Lions Want to Have Fun

Tail Twisters have added elements of fun and surprise to Lions club meetings since the 1920s.

Having fun while doing good has been a Lions specialty from the beginning.

In the early 1920s, many U.S. clubs had pep committees charged with enlivening routine club meetings. Lions soon entrusted the merrymaking function to a single energetic and enthusiastic officer, known as the Tail Twister.

Students of Tail-Twisting lore will find rich veins of anecdote and remembrance among longtime Lions and also in Lions publications.

How did the name Tail Twister come about? *The World's Biggest Doers*, a 1949 history of the Lions, described this origin story, as recounted by Lions founder Melvin Jones:

"One Sunday afternoon three or four of us were discussing this matter of putting pep into the meetings. One fellow who had been born on a farm said we needed to do what used to be done on the farm. When a cow refused to go through the gate, someone would grab her by the tail and twist. We all laughed, but one of the boys said, 'Why isn't that a good name—tail twister?'"

The fact that lions—real lions—also have tails gave the name another amusing twist.

Now optional for all Lions clubs, the role of Tail Twister had been an established office under charter bylaws for decades. But as a 1941 article in LION Magazine made clear: "Of all the officers in the club, he [the Tail Twister] has no rigid code, no well-defined plan of action. He must be a Lion of originality."

Indeed, Tail Twisters have been remarkably creative in promoting fun and fellowship and boosting club treasuries by "twisting" small fines from members for minor breaches of club rules, such as not wearing a nametag or talking during a guest speaker's presentation.

The fines system is both autocratic and democratic. No member can appeal a Tail Twister's levy, and no member is above paying it.

"President Westfall Fined on Southern Trip," ran a banner headline over a full-page story in the April 1927 issue of *LION Magazine*. While visiting the Columbia Lions Club in South Carolina, USA, International President William Westfall forgot his Lions pin when changing "from his train clothes to his speaking clothes." An alert Tail Twister named Goldschmidt spotted Westfall's bare lapels and fined him 10 cents, the going rate for such infractions in the 1920s.

Contests, quizzes, brainteasers, jokes, lighthearted songs and poems are time-tested tools of the tail-twisting trade. Today's practitioners can find and share fresh material on several club websites and on a Tail Twister page on Facebook.



LIBERTY DAY

Lions Clubs across America have participated in this US Constitution educational program in the past and many Lions Clubs are still doing the program. Colorado Lion and program founder Andy McKean would like to revive this program in Arkansas. According to Council Chair Brad Baker, about 20 Lions Clubs in Arkansas have participated in the past.

Lion McKean spoke to the Council of Governors at their January 22 Zoom meeting encouraging Arkansas clubs to host Liberty Day programs in their communities.

Here are Lion McKean's suggestions for organizing a Liberty Day program.

- Contact their local school district Superintendent and/or school board to get their support for this program
- 2. Work with teachers in the school district to find out which teachers would like to participate
- 3. Usually the US Constitution is taught in $\mathbf{5}^{th}$ grade, again in $\mathbf{8}^{th}$ grade, and then again in high school
- 4. Whatever grade level works for the school district is how you should implement the program
- 5. Obtain copies of the Liberty Lives Forever pocket Constitution from our national headquarters in Colorado \$1 each plus shipping
- 6. I would be pleased to send free sample copies of this book to any Lions Club to show to the educators
- 7. Arrange a day and time, hopefully around Liberty Day, March 16th, the birthday of James Madison, the 'father of the US Constitution', to distribute the books to the students
- 8. If possible, arrange for a speaker to speak with the students about the US Constitution and answer their questions this usually takes about 1 hour- Attorneys judges, and elected officials are great speakers
- 9. Inside our pocket Constitution books are 24 Flash Cards for students to study and learn that are all facts taken directly out of the text of the US Constitution
- 10. After the students have studied and learned what is in the US Constitution we ask them to write a short essay indicating what they learned
- 11. You might want to give awards, possibly money, for the top 3 essays, as an incentive for students to do a good job suggested amounts 1^{st} \$100, 2^{nd} \$50, 3^{rd} \$25
- 12. Contact your local newspaper to cover the event. You would probably need the permission of the school district to do this

You do not have to do everything listed above. Whatever works for the schools and the local Lions Club.

Eyeglass collection: Walmart Partners with Lions

Most Walmart stores that have Vision Centers have partnered with the Lions Club to collect used glasses for those in need (outside of the USA). Through participating Walmart and Sam's Clubs you can donate prescription eyeglasses and prescription sun glasses.



In the Vision Center of most Walmarts, there is a blue Lions Club donation box. The Vision Centers will usually accept used glasses even if they do not have a donation box.

One Vision Center associate I visited with told me that when they have time, they clean, read the prescription and mark the glasses for future distribution through the Lions Club.

While there are still a number of Lions Club (usually sponsored by an individual club) Recycling Centers, many clubs have started taking their collected glasses to Walmart for processing.

Walmart does not accept reading glasses. Donated prescription glasses must be unbroken with no missing lenses.

It may be advisable for clubs to call the local Walmart Vision Center before dropping off large amounts of glasses.
