DIABETES AWARENESS



Diabetic retinopathy is a potentially blinding complication of diabetes that damages the eye's retina. It affects ¹ half of all Americans diagnosed with diabetes.

At first, you may notice no changes in your vision. But don't let diabetic retinopathy fool you. It could get worse over the years and threaten your good vision. With timely treatment, 90 percent of those with diabetic retinopathy can be saved from going blind.

The National Eye Institute (NEI) is the Federal government's lead agency for vision research. The NEI urges everyone with diabetes to have an eye examination through dilated pupils at least once a year.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH Mediterranean Quinoa Salad

2/3 cup regular or red quinoa
2 6-ounce cans very low-sodium chunk white tuna, drained
1 cup frozen peas and carrots mix, thawed
½ of a small red onion, halved and thinly sliced
½ cup bottled light Italian salad dressing
¾ cup halved cherry or grape tomatoes
Bibb or Boston lettuce leaves

1. Use a fine-mesh strainer to rinse quinoa under running water; drain.
2. In a small saucepan, combine 1-½ cups water and the quinoa. Bring to a boil and reduce heat. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Drain quinoa if necessary.
3. Combine tuna, peas and carrots, onion and salad dressing in a medium bowl. Add hot cooked quinoa. Toss to soften vegetables. Cool to room temperature.
4. Stir in tomatoes just before serving. To serve, spoon salad mixture over lettuce leaves on serving plates

CLUB ACTIVITIES

FAIRVIEW/COMINS—Our club has begun collecting greens to make and sell Christmas wreaths. Helped package and distribute food at the food bank. Helped a family with a handicapped child move into a home in our community.

GAYLORD—Sold Lions mints, Lewiston Lions raffle calendars and Lucky 13 raffle tickets. Budgeted donations were mailed to Leader Dogs of Michigan, \$500; Eversight Michigan, \$100; Lions of Michigan Foundation, \$275; Bear Lake Camp, \$75; All State Band, \$75; Penrickton Center for Blind Children, \$50; Paws with a Cause, \$50; and LCIF, \$500.

GLENNIE—Provided an eye exam and glasses to a local resident.

GRAYLING—Donated \$100 to provide Christmas gifts for an underprivileged child. Sold candy bars November 4, 5, 25 and 26 at Family Fare in Grayling. Also sold candy bars throughout the month, raising \$614. Screened 64 children at Grayling Elementary School; seven children were referred to an eye doctor for follow-up. Donated \$400 to a local family of a mother and three daughters so they will have food and gifts for Christmas. Finished selling 300 Lucky 13 raffle tickets. Sales began in early October and raised \$1935 for our activity fund. Our first drawing is December 2.

LEWISTON LS LIONS—Sold quilt raffle tickets at the Atlanta Band Boosters Bazaar. Commemorative Tree bulbs were sold in memory or honor of someone and displayed on a large pine tree in downtown Lewiston. A brief ceremony was held on December 2 to light the tree. Members provided refreshments at the township hall. Several members hosted a monthly bingo at the senior apartments.
