LCIF GRANT APPROVED Funding for Tele-Retina program with UAMS complete

Council Chair Myrna McGee reports that the LCIF grant submitted jointly by the MD7 Lions and University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) has been approved. The grant for \$40,500 is a matching grant to purchase nine Tele-Retina screening devices for the state. UAMS and the Arkansas Lions had to raise the additional funds to reach the estimated project cost of nearly \$85,000.

UAMS and the Arkansas Eye Bank contributed to the matching funds leaving the Lions to raise about \$12,000. District N Second Vice District Governor Cleon Rogers, one of the projects leads, reported at the recent council of governors meeting that the original amount had been raised as well as the additional \$2,500 needed for things LCIF disallowed form the proposal.

The grant will allow UAMS replace the three units they now have and add six additional units so that eight medical centers state wide will have units. The ninth unit will become a mobile unit moving to areas where it is needed.

Everyone with diabetes is encouraged to have a periodic tele-retinal screening as it detects problems behind the eye missed by normal eye screenings.



Earlier in the day, the club donated \$1000 towards an informational plaque in Freedom Park.



Rogers holds War Eagle Trail Run

Since 2006, athletes from around the country who believe a regular run along a paved road just isn't challenging enough have gathered early on a June morning to set off on the War Eagle Trail Run on dirt paths through the forests of the Hobbs State Park and Conservation Area. The trail run is the Rogers Lions Club's largest fundraiser, bringing in approximately \$6,000 each year that is then put back into the community in the form of assistance for individuals of all ages who need help paying for eye exams and corrective lenses. The club also assists with folks who are headed to MidSouth Lions Sight and Hearing Services in Memphis for treatments. Additional monies are doled out to the Arkansas Lions Eye Bank, Legend Treks, Leader Dogs for the Blind, World Services for The Blind in Little Rock, and three scholarship recipients selected each year from the local high schools.
