On National Assistance Dog Day, the Gary Sinise Foundation announced a \$350,000 grant to Leader Dogs for the Blind to support our service of veterans, defenders and first responders who are blind or visually impaired with highly skilled guide dogs.

"The Gary Sinise Foundation is proud to expand our efforts of support to our nation's veterans, defenders and first responders, specifically those experiencing blindness or vision loss," said Mike Thirtle, CEO of the Gary Sinise Foundation. "Through our partnership with Leader Dogs for the Blind, several Leader Dogs will be raised and trained to assist those we serve, helping them to regain their freedom and independence. And for all they have sacrificed for our country and communities, as our Founder Gary Sinise would say, 'we can always do a little more."

"The support of the Gary Sinise Foundation will directly help veterans and first responders who are blind, visually impaired or Deafblind," said Lion Susan Daniels, CEO of Leader Dogs for the Blind. "The impact of working with a guide dog reaches beyond the recipient to their family, friends and community. As each recipients' self-confidence and travel skills grow, so does their family's comfort knowing their loved one is safe and traveling independently with their Leader Dog by their side."

puppies in the past. "When we heard that
the Gary Sinise Foundation was sponsoring
puppies, we immediately wanted to be a
part of the partnership," said Laura Fisher.
"My husband, Paul, is an Army veteran and I
work for Leader Dog. It's like raising one of
these special puppies in our home was
meant to be."

This will be the 23rd puppy that Linda and Tony Gimble of Moline, IL have raised. "We are already great supporters of Leader Dogs for the Blind and to be able to raise a puppy sponsored by the Gary Sinise Foundation just makes this more special to us," said Linda Gimble. "Our son retired after 20 years in the Air Force, and this is a way for our family to honor his service and the service of millions of others like him."







Detroit Free Press names Eversight a winner of the Michigan Top Workplaces 2022 award

ANN ARBOR, Mich., November 21, 2022 – Eversight, a nonprofit eye bank dedicated to restoring sight and preventing blindness worldwide through donation, transplantation and research, has been named a 2022 Top Workplace in Michigan through the Detroit Free Press Top Workplaces competition. This recognition is based solely on employee feedback gathered through a third-party survey administered by employee engagement technology partner, Energage LLC. The confidential survey uniquely measures 15 culture drivers that are critical to the success of any organization, including alignment, execution and connection.

Eversight celebrates 75 years of restoring sight through donation, transplantation, and research

The Michigan Eye-Bank and Illinois Eye-Bank and formed a partnership in 1985.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (WILX) - Working to restore sight and prevent blindness through the healing power of donation, transplantation, and research, Eversight is celebrating 75 years.

Nonprofit eye banks were established in every state, often by Lions Clubs to meet the critical demand for corneal tissue to treat preventable blindness.

The Michigan Eye-Bank and Illinois Eye-Bank formed a partnership in 1985. This partnership earned them a reputation for clinical excellence in the eye banking field according to their website. Eversight also partners with Gift of Life Michigan, Lions Clubs, surgeons, businesses and philanthropists throughout Michigan

In addition to recovering, evaluating, and providing human eye tissue for transplantation, Eversight also does the following:

- Supports academic research into the causes and cures of blinding eye conditions
- Conducts eye banking research to provide innovative solutions for surgeons and their patients
- Promotes donation awareness through public and professional education
- Provides humanitarian aid to people around the world in need of sight-restoring transplants
- Partners with local governments and medical professionals in countries seeking to establish independent, sustainable eye banking infrastructure
- Educates technicians, surgeons and other clinicians on the latest eye banking and transplant technique

According to Eversight's website, they have worked with families of 1,682 Michigan residents who gave the gift of sight for transplantation research and education as cornea donors in 2020.

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 AM by DG Leathers. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Murch. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by ZC Marie Leathers.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 11/19/22 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by 1VDG Murch, supported by GST Leathers that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>- The YTD 2022-23 financial reports were presented, showing a beginning balance in the admin account of \$38,625.41, income of \$7,963.86, and expenses of \$13,996.01, leaving an ending balance in the admin account of \$32,593.26 as of 12/5/22. This consists of \$31,331.29 in admin and \$1,261.97 in convention funds. The projects account showed a beginning balance of \$32,078.77, income of \$31,387.46, and expenses of \$30,563.07, leaving an ending balance of \$32,903.16 as of 12/5/22. It was moved by GLT Zeller, supported by 1VDG Murch that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

Old Business- None

New Business- None

<u>GLT Report</u>- GLT Zeller reported that he is redoing a power point from a few years ago on keeping members active and engaged. It will be available to all clubs when completed. He also noted that the Lions of Michigan Forum in February is a great learning opportunity.

<u>GMT Report-</u> DG Leathers reported that we are at -3 for membership so far this year. He noted that the Council of Governors is talking about a state dues increase which they need to offset the membership decrease across the state.

<u>GST Report</u>- GST Marie Leathers reported that we will be providing Ziplocks for the service project at the Forum. For the state convention service project we have been asked to provide socks - 25 pairs each of men's, women's and children's. If your club can purchase some, please bring them to the district convention.

<u>Zone Chair Reports-</u> Lion Linda Gocha reported for ZC Gocha that East Jordan has three new members, and he is visiting the Boyne Lions on Wednesday. ZC Leathers reported that she visited Elk Rapids and was there for their annual community dinner.

Committee Reports

<u>Oral Reports-</u> <u>District Convention-</u> DG Leathers and PDG Durflinger reported that planning is proceeding. The forms were sent out, and are available on line. There were 14 on-line sign-ups for far.

Note: COVID-19 is clearly an ongoing phenomena that will continue to affect our national health, no matter how eagerly we want to forget it. We are in a stage of going on with our lives with a "normalcy" that in reality will include the presence of COVID. The fact that the recent variants of COVID have been much less lethal than the original and Delta strains, and that many people are taking the vaccines, have lowered the death rates. COVID now seems to be at the level with flu and the common cold instead of a deadly plague. Most people have a miserably unpleasant experience when infected, but don't die. There are always people, those with weak immune systems, the elderly, pregnant women or the already sick that will not survive the virus. Many places have virtually lessoned or stopped releasing COVID data, so that it is certain that most of the statistics are quite under-recorded, and the cases and deaths are actually much higher than what's counted. Due to these changing events, I've decided to retire the District 11-E2 COVID statistics by county. I'll keep reporting the World, U.S., and Michigan statistics data, and virus-related things that are happening.

UPDATE: State of COVID-19

The COVID Omicron XBB.1.5 variant is rapidly becoming dominant in the U.S. It is highly immune evasive and appears more effective at binding to cells than related subvariants, scientists say. XBB.1.5 now represents about 41% of new cases nationwide in the U.S., nearly doubling in prevalence over the past week. (CDC Info)

Post-COVID Conditions: Some people infected with the virus that causes COVID-19 can experience long-term effects from their infection, known as post-COVID conditions (PCC) or long COVID – conditions also called by many names, including: long-haul COVID, post-acute COVID-19, post-acute sequelae of SARS CoV-2 infection (PASC), long-term effects of COVID, and chronic COVID. The working definition of post-COVID conditions was developed by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in collaboration with CDC and other partners.

What You Need to Know

- Post-COVID conditions can include a wide range of ongoing health problems; these conditions can last weeks, months, or years.
- Post-COVID conditions are found more often in people who had severe COVID-19 illness, but anyone who has been infected with the virus that causes COVID-19 can experience post-COVID conditions.
- People not vaccinated against COVID-19 and who become infected may have a higher risk of developing post-COVID conditions compared to people previously vaccinated.
- While most people with post-COVID conditions have evidence of infection or COVID-19 illness, in some
 cases, a person with post-COVID conditions may not have tested positive for the virus or known they were
 infected.
- CDC and partners are working to understand more about who experiences post-COVID conditions and why, including whether groups disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 are at higher risk. (CDC Data)

TRIVIA & QUIZ: In honor of a new year, a change of pace to have a little trivia of things I didn't know and you might not know, either. Now you will know:

People: U.S. Census Data for 2020 — People who identified as White, or in combination with another race group, comprised 235.4 million people and **71%** of the total population. Individuals who identified as Black or African American, or in combination with another race group, totaled 46.9 million people, **14.2%** of the total population. People identified as American Indian and Alaska Native, or combined with another race group, comprised 9.7 million people, **2.9%** of the total population. Americans who identified as Asian, or in combination with another race group, totaled 24 million people, **7.2%** of the total population. The people who identified as Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, in combination with another race group, made 1.6 million people and **0.5%** of the total population. (Yes, I know the percentage adds to only 95.8, not 100 — that is probably because of the individuals who didn't check any of the race boxes on the Census form.)

Eyes — Colors of Human eyes are in these percentages: Brown Eyes: **45%**. Blue Eyes: **27%**. Hazel Eyes: **18%** (Hazel eyes consist of shades of brown and green.) Green Eyes: **9%**. Other **1%**. (Other? People with albinism (which causes a lack of pigment in the skin, hair, and eyes) appear to have pink or red eyes. Other pigment variations can cause gray eyes (which are blue with flecks of gold and brown) and amber eyes (which have a yellow, golden, or coppery hue) which are extremely rare. The vast majority of babies are born with blue eyes, which alter as pigment amounts change with age.

THE BLIZZARD OF THE CENTURY

In December, 2022, people across our nation looked forward to enjoying upcoming festive holidays. The traditional Christmas songs were sung or hummed by nearly everyone, seasonal songs like "Silent Night", "Here Comes Santa Claus", and "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas". Well, Nature, fueled with Climate Change energy, brought out the biggest White Christmas, or to be more accurate, a "Whiteout Christmas" not seen before in our lifetimes.

The huge storm was technically a "bomb cyclone", a weather condition in which there is a rapid pressure drop in the low-pressure mass — by at least 24 millibars in 24 hours. This quickly increases the pressure difference, or gradient, between the two air masses, making the winds stronger. This process of rapid intensification has a name: bombogenesis.

From December 21 to December 26 the storm hit almost the entire country as it moved from the Pacific to the Atlantic, leaving heavy flooding, icy roads, up to hurricane winds, and several feet of snow in the Rockies, the northern midwest and eastern states, and into Canada. The blizzard and the related cold wave killed at least 102 people, with 41 of those deaths in the Buffalo area where lake-effect snowfall exceeded 55 inches over the five-day period. Fatalities occurred in major highway pileups, icy roads, and some from freezing to death stranded in their cars or being disoriented in the snow. or losing their heat at home - 2,670,000 had power outages. Eight people died in mid-Michigan due to the snow and cold. 18,200 flights were canceled in the U.S. for between December 22 and 28, while hundreds more were canceled in Canada. In Michigan, the highest snowfall was in Baraga, 42.8 "— in our area, Mancelona, 36.7".

So many people, U.S. and Canadian, suffered through a very un-merry Christmas, being unable to travel to family gatherings, losing power, having a car accident, sustaining wind damage to home or property, or losing a family member or a good friend. We can only hope this "once in a generation" storm is just that, something we won't see again.

- They are the largest ancestry group in 21 states, including Michigan.
- The second largest ancestry population for decades has been Irish-Americans, but the 2020 Census showed that the English-Americans were a hair's width ahead in population.
- Michigan rates Germans as the largest population, with Polish in second place.
- Frankenmuth, located just 90 miles north of Detroit, is in fact is the most German town in the USA. (Mar 26, 2021)

The following table shows the population findings for the U.S. top 10 ancestry groups.

In Northern Michigan, German ancestry in all the counties in our 11-E2 District are above or or near 50% of the total population. The 2 top counties: Presque Isle leads with 59.97% and Oscoda is second at 57.52% German ancestry populations. The 2 counties with the lowest percentages: Cheboygan with 45.17%, and Charlevoix at 47.64%.

I always thought the English were the largest ancestry group population – they were at the beginning of our nation. The stats are based on what citizens have furnished, so there is always a chance that the data is not carved-in-stone accurate. I'm just grateful that the U.S. language isn't German!
