COVID Update: COVID "Almost Over"?

While COVID-19 cases are dropping in most places, it is still a threat to those with compromised immune systems and the non-vaccinated. In our own District there have been 715 new cases and 30 deaths in the last month. COVID has taken the lives of over 6.5 million people world wide, with over 1 million of those victims in the U.S.A. – and these statistics are most probably much less than the actual numbers.

A few other takes on the COVID status:

- More than 90 million cases have been confirmed in the U.S., according to NBC News count. New cases are rising, and the country has averaged between 100,000 and 130,000 new cases per day since August 1. -- (Sep 23, 2022)
- The COVID-19 pandemic has effected the life expectancy for the U.S. population. In 2020 life expectancy was 77.0 years, a decrease of 1.8 years from 2019. The age-adjusted death rate increased by 16.8% from 715.2 deaths per 100,000 standard population in 2019 to 835.4 in 2020. Age-specific death rates increased from 2019 to 2020 for each age group 15 years and over.
- Despite many people trying to ignore COVID and get back to "normalcy", some adamantly disagree that the pandemic is over, pointing out that COVID-19 remains a public health emergency in the United States, the World Health Organization still considers it a global pandemic, and most significantly, the virus is still killing over 400 people a day in the U.S

As if COVID wasn't enough of a health threat that will continue at some level for the foreseeable future, the CDC issued this Monkeypox Update: As of Sept 27th, 66,551 confirmed or probable monkeypox cases have been identified in over 106 countries around the world, including 25,341 in the US. Lets hope this isn't yet another Virus of the Year to contend with...

The Trouble With Duality

<u>Definition: Duality</u> — the state or quality of being two or in two parts; dichotomy; duality refers to having two parts, often with opposite meanings. Duality infers that every aspect of life is created from a balanced interaction of opposite and competing powers.

Our world is often seen in terms of duality: day or night; fight or flight; high or low; hot or cold; up or down; hard or soft; black or white; truth or lies; fast or slow; right or left (or wrong); good or evil; and so on. All these and more dualities exist, and many of these things we encounter every day in some fashion.

The problem is that too many people take the extreme position side of one duality part and ignore or rail against the opposite part and those who respond to that opposite part. Humans tend to embrace one idea of a duality choice and close their minds to anything else to maintain their comfort zone.

Racism is one example of some people stuck in a "black or white" mind trap, unable to conceive that we're all human beings regardless of skin color. Some people want to believe con men are telling the truth, not lying. Others refuse to believe those telling the truth, believing they're lying. We believe what we want to believe because of what we've been taught or experienced, and close our minds to anything else. An open mind is curious, ready to investigate what is not known, and able to change thoughts and beliefs if new data is found.


The reality of duality is that it deals with opposite extremes, while ignoring all that exists between the extreme opposites. In nature, the duality process of day turning to night doesn't occur like flipping a light switch on or off. Between day and night is the twilight time in the middle. The natural colors of black and white are opposites separated by thousands of shades of gray. Medium temperatures fill the space between to cold and too hot. The common belief is that a prey animal encountering a predator has the duality choice of fight or flight to survive. But there is another way many animals may avoid the predator without struggle or running away – they freeze. Animals, like deer, freeze in their tracks so the predator may not see it if it doesn't move; predators are looking for any movement that might be prey. There is a middle ground between truth and lying where we engage in both. No human has lived without at least telling a little white lie, maybe to not upset an other person. And even the greatest liars have told a truth now and then.

Duality is part of life. Keep an open mind, and realize we control our thoughts about dualities — duality does not control us. Balance is the middle path.

Pictures of the Month


