FORT SMITH CLUB TURNS 100

Second Oldest Club in Arkansas

The Fort Smith Noon Lions Club was chartered on March 8, 1919 with an impressive group of civic leaders as charter members. The Charter Night Ceremony was held at the Hotel Main on Garrison Avenue. The Fort Smith Noon Lions Club became only the second Lions Club in Arkansas, following the Little Rock Founders Club.









For 100 years, the Fort Smith Noon Lions Club has met regularly on Tuesdays and has been a supporter of local projects to improve Fort Smith. Club participation has included Lions state projects as well as many local charities.

Members of several different Lions Clubs were there to help Fort Smith celebrate their centennial. Fort Smith Mayor George McGill, Sebastian County Judge David Hudson and State Lions Coun-Chair Myrna McGee, along with representatives from Senator John Boozman and Representative Steve Womack's offices praised the 100 years of service provided to the Fort Smith community.



Often, we feel we can't fix the world, but we can help in small ways that will make a big difference to hungry children and discouraged families.




VAN BUREN LIONS CO-SPONSOR NETWORKING EVENT

He graduated from John Brown University's Engineering Department with an undergraduate degree in Aquaponics, Hydroponics, and Sustainable Food and Farming and then moved to Europe to complete his Masters in renewable energy. He started a company, Agrowponics LLC, and he works as a power systems engineer at Southwest Power Pool in Little Rock.
