
This past week I attended a community pocket park dedication by the Van Buren Lions Club. It was an awesome project and will be

Beyond Borders

As I sit and listen, I can hear the chatter coming from the many headphones being worn and the eleven translation booths directly behind me. It wasn't loud, but for me it created a certain level of noise. It also created excitement that only comes when you feel change is about occur. In my case, it was a connection to Lions around the world.

Over 700 DGEs from around the world attend this training in St. Charles and are broken up into groups of 20 to 25. This map shows where members of DGE Bryan's group came from.

Have you ever thought about Lions around the wond. Have you ever thought about Lions in other countries? What projects they take on, what services their communities need, compared to ours? Sure, we have. We've all read articles, watched videos, and thought about the Lions service impact in other parts of our world. But it's so easy to overlook or forget what's not in front of us. I'm reminded of that saying, "Out of sight, out of mind". I would think that to a smaller degree this might hold true for our neighboring clubs as well.

I had the privilege to attend the District Governor Elect seminar at the Q Center in St. Charles, IL. Lions from around the world attended. In my small classroom study group (also known as Group #20), we had Lions from the US, Canada, Trinidad, India, Sri Lanka and Turkey. Meeting so many Lions from around the world, helped me to see that we all face problems and in a lot of ways, the same problems, and issues. And though I enjoyed meeting all the Lions and even got invited to Sri Lanka, this story is about our Lions from Turkey. They had just taken flight to the US when their country erupted in destruction, chaos, and mass loss of life. A 7.8 magnitude earthquake ripped thru Country erupted in destruction, chaos, and mass loss of life. A 7.6 magnitude earthquake ripped thru Turkey leaving behind a desperate cry for loved ones. Being in the same group with the Lions from Turkey allowed me to see and feel their pain, tears and a choked up "thank you for your support". I was only given a tiny glimpse of the pain the people living in Turkey will experience. However, this will forever change my view on Lions around the world. I feel very fortunate to have got to know these three individuals of another culture. Had Refik, Yasar and Buket been in a different group, I would not have experienced the same connection. Most likely, we may have never met. I realize there are many aroas of our world that are sufficient. But because the Lions of Turkey decided to there are many areas of our world that are suffering. But, because the Lions of Turkey decided to stay for the seminar, I now can relate on a personal level to the disasters, destruction, and pain at a global level.

I now have a connection to Lions in other parts of our world. My growth as a Lion expanded – Beyond Borders.

On the phone, I enjoyed a great conversation with Lion Jerry Aldridge. He lived in Bentonville and worked for the city for a while before opening a home decoration store.

Lion Jerry is an artist and graphic artist who often times sketched caricatures of fellow Lions and club guest speakers. In the late eighties and early nineties, he designed sever Arkansas State Lions pins as well as pins for Bentonville, Bella Vista and both the Springdale Lions and the Springdale Lionesses.

Antidotal information indicates he was a member of the Benton-

ville Noon club while LCI records he was a member of the Bella Vista Club. Back in those days, there was little distinction by members or the public between the two clubs as evidenced by one of the pins he designed lists both clubs. PCC Myrna McGee, whose husband PID Don McGee was a member of the Bentonville Noon club, remembers them, his wife Mary Jo was also a Lion.

Recently, the question was asked, "What is the average age of Lions Club members in Arkansas?"

State Secretary and Past District Governor Wanda Green provided the research used to plot this graph. It's interesting in that it creates the bellcurve we most likely expected, but it's still does not show the average age.

By using the provided information and making a few assumptions about the average age of members in each of the groups, the average of an Arkansas Lion appears to be 63 years and 8 months.

LCI Warns: Don't be Scammed!

Lions International has been made aware of the increasing number of phone, text, social media and email scams. Most recently, fraudulent invoices have been sent to clubs by scammers requesting payment for products delivered or services rendered.

Be aware of scams that fraudulently use the Lions Clubs International, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), the International Association of Lions Clubs or other variations of our organization's name and logo. These types of scams are designed to trick people into revealing personal and financial information about themselves, which can then be used to commit identity theft, but they often misspell the name of the organization.

If you receive a suspicious mailing, email, text, check or social media message, please follow these guidelines:

• Do not reply, open any attachments or click on any links in the message.

• Be wary of any offer to accept a check or money order in an amount greater than you are owed or requests to return money to the check sender.

• Look carefully at every invoice and compare it to previous ones received that you know to be genuine – particularly the bank account details, the wording used and association name and branding.

• Do not immediately cash an unexpected or surprise check. Do not deposit it unless you are expecting a check and you are absolutely certain it is meant for you.

• Do not pay upfront for a promise like a grant, debt relief or financial assistance.

If you have any doubts about whether a Lions International or LCIF communication is authentic, you should contact us at <u>privacy@lionsclubs.org</u> before you act.

Fraudulent "scams" are increasingly common in our digital world, so it is important to remain vigilant. Read <u>How to Protect Yourself from Scams</u> to find more information on the steps you can take to protect yourself.


<u>Official Call</u>

Hot Springs Evening Lions Club had a busy and productive winter quarter. In November, we donated \$1000 to our local Village Employee Benefit Fund. The Village Employees Benefit Fund (VEBF), a non-profit volunteer group not associated with the POA, was founded in 1999 by Village residents to say, "Thank You" to approximately 450 non-executive employees for their service. When we have an ice storm, crippling snowstorm, fire, tornadoes, or some other emergency, their services are very visible. What isn't so visible is their day-to-day effectiveness, even though our workers must do their jobs in heat, cold, and sometimes other dangerous conditions.

The VEBF distributes donated funds to POA Employees at their annual Christmas Luncheon with a thank you note from us, the residents, who deeply appreciate their dedicated performance throughout the year. They also support an emergency fund to assist POA employees with funds during a personal or financial crisis.

In December, our Lions were busy supporting the Cedar Mountain Boys and Girls Club. The club donated \$300 towards the Christmas dinner fund to ensure that families in need had food during the holiday season. Individual Lion members stepped up and donated personal funds to increase that donation to over \$1200. In addition, Lions also sponsored 12 children from the Angel Tree and purchased gifts for children who might not experience a Christmas holiday.


