FROM THE GOVERNOR



Greetings 11-E2 Lions:

As I write this, I am on the home stretch of annual club visits to the 32 Lions Clubs of the District. As of October 18, 2018, I will have visited 24 clubs. Every club I visit confirms what I already know – Lions are good, generous people who give back to their communities through service to their fellow citizens - especially to those in need.

But there is also a pervasive attitude of most Lions I have met in my travels that I find problematic and frustrating to the point of pain. That attitude reflects a disconnect between Lions and the organizations to which they pay their dues - Lions Clubs International, Lions of Michigan and District 11-E2. No one seems willing to become active at the District level other than several Past District Governors. Past club presidents need to participate. Otherwise, the pool of eligible Governor candidates dries up. NO ONE HAS TO GIVE UP HIS/HER LIFE TO SERVE AS A DISTRICT OFFICER.

The District is now faced with entering the next Lion year of 2019-2020 with no District Governor. I can't tell you precisely what will then happen, but I would hope LCI would take over the District to preserve the viability of its clubs, at least until such time that we have ELIGIBLE Lions ready to step up. My goal is to have both Vice District Governor positions filled by the end of the District Convention in early May, 2019. But I will no longer stress out and worry about the situation. No more begging, no more cajoling, no more diatribes. The solution to our problem is up to the Lions of 11-E2. I can live with the consequences of no solution. Can you and your communities?

Now to more positive news. Most 11-E2 clubs have shown at least partial support for Leader Dogs, Bear Lake Camp, Eversight, Lions of Michigan Service Foundation and Lions International Foundation. I would like to recognize 15 11-E2 clubs who contributed to all five of these projects during the 2017-2018 Lions year:

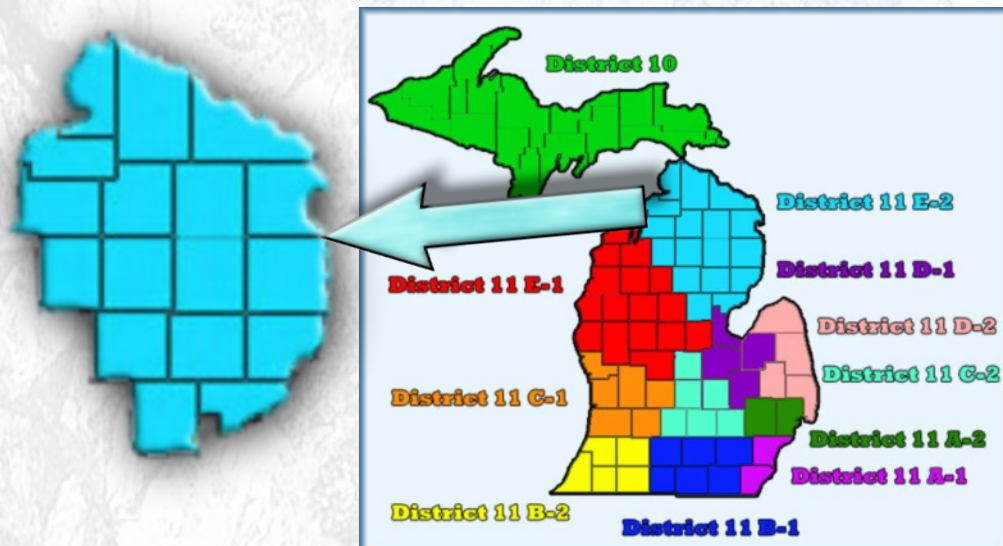

GUDRUN YNGVADOTTIR: INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



**International President
Gudrun Bjort Yngvadottir**

For those Lions who may have missed it, Gudrun Yngvadottir, from Gardabaer, Iceland, was elected to serve as International President of Lions Clubs International (LCI). Her election at the 101st International Convention in Las Vegas, Nevada, June 29 through July 3, 2018, is a landmark in history as Gudrun is the first woman to hold this position in LCI. A brief bio is presented below:

International President Yngvadottir is a biomedical scientist and has worked in research, education and management. Since 1990 she has worked at the University of Iceland as Vice Director at the Institute of Continuing Education. A member of the Gardabaejar Eik Lions Club since 1992, President Yngvadottir has held many offices within the Association, including District Governor Council Chairperson. She has dedicated her service to children and youth, membership and leadership development, health and wellness, including vision and diabetes, environmental projects and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). She has served on many committees as well.

In recognition of her service, Gudrun has received numerous awards including the Kjarans Medal, the highest award of Icelandic Lions; the Lions Crystal, the highest award of Norwegian Lions; several Membership and Extension Awards; eleven International President's Awards; and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest Lions Clubs International award. She is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. In addition to her Lions activities, President Yngvadottir is active in numerous professional and community organizations, including the Icelandic Association of Biomedical Scientists and has been its representative for cooperation between Scandinavian and European scientists. President Yngvadottir and her husband, Dr. Jon Bjarni Thorsteinsson, a past international director and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have one son, one daughter and six grandchildren.

Lions Response to Hurricane Florence

Note: As this is being written, Hurricane Florence is wreaking havoc along the Atlantic coasts of the Carolinas. Category 1 winds, powerful storm surges several feet high, and incredible amounts of rain (up to 40 inches, or even more in some areas), are creating power failures, falling trees, ravaged buildings, and massive flooding. The destruction this storm inflicts may be unprecedented - recovery will be difficult and may take years to fully complete. Many government and private organizations are marshalling resources to help the people suffering from this disaster. As Lions living in Northern Michigan, we don't always realize the breadth and depth of the Lions organization when it comes to providing aid in disaster situations. Lions are there, doing what needs to be done, and helping those who need help. The following information was sent out on September 13, 2018:

A Message From Lions Clubs International Chairman Dr. Naresh Aggarwal

"With Hurricane Florence pummeling the Carolinas and Virginia, it appears this year's hurricane season is off to a strong start. Disastrous winds, deadly storm surges and catastrophic flooding are expected to devastate the region.

Local Lions are already planning their long-term response. While many organizations, agencies and departments will be there in the aftermath to offer immediate relief and supplies, Lions will be on the ground for as long as it takes these communities to rebuild. This is the real heart of Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) disaster relief programs. Lions live, work and play in the places where they serve and are committed to helping their neighbors get back on track, no matter how long that takes."

Defense Against Diabetes (A Primer)

The 2017-18 Council of Governors were presented with the results of a \$45,000.00 Grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation to District 11E1 which resulted in a program which developed and implemented a pilot program for diabetics. It involved a comprehensive plan that provided diabetic retinopathy screenings, A1C screenings and nutritional educational training for diabetics. The original projection for the number of participants was 400 and that goal was surpassed by 30% and actually served 524 participants. Based on the information that was presented to the COG, they approved a statewide (MD-11 and SD-10) project to apply for a \$250,000 matching grant. The amount to be raised is \$62,000.00 and the matching amount would be \$188,750.00. At the first cabinet meeting for 2018-19, a vote was taken and the cabinet approved our participation in this project. We have submitted our proposal and budget to the steering committee for submission to LCIF.

Each district is asked to provide \$5,681.00 and will receive \$17,045.00 for a total of \$22,726.00 to use toward the project. In District 11E2 we have 32 Lions Clubs and eight Lioness Clubs. Each club is asked to contribute a minimum of \$142 and they can expect a return of \$568.00 to provide these services in their community. Clubs are expected to provide volunteers to do the A1C screenings. This would be accomplished at stand alone events promoted by the club or at health fairs sponsored by hospitals and clinics in the district.

The time line on this project is that we must submit our application to LCIF by October 9, 2018 and LCIF will approve or deny the grant in early 2019. We should be planning to sponsor events to hand out information and conducts screenings in April, 2019 and beyond. All of the funds must be used within one year of the grant being approved.

How to Scan QR Codes Using Your iPhone or iPad

September 4, 2018

QR codes can be used for website links, coupons, tickets, and contact information, just to name a few, and scanning them using your iPhone or iPad is completely accessible for blind and low vision iOS users.

Apple has built QR code recognition directly into its camera app, which means all you need to do is open it up and point it at the code in question. Remember to have some lighting for scanning the QR code.

You'll get a notification appear on screen once your iOS device recognizes what it's looking at (which generally takes less than a couple of seconds), promoting you to action the link the QR code points to, a quick tap on this and you'll be taken to the desired location, usually within the Safari web browser.

This works on all iPhone and iPad devices running iOS 11, and higher.

How to scan a QR code on iPhone and iPad

Open up the camera app on your iPhone or iPad.

Hold the device's camera up to the QR code.

No need to hit the shutter button, your iOS device will automatically recognize the QR code and provide you with an on-screen notification. (Make sure you have mobile signal or you're connected to Wi-Fi.)

Select the notification to be taken to the destination of the QR code.

There's also a built-in QR reader in the Wallet app on iPhone and iPod. To access the scanner, open the app, select the plus button at the top of the "Passes" section, then select Scan Code to Add a Pass.

From here, you can scan QR codes for coupons, boarding passes, tickets, and loyalty cards, but only for the specific things that Wallet considers "passes."

If you try to scan any other QR code, you'll get an error message.

How to Scan Codes with your Smartphone

Your phone is capable of reading QR codes and barcodes, but you need the right app. We show you how to scan codes on an Android phone.

How to scan codes with your smartphone

Your smartphone has the ability to read both QR codes (which automatically take you to a website URL) as well as scanning a barcode to bring up product information such as price comparisons and user reviews. All you need to do is download the right app and then simply point your smartphone camera at the codes.

First of all we should say that there are tons of apps out there that claim to do this, and a lot of them are very good. For the purpose of this tutorial we have chosen two popular apps that we are familiar with and we are installing both on an Android phone. You'll be able to find similar free apps for iPhone in the App Store.

How to scan QR Codes with an Android smartphone

Download QR Code Reader from Google Play

Launch QR Code Reader

Allow the app permission to take pictures and record video

Point the phone's camera at the QR code so it sits inside the square shown onscreen

The app will read the QR code and offer up a link to the related website

How to scan barcodes with an Android smartphone

Download Barcode Scanner from Google Play

Launch Barcode Scanner

Position your phone camera so the green line shown on screen runs horizontal across a product barcode

Select either Product search or Web search depending on what information you want to discover

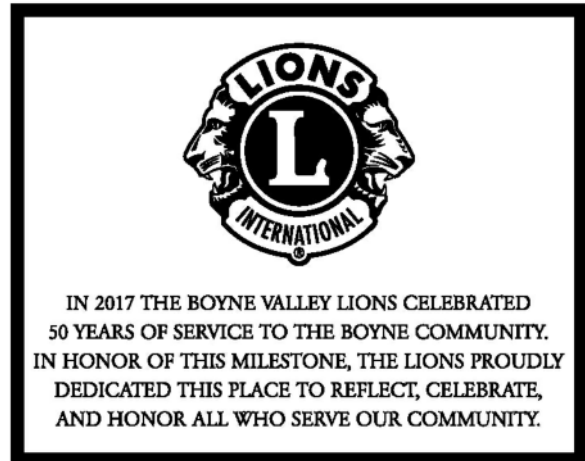
August:

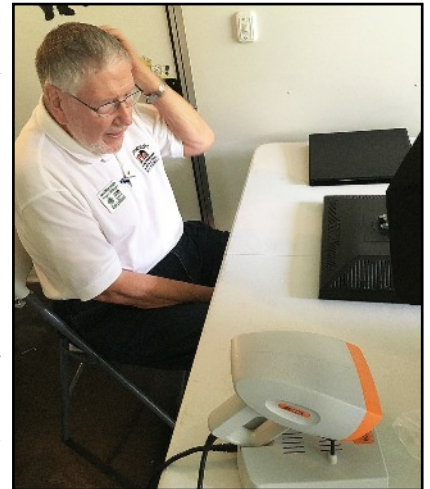
Six Petoskey Lions Club volunteers, with help from the Camp Daggett staff, served 22 youth at the breakfast, as well as 20 counselors and staff.

Red Cross Closing Update

-From Petoskey Lion David Zimmer

Heads Up Notice: I was recently contacted by local Red Cross Coordinator Collette Sparks, who informed me that the Red Cross, in a cost-cutting move, is closing all "Mobile Collection Centers" in Northern Michigan, including the Petoskey Red Cross site

According to Collette, the closest sites for Northern Michiganders to donate blood after the closings will be Traverse City, Grand Rapids, Lansing and other southern Michigan cities.

Collette said they were notified that the closings would be in mid November; then this date was postponed. She said few specific details are being shared. There is confusion and uncertainty as to when the final date will be determined, which is particularly difficult for the more than 200 Red Cross staff members who will lose their jobs.

As it stands now, the Red Cross is doing "business as usual", so our November 2nd Blood Drive is still on as scheduled.

There is a chance that the closing decision could be re-evaluated and reversed. It could turn out that there are alternative cost-cutting measures that would be a better choice. But if not, this could be the last Blood Drive for the Petoskey Lions, as well as for the other Northern Michigan Lions Clubs that sponsor blood drives in our District 11-E2.

It seems counterintuitive that an organization consistently asking the public to "donate critically needed blood" would abandon a large segment of its Michigan collection source. One wonders how many local donors will want, or be able, to go to Traverse City to donate blood after this cost-cutting move closes the local sites.

We'll have to wait and see how this turns out.
