#### **CLUB ACTIVITIES**

**ALPENA**—Participated in the gift of life program at the Michigan Secretary of State's office.

BELLAIRE—Discussion of the direction our club is heading in if no one comes forward to help fill the offices for the ensuing fiscal year. The president, 1st and 2nd vice presidents, secretary, treasurer, and membership chair positions were filled as a result. It was decided that our club put forth a huge effort to promote our club and we will be meeting with the editor of the Antrim Review to begin the process. Discussion of our Executive Board meeting ensued with the approval and election of the officers for next year. The memorial for Lion Lee Somers netted \$500, appropriated in his memory to the Bellaire Cub Scouts Pack 15 (which we sponsor) for their new camping equipment. The proposals for merging of the two Districts 11-E1 and 11-E2 and the increase for District dues were presented by paper ballot and approved by the Club. Lions Don and Bobbi Lukins will represent our club at the convention. Sold the rest of the District convention raffle tickets and discussed status of current programs. Guest speaker was Butch Bartz from Butch's Marine in Alden. Historical information of the Clam River area was presented. Convention to be attended by King Lion Bobbi Lukins and club Secretary Don Lukins on Saturday and Sunday, April 29-30. We attended the meeting in the morning on Saturday, the secretary workshop, website technology, luncheon, state projects forum, State Police presentation by PDG Bill Stenback of the Central Lake Lions, raffle, and the Awards Banquet. Sunday began with a memorial service at 8 AM and the District Elections at 11 AM. Much information was obtained to pass on to club members.

CHARLEVOIX—Donations were made to: Keep Charlevoix Beautiful, \$100; Charlevoix Garden Club, \$75; Madonna University, \$250; Venetian Festival space rental fee, \$150; North County Trails membership fee, \$46; and Charlevoix Little League, \$150.

FAIRVIEW/COMINS—Donated to Leader Dogs for the Blind, Bear Lake Camp, Oscoda/Montmorency Child Protection Fund, Fairview School 3rd Grade trip to Detroit Zoo, and Fairview School trip to the Upper Peninsula. Distributed books to 3rd and 5th grade classes, delivered emergency supplies to senior citizens, boxed and distributed food at the local food bank.

**GAYLORD**—Sold 75 Sight & Hearing raffle tickets and received \$74 in donations. Supported an individual with sight needs. Held a Project KidSight vision screening for preschoolers at the Otsego County Fun Fair; 58 children were screened and six children had referrals. Maintained newspaper recycling trailer.

GRAYLING—Provided a \$400 scholarship to a local college student. Held White Cane Fundraiser on April 21-22 and raised \$1270. The Lions of Michigan stuffed backpacks with food at the Michigan Lions Forum, and 12 of those backpacks were presented to the Grayling Middle School to give children who don't get enough nutritious food for the weekend. Provided an eye exam and eyeglasses for two individuals. Provided one person with a hear exam and hearing aid.

LEWISTON LIONESS LIONS—Sold quilt raffle tickets at Family Fare. Donated to: J-L Odyssey for the Mind trip to Lansing for world competition; Oscoda County food pantry; Lydia's Gate; Montmorency/Oscoda Protection Council on Abuse and Neglect; Donated \$100 to support one child in the program to supply food and supplies to Lewiston students each Friday. Donated to the purchase of new J-L cheerleading uniforms.

**MACKINAW CITY—**Will work with the Mackinaw City school system to help repair and install playground equipment at the school. Donated \$500 to the local food pantry to help those in need of nutritious food.

OSCODA—The Oscoda Lions Board of Charities Account and the Oscoda Lions Board of Directors met on April 6 at the United Methodist Church. The membership and two guests met at Tait's for a dinner meeting on April 27. The speaker was Fran Whitney from

NEMCSA. A new member was also inducted. Provided assistance for a student to attend Herter's Music Camp. Donated to the Oscoda Schools Safe Graduation Event for senior students. Assisted with the community scholarship fund. A high school student helped the Lioness and Lions with their regular blood collection. The Lions help to support the 4th of July activities by donating to the cost of the fireworks. A ramp was built to assist a citizen who had a leg removed below the knee.

**PETOSKEY**—Petoskey Lions Club sold Sight & Hearing Sweepstakes raffle tickets on Saturday, April 15, at the D&W Market. A total of 49 tickets were sold, plus 21 tickets sold prior to the event, for a total of 70 tickets sold. At \$2.50 per each ticket sold, the Petoskey Lions earned \$175. In addition, the Lions collected \$275,40 in non-ticket related cash donations, for a total of \$450.40. The Pancake Supper fundraiser served 85 people, with help from friends and family volunteers, including homeless shelter residents of the Nehemiah and Mary Margaret Houses. The event was held at the Petoskey United Methodist Church, on Wednesday, April 19. Pancakes, sausage, applesauce, and ice cream were served. A total of \$468 was collected for the supper with an additional \$56 in donations; expenses to be calculated. Petoskey Lions met at JW Filmore's for a regular business meeting. The major item of business was to select a scholarship winner from 13 Petoskey High School applicants. After screening the applications, a senior student was selected for Wallace C. Glasscock Memorial Scholarship. Other items discussed included the May Camp Daggett Cabin Cleanup, an Installation Dinner in June, participation in the

**LINCOLN LIONS**—Member Duane Dillard spearheaded this donation and coordinated the contributions of several local groups to the Alcona Schools Backpack Program. The Lincoln Lions Club donated \$1000 to this year's program and has pledged another \$1000 for the 2017-18 school year.

A group of Alcona organizations and benefactors have teamed up and raised enough money to operate the Alcona Elementary School backpack program for an entire year.

On Wednesday the groups met with school officials to present checks totaling \$7,200, enough to support up to 72 students at \$100 per student a year, according to elementary Principal Tami Bonzheim.

This is the fourth year for the program where volunteers create food parcels for underprivileged children every week and slip them into the students' backpacks on Thursdays so the students will have food to eat on the weekends, Bonzheim said.

Duane Dillard, a member of the Mikado American Legion, the Lincoln Lions Club and a veteran of the U.S. Marines, said those groups and many others, came together to create the donation, which was largely put together from grassroots donation efforts.

Dillard said the fundraising effort came in part because of what he and his wife had seen around the world in their military careers.

"We have seen the devastation in far off lands and when we decided to move up here we couldn't idly stand by and let the kids go hungry around here," he said.

He said the American Legion, as well as the Mikado American Legion Women's Auxiliary and the Lions, worked to step up donations well beyond the \$4,000 donated last year.

Dillard said many notable organizations in the community also contributed to the effort for this year.

"There were even two people who passed away," Dillard said. "Their memorial funds were created to contribute to the project."

Dillard said the majority of the funds came in the form of donated bottles and cans that were returned for the deposit funds.

"All kinds of kind folks would just donate for the project," he said.

Although the funding will pay for the current year, Dillard said the organizations already are busy raising funds so next year's backpack program can be fully funded from the start.

"We're doing a massive raffle that actually makes the mail in a couple of days," Dillard said. "We're going to be raffling off a generator and a large leaf blower."

According to Bonzheim, the exact number of students in the program changes because different elementary students enter the program and others leave the program. She said regardless, having food in a child's belly when they come to school is important and said the program works as a way for students to have something to eat over the weekend.

"It gives them lunch and the nutrition value that they need and they know that there is going to be food for them over the weekend," she said. "It also helps the parents out with their money so they don't have to decide which bill to pay or to forgo food to put gas in the car."

Bonzheim said she has seen the program grow in the fourth year and there has been a lot of increased community support as the program covers more students.

She said students who get the bags are not chastised by other students.

"The funny thing is we have kids who say 'I didn't get one,' or 'I want one,'" Bonzheim said. "They know that this is something special so this is something that is looked at as a positive in the school."

Lions Clubs International has announced that effective July 1, 2017 membership initiation fees for a new member joining an existing club or the fee for a Charter shall be consolidated into a single category called "Entrance Fee."

- All new members joining after July 1, 2017 will pay a \$35 entrance fee
- This is the first fee increase since 1993
- The entrance fee increase will support the development of:
  - Enhanced new member kit with ongoing new member communications and tools
  - Upgraded MyLCI 2.0 to provide members a destination to track their activities and engage with other members
  - New service programs to support the new global service framework rollout
  - A mobile app for members to serve on the go
  - Digital LION magazine including mobile magazine app

Waiting Until July 1<sup>st</sup> to add your new members this year WILL cost your Club or them additional money!

As of July 1st you should STOP using all literature that has the current "Entrance Fee" on it Membership Applications, Club, State, International Instead you will need to publish or request "NEW" literature to use with the correct updated Member "Entrance Fee".

Please keep informing your clubs of this information right up until the end of the year, a lot of clubs have the habit of holding new members over trying to save paying dues for 1 or 2 months at the end of the year and starting the new year with new members but if they do that this year it will actually cost them more money with the increase in the New Member "Entrance Fee". They need to be added NOW!
