Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts with annual gross receipts less than US\$50,000 that are not required to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as the 990-N). Please be advised this filing relates specifically to the 501(c)(4). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

2024-2025 Tax Year*	Form to File
Gross receipts normally \$50,000 or less	990-N
Gross receipts greater than \$50,000 and less than \$200,000, and	990-EZ or 990
total assets less than \$500,000	
Gross receipts \$200,000 or greater or total assets \$500,000 or greater	990

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by November 15 each year. Please note that an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may apply for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an EIN online, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.

Please note that Lions Clubs International is not authorized to provide guidance regarding your club's filing. Dear Leader Dog Community,

We're proud to share a significant step forward in the fight for equal access. On September 12, 2025, the U.S. Department of Justice filed a lawsuit against Uber Technologies Inc., alleging violations of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The complaint outlines discriminatory practices against passengers with disabilities, including those traveling with service animals and using mobility devices and seeking \$125 million in damages.

The lawsuit highlights repeated ride denials, improper fees, and failure to provide reasonable accommodations, resulting in missed appointments, delays, and unsafe conditions for riders with disabilities.

This action is a direct result of the determination and advocacy of individuals across the blindness community including many Leader Dog clients who have consistently reported discrimination and demanded change. Their courage and persistence are driving this progress.

At Leader Dogs for the Blind, we stand firmly with our clients and the broader disability community. We remain committed to supporting efforts that challenge discrimination and promote accessibility, independence, and inclusion.

October: 2025 — Knowing Kindness / Coywolves

October is the turning month, when weather turns autumnal, trees change their colors and drop their leaves, and the final day of the month give us the trick or treat of Halloween. Summer weather may linger early in October, but we are usually given a taste of the coming winter later in the month. In fact, this year up to 8.8" of snow fell on some mountain areas in Colorado on Sep. 23, so anything may happen in October as well. Also, some weather forecasts say that the coming Winter will be colder and have more snow — a winter that could be like the winters were decades ago.

One of the things that Lions are known for is Serving others in need with Kindness as we know it. However, there is a lot more to Kindness than we are aware of. I researched what Kindness is, how it works, and why it matters, and learned a lot I didn't know.

Definition of Kindness:

Kindness is the quality of being **friendly**, **generous**, **considerate**, and **compassionate** toward others—without expecting anything in return. It's a deliberate act that benefits others, often with emotional or practical support, and can be as simple as a smile or as profound as a life-changing gesture.

How Kindness Works — Psychologically, Socially, and Biologically

1. Psychologically

- Builds empathy: Kindness opens the door to understanding others' feelings and perspectives.
- **Boosts well-being**: Both giver and receiver of kindness experience increased happiness, reduced stress, and even decreased symptoms of depression and anxiety.
- Strengthens identity: Acts of kindness reinforce positive self-image and purpose.
- Builds trust and connection: Kindness helps form and strengthen relationships and communities.
- Inspires others: It's contagious—witnessing or receiving kindness often inspires people to "pay it forward."
- Creates safe environments: Consistent kindness fosters cultures of respect, safety, and cooperation.

3. Biologically

- Activates the brain's reward system: Kindness releases feel-good chemicals like dopamine, oxytocin, and serotonin.
- Lowers cortisol (stress hormone): Leading to reduced blood pressure and a healthier heart.
- Promotes longevity: Studies suggest people who engage in regular kind behavior may live longer.

Examples of Kindness in Action:

- Listening without interrupting
- Offering help to someone without being asked.
- Forgiving someone who hurt you.
- Giving time, not just things.
- Being kind to yourself (self-compassion)

Why Kindness Matters:

In a world dominated by competition, division (racism, sexism, bigotry, etc.) indifference, lying, corruption, and violence (war, domestic violence, assassinations, shootings in schools and churches), a quiet force that heals, connects, and uplifts is severely needed. Kindness is a universal language that doesn't require words—and its impact often reaches far beyond what we can see. The world <u>really needs</u> Lions Serving with Kindness.

Something I never heard before: **Coywolves**. A **coywolf** is a hybrid animal — the result of interbreeding between **coyotes** (canis latrans) and **eastern wolves** (canis lycaon or canis lupus lycaon) — and sometimes with **domestic dogs** (canis familiaris). The term "**coywolf**" refers to an intermixed hybrid canid that contains genetic material from coyotes (60–70%), eastern wolves (20–25%), and domestic dogs (10–15%).

Coywolves emerged naturally in eastern North America over the last 100 years because of habitat loss and persecution reduced gray and eastern wolf populations – Coyotes, originally native to the western U.S., Expanded eastward in the early 20th century – Coyotes moved into areas where eastern wolves were still present (especially southern Ontario and Quebec), and the two species interbred – Occasional mating with

domestic dogs add dog DNA to the mix. Wolves, coyotes, and dogs all belong to the the genus *Canis* and are closely related, so they can interbreed and produce fertile offspring.

Coywolves now inhabit much of eastern North America, including Southeaster Canada's Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and U. S. states New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Maine, New Jersey, Maryland, and Virginia. They are especially common in urban and suburban areas such as Toronto,

Boston and New York City where they've adapted remarkably well.

<u>Coywolves traits</u>: Larger than western coyotes (up to 55 lbs), but smaller than wolves; More social than coyotes, and sometimes form packs like wolves; Better at hunting deer and living in urban areas than pure coyotes; More genetically diverse, which may help them adapt to changing environments.

Are there any coywolves in Michigan? Yes — coywolves are present in Michigan, though they're not officially classified as a separate species here. They're well adapted to both rural and suburban areas — including much of Lower and Upper Michigan. So while you won't see "coywolf" listed as a species by the DNR, the animals people call coywolves do exist here — they're the typical "coyotes" you might encounter in Michigan today.

Another of Nature's gifts to our planet and the creatures that live on it.
