when ozone, pollen or pollutant particles small enough to enter our bloodstream from wildfires, smokestacks, or dust particles are in the air. People who are sensitive to particle pollution may experience respiratory symptoms while others aren't affected.

The U.S. Air Quality Index (AQI) is a tool for communicating about outdoor air quality and health. The AQI is divided into six categories, with each category showing a different level of health concern. Each category also has a specific color, which makes it easy for people to quickly determine whether air quality is reaching unhealthy levels in their communities.

The AQI categories:

Green: 0 to 50 — Good, air quality is satisfactory.

Yellow: 51 to 100 — Moderate, air quality is acceptable, but may be a risk for some people.

Orange: 101 to 150 — Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups, the general public is less likely to be affected.

151 to 200 — Unhealthy, members of the general public may experience health effects.

Red:

Purple: 201 to 300 — Very Unhealthy, health alert: The risk of health effects is increased for everyone. Maroon: 301 and higher — Hazardous, health warning of emergency conditions: Everyone is more likely to be affected.

There have been many Good days this summer, but Moderate and Unhealthy for sensitive groups have been affected by the air quality several days when the winds carry the wildfire smoke into northern Michigan. The smoke gives the air a haze in the area that has been around for weeks. This pollution of the Environment is one problem that science, and we Lions, can't fix — yet.

For something different: I came across an article on a website recently about fingerprints, and that several other mammals have fingerprints. They developed the "swirly microscopic grooves" that help grasp for climbing trees or getting fruits or leaves that they eat. Our close relatives that share our evolutionary tree, such as chimpanzees and gorillas, also developed fingerprints similar to ours. But there is one mammal that has fingerprints that are most identical to humans.



ANSWER: 4. Koala

The Koala, not a primate and far away from our evolutionary tree, was discovered by researchers at the University of Adelaide in Australia in 1996 to have the prints most similar to our own. Koalas are arboreal marsupials, *Phascolarctos cinereus*, from Australia, far from primates and humans.

Koalas' survival depends on their ability to climb small branches of eucalyptus trees and grab their leaves, the only food they eat. Their development of fingerprints over millions of years helped them be able to get their food. Somehow, their prints are like ours, a coincidence of Nature indeed.
