Past District Governors Help MD7 With Budget Shortfall

Membership in Multi-district 7 is down this year by 255 members resulting in a \$3100 shortfall in the state's 2021-22 budget. Council Chair Jeremy Kimble and State Secretary Wanda Green have been working diligently to make necessary cuts in order to present a proposed balanced annual budget to the Council of Governors for their approval at their July 10 council meeting. Not easily done according to CC Kimble.

In a pre-council emergency meeting on July 7, The Past District Governors Association agreed to make up the shortfall with a \$3100 donation to the multi-district. The motion was made by PCC and PDGA Treasurer Tracy Price. The proposal passed, but not with out the reminder that this is a one-time donation and that the multi-district must make plans for increasing membership this year.

PCC Price, who is also the states GAT leader for membership and CC Kimble agreed that they would present the basics for a membership plan at the July 10 Council of Governors meeting.

IRS 990s DUE NOV. 15

With few exceptions, most Arkansas clubs and districts follow the same July to June fiscal year that LCI follows. That means it's time for clubs to file there IRS 990 reports. November 15, 2021 is the deadline.

Even if a club did not meet because of Covid, or had little or no income, filing with the IRS is required. There can be consequences when clubs do not file properly.

GOVERNORS MEET IN LITTLE ROCK



On Saturday, July 10, Council Chair Jeremy Kimble called the first meeting of the new council of governors to order. All four district governors were present along with many of the MD committee chairs. Others participated using Zoom.

CC Kimble introduced business owner and Hot Springs Village Evening Lion Jack Wells who made a presentation to the governors allowing his company to maintain the inventory of the MD's Arkansas Lions branded items and fulfill orders as needed. The council approved the proposal.

Past District Governors Association Treasurer Tracy Price presented Council Treasurer Don Young a check for \$3100. (See related article)

Treasurer Young then presented next year's budget which was approved after some discussion. According to CC Kimble, the donation from the PDGA, allowed a budget almost identical to last years.

There was lengthy discussion on the need for and roll of the Special Events Planning Committee. Their roll in recent years had expanded beyond that described in our constitution and by-laws. The council decided to retain the SEPC and revert back to the constitution for their job description.

There for awhile, it looked as if we would have no host-club for the Mid-Winter Leadership Forum, but the Conway Noon Lions stepped up. No date has been set, but Mid-Winter is usually scheduled in January. The council chair said he felt like in recent years, Mid-Winter has become much like the state convention. This year he is going to

count on his GAT leaders and others to provide some actual training, which was the original intent of Mid-Winter.

The meeting concluded with District Governors Rene' Roberts, Carol Allen, Roy Patterson and Don Young introducing themselves.

Immediate Past President Danny Walters receive the "Lion of the Year" for serving as club president for two years and leading them through the Covid Pandemic.


The Fayetteville Lions Club currently meets on the first and third Wednesday each month at Mermaids restaurant in Fayetteville.

DINNER PROCEEDS DONATED — The Hope Lions Club recently held two fish/chicken fry dinners, with proceeds going to local organizations — one for the local charitable medical clinic and one for the local homeless shelter. Both events were very successful. The event for the charitable medical clinic fed about 500 people. The event for the local homeless shelter fed about 800, and it had to stop early because we ran out of food.

In both events the club partnered with churches, the City of Hope, the entity that was the recipient for the funds, and several local businesses to put on the event. The next chicken/fish fry will be held during the Hope Watermelon Festival (August 6). Most of the proceeds from that event will go to Mid-South Lions Sight and Hearing.





The new concrete floor was a Scout Eagle project. Concrete, sand, and gravel was donated by local businesses.

A local funeral home supplied, set up, and took down the tents.

A local restaurant secured the fish for us from Texarkana (Good fish is hard to find, and we have to get it in small orders.) They also stored the fish until the dinner.

A local grocery store helped each entity determine how much food and other supplies they needed to get and stored the food until the dinner.

The City of Hope provided the coliseum free of charge, set up tables and chairs, and cleaned up afterwards. They also allowed use of their dumpsters free of charge.

Local churches provided desserts to sell.

A local church youth group served the food.

A local auctioneer volunteered his time to auction off the desserts

Several years ago, our trailer that the local college class had made us to haul the fishcooking supplies got too old. These merchants bought ads to provide a new trailer.



Medical Clinic – Served about 550 meals and earned about 1/3 of their year's budget. Homeless Shelter – Served about 800 meals until they ran out of food. Raised about \$15,000.

They had no idea that it had been sitting their garage for years, apparently after long-time Jonesboro University Heights Lions member Jim Mashburn died and his widow [now Lion Helen Mashburn] brought a whole bunch of old JUH Lions records to Lion Charles, to get them out of her house. (He was then club Secretary.)

Our club decided to save and frame this historic charter and hang it next to **our** club charter in our Lions Den at the restaurant (the *Eggsellent Café*) where we meet, . Arkansas Lions are urged to take a look at it if they are in Jonesboro, and especially view the signatures of the original members. (Linda Benefield was an original member, and her husband Mike Benefield was the President of the sponsoring club, the Jonesboro University Heights Lions. Both have their signatures on the Charter.)

The Lions Store has been in business in various forms since Lions Clubs International was founded in 1917. Early issues of *LION Magazine* carried ads for club stationery and engraved printing plates to promote con-

sistent use of the Lions emblem. Other ads featured products that showcased Lions' pride, like desktop lion figurines and pen-and-ink sets.

According to Club Supplies sales department records, the first stand-alone catalogue appeared in print in the early 1930s. The online Lions Store opened in 1999.

Looking through old catalogues opens windows into Lions history. Some items are gone forever, like the Goat Medal, which members were enjoined to wear until they recruited a new club member.

ittle Rock Founders Lions Club

A 105 year history

PROLOGUE — As you read the history of the Little Rock Founders Lions Club you feel inspired by the member achievements and accomplishments in the years since it was chartered on February 17, 1916. Over the next twelve months we will be providing a history of the Little Rock Founders Lions Club from records passed down over the years from previous Club Secretaries.

Six Lions from the two clubs in Arkansas, Little Rock and Texarkana, attended for their clubs. There are no records of the names of the Lions who represented the Little Rock Lions Club. However, Lion Thomas S. Parker was appointed by the Board of Directors to District Governor for Arkansas for the period 1918-19; we would assume he was in attendance along with others member of the club. The Board also approved a Lions magazine to keep the growing membership informed. Volume 1, Issue 1 of "The Lion" appeared November in 1918. How do we reach out to potential members?

- 1. Ask each member to bring 3 names to the club membership Chair.
- 2. The club membership chair prepares a letter of invitation to the potential Lion asking them to attend a special event to learn more about Lionism. This letter is to be signed by the club President. (Sample letters are included)
- 3. A follow up call to the potential member needs to be made to insure that the potential member will be at the meeting.
- 4. Schedule the District Governor or one of the Vice District Governors to attend the meeting and share information about Lions and their impact on the community and around the world.
- 5. Plan a very professional meeting to be held at the same time as the normal meeting. Lions vests loaded with trading pins are discouraged at this meeting. Shirts with Lions emblem is preferred. Lions songs are not recommended. Prayer and pledge is important. Have someone prepared to handle these.
- 6. Finger foods or a light meal is sufficient for this meeting.
- 7. Insure that membership applications are at each seat.
- 8. After the meal the speaker will share Lions information and challenge the prospective members to complete the application with the help of the sponsor.
- 9. The sponsoring Lion needs to sit with their potential member.
- 10. The speaker needs to explain the Dues structure and how they are used and ways to be collected.
- 11. Club president will have closing remarks, thanking all who are in attendance, and passing on information about the next scheduled meeting and upcoming events.
- 12. After the meeting prepare for the new member induction ceremony which needs to be done in the next few meetings.
- 13. Assign the new members to committees where they will feel comfortable and will be able to use their knowledge.

Other ways to solicit new members:

- 1. Share with potential members that we need their help at our service projects and want them to enjoy our fellowship.
- 2. When contacting business and professional possibilities, ask them which employee they would like to represent their company in the Lions Club. Don't give them the opportunity to give you a No answer.
- 3. Invite potential members to join you at a service project. A good project would be at a Vision screen.

These are only recommendations and can be altered to fit your club.
