This year, the 105th Lions Clubs International Convention is in Boston, Massachusetts. We look forward to seeing all voting delegates cast their votes for executive officers and international directors.

According to our records, your club does not have a delegate assigned to vote during LCICon 2023. In order to vote, club delegates must:

- Be assigned as a voting delegate by their club secretary or other duly authorized officer in MyLCI.
- Be registered for LCICon 2023. Register for the convention here.
- Have a unique email address. Use the same email as registering for LCICon 2023.
- Provide their member identification number when registering for the convention.

All delegates must be assigned before July 5, 2023 at 23:59 U.S. Central Daylight Time. You may assign a delegate in MyLCI until the July 5 deadline. If you are assigning a delegate with your local system or through your Council Office, please check with your council chairperson for their submission deadlines, as it will likely be before July 5, 2023.














District 11-E2 Convention April 21-23, 2023



The meeting was called to order at 10:00 AM by DG Leathers. The invocation was offered by 1VDG Murch. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by ZC Denny Gocha.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Minutes of the 11/19/22 cabinet meeting were presented by CST Durflinger. It was moved by 1VDG Murch, supported by ZC Gocha that they be accepted as presented. Motion carried. There was no correspondence.

Treasurer's Report- The YTD 2022-23 financial reports were presented, showing a beginning balance in the admin account of \$38,625.41, income of \$15,647.20 and expenses of \$19,813.67, leaving an ending balance in the admin account of \$34,458.94 as of 3/8/23. This consists of \$33,037.83 in admin and \$1,421.11 in convention funds. The projects account showed a beginning balance of \$32,078.77, income of \$35,563.26, and expenses of \$31,773.07, leaving an ending balance of \$35,868.96 as of 3/8/23. It was moved by ZC Leathers, supported by 1VDG Murch that the reports be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

<u>Old Business-</u> Gahagan Nature Preserve support letter- We received a request to show support for the GNP visually impaired trail project to go with their grant request. There were several samples provided. CST Durflinger will draft something and send to the cabinet for approval.

New Business- Community Impact Grant Application- We have funds available from LCIF to do a community impact project. The information was sent out to all clubs, with only one response which came from the Hillman Lions Club for enhancements at the Hillman Band Shell. It was moved by IPDG Gaines, supported by 1VDG Murch that we approve the project, and allow the Hillman Club to submit it to LCIF. Motion carried.

<u>Hoop House Donation</u>- ZC Kane submitted a request from the Alpena area for a group that grows vegetables at the local community college and distributes them to local food pantries etc. to help buy seeds. The Alpena Club donated \$300 toward the request. It was moved by ZC Leathers, supported by ZC Gocha that we match the Alpena Club contribution. Motion carried.

<u>Creation of Hunger Fund-</u> CST Durflinger noted that it was time for us to review our district project funds and consider revamping them to better meet current needs. It was suggested that we add a hunger fund, and consolidate some of the various medical funds into one medical account. It was also felt that some of the funds should be reallocated within the funds. CST Durflinger will come up with a draft proposal for cabinet review. It will then be sent to the clubs, and will be voted on at the business meeting at the convention.

Bear Lake Camp Contribution- Clubs have received a request to provide additional funds over and above their normal contributions to replace the golf carts at Bear Lake Camp. It was moved by IPDG Gaines, supported by 1VDG Murch that the district donates \$500 for this project. Motion carried.

<u>Support for state convention</u>- DG Leathers reported that the state is soliciting support for the state convention. It was moved by ZC Gocha, supported by 1VDG Murch that we support it at the \$150 level. This will come from district admin funds.

GLT Report- GLT Zeller turned in a written report.

GMT Report- IPDG Gaines turned in a written report.

<u>GST Report</u>- In addition to her written report, GST Marie Leathers commented that only 3 clubs so far have supported the Habitat tool service project for the convention. CST Durflinger reported that in addition we received financial support to buy the tools from 2 clubs. If we are going to be able to provide the 50 bags we want to pack, we will need more participation from district clubs.

Zone Chair Reports- ZCs Gocha, Leathers and Kane turned in written reports. ZC Leathers added to her report that she has a goal of making the Gahagan Nature trail a zone project.

Oral Reports- Peace Poster- Lion Jean Manning reported that the Peace Poster winner will be attending the convention luncheon where her prize will be presented. It was decided that we would order Peace Poster kits now and distribute them so clubs could get their local schools started at a time convenient to the local school. CST Durflinger will order 10 kits to start. If you want a kit for your local school, contact Lion Jean. We will also be purchasing paper to be distributed with the kits to ensure that the posters submitted are the correct size. District Convention- DG Leathers, PDG Gingerich and PDG Durflinger reported that planning is proceeding. We have about 60 people registered so far. The next free meal drawing is on 3/15. Subject: potential district funding for hunger project

The Hoop House at Alpena Community College

There is a group of volunteers who grow produce in the hoop house on the college campus. All of this produce is donated to non-profit agencies in Alpena. Most of our produce goes to The Friendship Room; they often share it with other places that help feed our poor. Here is a short version of the history of the hoop house. The hoop house started life as a project of the Friends of the Farmers' Market in summer of 2013. It was erected by the maintenance crew of the college, with a little help from some of the Friends. Once it was put up, a few volunteers from the Friends planted crops to sell at the Market. Selling was not primarily the focus of the originator, Bob Plume, but the project ended up that way. About two years later most of the farmer-venders at the Market thought the produce from the hoop house was too much competition for them, so it was decided to grow produce and donate it to the Friendship Room. The main thrust of the HH is to provide quality produce to help feed the poor in our area. We purchase only organic seeds from the best suppliers. And any fertilizer, or pesticides are organic in nature. If we can buy anything we need from local retailers, they are our first source. All money that we use is donated by the volunteers or other private persons. It seems that the Friends group has no interest in this project at all, and it has been maintained by a group of volunteers, under the leadership of Henry Stibitz (whose wife Florence is an active Alpena Lion).

The group of volunteers is looking for funding to purchase seeds in January. The details are attached.

Just so you know: this past season volunteers gave enough money to revamp our watering system (about \$1200.00) and also create a seedling nursery (about \$900.00) We are serious about feeding the poor! None of us want any expressed gratitude or notoriety for this.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE - DISTRICT 11 E-2 REPORT for 3-11-23

This report is about Pollution and what is considered pollution. Have you thought of sound or noise as being pollution? There are many causes and/or effects of sound or noise pollution. Noise or sound pollution not only can have an effect on humans, but it can also affect animals and plants. We usually think of effects on humans when we think of noise and sound. However, progress in agriculture and clearing land of trees which provide a barrier to sound affects the wild animals.

If animals are forced to leave their original locations, it can have an impact on plants and trees. Insects and birds are prevented from delivering pollen to another plant or preventing dispersal of seeds.

Here is a very short list of what areas of our health can be effected by sound and noise pollution:

I don't have the space to give all of the causes of noise pollution or the effects and preventative solutions. In one of my searches, it was indicated that "the most common issue from noise pollution is heart attacks." There were many suggestions for "decreasing sound and noise pollution."

LCIF Report

Below is an excerpt from the LCIF report on the response to the Earthquake in Turkey for your information. Thanks to our district clubs that contributed to assist those in dire need after the disaster.

Lions International Response to Earthquake in Turkey and Syria

The earthquake that struck Turkey and Syria devastated communities, homes and families. When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, Lions and Lions International are among the first to respond. LCIF quickly awarded a US\$200,000 grant to the Lions in Turkey, who are providing 16 prefab container buildings to the Hatay Province in southeastern Turkey to create a Lions Village for earthquake survivors. As relief needs continue to emerge, additional grants may be awarded. Your donation to the Disaster Relief Fund can be the difference for families struggling to cope with disasters like this one.

We have \$3300 in funds available for a Community Impact Grant, but only received one application to use the funds. As we earn more each year, it would be nice if clubs would look around their communities for a project that would help with the quality of life in their area- upgrades of trails, playground equipment, park upgrades, etc.

Last year we ended the year with total contributions of \$19,134.75, a 53% increase over the previous year as clubs increased their donations to Campaign 100. We still have 5 clubs that never make a contribution to LCIF, which I find surprising with the amount of money that has come into our district recently between Covid relief, the Gaylord tornado and the Community Impact Grants. It would be wonderful if those clubs would consider at least a token contribution to OUR Foundation. So for this year our contributions total \$8,955 from 14 clubs. Our average giving over the past 4 years is \$13,120/year.

I recently sent out a list of where clubs stand with regards to awarding Melvin Jones Fellowships. I was surprised at how much some clubs have accumulated without selecting someone in their club for recognition. And remember that you can also award them to a deserving community member, or to someone who has been especially helpful to your club.

We currently have a special fundraiser going on for LCIF in the district. DG Rod has agreed to shave his head if we raise an additional \$10,000 this year, and the PID who is visiting our convention this year will shave his head if we raise \$20,000. You can make a contribution on Facebook, or can send a check made out to the district with a notation that it is for DG Rod's haircut. So far we have raised just over \$2,000, so we have a way to go. Please talk to your club about supporting this fundraiser.



UPDATE: State of COVID-19 In 2023

Globally, nearly 4.1 million new cases and 28 000 deaths were reported in the last 28 days (13 February to 12 March 2023), a decrease of 40% and 57%, respectively, compared to the previous 28 days; however, there are significant regional differences including increases in some regions.

As of 12 March 2023, over 760 million confirmed cases and over 6.8 million deaths have been reported globally.

Current trends in reported COVID-19 cases are underestimates of the true number of global infections and reinfections as shown by prevalence surveys.(1–4) This is partly due to the reductions in testing and delays in reporting in many countries. Data presented in this report may be incomplete and should, therefore, be interpreted with caution. Additionally, data from previous weeks are continuously being updated to incorporate retrospective changes in reported COVID-19 cases and deaths made by countries.

We present changes in epidemiological trends using a 28-day interval. This helps to account for delays in reporting, smooth out weekly fluctuations in case numbers, and provide a clear picture of where the pandemic is accelerating or decelerating. Disaggregated data are still accessible on the WHO COVID-19 dash-board, where the full dataset is available for download.

SARS-CoV-2 variants of concern and Omicron subvariants under monitoring Geographic spread and prevalence

Globally, from 13 February to 13 March 2023 (28 days), 65,348 SARS-CoV-2 sequences were shared through GISAID. Among these, 64,324 sequences were of Omicron descendent lineages, accounting for over 98.4% of sequences reported globally.

The global variant landscape is characterized by a continuous increase in prevalence of the recombinant variant XBB and its descendent lineages. XBB is a recombinant of BA.2.10.1 and BA.2.75, first reported on 13 August 2022 and which has since spread to 115 countries. XBB was designated as an Omicron subvariant under monitoring due to its genetic constellation and initial evidence of high capacity to cause reinfection. XBB has subsequently diversified into 25 descendent lineages, three of which show continued growth advantage and an increase in prevalence, notably XBB.1.5, XBB.1.9 and XBB.1.9.1. The latter two share the same genetic constellation in the spike region and are expected to have similar phenotypic characteristics as XBB.1.5. WHO monitors all XBB descendent lineages and performs regular risk assessments.†

WHO has updated its tracking system and working definitions for variants of SARS-CoV-2 to better correspond to the current global variant landscape. Each Omicron sublineage will be independently evaluated and classified based on its phenotype. Therefore, from 15 March 2023, the WHO variant tracking system will consider the classification of each Omicron sublineage independently, and not automatically classify it as a VOC solely because it is a sublineage of the established VOC Omicron. HUNGER HURTS: Children In Need In Paradise

Most of us Northern Michiganders consider ourselves lucky to be living in such a beautiful area, where lakes and forests draw tourists from other states as well as from southern Michigan. Emmet County is considered an affluent area, part of Michigan's 300-mile western "Gold Coast" shoreline paradise. In the summer, Emmet County triples in the number of people living here – people with money enough to have a summer home up here, and many fortunate to have massive fortunes; big players in business, celebrities, and sport icons.

Of course we all know that most Emmet County locals don't have that level of wealth. However, I was gobsmacked when I learned that almost half of the students attending schools in our county live in hunger. Kathy Petersen, Executive Director, Founder and Volunteer of Northmen Den Youth Pantries, talked to Petoskey Lions about Emmet's hunger problem. The following info is taken verbatim from a NDYP flyer and newsletter:

"It's hard to believe, having million-dollar vacation homes on the shores of Lake Michigan and area lakes, there is such HUNGER in our paradise. But there is! According to www.mischooldata.org, Emmet County's public schools have 2,036 middle and high school teens with 913 eligible for free or reduced-cost lunches determined by family income. That's 49% – as many as 1 out of 2 teens in Emmet County are dealing with HUNGER.

- Alanson 1 out of 2 students

On average a student receives \$13.00 worth of food in each bag for the weekend.
