103rd CONVENTION A BIG SUCCESS!

The 103rd annual Arkansas Lions State Convention, the first state event in well over a year, has been considered a great success. Members attending the event in Little Rock nearly doubled expectations of the planning committees.

Both convention key speakers made their presentation using Zoom. Past International President Bill Biggs spoke about the importance of our state projects, Mid-South Lions Sight and Hearing, World Services for the Blind and the Arkansas Lions Eye Bank and Laboratory. He spoke of their great service and their need for continued Lions support.

Past District Governor Chris Gunstream (DG of one of the few districts to test the NAMI programs in 2019) discussed their success and how they used the NAMI program to build their vision to achieve increased membership.

Although this was the 103rd convention, Past Council Chair Tracy Price talked about the achievements of 2019-20 in a short presentation he called the 102nd annual convention. He also presented awards that would have been presented at his convention, had it not been canceled because of Covid.

One of the most moving moments of the event was Conway Evening President and Methodist Minister Bonda Moyer read scripture and offered comments as part of the Celebration of Life Memorial Service for members we've lost in the last two years. Her husband, PDG Norm Moyer was among those lost.

As part of the convention, there was a Council of Governors meeting and convention business meeting. See separate reports of those proceedings as well as a list of award winners elsewhere in this newsletter.





STATE NEWS

COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS

The Council held it forth quarter meeting on the Friday preceding Saturday's convention in Little Rock. All members of the council attended in person.

Aside from presenting previous meeting minutes and the MD7 financial report for approval, all other committee reports were accepted as submitted ahead of time.

Council Chair Brad Baker spoke about Tennessee, Missouri and Mississippi's plan to support a bid by Memphis to host the 2025 USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum. The Arkansas Lions have been asked to join in the effort to bring the forum to Memphis. After is was pointed out there would be no commitment of financial support for several years, the council agreed to support the bid. The USA/Canada Forum is a great leadership development event that draws several thousand Lions each year.

Past District Governor Kandy Cayce submitted information about the newly acquired male Lion at the Little Rock Zoo and for financial support related to its transportation to the zoo. PDG Cayce would like to see individual clubs join in on an effort to recycle Christmas lights in an effort to raise funds. The council encouraged past district governor to reach out to the clubs, as she had requested.

The council agreed to accept Jonesboro's bid to host the 2022 state convention. No club has yet asked to host the next Mid-Winter forum, although Fayetteville is considering the possibility.

The current council members along with our district governors elect held the election for council chair. District 7-0 Governor Jeremy Kimble will be the 2021-22 Council Chair.

COUNCIL ELECT MEETS

After the final council meeting of the year, the incoming council members met to elect council officers and approve committee chair positions.

Council Chair Elect Jeremy Kimble was elected earlier in the day in a joint meeting of current and incoming council members. Elected at this meeting were Roy Patterson, Vice Council Chair; Carol Allen, Council Secretary and Don Young Council Treasurer.

Price for this year's prestige pin is \$6 and the state landmark pin will sell for \$2. The pins are available for purchase at all state events and district conventions.





Twenty-five percent of the funds requested will be released at the time the grant is approved. Additional funds will be paid on a reimbursable basis when the project is completed and proof of expenditures and a final report have been received. The reports must be received within 30 days of the project completion. If the project is long-term, over six month, funds may be reimbursed more often. A project period may be extended upon justification received by the Foundation.

One copy of the grant application must be submitted to the Lions of Arkansas Foundation through any of the trustees listed below.
