

Vice District Governor's Message

Greetings fellow Lions, how has your winter been? Are you ready for spring?

The more information someone has about our clubs and Lions in general, the better our chances of getting that person to join.

Our clubs play a key role in our communities and there are people who want to help make our communities stronger. Sometimes they don't know where to go to become involved. That's where you come in: Reach out to people and let them know about Lions.

We are Lions for a reason, because we care and we enjoy service. Let's make sure we share that with as many people as we can, so can grow and be a force in our communities.

 operations, identifying areas that can be improved and taking measured steps to accomplish
 your goals, your club can be even better. The CQI program offers you <u>three suggested ideas</u>
 for implementing the Club Quality Initiative.

As your club develops a plan for membership satisfaction and retention, connecting with the membership chairperson is a great way to help with planning, create enthusiasm and build the club's membership. In addition, reaching out to members within the club and building teams that will help enhance their experience as Lions is key to success.

 Review the <u>Membership Satisfaction Guide</u>: This guide will help you troubleshoot common issues that members have in their experience as Lions. There are useful templates for quick surveys of club members to get a pulse on what they think of your club. This will help you identify areas that will improve the club experience.

In mid-2023, we'll be launching the Lion Portal. To ensure a smooth transition, Lions and Leos should make sure their information (their name, contact information and communication preferences) is correct in MyLCI. Also, a unique, unshared email address is required to log into the Lions Portal. Get news and updates on the Lion Portal page.

Sending a voting delegate to LCICon 2023 in Boston? They must be registered for the convention and assigned as a voting delegate by their club secretary or other duly authorized officer in MyLCI by July 5. Get more information on the LCICon election page.

Dear Lion Leader,

Lions International has been made aware of the increasing number of phone, text, social media and email scams. Most recently, fraudulent invoices have been sent to clubs by scammers requesting payment for products delivered or services rendered.

Be aware of scams that fraudulently use the Lions Clubs International, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), the International Association of Lions Clubs or other variations of our organization's name and logo. These types of scams are designed to trick people into revealing personal and financial information about themselves, which can then be used to commit identity theft, but they often misspell the name of the organization.

If you receive a suspicious mailing, email, text, check or social media message, please follow these guidelines:

- Do not reply, open any attachments or click on any links in the message.
- Be wary of any offer to accept a check or money order in an amount greater than you are owed or requests to return money to the check sender.
- Look carefully at every invoice and compare it to previous ones
 received that you know to be genuine particularly the bank
 account details, the wording used and association name and
 branding.
- Do not immediately cash an unexpected or surprise check. Do not deposit it unless you are expecting a check and you are absolutely certain it is meant for you.
- Do not pay upfront for a promise like a grant, debt relief or financial assistance.

If you have any doubts about whether a Lions International or LCIF communication is authentic, you should contact us at privacy@lionsclubs.org before you act.

Fraudulent "scams" are increasingly common in our digital world, so it is important to remain vigilant. Read <u>How to Protect Yourself from Scams</u> to find more information on the steps you can take to protect yourself.





DISTRICT NEWS

Lions of Michigan Foundation Sight and Hearing Tickets

I hope everyone is doing well selling their sight and hearing tickets. I have attached a list of the tickets that were sent to each club in November, which I based on how many you had sold last year, with a minimum of 30 sent to each club. I have 136 tickets that haven't been distributed to a club in the district, so if you need more, let me know. Our district has always been the leader in sales for the state, and I would love to have that continue next year. The goal of your trustees this year is for us to sell 3000 tickets as a district (note-Oscoda alone took 1100 tickets, so if they sell all of those, it doesn't leave all that many for the rest of us!).

I also attached a summary of the grants we have received so far this year, as well as hearing aids provided. Last year the Foundation provided a tremendous amount of assistance to our district, with the \$7,500 grant for the Gaylord tornado, and a number of Veteran's Assistance Grants and hearing aids. In order to be able to continue this service to our communities, we need to support the Foundation. Selling raffle tickets benefits not only the Foundation, but if your club sells a minimum of 30 tickets, you will receive a rebate of \$3.50/ticket, which increases to \$5/ticket if you sell 100 or more, and \$5.50/ticket if you sell 250 or more, so a great fundraiser for your club as well. Even a small club can do well with these. My own Hillman Club with only 14 members has sold 200 for the past several years, and we are on track to do that again this year, so there is no reason that every club in the district shouldn't be able to sell at least 30.

If you want to be entered into the ticket sellers drawing, your stubs and money should be returned to the Foundation by May 6. You may continue to sell tickets until the drawing at the state convention on May 20, but remember that if you are mailing them to allow plenty of time for them to arrive in Lansing. I would suggest at least a week given how slow the mail can sometimes be. Every year the Foundation has to return money and stubs to clubs whose tickets didn't arrive back at the state office in time, so please don't waste all of your efforts by sending them in late! You can also send them to Lion Diane Skop (Houghton Lake Lions) or to me, and we will see that they get to the state office, or to the state convention where the final drawing is held. If you are attending the district convention in April, you can also bring them there. Let me know if you have any questions. Thanks to all of you for all of your support of the Lions of Michigan Foundation.

UPDATE: State of COVID-19 In 2023

The COVID-19 virus continues to evolve as there's a new omicron subvariant called XBB.1.5 sweeping the nation. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's latest report shows it now makes up 74.7% of new COVID-19 infections, up from 49% earlier. Scientists found its concerning mutations make it even more contagious than other strains. That's something experts believe will likely continue in the future.



While XBB.1.5 is spreading easier, doctors find that it doesn't seem to cause more severe disease. That it's mild may be good news, but there are still 500-600 deaths a day. Health experts note that the updated COVID-19 boosters are working well, even against this new variant. Without the bivalent booster, your antibodies won't recognize this variant very well, and doctors are concerned that our high-risk populations, our seniors especially, get that important bivalent booster.

The concern for seniors is certainly well shown in the statistics in COVID-19 death rates. It is documented that 80% of all COVID deaths were over 60 years of age. The following table depicts the correlation of age groups as a percentage of the U.S. population and the percentage of COVID fatalities as of February 1, 2023.

The world wide statistics show the same outcome of greater death percentages growing higher the older the population group is. In Michigan, as of January 1, 2023, through February 21, 2023, 490 people have died from COVID — people 65 & above accounted for 435 of the total deaths.

The Seasons of Life

The month of March marks the end of Winter and the beginning of Spring, at least on the calendar. The actual weather may not correspond to the calendar, as we living north of the 45th parallel, or near it, are often reminded. Some Winter blizzard conditions can, and usually do, show up after Winter "ends". Actually, the marks of seasons, the Solstices and Equinoxes, are determined by the position of the Earth's tilt to the sun.

Seasons have long been used to put a time-line on the journey of human life. We are born, helpless and dependent on others for survival — just as a seed pushes through the soil, dependent on rain and the sun to help it grow and thrive. RISE OF THE PIZZLY

One of the major projects for Lions Clubs International is the Environment; "We serve to sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of all communities."

Human activities have altered environmental norms, resulting in loss of habitat and threat of extinction for many species. Climate change has been particularly rough for polar bears. The usual Arctic ice on which they live and hunt their stable food, seals, has nearly disappeared, melting in the rising temperatures. Starving polar bears are being driven ever



further south, onto land where they meet grizzlies, whose ranges are expanding northwards. With growing contact between the two species comes mating, and therefore increased hybrid offspring, commonly known as "pizzlies", a term replacing the "p" from polar and dropping the "gr" from grizzlies. Some scientists suggested putting the sire's name first (as done for many other hybrid animals), so a hybrid grizzly-polar bear would be one of two names: Pizzly Bear or a Nanulak (the hybrid offspring of a male polar bear and a female grizzly bear), or Grolar Bear or Aknuk (the hybrid offspring of a male grizzly bear and a female polar bear.)

In 2006, a hunter shot what he thought was a polar bear in the Northwest Territories of the Canadian Arctic. A closer look proved to be an altogether more unusual animal: A bear with the cream-white fur of a polar bear but the long claws, humped back, shallow face and brown patches of a grizzly. DNA tests confirmed that the animal was a hybrid — the first documented wild offspring of a polar bear and a grizzly bear.

The most recent estimate of when polar bears diverged from brown bears is less than 500,000 years ago, although scientists continue to research this question. After beginning to branch off, the polar bear's ancestors went through a series of evolutionary changes in order to survive in the Arctic, and ultimately they became superbly adapted to a life of hunting seals and surviving extreme cold. Despite their differences, polar bears and brown bears share lasting DNA genetic similarities that make the two bears biological sister species, so the two species can mate and produce viable offspring. Unlike other hybrids, like donkeys mated with horses to produce sterile mules, the hybrid bears are fertile and have themselves produced young. A 2017 study in the journal Arctic found DNA from eight hybrids springing from a single female polar bear who mated with two grizzly bears.

Polar bears are considered the largest predator on earth. Big, brilliant, and built for cold, the polar bear's keen intelligence has been compared to that of the great apes. Their weak spot is having a specific diet. Grizzlies are also considered to be quite intelligent. One of their strongest traits is that they will eat anything. With pizzlies drawing characteristics from both parents that could give them an edge in warming northern habitats, some scientists speculate that the pizzlies, and/or "grolars", could be here to stay.
