FROM THE GOVERNOR...

At the Michigan Forum this year the Lions of Michigan packed over 250 backpacks

with shelf stable food to be distributed to children who need it throughout the state.

Lion CarlaJean and I brought 12 of these backpacks back to Grayling and gave them to the Grayling Middle School to be distributed. So many children are in need of food at home. They get


meals (free or reduced cost) at school, but during vacations and weekends they may not be getting nutritious meals.

We need to address this need. I encourage our Lions Clubs to examine the issue in their service area and assist in any way that they can. There are a number of ways to help. Some clubs may choose to implement their own backpack food program, while some may choose to donate money to the local food bank. The Food Bank of Eastern Michigan has its own backpack program. The FBEM covers 13 of the 17 counties in District 11-E2.

Designed to provide extra support on weekends for children who receive free or reduced-priced lunches at school, this program provides a backpack full of nutritious

and easy to prepare foods for children to take home on the weekends when school meals are



The program began in 2004 with 50 backpacks in 2 elementary schools. Currently, this program serves nearly 7,000 children in more than 160 schools throughout 22

counties in northeast Michigan. For more information, please contact Kathleen Payton at 810.396.0227. The Food Bank accepts donations of both money and physical assistance.

In our three western counties, the Manna Food Project serves Antrim, Charlevoix, and Emmet Counties. The "Food 4 Kids" Backpack Program provides shelf-stable, nutritious food for children over the weekend who otherwise may not have enough to eat when they are not receiving school breakfast and lunch.

A typical backpack might include low fat milk, 100% juice, cereal, granola, applesauce, fruit snacks and chicken Ramen noodles. Manna distributes 2,200 backpacks each week Continued on Page 2...

children where the packs are distributed.

Manna volunteers receive group hugs, sweet comments, stories and cheerful thank you from the children when they deliver to these schools.

During the summer months Manna distributes "snack packs" to children. Snack packs are a downsized version of the backpack and provide some extra food for children when they are home and not receiving school breakfast and lunch.


